






The Amphitheatre-Cedar Lakes FFA-FHA Camp. Project of the West Virginia State Society N. S. D. A. R.



STANDING RULES OF THE CONFERENCE

- 1. All sessions shall begin promptly at the hour announced.
- Delegates are expected to be in their seats before the opening of each session.
- 3. Doors will be closed during speech, musical numbers and reports.
- 4. No delegate shall be entitled to the floor until she rises, gives her name and chapter, and is recognized by the chair.
- 5. A double-spaced, typewritten copy of each report must be handed to the recording secretary.
- 6. All Resolutions must be presented through the Resolutions Committee.
- 7. All main motions must be presented in writing, signed by the mover and seconder. They shall be read from the floor and sent to the desk of the recording secretary. Cards will be provided for the above procedure.
- 8. Any delegate seconding a motion must give her name and that of her chapter.

- Reports of special meetings, including the Founder's State Officers Club, State Chapter Regents' organization, breakfast and luncheons must be given by the president or secretary to the recording secretary for inclusion in the State Proceedings.
- 10. No member shall speak more than twice during the same session to the same question and no longer than two minutes at one time without consent of the conference; the question of granting consent shall be decided by two-thirds vote without debate.
- 11. Robert's Rules of Order (revised) shall be the accepted authority on Parliamentary Law.

SPECIAL CALLED MEETING

Miss Diane Myers

A meeting of the West Virginia Society N.S.D.A.R. was called by the State Regent for Saturday, February 4, 1961, at the Rose City Cafeteria, Washington and Duffy Streets, Charleston, West Virginia, at 12 o'clock. The State Regent presided. Attending were three other state officers, 22 who had been named as delegates or alternates for the State Conference held in Charleston in October 1960 and thus eligible to vote at this call meeting. Also attending were about 10 other D.A.R. members.

Following a Dutch luncheon, the State Regent offered a prayer and the Flag Salute was given. State officers, National chairmen and chapter regents were introduced.

The Regent stated the purpose of the meeting was to discuss three things: (1) The proposed Sugar Grove project; (2) The completion of our Cedar Lakes project; (3) The Magnolia tree for the grounds of the National Society. She explained that Mrs. Ferguson had to resign as chairman of the Centennial and Legislation Committee, and Mrs. Frank G. Cumerford, Fort Lee Chapter, had been named to replace her. Mrs. Whitlock had to resign as chairman of the Cedar Lakes project and Mrs. Ruth Miller Bonham, Anne Bailey Chapter, had replaced her. Both ladies were present.

The Regent stated that copies of the address Congressman John Slack made to the State Conference in October had been mailed to each chapter regent. She outlined the proposal he made which he was hopeful the D.A.R. would accept, as he feels it can best be promoted by a patriotic, non-partisan organization such as ours. The Regent said the matter was not brought up at the State Conference as it was felt discussion then might be somewhat premature and that it might also be said to be a political issue. Since the state meeting, the Regent has conferred with Congressman Slack and representatives of governmental departments concerned with the Sugar Grove Research project. She cited an article in the April 1960 Saturday Evening Post on "The Big Ear in Lost Valley," and also presented a newspaper clipping on the subject. Maps were passed around marking the area concerned.

The Navy is constructing a Radio Astronomy Tower in Pendleton County, near Sugar Grove, which will be designed to catch sounds from outer space, an important and necessary part of today's research and development program. This will be the greatest center for space education in the U.S. At the research center in Green Bank, Pocahontas County, the public may come and go at will, but the only way the public can enter the Sugar Grove area is through the development of the surrounding area. The completion of this project is planned for 1963, but the Navy has promised that if the installation is not completed by that year, it will be sufficiently far enough along that sounds may be had from distance if not from the most remote distance.

Congressman Slack has proposed the construction of an educational, scientific and tourist center near the site of the Sugar Grove Research project. He, and others who have discussed the proposal, see in it a wonderful opportunity to aid in the development of the area, and the state as a whole, along the lines of modern scientific education, as a great attraction to student tourists, and a boost to the economy of the state.

It is hoped that the State will find money to build a building adequate to house certain instruments and the Navy will furnish implements to earry sound down to the building from the "Big Ear" where it may be heard, since the public may not enter the Research area. The Department of Defense is prepared to support the project with release of certain materials and could arrange a center for counseling, the expense of which would be borne by them, except that the housing would have to be provided by the state. A statement from the Department of Defense will be released soon.

The State Regent and the Committee Chairman called upon the Governor and Mr. Don Crislip, head of the state's publicity department, both of whom are enthusiastic about the possibilities. The Governor expressed keen interest in the proposal and stated that he would take immediate action relative to its cost.

All the D.A.R. is asked to do is to boost the project and stimulate as much interest as possible. We will not be asked or expected to contribute financially but the Governor and Congressman Slack want the public to know about it and, of course, want to feel that the public really wants it. Mrs. Holcombe has also seen the majority leader in the House, Mr. Brotherton, who is interested, but who pointed out they would need facts and figures.

The President General and other D.A.R. officials in Washington, as well as regents of several other states which have had centennial celebrations, all agree as to the function and use if the project is carried through. It is felt the possibilities are limitless.

A committee consisting of Mesdames Cumerford, Malcolm, Overholt and Hill was appointed by the Regent to draft a motion and report back. After a short intermission, the Chairman, Mrs. Cumerford, submitted the following motion and moved its adoption:

"that the West Virginia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, act as a sponsoring organization in the development of a State educational and tourist center to be located near the Navy's Sugar Grove Radio Astronomy Tower in Pendleton County, and financed by the State of West Virginia; the opening of the center will coincide with the completion of the tower in June 1963."

Mrs. Malcolm seconded the motion. After discussion, it was adopted unanimously. Copies will be sent to Congressman Slack, Governor Barron, the Centennial Commission and Mr. Brotherton. Mrs. Bonham, Chairman of the Cedar Lakes project, said this district has given \$406.80 toward lighting the amphitheater, and the total cost will be a little over \$2,000. If each chapter would send 50c per member, this would take care of the cost. All were urged to do so, so the project may be completed. There are also a few seats still unpaid for.

Magnolia Tree. There is still about \$95 due on the purchase of the tree. It is hoped that chapters not having contributed will do so in the near future so this project, too may be marked complete.

RESOLUTIONS

Adopted by the Seventieth Continental Congress National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution

The Fifty-Sixth Annual State Conference of the West Virginia Society, N.S.D.A.R., approved the following resolutions presented by Mrs. Carl C. Galbraith. Co-Chairman of the Resolutions Committee at the National Defense Luncheon on Friday, October 27, 1961.

REDEDICATION

"FOR EVIL TO TRIUMPH, GOOD MEN NEED ONLY DO NOTHING"

- Whereas the historical, educational and patriotic objectives of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, that stress true patriotism, love of country, the cherishing of American freedoms, spiritual and moral values, which serve as a beacon light for all the world, are now challenged as never before by opposing ideologies and Constitutional violations; and
- Whereas in order to maintain these objectives and extend the freedoms guaranteed under the Constitution of the United States of America it is imperative that evil shall not triumph because good men do nothing:
- Resolved. That the National Society. Daughters of the American Revolution, again pledge itself to join in the efforts to rekindle pride in and understanding of cur national heritage, believing that the sovereign people, if informed, will reject schemes of the international Marxist socialists to weaken and destroy this nation, and rededicate itself anew to the preservation of our Censtitutional principles to the end that "this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom and government of the people, by the people, and for the people shall not perish from the earth."

"GREAT DECISIONS" PROGRAM

- Whereas the "Great Decisions" Program, sponsored by the Foreign Policy Association, has been labeled by a State Grand Jury as "insidious and subversive" and is one of the foremost means of conditioning the minds of American citizens to the acceptance of appeasement policies; and
- Whereas the "Great Decisions" Program has been sold to colleges, high schools and adult discussion groups on the premise it is an impartial presentation of current issues, yet often leads its readers into a device of appeasement-inspired alternatives by means of selection, emphasis, and supplementary references, and by omission of the pro-American anti-communist viewpoints; and
- Whereas the sponsoring organization of the "Great Decisions" Program has improperly used alleged endorsements of distinguished individuals and organizations, including that of the Daughters of the American Revolution, to indicate approval of the program;
- Resolved. That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge the Congress of the United States to institute an investigation of the purposes and objectives underlying the "Great Decisions" Program;
- Resolved. That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge its members as well as citizens in their communities to be alert to the propaganda of this program.

DEMORALIZATION IN THE ENTERTAINMENT WORLD

- Whereas the entertainment media are again employing certain writers, directors, and actors who have been openly defiant of our country's duly authorized investigative bcdies and who serve to weaken the prestige of the United States of America by distorted themes and slanted emphases and inaccurate statements, thereby strengthening the communist position in the ideological war; and
- Whereas one of the goals of communism is the destruction of moral absolutes so that the individual will feel no qualms of conscience; and
- Whereas there has been a marked increase in themes of brutality, defeatism, sadism, perversion and violence in the American theatre and in the motion picture and television industries;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution call upon the entertainment industry to clean its own house before Federal censorship becomes inevitable;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, protest the downgrading of American history by television programs that distort historic fact and malign the character of American patriots.

COMMUNIST PROPAGANDA

- Whereas for eleven years the communists have been exerting pressure to force the Post Office Department and the Customs Service to stop intercepting propaganda from abroad; and
- Whereas an Executive Order ended the established practice of the Post Office of delaying delivery of unmarked, unordered propaganda as an impediment to cultural exchange; and
- Whereas an estimated 14 million pieces of Red propaganda were mailed to Americans, 99 per cent unsolicited, during 1960 alone, although by comparison only a few thousand copies of American publications are permitted anywhere in the Red Empire;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, support the principles embodied in H.R. 5751 to create a controller of foreign propaganda in the Customs Service and require the labeling of all publications from behind the Iron Curtain as communist propaganda.

ORGANIZATION FOR ECONOMIC COOPERATION AND DEVELOPMENT

- Whereas participation in the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) will hasten the development of world government, since it incorporates a scheme to make foreign aid a permanent feature of national policy and to channel such aid through an international agency, thereby disenfranchising the Congress and the American people from authority over foreign aid and trade policies; and
- Whereas the resolution under which the OECD convention (treaty) was ratified provides no real assurance that Congress shall retain power to direct our national policy respecting the efficient use of OUR economic resources and the development of OUR scientific and technical resources; and
- Whereas appropriation of Federal funds is a Constitutional function of the United States Congress, but the treaty text states: "General expenses of the Organization shall be determined in accordance with the scale to be determined by the Council," thereby specifically denying the Congress any review of the cost of participation in the program;

- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, is of the opinion that the use of OECD as the mechanism for fixing foreign aid goals for our country is an unconstitutional delegation of power and a threat to our sovereignty;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, petition the Congress of the United States to review the significance of participation in this international organization, and urge that no appropriations be granted for the implementation of this program.

DISARMAMENT

- Whereas fear of nuclear war has already led this nation into a selfimposed ban on underground nuclear testing without exacting a similar concession from the Soviet Union, thereby endangering national security; and
- Whereas the head of the United States delegation to the East-West Conference in March 1960 urged the establishment of an international police force under the control of the United Nations after curtailment of national arms and armies, thereby sacrificing the principle of the inherent right of self-defense of every nation; and
- Whereas disarmament could only result in loss of national sovereignty in a communist-dominated world government;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, affirm that any consideration of disarmament threatens the sovereignty and independence of this and other non-communist nations so long as the major Soviet political objective continues to be the total domination of the world:
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge the Congress of the United States of America to exert every possible effort necessary to guarantee and maintain; a strong and independent national military force capable at all times, and under all conditions of preserving our national sovereignty.

MONROE DOCTRINE

- Whereas the Monroe Doctrine which protected the sovereignty of the Western Hemisphere for over 100 years, has been violated by international communism through infiltration and agitation in many parts of Central and South America, the Panama Canal Zone and Cuba; and
- Whereas this violation of the Monree Destrine constitutes a threat to the peace of the United States and to the entire Western Hemisphere;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge the Congress of the United States to
 - (a) Reaffirm the principle of the Monroe Doctrine;
 - (b) Take any action necessary to protect the sovereignty of the United States of America over the Panama Canal Zone; and
 - (c) Work toward an early end to the communist infiltration of Central and South America, especially in the Caribbean area.

THE THREAT OF FEDERALISM TO CONSTITUTIONAL GOVERNMENT AND ECONOMY

- Whereas Federal paternalism and increasing centralization of power are changing our form of government by gradual and special interest pressures; and
- Whereas Federal Grants-in-Aid and subsidies to education, agriculture, industry, power, health. housing, urban renewal, and welfare invade

the responsibilities of the states and local governments, cost more than state and locally administered programs, accelerate inflation and increase the public debt, and impair the will of the people for responsible state and local government; and

- Whereas Federal Aid to Education, a Federal Medical Aid Program, and the so-called Fair Housing Program now being urged would augment the already swollen power of government and vastly increase the burden on the taxpayer;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, oppose expansion of Federal Grants-in-Aid Programs, and favor: (1) cutback in all Federal Grants-in-Aid Programs, (2) elimination of Federal competition with private business, (3) reduction of the public debt, and (4) economy in government, as necessary measures to maintain confidence in the American dollar and halt the drift from Constitutional Government to socialistic government.

RED MOVEMENT FOR YOUTH

- Whereas the youth of the United States is becoming more and more a target for communist propaganda; and
- Whereas J. Edgar Hoover has reported a new and significant communist effort to conquer the minds of the youth of the United States, namely, by the formation of a youth organization whose activities will be secretly directed by Communist Party members, by fomenting turmoil among students and other youth and instigating riots, and by issuing a special publication called "New Horizons for Youth," edited by the the Communist National Youth Director and aimed directly at American youth.
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, work to alert parents, teachers and young people to these Red movements;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, encourage the showing of the documentary film "Operation Abolition" which reveals the techniques employed by communist leaders of using students and other youth in the riots against a Congressional Committee in San Francisco last May;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, protest the sale and circulation of "New Horizons for Youth" as a communist magazine published for the sole purpose of subverting the youth of the United States of America.

PEACE CORPS

- Whereas the Peace Corps, created by Executive Order without the prior consent of Congress, proposes to send inexperienced youth on a global mission to aid in the economic development of countries where many of their counterparts will be highly trained communist-bloc technicians; and
- Whereas (a) The unnecessary risks to the individuals who may participate in this program include:
 - (1) Loss of Constitutional rights and protection while in the service of the host country;
 - (2) Separation from the moral and disciplinary influences of their homeland,
 - (3) Service connected disabilities or possible loss of life resulting from health hazards encountered in the course of their employment abroad.

- (4) Resulting conformity in the ideological concepts of the sponsors of the Corps; and
- (b) The dangers to the United States of America include:
 - Eventual possible universal civilian draft and job assignment for domestic as well as foreign service on an international basis,
 - (2) Depriving this country of the most talented young people who should be preparing for leadership at home in industry, the professions, the political life of the country, and the armed forces.
 - (3) Federal control of education by curricular requirements necessary to service in the Corps, and
 - (4) A new burden on the taxpayer because of the immeasurable cost of maintaining the Peace Corps;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge the Congress of the United States to refuse to enact legislation in support of the Peace Corps.

THE FEDERAL RESERVE BANK

- Whereas the Constitution of the United States of America grants to Congress alone the power to coin money and issue currency;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge that a study be made by the Congress of the United States and by the members of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, of our central banking mechanism, known as the Federal Reserve Banking System, and its impact on the economy of the United States of America.

THE SUPREME COURT

- Whereas Constitutional authority is primarily vested in the Congress of the United States of America, as the voice of the people; and
- Whereas successive decisions of the Supreme Court over the past several years have brought this nation to the moment of peril, envisioned by Thomas Jefferson in 1821 when he said, ".... the germ of dissolution of our federal government is in the constitution of the federal judiciary; ... advancing its noiseless step like a thief, over the field of jurisdiction, until all shall be usurped from the States, and the government of all be consolidated into one.

"To this I am opposed; because, when all government, domestic and foreign, in little as in great things, shall be drawn to Washington as the center of all power, it will render powerless the checks provided of one government on another, and will become as venal and oppressive as the government from which we separated."

Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge the Congress of the United States to assert the legislative authority vested in it by the Constitution of the United States of America as a means of preserving our liberty.

PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE vs. GROUP DYNAMICS

Whereas the development and achievements of the United States of America have been due in large measure to the living belief of her people that the degree to which a society is free depends upon the extent to which each individual member accepts and assumes personal responsibility; and

- Whereas a curious formula for arriving at decisions in the name of a group is currently being advanced and taught within the United States in various conferences, workshops and agencies—relying upon a concept of group consensus which excuses the individual from defined responsibility and ignores established individual rights—and which appears to signal a general weakening of the sense of personal responsibility within the nation;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, declare its firm opposition to any method or concept of decisionmaking which encourages or implies the evasion, disregard or rejection of the individual's personal responsibility;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, alert its members and the public to the importance of adhering to the time-tested principles of parliamentary practice which are the instruments protecting the rights of the majority, the minority and the individual that are essential to a free people.

POSTAGE STAMPS

- Whereas recent issues of United States postage stamps have portrayed pictures of foreign persons and places unrelated to the history of the United States; and
- Whereas this nation has a magnificent heritage which should be commemorated by appropriate postage stamps;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, recommend that the Post Office Department use in the design of future issues of postage stamps only subjects relating to historical places, patriotic events or renowned persons connected with the historical progress of the United States.

APPOINTMENT TO THE INTERNATIONAL COURT OF JUSTICE

- Whereas the office of Justice of the International Court of Justice can be filled on behalf of the United States without any power on the part of the Executive, Legislative or Judicial Branches of the Government to pass thereon; and
- Whereas such position could be occupied by an individual who belongs to subversive organizations or one whose prior record indicates unfitness for this office;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge the Congress of the United States of America to adopt legislation prohibiting any citizen of this country, so long as the United States of America is a member of the International Court of Justice, from accepting an appointment as a Justice of that Court until after the approval of that citizen for such an appointment by the Senate of the United States;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, reaffirm its support of the Connally Reservation to the protocol of the United States' adherence to the International Court of Justice, which states that the jurisdiction of the World Court shall not apply to disputes with regard to matters which are essentially within the jurisdiction of the United States" as determined by the United States."

CHRISTIANITY

- Whereas the influence and survival of Christianity is being jeopardized by the spread of atheistic communism throughout the world; and
- Whereas in communist-controlled countries the clergy is silenced, church property confiscated, and churches are closed or used as centers of propaganda for the state; and

- Whereas in a communist-dominated world our Christian civilization would be destroyed and ultimately lost to future generations; and
- Whereas the present communist world revolution is a current phase of the long-range struggle for the success of the atheistic movement;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, make every effort to promote knowledge concerning the religious motivation of the Founding Fathers in drafting the Constitution of the United States of America which is based on the concept that all men are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, promote among American youth a consciousness of the tremendous influence that Christianity has had in the development of Western civilization in order to secure and retain the faith of the Founding Fathers of this country.

ANTITRUST LAWS APPLIED TO LABOR UNIONS

- Whereas antitrust laws were enacted to curb the monopolistic power of hig business, but have never been applied to the present ever greater monopolistic power of big labor unions; and
- Whereas by subterfuge and under the guise of individual choice, which can be and frequently is coerced, huge sums of money are collected and used to influence elections; and
- Whereas for many years the power of labor leaders has been built on immunities and privileges granted labor unions, but which are denied people outside the labor unions;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge the Congress of the United States to enact legislation which will provide that American labor union organizations be made subject to Federal antitrust and tax laws on the same basis as American business organizations.

CONSERVATION OF NATURAL RESOURCES

- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge the Congress of the United States of America to provide for a thorough research program to determine the extent to which the widespread use of chemical pesticides is endangering natural resources, namely, the slaughter of birds, the harmful effects on plant and wild animal life and the possible cumulative aftereffects on human health;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge increased activity and cooperation on the part of local, state and federal agencies to assure to the people of the United States adequate supplies of good, pure water for all purposes; and recommend to Congress that the Water Pollution Control Act which expires June 30, 1961 be extended and expanded.

THE WORLD FEDERATION FOR MENTAL HEALTH

- Whereas the published goals of the World Federation for Mental Health enunciated in a publication of that organization, "Mental Health and World Citizenship," is to bring about social, economic and political changes which that organization alleges are necessary to the attainment of mental health; and
- Whereas such changes are not in accord with the traditional concepts of our American way of life and could only be achieved through a transformation of our Constitutional Republic into a world government with a consequent surrender of this country's sovereignty; and

- Whereas there is a tendency in the field of psychiatry to weaken commitment safeguards and to question the mental responsibility of persons who entertain ideological beliefs not in accordance with the objectives of the World Federation for Mental Health;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge its members to make every effort to ascertain whether legislation proposed for enactment or which has been adopted in their states can be traced to influences of organizations and societies afliated with or sympathetic to the World Federation for Mental Health or whose objectives are in accord with the above-mentioned goal of the World Federation for Mental Health, and to expose and counteract such legislation.

TERRITORIAL SEA WIDTH

- Whereas a fundamental principle of international law affirmed at the Hague Codification Conference in 1930 established the three-mile limit for territorial seas; and
- Whereas Afro-Asian nations with communist support are endeavoring to extend the three-mile limit to a twelve-mile limit, which extension would impair the principle of freedom of the seas and adversely affect the vital interests of the United States and other maritime nations by making strategic sea and air routes subject to closure, such as the Straits of Gibraltar, Bab-el-Mandeb and Malacca;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge the United States to adhere to the fundamental principle of international law providing for a three-mile limit as the width for territorial seas.

IMMIGRATION

- Whereas plans for the triumph of the world socialist state call for free migration between countries as declared in the United Nations Covenant on Human Rights; and
- Whereas international communism as a world conspiracy depends on the unhampered movement of its agents; and
- Whereas the Immigration and Nationality Act is vital to the preservation of this Republic; and
- Whereas enemies of this Act seek its destruction through systematic erosion under the guise of humanitarianism, which has thus far been repelled by alert, patriotic legislators, organizations, and individuals; and
- Whereas unemployment is admittedly a major problem and controlled immigration protects our national economy;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, reaffirm support of the Immigration and Nationality Act without crippling amendments which would threaten the security of this nation.

COMMUNIST CHINA

- Whereas pressure from certain allies of the United States of America for admission of Communist China to the United Nations has been added to the continuing pressure of the Soviet Union and its satellites for such admissions; and
- Whereas admission of Red China to the United Nations would add to the already formidable power of the communist bloc in both the Security Council and the General Assembly;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge that the Government of the United States of America use

every political and diplomatic means available to strengthen American support of the Republic of (Nationalist) China in the United Nations;

Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution reaffirm its previous stand and strongly oppose admission of Communist China to the United Nations.

COMMENDATIONS

- Whereas leaders in every field of endeavor, alert to the communist threats to change every facet of the American way of life, are putting forth supreme efforts to protect and preserve the rights of the individuals as guaranteed in the Constitution of the United States of America;
- Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution in its 70th Continental Congress assembled commend:
 - The Internal Security Subcommittee of the United States Senate and the House Committee on Un-American Activities for their investigations leading to legislation including the Internal Security Act designed to protect the government and the people of the United States of America against subversion and infiltration by communist conspirators and other un-American groups.
 - 2. The Honorable J. Edgar Hoover, who, for many years has directed the Federal Bureau of Investigation with great courage and distinction so that this worthy agency has provided safety and protection to all citizens of this country.
 - 3. Ministers and church leaders who have courageously exposed the ecumenical (world-wide in extent, influence) movement within the World Council of Churches which would jeopardize the security of the United States of America.
 - 4. Those members of the legal and medical professions who seek to alert the public to the evils of socialism and Federal controls which can only lead to a totalitarian form of government.

REPORTS OF STATE OFFICERS

STATE REGENT

It is with mingled emotions that your State Regent brings to you her last State Conference report; Happiness . . . because it is a time of meeting with you, to review your many accomplishments of the past year; Sadness . . . because it is the last one over which it will be her privilege to preside.

She is most proud to have been a State Regent of this national patriotic organization—Daughters of the American Revolution, and especially—to have represented the beautiful mountain State of West Virginia.

During the four years which she has been privileged to serve as your leader, many things have been accomplished; but . . . many dreams and ambitions have not yet been fulfilled. However, she hopes, in all humility that her efforts have added to the groundwork set by her predecessors in forwarding the patriotic, educational and historical objectives of the National Society, and . . . that those things accomplished during these four years will "bear fruit and LIVE," and, . . . that, the unfinished "dreams" will eventually become a reality for West Virginia. Her appreciation and gratitude is boundless, to those National Officers who have given of their counsel, guidance, cooperation and assistance, as well as the Honorary State Regents, State Board, State Chairmen, Chapter Regents, and ALL DAUGHTERS, who have so willingly and cheerfully given of their time and efforts—without them, nothing could have been accomplished.

Indeed! Your State Regent, very sincerely and humbly has endeavored to exemplify the theme—"Today is yours . . . To Live! To Act, To serve God, Home and Country," and trusted that it might be a challenge to all Daughters of West Virginia to become closer and work harmoniously together for the fulfillment of State and National Objectives. After much thought it seemed to her that this theme was the embodiment of all the beautiful themes of the National Society which have been chosen by our several President's General over the years.

The splendid reports of the State Society Officers; State Chairmen; District Directors and various Chapter Regents, you will find recorded in detail elsewhere herein. As—also, you will find details of the 56th State conference, depicting the graciousness and hospitality which prevailed thruout the state meeting Oct. 26-28th, inclusive. Therefore, those details are not made a part of this report.

However, your State Regent would like briefly to mention items of interests that have transpired since her last detailed report to you.

It has been her privilege to participate in many school award programs, which were sponsored by various Chairmen and Officers for the "American History Essay" contest and the "Good Citizens" awards. She participated in many patriotic programs over the State, representing The State D.A.R., i.e. . . the West Virginia Historial Society; Veterans of Foreign Wars; American Legion; U.D.C.; Governor Barrons Conference; Colonial Dames of the 17th Century; the Daughters of the American Colonies; Daughters of the Colonial Wars; Sons of the American Revolution and the State meeting of the Children of American Revolution and the State meeting of the Children of American Revolution and others. Being one of the first women named, your Regent is serving on the Centennial Advisory Committee of West Virginia, her name appearing in the original brochure.

She served as a National Promoter for the NSCAR; as well as being the local Yomoko CAR president for the last two years; and is glad to report. that on the local level, the membership in the CAR has had a tremendous gain; not only in membership—but, in interest and accomplishments. She

is proudly serving on the joint State Committee of Patriotic Organizations to study educational problems in West Virginia sponsored by the American Legion.

Your State Regent was especially pleased at the recognition accorded the D.A.R. at the U.S. District Court meeting in Charleston this past Spring, at the "Naturalization Ceremony" she was recognized for the distribution of our DAR manuels and phamplets given to the new citizens, which service has been rendered new citizens over a period of years in West Virginia.

Your State Regent feels that the privilege given to her to work for the NSDAR, and the things which have been accomplished by it in West Virginia during the past four years, and in connection with it have brought about many pleasant recognitions. She was given the honor of being named as one of the "Ten top club women of the year" in Kanawha County, a project sponsored by the "GAZETTE-MAIL." The DAR work done by her along with other services rendered in other organizations were large factors.

It has been the privilege of your State Regent to attend many Chapters during the year and to formally address several of them, concerning the work of the NSDAR: and regretted that more than thirty invitations had to be declined because of other pressing duties and inclement weather.

Three of the Five State District meetings were attended. At the October, February and April meeting in Washington; the pre and post Continential Board meetings in Washington; and the Continental Congress, she was present as West Virginians' official representative. It was at the West Virginia Luncheon, over which she presided at the Army & Navy Club, during the April Session of the Washington Congress—that the Board of Management, voted to set aside \$500 for pre-centennial brochure of West Virginia, being compiled by the Historian and Centennial Committee. It is hoped that these Brochures will be circularized before the next Continental Congress. She is grateful for the tremendous amount of work which has been done upon the proposed Historial Brochure.

In February 1961 a call meeting was held in Charleston, at which time, it was voted by the West Virginia Society to "Act as a sponsoring organization," in the development of a State Educational & Tourist Center, to be located near the Navy's SUGAR GROVE RADIO ASTRONOMY TOWER in Pendleton County. The opening of the center to coincide with the completion of the 'FOWER, June 1963, if possible.

All committments to National and State projects have been met. The Program for the Dedication of the Cedar Lakes project is carried in detail elsewhere in these proceedings, for . . . the project has been completed, money-wise. And the dedication of the seats and lighting for the ampitheatre, in the truly beautiful surroundings, merits the inspired name given this "Conference Center," as a setting for "Learning." It would be impossible to describe to you or tell you, the hours of work and thought that have gone into the making of this project a reality, at Ripley, West Virginia. It is with grateful thanks that your State Regent acknowledges the honor that is hers by reason of the plaque at Cedar Lakes being inscribed with her name; she is also grateful for the honor of having her name placed upon the plaque in the routunda of the State Capitol, in connection with the U.S.S.W.Va., as of December 7, 1957.

The Doris White Gymnasium Project at the Kate Duncan Smith School, has now been completed; and the State Regent is pleased at the action of the State 1960-61 Conference in Bluefield, that the gift of the West Virginia Daughters to this project, be named in her honor; also—she expresses appreciation that the gift to the project of the Chaplain General, "The Cathedral of the Pines," located in New Hampshire, be given in her honor and that of the State Chaplain, Mrs. Chester A. Roush, Outstanding results have been accomplished by the State Librarian and in the department of Geonological Research and the DAR Schools.

In regard to the project "Sunrise"—the restoration of the home of the late Gov. McCorkle, located within the City of Charleston, your State Regent was named as one of the original promoters of the project.

An attempt was made to have the West Virginia Legislature pass a Permanent Bill for the observation of "History Month."

West Virginia may well be proud of its recent issues of the DAR News. The chairmanship of this is no small job, and is much to be appreciated. The September issue was especially fine; there will be two additional issues before the ending of our current year.

It is gratifying to know that the State Regents Club President has brought the chapter regent roster up to date.

It is hoped that the end of this year will bring the membership of our State to an all-time-high. The membership chairman can take pride in the fact that many new members have been brought into the State Society, and that five new Chapters have been organized, which brings the total number of Chapters in the state to 53. The new Chapters being— Fort Lee Chapter, Charleston, Mountaineer Chapter, South Charleston, Wilson Cary Nicholas Chapter, Summersville, W. Va., Col. William L. Lowther Chapter, Salem, Vandalia Chapter, Nitro, W. Va. But with the gaining of new members, our hearts have been saddened because of the loss of old ones—who were our friends, near and dear—our loved ones. Especially do we feel the loss of Mrs. W. C. Bishop, whose work was outstanding on the "Good Citizenship Committee"; and Mrs. Waitman H. Conaway, Dean of our Honorary State Regents.

The State Regent presented, on behalf of the General Andrew Lewis Chapter and its Chapter Regent, Mrs. Nancy Wilson, a set of Encyclopedia, to the Womens Federal Prison, at Alderson, West Virginia.

In speaking of the General Andrew Lewis Chapter, one cannot forego mentioning their generous hospitality and the graciousness of their Regent, at the time of a visit there following the 1960 Conference—at which time Mrs. Ashmead White, our distinguished President General, and Mrs. Elsworth E. Clark, National Press Relations Chairmen were the personal guests of your State Regent at the General Andrew Lewis Hotel. Entertainment at "White Sulphur" and a special reception, at which time Mrs. Ashmead White was privileged to meet Mrs. Doris Caldwell, the sculptor and artist, who created the exquisite figuerine, in her likeness, and presented to her at the State Conference in Charleston. It was through friendship for Mrs. Wilson Phelps, that Mrs. Caldwell did this great favor for the DAR of West Virginia, and your State Regent; with the cooperation of the local Lewisburg Chapter.

Subsequently, Mrs. Caldwell made a figuerine of Mrs. Benjamin Harrison, the first President General of the NSDAR, which your State Regent presented to the National Society at the 1960 Congress in Washington, D. C. in April. Mrs. Caldwell is now making a figuerine of Mrs. Robert V. H. Duncan, who was one of the many distinguished guests at the 1961 conference in Bluefield, and whom we are proud to say, is a candidate for the office of President General for the 1962 election.

It is with appreciation that your State Regent acknowledges the title of the West Virginia State Society of "Honorary State Regent for Life." Also, deep appreciation for their endorsement of her as a candidate for Vice-President General, NSDAR, election to take place at the Continental Congress in April 1962, in Washington, D. C.

To all visitors and speckers on both the National and State level, who have come to our State and made so great a contribution to our work, this State Regent wishes to acknowledge, collectively as well as individually, appreciation and admiration. She was indeed proud to have so many honored guests among our National Officers; National Chairmen and National Vice-chairmen, not only at the 1961 Congress, but through out the past four years.

And, we were extremely fortunate in having so many distinguished speakers for our West Virginia 1961 Congress, among whom was our own Governor, W. W. Barron; Honorable John M. Slack, Jr.; Honorable Elizabeth Kee, M. C.; Henorable Hulett Smith, Commissioner of Commerce of W. Va.; Honorable J. R. Adams, Dept. Commander, of the American Legion; Mr. S. D. McMullen, State Director of Vocational Education and Director of the Cedar Lakes Project.

There have been many who have aided and abetted our state Society all along the way; and there was none more loyal as an ally for the efforts of our DAR, than our Ex-Governor, Cecil H. Underwood, during the State Regent's first year as Regent.

As the out-going State Regent, I wish to congratulate the newly elected State officers, who will take their official place in the affairs of the State, at the conclusion of the 1962 Continental Congress, in Washington, at which time, the President General and Chaplain General will make their authentic confirmation of their term of office.

It will be with a heart-full of love and good wishes for you in the future, that I plan to witness that ceremony; and unto you—West Virginia Daughters, under the leadership of Miss Virginia B. Johnson, I pledge my wholehearted support.

And, in parting, may I say to each Chapter and Daughter, continue to work for the principals of our wonderful organization, and DO NOT neglect, that—which is now, one of our most important of all objectives, "NATIONAL DEFENSE."

STATE CHAPLAIN

"Today Is Yours-To Live, To Act, To Serve God, Home and Country"-

The State and Chapter Chaplains have endeavored to realize the theme of our beloved State Regent as they have gone about their several duties. Many expressions of love and concern have been extended to the ill and bereaved, and, as one Chaplain puts it, "we have tried to keep in touch."

It is again my very sad duty to report the deaths of 73 West Virginia Daughters. These loyal Daughters, who have entered Life Eternal, were honored Thursday afternoon (October 26, 1961) by our State Society in a Service of Remembrance held at the Bland Street Methodist Church.

Mrs. Waitman H. Conaway, Honorary State Regent and Past Vice President General, who slipped away last November, has left a void in our Society which will be hard to fill with her dignity and outstanding accomplishments. It was during Mrs. Conaway's tenure as Regent of the West Virginia Society that its first annual proceedings were published in 1926-27.

Chapters report the deaths of one Honorary Founding Regent and ten past Chapter Regents, one of whom was Mrs. W. C. Bishop, who was currently serving as State Chairman of D.A.R. Good Citizens and had served as Southern District Director during same period. She gave much of her time, energy, interest and love to D.A.R. Many of the deceased members had held offices in their respective Chapters and each named in our Necrology has served our Society with faith and devotion. "To live in the hearts of those we leave behind is not to die."

Reports were received from the majority of the Chapters in reply to my September letter to each Chapter Chaplain. Twenty-five Chapters open their meetings with the DAR Ritual, which is also used for installation and other special services. The Lord's Prayer and other devotions are often used in opening and closing the Chapter and Board meetings. Most of the Chapters reporting hold memorial services in varied and beautiful ways and two Chapters report the marking of graves appropriately on Memorial Day. Bee Line Chapter sends a marker to the funeral of a deceased member instead of flowers, and it is placed near the casket. Dedication services are held later at a suitable time. Many Chapters place markers on graves of deceased members. Buford Chapter sends a contribution to one of the Approved Schools in memory of each deceased member. The Anne Bailey Chapter gave a bronze plaque bear-ing the name "Anne Bailey" to a new school building of that name. The Chapter Regent and Chaplain had a part in the service at the dedication of the building by presenting the plaque. John Hart Chapter provided a Worship Center at Camp Pioneer and planted 75 young pine trees around it. In August a Ritual service was held for the Planting of a Tree.

As State Chaplain, my duties at the 55th State Conference, held in Charleston, were carried out to the best of my ability. It was a real pleasure and honor to have our President General, Mrs. Ashmead White, in attendance at the Memorial Service and the placing of the Memorial Wreath. It was my privilege to assist Mrs. V. Eugene Holcombe, State Regent, and Mrs. Mortimer Gamble, State Chairman of Conservation, in a Tree Planting Ceremony when the West Virginia State Tree "A Sugar Maple" was planted in the State Capitol Grounds.

I did not have the pleasure of attending the Continental Congress in April but the invocation and prayers were sent for the State Luncheon and Board meeting. In May I attended the Western District Meeting, held in Spencer, and gave the Invocation at the opening session and Grace at the luncheon. My own Colonel Charles Lewis Chapter observed its 60th Anniversary in June and I was honored to give the Invocation at the luncheon. I regret that I could not attend the Jackson's Mill Luncheon and Board Meeting in July. I was happy to meet with the Executive Committee in Charleston last fall at the home of our State Regent, whose gracious hospitality we enjoyed. Rain prevented our going to Cedar Lakes, as planned, to see the progress of our State Project there. I had hoped to be able to include in this Conference Report the dedication ceremony of our Cedar Lakes Project, but we shall look forward with trustful expectation to that dedication, which will honor this Administration, before our work is finished in April.

Serving as your State Chaplain has been a rewarding experience and I thank all of the members of the State Board of Management for their wonderful cooperation as we have worked together. I thank all of the Chapter Chaplains for their reports and kind letters and I thank all of the West Virginia Daughters for giving me the opportunity to serve.

In closing, this little poem is my wish and my prayer:

"My life must touch a dozen lives before the day is done; Leave countless marks for good, or ill ere sets the evening sun. So this the wish that I must wish, the prayer that I must pray— Let my life help the other lives it touches by the way."

STATE HISTORIAN

This is a very inaccurate report. Only 20 chapters returned the questionnaire sent them. To get a partial inaccurate report reference has to be made to February 1960-61 report with only 26 Chapters reporting at that time. This makes a little over half a report.

118 medals, 216 certificates and 111 other awards such as ribbons, books, tie pins, etc., were given.

In connection with the Legislative Chairman presented to members of the House of Delegates the "Big Ear", the Navy project, the construction of a house on land appropriated by the state, for tourists to be able to hear the outer space sounds harnessed by the big-ear. The Bill was passed.

38 Chapters sent in 384 pictures for the Pre-Centennial DAR Brochure. Of this number-217 were state historic markers dealing with the decade of 1700. 85 were of Rev. War Soldiers' graves of which 20 were marked by DAR. 65 were historic sites marked by DAR. And 20 were other historic sites.

The Brochure material has been approved by the State Archivist and Historian, the State Centennial Commission and the State Historian Commission. The State and State Centennial seal is to be used in the Brochure.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

The Governor proclaimed February American History Month as well as many Mayors.

Many Radio and TV programs were given. The Spot Announcements sent out by National were used.

- 4 Chapters took school Children on historic tours.
- 3 Chapters made historic tours with members attending only.
- 9 Chapters had window displays.
- 5 Chapters had restaurants use American History Month Stickers.
- 4 Chapters had hotels use the stickers.
- 12 Chapters used the American History Month Posters.
- 10 Chapters sent in essays to enter National Essay Contest.

The 8th Grade State winner was Linda Keel of Kingston, Southern District. Her topic was, "The Ohio—Yesterday and Today." She read her essay at the Conference and received her award. A sterling silver DAR History Medal on a sterling silver chain. She was sponsored by the Borderland Chapter.

The 7th Grade State Winner was Robert Allman of Parkersburg, Northern District. His topic was "The Potomac River." Because of illness he did not read his essay at the district meeting. His award was a sterling silver tie pin with the DAR Insignia on it. He was sponsored by the James Wood Chapter.

The 6th Grade State Winner was Audrey Wilkins of Morgantown, Central Division. She read her essay at the district meeting and received the same award as Linda Keel. Her topic was "The Greenbrier River." She was sponsored by the Elizabeth Ludington Hagans Chapter.

The 5th Grade winner of the Chapter, State, National Eastern Central District and NATIONAL WINNER was Diane Lynn Stewart. Her topic was "The Beautiful Ohio River." She received the same state award as Linda and Audrey when she read her essay at the district meeting. There she also received the National Division award of a book, "The American Presidents", and the National Award a \$25 Savings bond. She was sponsored by the Elizabeth Ludington Hagans Chapter. She is to be presented at the State Conference in Bluefield in October.

My hearty thanks to all who have made this gift to the NSDAR library possible.

The requested books for 1961-62 have been located and have been sent to the NSDAR Librarian. They are: "Early Southwest Virginia Families," "Guide to the Study of West Virginia History," and "Index to West Virginiana."

From an accumulated group of books in the charge of several state librarians your state librarian was given the 'go-ahead' to send to National and to the State Department of Archives and History the books which were not listed in their catalogs. To NSDAR we sent:

1. "Catalog of genealogical and historical works," formerly published by the National Society.

2. "The mystery of the Horn Papers."

3. "The name and family of Cunningham."

4. "The name and family of Taylor."

2. "The name and family of Hite or Hight."

3. "Records of marriages performed by the Reverend William Welch of Mineral county, W. Va., from 1816 to 1867."

4. "The William Gaunt family history, 1735-1948."

Blennerhassett chapter sent to the Department of Archives and History a booklet, "The history of Blennerhassett." The following chapters contributed generously in various ways to their local libraries: Barboursville, Buford, Daniel Davisson, Elizabeth Zane, Fort Lee, General Andrew Lewis, James Wood, John Hart, Major William Haymond (a memorial to Mrs. Waitman T. Conaway) and Pack Horse Ford.

Anne Bailey, Blennerhassett, Buford, Colonel Morgan Morgan, William Henshaw, and Wheeling chapters contributed to the NSDAR library fund.

Our fifty-fifth Annual State Proceedings was sent to National and the Western district re-subscribed to "West Virginia History," a quarterly magazine published by the West Virginia Historical Society for the National society.

Through this term of office most of the library projects undertaken were accomplished. However two were not realized which we will leave to the next librarian, i.e. assembling material for county histories where no history has been written and naming a librarian in all the chapters in the state. We lack the appointment of one librarian to make our state one hundred per cent.

To all the West Virginia daughters and especially to the chapter librarians I want to thank you for your splendid cooperation and to you Madame Regent for your encouragement in the Library program. It has been an enjoyable and rewarding term of office.

After my report was written Mrs. J. F. G. STATE PARLIAMENTARIAN

The Parliamentarian for the West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution submits the following report:

Since September, 1960, the State Parliamentarian has conferred by correspondence with the Chairman of the Revision of By-Laws Committee and gave a personal opinion as to the proposed change of number required to constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

The Parliamentarian has also conferred by correspondence with officers of five different chapters as to procedure with chapter problems.

Requests from District Directors asking that the term of office be clarified prompted a letter to all District Directors, sent at the request of the State Regent. There was confusion concerning the term of office following the ruling of the National Parliamentarian with regard to the Resolution passed at the 1960 D.A.R. Conference. The District Directors were advised that the term of office would not change until authorized by a change in State By-Laws. Also that the thinking behind the proposed change was to have the term of office for the District Directors to run concurrently with that of the State Officers.

The Parliamentarian also gave an opinion to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer as to the constitutionality of the added assessment to Conference dues, which was confirmed by Resolution at the 1960 State Conference, but not by a change in By-Laws.

The Parliamentarian reviewed the proposed By-Laws of a chapter in the process of being organized and found no conflict between the proposed By-Laws and the By-Laws of the State Society and the National Society, DAR.

The Parliamentarian attended the 1960 State Conference, the Southern District Conference held in Beckley in May and was guest speaker for three chapters at special meetings to which guests had been invited.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Reports were received from 28 Chapter Chairmen.

Two large 50-star flags were presented to schools and 1 was purchased for the Chapter's use.

Two hundred eighty-five small 50-star flags were presented to all first grade children in the city schools—public, state and parochial; 36 were placed on graves of Revolutionary soldiers and deceased Chapter members; 8 were obtained for Chapter use—a total of 329.

Twelve Chapters studied the Flag Code and 75 copies of the Code were distributed to: a school superintendent; first grade teachers, chapter members.

Twelve incorrect displays of the flag were corrected.

All Chapters reporting stated they had a program or talks on the history or correct use of the flag.

Seventeen newspaper items on the flag were used; three radio programs were reported.

All Chapters report using the Pledge to the Flag at every meeting, and singing of the National Anthem.

The greater majority of Chapter members display the flag on Flag Day and nearly all on National Holidays. One hundred fifty members now own a 50-star flag.

Some special activities reported:

1. One Chapter obtained a flag which had been flown over the National Capitol, and it will be flown in front of the Chapter house.

2. Flags were placed on graves of Revolutionary soldiers graves and deceased members on Independence Day with appropriate ceremony.

3. A school teacher Chapter member instructed a group of adults in the proper manner of giving the Pledge to the Flag and the American's Creed.

4. One Chapter makes certain that the flag is displayed on all holidays by business firms, residents, etc., in the city.

West Virginia membership, according to the State Treasurer's record of Sept. 15, is 3433, a net loss of 85 for the past year.

Thirty-one chapters reported 89 received by application, 7 reinstated, 63 resigned, 12 dropped, and 53 deceased members.

The resignations are too high for our State growth. Our goal should be "Every member enroll a new member, and enroll two members to replace those lost by death." REVISIONS

PROPOSED BY-LAWS AMENDMENTS-1961

Article VII. Section 6. Fifty (50) voting members representing at least twenty Chapters present at any meeting of the State Conference shall constitute a quorum.

(The change is from twenty to fifty and the number of Chapters is added. Suggested because of the rise in State membership and number of Chapters.) Article VIII. Section 7. Each Chapter in the State Organization shall pay to the State Treasurer, not later than September 15, the sum of three dollars for each representative to which the Chapter is entitled at the meeting of the State Conference, this amount to be used in defraying all expenses in connection with the holding of the State Conference. No Chapter whose State or Conference dues are not paid shall be entitled to representation at meetings of the State Conference.

(The change from two dollars to three dollars was passed by a resolution in 1960 but a resolution cannot amend a By-Law, therefore this amendment is necessary if that change is desired.)

Article IX. Section 4. Fifteen members shall constitute a quorum for the State Board of Management.

(The change from ten to twenty members is more equitable from a membership of sixty.)

A \$7.50 ad was placed in the DAR magazine, and over 20% of our members subscribe to the magazine. Paid in full is our dollar and a half per member for the completion of the Cedar Lakes Project. Two more loans have been granted to student nurses, one for \$250 and one \$55, to further their education. This makes a total of four loans at the present time.

Our programs were well planned to keep the interest of the members. as well as to follow the National Program, "For What Avail, Should Freedom Fail." One National Defense Program entitled "An Enlightened Public Opinion," given by the Defense Committee.
