Twenty-two chapters reported, with fifteen using the National Anthem at every meeting and seven using the Anthem when they have a piano for accompaniment. Eight chapters observed National Music Week with musical programs. Fourteen studied West Virginia composers and six used music of West Virginia composers. West Virginia had one vocalist in the National Chorus last year.

Ten chapters promoted American music in different ways, some by youth group programs, recordings, two had American opera programs. One chapter gave one hundred American songbooks to the high school music department. Two chapters use ten minutes of each meeting for

American music.

State Chorus Group is planned for State Conference.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

I was very pleased to receive reports from 36 chapters.

Members of this committee sometimes have difficulty in carrying out their objectives because other organizations have taken over their work. Others have trouble getting naturalization lists. Some are handicapped by lack of money.

Some of those chapters having no foreign born in their communities, are attempting to further education of native born children, stressing

opportunities for the bright and gifted.

Eighteen chapters had Americanism programs to which the public

was invited.

Nineteen chapters repeat the American's Creed at each meeting. Five chapters work with Naturalization Courts, helping with Naturalization Schools. Members also help as individuals.

Over 200 manuals were distributed to new citizens, Scouts and li-

braries.

Twelve chapters place magazines in schools and libraries. Small donations were given to the Occupational Therapy Fund.

DAR story in West Virginia has been publicized through press, radio and TV. Interesting and comprehensive articles and stories covering varied activities have been carried in 32 daily and weekly newspapers. 38 of the 52 chapters reported and have been totalled as follows: 22,364 inches, which included "Reply of President General to Supreme Court's Decision on Prayer in Public Schools," used by 6 chapters; 141 pictures; 7 hours, 2 minutes on radio and TV. Most chapters keep a press book for individual use.

Promotion of the objectives of the society received excellent publicity through all media during Constitution Week, American History Month and various Awards Days. Several fine editorials appeared in newspapers upon request of chapters. A number of chapters received

space in West Virginia News and DAR Magazine.

The chairman is most appreciative of interest shown by the fine response of chapter chairman and the splendid cooperation in making this report possible.

PROGRAM

My report is based on 36 questionnaires returned. In planning the year's program all chapters reported they carried out the three objectives; Patriotic, Educational and Historical, as outlined by the National Committee. The national theme was carried out in program planning.

Average time devoted to National Defense at each meeting is 10

minutes.

89% of the chapters read the President-General's message at each meeting.

Outstanding programs described included; Constitution, Americanism, History of the Flag of the United States, American Indian, Essays by History students, National Defense and the West Virginia Centennial; Different phases of communism were studied and given through panel discussions, reports, speakers and chapter anniversaries.

The average attendance of chapters reported was 45%. It has been

A scrapbook of material evidence of Chapter activities was compiled by State Vice Chairman, Mrs. Anna Allen, and presented to the Freedom Foundation in competition for the Thomas Jefferson Award. Thank you, Chapter Regents, Chairmen, and members for your untiring efforts to make this possible.
