STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT LUNCHEON

The State Board of Management, West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, met in the West Virginia Room of the Fairmont Hotel on Thursday, October 22, 1964, for luncheon at 12:00 Noon.

The State Regent, Miss Virginia Johnson presided and asked the invocation.

After luncheon, Miss Johnson reported to those assembled on the October National Meeting which she attended. She reported that there would be an increase in the price of the Ex-Chapter Regent's Bar. It would now cost \$25.00 and would be somewhat different in design.

She announced that the D.A.R. Magazine subscription price would be increased to \$3.00 per year effective December 1. It was noted that the cost to print the magazine is approximately \$4.00 per year.

The National Society voted to replace 17 of the State Flags which they gave to the United States Naval Academy some years ago.

It was noted that October 11, 1964, began the Society's Diamond Jubilee observance which will last for eighteen months through Congress of 1966.

Miss Johnson announced that Daughters of American Revolution Guidebook, similar to the White House guidebook, was being prepared with the assistance of the National Geographic Society. The book will be ready for sale at Congress and is priced at \$1.00 per copy for paperback; \$5.00 per copy for hard back bound books. A collector's item copy will be sold for \$25.00 and must be ordered. All checks for books must be sent to the Treasurer-General clearly marked as to what check is for.

It was announced that the West Virginia Society had completed paying its share to the Library Expansion Project. The steps are completed.

A report of the American Heritage Camp was made. There were 141 people at camp. Regents were urged to begin early to sponsor girls and to get other organizations and people to sponsor girls. April 1 is registration deadline date. Activities provided at camp are of long lasting value. The request was made that persons signing sponsor applications include full name and address. It was noted that this project will be submitted to the Freedom Foundation for consideration.

It was announced that Bazaar items would be on sale in the Crystal Room and proceeds used to send C.A.R. girls to American Heritage Camp.

Detailed rules for the Outstanding Junior Contest are included in the August mailing from National to all Regents.

Miss Johnson announced that the National Chairman, American Indians Committee, had asked if the West Virginia Daughters would contribute \$500.00 toward a music practice room at St. Mary's School for Indian girls. Redemption for cash of 250 stamp books would provide the necessary funds for this project. Panama Canal and Guantanamo Bay
Lest We Forget

Adopted by the 59th annual State Conference, West Virginia State Organization, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, at Fairmont, W. Va., October 23, 1964.

CLARIFICATION OF SCHOOL PRAYER ISSUE

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court ruling banning prayer in public schools as a part of classroom exercises has given aid and comfort to atheism and the anti-God communist global movement; and

WHEREAS, the Court appears to have gone far beyond the original intent of the Founding Fathers as expressed in the Bill of Rights:

RESOLVED, the West Virginia State Organization, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution calls upon the House of Representatives to pass a resolution expressing the sense of the Congress that the Supreme Court clarify its ruling to allow the recital of a nonsectarian prayer on a voluntary basis in the public schools.

ALTERATION OF THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

WHEREAS, court action has been instituted to remove the phrase "one nation under God" from the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, thereby, a handful of militant atheists are attempting to impose their will on the majority of God-loving citizens by their efforts toward "one world without God:"

RESOLVED, the West Virginia State Organization, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, calls upon the Congress to use every means at its command to prevent alteration of the pledge of allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

APPORTIONMENT OF STATE LEGISLATURES

WHEREAS, it is apparent the judicial notions of social and political justice are supplanting the Constitution as the law of the land; and

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court has robbed many states of their sovereign power to establish their own state representative assemblies by holding that the equal protection clause of the Constitution requires the seats in both houses of a bicameral state legislature be apportioned solely on a population basis:

RESOLVED, the West Virginia State Organization, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, petition the Congress to initiate a Constitutional amendment to insure the right of the individual states to organize their bicameral legislative bodies in such manner as the people of the state may determine, so long as one house is apportioned on the basis of population.

AMENDING WEST VIRGINIA MOTOR VEHICLE LAW

WHEREAS, newly-licensed drivers are responsible for an alarming rate of motor vehicle accidents upon the highways of West Virginia; and

WHEREAS, the present state code provides too short a time to learn and practice the operation of a vehicle which has a great destructive potential:

RESOLVED, the West Virginia State Organization, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, requests the West Virginia State Legislature to examine the motor vehicle laws of other states, and to re-examine its own code with a view to establishing a classification equivalent to "apprentice operator" in the state of West Virginia.

THE HONORABLE HERBERT HOOVER

WHEREAS, the Honorable Herbert Hoover was an unceasing proponent of personal freedom and personal initiative; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Hoover continuously fought for those ideals which are the basis of Constitutional government:

RESOLVED, the West Virginia State Organization, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, mourns the passing of the Honorable Herbert Hoover, President of the United States of America from 1928-1932, and a great and patriotic American.

Mrs. Carl C. Galbraith, State Chairman Constitution Week Committee presented a scrapbook which would be sent to the Freedoms Foundation and some further ideas for observing the week.

Mrs. Ashmead White, Honorary President General, held the winning number for the quilt made by the James Wood Chapter which she presented to the State Regent, Miss Virginia Johnson. It was announced that \$103.00 had been realized on the quilt.

Mrs. Ben Williams, John Chapman Chapter, moved that a plaque be placed on the center stairway in the National Library honoring Miss Virginia Johnson, State Regent; that a plaque be placed on one side stairway honoring the State Librarian, Mrs. Jackson A. Hammond and that one plaque be placed on side stairway honoring the State of West Virginia Centennial Year. Seconded by Mrs. Percy Gillie, John Chapman Chapter. Motion carried.

Mrs. Ashmead White, Honorary President General, expressed her appreciation to the West Virginia Daughters for a most enjoyable visit.

Mrs. W. H. S. White, Honorary State Regent, expressed appreciation for kindness extended to her by all.

The Sixtieth State Conference invitation was extended by the Buford Chapter of Huntington to hold the Conference at the Frederick Hotel, in Huntington, October 21, 22, 23, 1965.

Mrs. Ray Jones moved that minutes of closing session be submitted to the Executive Committee for approval. Mrs. Samuel Solins seconded. Motion carried.

There being no further business the assembly united in singing "West Virginia Hills" and "Blest Be the Tie That Binds." led by Mrs. Wm. L. Wilson.

The Pages retired the Colors and the Conference was declared adjourned at 10:25 a.m. by the State Regent.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To date, October, 1964, ten Chapters: Ann Bailey, Colonel Charles Lewis, Colonel Morgan-Morgan, Elizabeth Ludington Hagans, Fort Lee, John Young, Mondongachate, Mound, Potomac Valley and Spencer Roane Chapters have responded with Genealogical Forms and Cards amounting to 407 pages composed of 177 Forms, 173 Cards, 57 white pages.

Ann Bailey, Colonel Morgan-Morgan, Elizabeth Ludington Hagans and Mound Chapters report Genealogical Forms and Cards completed. Elizabeth Ludington Hagans and Mound Chapters Genealogical work complete to date.

Colonel Morgan-Morgan Chapter reports Cemetery work completed three years back. Three bound volumes sent to Washington Library, Washington, D.C.

Nineteen Chapters returned report blanks for 1963-1964. Some Chapters who have done no work, promise to complete the work this year. Others do not have anyone in the Chapter who can do this work. A few Chapters have voted "NO" to the opening their records to the public feeling they are private property.

Two Chapters are working on Land grants, Marriage, Bible and other preserved records. It is expensive for small Chapters, the paper and binders if they are professionally bound.
