Mrs. Gordon D. Wooton, Conference Co-Chairman read and moved the adoption of the proposed standing rules of order for the 60th state conference. Seconded by Miss Virginia Johnson. Motion carried.

Minutes of the opening session were read by the Secretary and approved, as corrected.

The following excerpts were read from the minutes of the board meeting held at Jackson's Mill, July 10, 1965:

- (1) That Miss Mary Dean, Eastern District, be recommended for election to the office of State Registrar, due to the resignation of Miss Myra Gosnell.
- (2) That the State sponsor the project of collecting family bible records old bibles are being destroyed and this may be the only source of information available for descendants; the date of bible publication to be prior to 1890. Information should include photostatic, or typed copies of records; past and present owner of bible with their address; publisher and date of publication.
- (3) That the chapters carrying a ten dollar add in the DAR magazine to satisfy honor roll requirements, be listed on one page honoring West Virginia and the state executive board.

Miss Ruth Seibert placed in nomination, the name of Miss Mary Dean, for the office of State Registrar.

The tellers, Mrs. Jack Adams, chairman, and her committee, were instructed to pass the ballots to all delegates, and was asked to report the results of the voting at the evening session. Seconded by Mrs. Ben Williams, State Chaplain, motion carried.

Greetings were extended by Mrs. Carl Kietzman, State Regent of Ohio

The State Regent, Mrs. Galbraith, declared reports of the state officers in order, and asked for reports from: Mrs. C. William Moore, Vice-Regent; Mrs. V. Parmesano, Recording Secretary; Mrs. Arthur Ward, Organizing Secretary; Mrs. William E. Cooey, State Treasurer, who moved the acceptance of the auditor's report on the Treasurer's report. Seconded by Mrs. C. William Moore, Finance committee chairman. Motion carried.; Miss Mary Dean, Registrar; Mrs. Hersel Henderson, Historian; Mrs. John A. George, Librarian. The State Regent then asked the Vice-Regent to assume the chair while the Regent's report was read.

That the 60th State Conference reaffirm the Resolutions adopted by the 74th Continental Congress: Rededication; Presidential prayer breakfast; American History—Textbooks—Patriotic Education; Law and Order; Display of State Flags; Support Strengthening of the Immigration and Nationality Act; The Electoral College; Disarmament; Fiscal Policy and the Monetary System; Legislative Reapportionment; Genocide Convention; Combatting communism and communist propaganda; and Regulation of Foreign Commerce". Seconded by Miss Vivian Liggett, Elizabeth Zane Chapter. Motion carried.

Mrs. Grant P. Hall, State Parliamentarian reported on Parliamentary procedures.

The State Regent presented Mrs. Sue Miller, who presented the Conference with the first scrap book of the state organization, and programs from 1911 to 1923. It was the property of Eunice Proctor Perkins, one of three honorary State Historians on the Governors Commission for accumulating records for the state archives.
