From WHEELING CHAPTER: "WHEREAS Section 1785 of the West Virginia Code requires the display of the Flag of the United States of America from all schoolhouses during the time the school is in session, except in inclement weather; and

WHEREAS, t,he Flag of the United States of America is being forced into a position of secondary importance in many places; and

WHEREAS, the Flag of the United States of America should always be before the eyes of all citizens, especially children; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the West Virginia State Organization, Daughters of the American Revolution, request His Excellency, Hulett C. Smith, Governor of the State of West Virginia, to call for strict compliance with the state code and the enforcement of the provisions providing for penalties, to the end that the Flag of the United States of America may be displayed in the proper manner at all proper times."

From JOHN HART CHAPTER: "WHEREAS, we are urged to save and defend faithfully from waste,, the natural resources of our Country

and State, and

WHEREAS, there have been concerted efforts to obtain rights legalizing the destruction of our Natural Resources, and

WHEREAS, the streams of our State are being polluted by factories and our timber depleted, causing water shortage and

WHEREAS, there is a growing need to preserve our National Parks and extend our National recreation areas,

RESOLVED, that the West Virginia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution request the State Legislature to prohibit the damaging of our streams, the indiscriminate cutting of timber, also urge the continued preservation of wild life preserves and promote the creation of more National Parks and the extension of recreational areas, and

WHEREAS, the coal in our State is being stripped and in many cases the land left unsightly by strip mining operators, who pay \$30 an acre for each acre stripped,, ,but the \$900,000 allotted for this work is not adequate to reclaim all the land,

RESOLVED, That this Conference endorse the action taken last week by the Governor's Task Force on Surface Mining."

From MRS. DANIEL W. SNYDER: "WHEREAS, Mrs. Paul O. Reymann of Wheeling, W. Va., served as Regent of the West Virginia State Organization of the National Society of the DAR during the years of 1931-1932-1933, and due to the depression and the debt of Constitution Hall she could have no National or State project, and

WHEREAS, prior to 1931 all student loan work was confined to Chapter loans sent direct to schools or colleges, so Mrs. Reymann chose as the theme of her administration "Education in West Virginia" and upon motion of Mrs. John Gorden of the Wheeling Chapter,, a State Student Loan Fund was started in her honor to be known as the Blanche L. Reymann State Student Loan Fund to help West Virginia students in five Denominational Schools or Colleges in West Virginia and

WHEREAS, this fund became inactive due to the out-right scholarships being given by the Government and the various organizations, and

WHEREAS, this became, in sense, if not fact, a Memorial Fund at Mrs. Reymann's death and as such is a monument to her and should be dedicated to educating some of the youth in West Virginia,

RESOLVED, Since there is no demand for Student Loans, that the 61st State Conference revive this fund by giving the income from it each year as a scholarship to a West Virginia student who meets the requirements in any of the five Denominational Schools to be known as the Blanche L. Reymann State Student Loan Scholarship, thus carrying out the monetary monument in her memory and the wishes of those who started this fund and are no longer with us."

The Secretary read the explanation of the Blanche L. Reymann State Student Loan Fund compiled by Mrs. D. W. Snyder. On motion of Mrs. Kraybill, Buford Chapter, the Recording Secretary was instructed to write a letter of appreciation and thanks to Mrs. Snyder.

The motion of Mrs. Cooey "That the Regent be given auhority to appoint a Committee of 3 to investigate and report at the next Conference on the Blanche L. Reymann State Student Loan fund," was amended by Mrs. Jack Adams by "striking out 3 and inserting 5." The motion as adopted reads, "That the State Regent be given authority to appoint a committee of 5 to investigate and report at the next Conference on the Blanche L. Reymann State Student Loan Fund." Mrs. Galbraith appointed Mrs. D. B. Kraybill chairman of the investigating committee

the American Revolution request the State Legislature to prohibit the damaging of our streams, the indiscriminate cutting of timber, also urge the continued preservation of wild life preserves and promote the creation of more National Parks and the extension of recreational areas, and

RESOLVED, That this Conference endorse the action taken last week by the Governor's Task Force on Surface Mining."

A rising vote of thanks and appreciation was given our State Regent.

Your cooperation is again requested in sending in the name of your chapter librarian as soon as possible so necessary correspondence will be forwarded to your chapter.

I should like to add my personal plea to place the DAR magazine in all 18 colleges and 234 high schools and as many public libraries as possible in West Virginia. We all know the value of the many fine articles found in it and how beneficial they would be to those not in our D.A.R. program.

As West Virginia met the quota in the National Library Expansion Program, we are again asking for your full cooperation in the Microfilm Fund,, which is the only project for this year. The money received will be used to purchase legible Microfilms of the 1850 Federal Census Schedules. As you doubtlessly realize, storage is a considerable problem, and if each chapter could contribute 5c per member toward this project this will greatly benefit the National Library. Make your checks payable to Mrs. William E. Cooey, State Treasurer, so West Virginia will receive credit. Let us all strive together to keep West Virginia in the foreground.

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#### REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMEN OF NATIONAL COMMITTEES

## AMERICAN HERITAGE COMMITTEE

Statewide participation in the objectives and projects of the American Heritage Committee was attained. Reports included all facets of the suggested goals—historical restorations, pilgrimages, contributions of antique and historical items,, art exhibits, visits to galleries, one-man shows, displays, crafts of all sorts, participation in historical dramas, pageants, and choral readings, programs on American literature, materials such as wills,, deeds, maps, and letters assembled. American music featured in Chapter programs, use of the National Anthem at all meetings, and contributions to the DAR Museum.

Most outstanding, and unique with the West Virginia Daughters, was the support of the American Heritage Camp at Cedar Lakes. 96% of the West Virginia DAR Chapters sent one or more girls to this camp. Here outstanding speakers were heard, crafts were taught, tradi-

tions were established, and the basic fundamentals of American government, literature, history, and culture were taught. In the period since its inception in 1963 as our Centennial Project this camp has grown until it has reached the capacity of the facilities at Cedar Lakes. Every chapter which spensored a camper to Our American Heritage Week helped to promote the work of nine DAR Committees—American Heritage, Junior American Citizens, National Defense, Conservation, Americanism, Motion Ficture, Program, Public Relations, and the Flag of the United States of America.   - 10. Five chapters placed the debate material in their high schools.
- 11. Members from twenty-one chapters wrote to our Legislators concerning pending legislation.
- 12. Twenty-three topics pertinent to our National security were discussed at chapter meetings.
