THE STAR SPANGLED BANNER

Oh, say, can you see by the dawn's early light What so proudly we hailed at the twilight's last gleaming; Whose broad stripes and bright stars, through the perilous flight, O'er the ramparts we watched, were so gallantly streaming, And the rockets' red glare, bombs bursting in air; Gave proof through the night that our flag was still there. Oh, say, does the star-spangled banner yet wave O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave?

Oh, thus be it ever, when freeman shall stand Between their loved homes and the war's desolation; Blest with victory and peace, may the heaven-rescued land Praise the Power that hath made and preserved us a Nation! Then conquer we must, when our cause it is just, And this be our motto—"In God is our trust"; And the Star-Spangled Banner in triumph shall wave O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.

THE AMERICAN'S CREED

GREAT SEAL OF WEST VIRGINIA

The Great Seal of West Virginia, which also is the Coat of Arms, symiother the principal pursuits and resources of West Virginia. Described briefly, the obverse side of the Seal bears the legend, "State of West Virginia," together with the motto, "Montani Semper Liberi" (Mountaineers Are Always Free); a farmer stands to the right and a miner to the left of a large ivy-draped rock bearing the date of the state's admission to the Union; in front of the rock are two hunter's rifles upon which rests a Phrygian Cap, or "Cap of Liberty."

The reverse side of the Seal is not in common use today. It was intended to be employed when the Seal was attached to documents by ribbons

and suspended in the manner of a medal.

Joseph H. Diss Debar, of Doddridge County, designed the State Seal in 1863 at the request of the first West Virginia Legislature.

STATE FLAG

Before the design of the present State Flag was officially adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 1929, West Virginia had been represented by

several flags which had proved impractical.

Prominently displayed on the pure white field of today's flag and emblazoned in proper colors is the Coat of Arms, the lower half of which is wreathed by Rhododendron. Across the top, lettered on a ribbon, is the constitutional designation—"State of West Virginia." The white field is bordered on four sides by a strip of blue, and for parade purposes all but the staff side are to be trimmed with gold fringe.

- (c) The 14th Amendment was added to the Constitution right after the Civil War. It was the voting right of slaves.
- (d) In 1913 the 16th Amendment was passed could tax the citizens with no limit.
- (e) In 1918 the 17th Amendment was passed. This was for Senators to be elected by popular vote.
- 3. Sections of the Constitution have been ignored; the 12th Amendment in the Original Constitution, the President and Vice-President were to be chosen by the Congress. There should be a vote for every representative and senator in a state.

Mrs. Keitzman said we need to go back to the Constitution. Think about the man we elect to congress. Let DAR stand up.

Mrs. Fennell Anderson led the singing of "America" to be followed by Reports from State Chairmen.

Again Colonel Morgan Morgan Chapter, Fairmont, leads with 158,865 points. Elizabeth Ludington Hagans, Morgantown, second with 106,830 points. Princess Aracoma, Logan, again third receiving Honorable Mention with 85,325 points. Major William Haymond, Fairmont, close behind with 83,617 points.

Each chapter reporting is to be congratulated on the amount of energy, time and money spent in keeping before the public and educating the children of the importance of the Constitution of the United States.

Let's make next year's report better than ever by having more chapters participating in this great project.
