

GREAT SEAL OF WEST VIRGINIA

The Great Seal of West Virginia, which also is the Coat of Arms, symbolizes the principal pursuits and resources of West Virginia. Described briefly, the obver e side of the Seal bears the legend, "State of West Virginia." together with the motto. "Montani Semper Liberi" (Mountaineers Are Always Free): a farmer stands to the right and a miner to the left of a large ivy-draped rock bearing the date of the state's admission to the Union: in front of the rock are two hunter's rifles upon which rest, a Pbrygian Cap, or "Cap of Liberty."

The reverse side of the Seal is not in common use today. It was intended to be employed when the Seal was attached to documents by ribbons and suspended in the manner of a medal.

Joseph H. Diss Debar, of Doddridge County, designed the State Seal in 1863 at the request of the first West Virginia Legislature.

STATE FLAG

Before the design of the present State Flag was officially adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 1929, West Virginia had been represented by several flags which had proved impractical.

Prominently displayed on the pure white field of today's flag and emblazoned in proper colors is the Coat of Arms, the lower half of which is wreathed by Rhododendron. Across the top, lettered on a ribbon, is the constitutional designation—"State of West Virginia." The white field is bordered on four sides by a strip of blue, and for parade purposes all but the staff side are to be trimmed with gold fringe.

As of October 3, 1959, Allegheny Society of Charleston, Betty Henry society of Oak Hill, and Randolph Society of Elkins are officially disbanded due to no member-hip. Kern's Fort of Morgantown is being reactivated under the leadership of Miss Nancy McCabe, a sisted by the Elizabeth Ludington Hagans and Colonel John Evans Chapters, DAR.

Kanawha Valley, John Young, Anne Bailey, Pack Horse Ford, Buford, and William Morris Chapters reported active involvement in C.A.R. leadership roles and special financial support. REPORT—STATE CHAIRMAN OF NATIONAL DEFENSE, NSDAR

Forty-one West Virginia Chapters have made possible the following report for the State Program Committee:

Twenty-two chapters have published a Year Book for 1969-70; one a supplement and six others inserts to bring last year's book up to date. Thirtytwo have used our National Theme.

In preparing their programs, thirty-nine chapters used the Honor Roll as a guide; thirty-six used the Suggested Program Outline for 1968-69, and the same number in 1969-1970. Twenty-six chapters have used a total of thirteen slide programs and seventy-three manuscripts in planning their programs Thirty-six chapters are covering the complete work of the DAR in their programing and thirty-one have identified their programs under objective or committee headings.

Thirty-nine chapters have our President General's Message read and thirty-eight devote five minutes or more to National Defense at their chapter meetings. Year Books indicate that thirty-even will have a complete program on National Defense. Thirty-seven chapters had reports on State Conference and thirty-four on Centinental Congress.
