

From Your President

Tonite, on the eve of a dream come true and a 1960-62 objective becoming a reality - the first program of



the Little White House Conference for Children and Youth in West Virginia is opening in our State Capitol, and I am writing my last message to you as President of the West Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs. As I reminisce on this very vital objective of this administration. I recall the wires and personal letters going out from our Adult Institute in the Fall of 1960 to Governor Underwood and to the State Superintendent of Schools, emphasizing our educational program

for 1960-62 and pleading for the formation of a little White House Conference to implement the recommendations from the big White House Conference in Washington from which your president had just returned, bringing the sad news that in that meeting, West Virginia and perhaps only one other state presented no progress report or any follow up program from the White House Conference for Children and Youth held in Washington a decade ago.

Mrs. Charles Henry, Education Department Chairman, and Miss Helen Stealey also a delegate from West Virginia to the White House Conference in Washington, along with the concerted effort from all West Virginia Clubwomen. to both former Governor Cecil Underwood, and our present Governor, W. W. Barron, urging the formation of this very organization which is convening in Charleston and opening its sessions tonite, has been a very rewarding experience for the West Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs.

The great thrill in my looking over the White House Conference program for West Virginia is that the subjects for discussion in workshops are almost identical to the Federation's recommendations as they were presented to the State Board of Education many months ago.


To some outsiders, this Little West Virginia White House Conference for our Children and Youth may seem like something that just happened but those who have had a close look at the picture since our delegates returned in 1960, inspired and thrilled by the thought of implementing this program, it has been a long, hard battle, but one well worth the courage, patience and effort put forth to initiate its inception and formation.

The Federation could never have completed this task alone - This truly is a real investment the Federation has made in the Future of West Virginia - Our sincere thanks and heartfelt gratitude to all those who have helped make this project a reality and achievement of our Federation

"Women And the War On Traffic Accidents" Safety Expert's Topic



Amos E. Neyhart

Regarded as America's pioneer in Driver Education, Professor Amos E. Neyhart, Director, Institute of Public Safety, The Pennsylvania State University, and Consultant on Driver Education, American Automobile Association, presented the first high school Driver Education Course in the country in State College (Pennsylvania) High School during the 1933-34 school term.

The Safety Division, Mrs. R. H. Colvin, Chairman, arranged for Professor Neyhart to speak on Friday afternoon at the convention. His subject, "Women and the War on Traffic Accidents."

As the need for many properly prepared teachers became apparent, Professor Neyhart presented the first Teacher Preparation Course in Driver Education in the United States during the 1936 summer session at The Pennsylvania State University. This was followed in 1937 by the first College Professor's Seminar in this field at the University of Kentucky conducted by him and Dr. F. R. Noffsinger. Since then, he has personally conducted numerous such courses on campuses all over the United States, as well as graduate seminars in Safety Education. These courses carry both graduate and undergraduate credit.

Widely traveled as a speaker and lecturer, Professor Neyhart has presented papers and reports and served as moderator and panel member at annual meetings of many associations.

Will they be lost in a new and changing world? Are they being educated for excellence or have we compromised for less?

Have they been exposed to the Educational Routine on all levels?

Our children now sitting in the public schools of West Virginia will be living and working all over the world, and it is the responsibility of every West Virginia Clubwoman to see that their local schools prepare these children adequately to live harmoniously in other countries.

I thought perhaps you would like reading an article which Dr. Thomas Wikstrom, Music Consultant for the West Virginia Department of Education, found somewhere during his travels revealing what the parents of today might hope the teacher would impart to his child. The article's title is: "Please Teach My Boy About Life But Do It Gently If You Can." A copy of the article follows:

"My young son started to school a few weeks ago. It's all going to be strange and new to him for awhile, and I wish you would sort of treat him gently.

"You see, up to now, he's been king of the roost ... he's been boss of the backyard. His mother has always been around to repair his wounds, and I've always been handy to soothe his feelings.

"But now things are going to be different.

"This morning he's going to walk down the front steps, wave his hand, and start out on the great adventure . . . it's an adventure that will probably include wars and tragedy and sorrow. To live his life in the world he has to live in will require faith and love and courage. So, world, I wish you would sort of take him by his young hand and teach him the things he will have to know.

"Teach him . . . but gently, if you can.

"He will have to learn. I know, that all men are not just, that all men are not true. But teach him also that for every scoundrel there is a hero ... that for every crooked politician, there is a dedicated leader ... Teach him that for every enemy, there is a friend. It will take time, world, I know, but teach him if you can, that a nickel earned is of far more value than a dollar found ... Teach him to learn to lose ... and to enjoy winning. Steer him away from envy, if you can, and teach him the secret of quiet laughter. Let him learn early that the bullies are the easiest people to lick ...

"Teach him, if you can, the wonder of books . . . But also give him quict time to ponder the eternal mystery of birds in the sky, bees in the sun, and flowers on a green hill. In school, world, teach him it is far more honorable to fail than to cheat . . . Teach him to have faith in his own ideas, even if everyone tells him they are wrong. Teach him to be gentle with gentle people and tough with tough people.

"Try to give my son the strength not to follow the crowd when everyone else is getting on the bandwagon. Teach him to listen to all men . . . but teach him also to filter all he hears on a screen of truth and take only the good that comes through.

"Teach him, if you can, how to laugh when he is sad... Teach him there is no shame in tears... Teach him there can be glory in failure and despair in success.

"Teach him to scoff at cynics and to beware of too much sweetness ... Teach him to sell his brawn and brains to the highest bidders but never to put a price tag on his heart and soul. Teach him to close his ears to a howling mob ... and to stand and fight if he thinks he's right.


"Treat him gently, world, but don't coddle him because only the test of fire makes fine steel. Let him have the courage to be impatient . . . let him have the patience to be brave. Teach him always to have sublime faith in himself. Because then he will always have sublime faith in mankind.

This is a big order, world, but see what you can do ... He's such a nice little fellow ... he is my son!"

FROM YOUR PRESIDENT (Continued from page 3) goals for 1960-62.

The keynote address of the Little White House Conference was given by Governor Barron. He said at this Conference:

"My idea for West Virginia is centered in the concept of development and new growth. We have programs underway for roads, industrial expansion, natural-resource development, agricultural improvement, and the improvement of State-controlled institutions. But these are not enough. We must have widespread and deep-rooted educational improvement too. We must cause new growth within our system of public education.

In my recent message to the second regular session of the 55th Legislature, I said:

'I already have assured key school leaders that immediately after this session I plan to work with them in "stuffing" and preparing about 8,600 Christmas Seal envelopes for mailing. This year, it was a 'crash' program, being accomplished in one session. The letter enclosed with the seals, cites the visit of the state Mobile X-ray unit, tuberculin testing in the schools, Dental Health Clinic, services of Health Department and chair of pulmonary diseases at WVU among things accomplished by the tuberculosis associations through the sale of seals.

developing a major school improvement program that will guarantee to lift education to its proper level in West Virginia — and equally guarantee our teachers conditions which will make top-flight, modern instruction possible.

'In developing this plan, it is my aim to make it possible for some of our school leaders to visit other states in search of new ideas and ways for improvements. Further, it will be my purpose to see that a blueprint of this school improvement program is completed in time for action by the 1963 Legislature.' "

I should like to strongly recommend that the West Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs give the Governor their whole-hearted support in the coming years and never falter in their efforts and attempts to see that this promise to the children of West Virginia is fulfilled.
