GREAT SEAL OF WEST VIRGINIA

The Great Seal of West Virginia, which also is the Coat of Arms, symbolizes the principal pursuits and resources of West Virginia. Described briefly, the obverse side of the Seal bears the legend, "State of West Virginia," together with the motto, "Montani Semper Liberi" (Mountaineers Are Always Free); a farmer stands to the right and a miner to the left of a large ivy-draped rock bearing the date of the state's admission to the Union; in front of the rock are two hunter's rifles upon which rests a Phrygian Cap, or "Cap of Liberty."

The reverse side of the Seal is not in common use today. It was people, by the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived intended to be employed when the Seal was attached to documents by ribbons and suspended in the manner of a medal.

Joseph H. Diss Debar, of Doddridge County, designed the State Seal in 1863 at the request of the first West Virginia Legislature.

STATE FLAG

Before the design of the present State Flag was officially adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 1929, West Virginia had been represented by several flags which had proved impractical.

Prominently displayed on the pure white field of today's flag and emblazoned in proper colors is the Coat of Arms, the lower half of which is wreathed by Rhododendron. Across the top, lettered on a ribbon, is the constitutional designation — "State of West Virginia." The white field is bordered on four sides by a strip of blue, and for parade purposes all but the staff side are to be trimmed with gold fringe.

RESOLUTIONS

ADOPTED BY THE 81st CONTINENTAL CONGRESS

DANGERS OF THE EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution favor repeal of obsolete state laws discriminating unfairly against women, support the efforts of Congress to abolish discrimination against women by statute, but warn that adoption of the Equal Rights Amendment to the Constitution could adversely affect well-established rights of women and result in constitutional and legal chaos.

OUR COMMON DEFENSE

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution call for increased defense appropriations to insure the restoration of modern, effective detection systems, encircling the entire United States and to return the United States to its former military superiority.

AMNESTY FOR DRAFT EVADERS AND DESERTERS OPPOSED

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution oppose amnesty for those who have defied the law and recommend their prosecution upon their return to the United States according to the laws of the United States government.

PANAMA CANAL

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution opposes surrender of United States sovereignty over the Canal Zone and of the rights granted in perpetuity by the Treaty of 1903 over the Panama Canal.

WITHDRAWAL FROM THE UNITED NATIONS

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution stand for the immediate withdrawal of the United States of America from the United Nations and urge that the United Nations move its headquarters and all of its specialized agencies to another country.

UNITED NATIONS CONFERENCE ON HUMAN ENVIRONMENT

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution endorse cooperation with our neighbor nations in the Western Hemisphere to recognize, respect and conserve common vital element necessary to our joint survival without subjecting ourselves to dictation from a closed world jurisdiction.

IMMIGRATION AND POPULATION CONTROL

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution recommend reduced immigration, restoration of the quota system, and strengthening of the laws and penalties pertaining to illegal entry in order to preserve the institutions of America government for our children and posterity.

EDUCATION

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution urge that the Nation move forward to a basic educational curriculum which includes American history as a required subject, and to a school system providing a climate conducive to learning by encouraging self-discipline and by the teaching of moral values that have proved to be invaluable in the past and are desperately needed in the future.

REGIONAL GOVERNMENT BY EXECUTIVE ORDERS

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution alert the public to the dangers of the uses of Executive Orders and especially their use to create a Regional form of government which would destroy Constitutional government.

UNITED STATES TRADE WITH COMMUNIST COUNTRIES

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution oppose all trade in strategic materials with communist nations, and warn that by trading with the enemy this Nation is aiding and abetting its own possible destruction.

WORLD GOVERNMENT MARCHES ON THROUGH

ATLANTIC UNION

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution unalterably oppose any legislation which directly menaces the safety and security of the Western Hemisphere and which would destroy the sovereign independence of the United States of America.

BUSING

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution oppose arbitrary busing of school children but warn of the far-reaching consequences of a constitutional amendment to avoid such busing and urge that every effort be made to retain state and local control of the educational system.

REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMEN OF NATIONAL COMMITTEES AMERICAN HERITAGE COMMITTEE

The American Heritage Committee is one of the most active and most publicized, because of the wonderful cooperation of chapter chairmen and the "American Heritage Camp" at Cedar Lakes. All of the various fields comprising the work of the committee are included in the camp activities, and practically every chapter cooperates by sending representatives to the camp.

To mention a few outstanding projects: One chapter owns and maintains furniture in their chapter house which is a museum. The furniture dates from the 1700s, and quilts and coverlets from 1800. Another has a commemorative plate designed by a member,

showing several of the homes of Patriots of the county. The plate not only provided the chapter with a wonderful money making project, but has gone out to many homes in many states carrying with it a bit of our American heritage. Another chapter has a collection of pictures of old buildings, many now razed, including one of the first hotels in the state where many Presidents of the United States were guests at different times. The collection is to be displayed in a museum. Other projects noteworthy of mention: A book of original poetry; an original drama, "Heritage of the Hills," concerning the Bi-Centennial; a cook book of West Virginia foods now being printed. One unique style show was of quilt patterns worked into clothing—the quilt patterns being very old ones that had been passed down from generation to generation.

Of the chapters reporting, all have had programs relating to some facet of our American heritage in the fields of art, crafts, music, literature and drama, such as quilt and heirloom showings; American music; papers concerning the life of great Americans as well as historical places. Poetry readings of American heritage and many discussions of quilts and all fine arts in our state and localities during colonial years.

Please continue your fine cooperation in promoting the work of our committee for it is surely the Daughters of the American Revolution who are expected to lead the way in preserving our great American Heritage.

BI-CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

Two meetings have been held with groups to discuss and plan for the State Program for the Bi-Centennial celebration in 1976.

Since the freedom of this Country was established through and by the early churches and because our forefathers, patriots, and statesmen who established the Constitution which has led the standards for this Country, were basically scripture-minded, we believe that we should especially remember these facts as we plan for a program within the State.

Therefore, it is our thinking that the Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia should promote a program of early Colonial Church Music in the Churches of West Virginia on Sunday, July 4, 1976.

The approach has been made through the World Council of Churches of West Virginia by conferring with the Executive Secretary, Mr. Paul F. Price, who has approved the idea of offering to each church the opportunity to join in such a program, if it so desires. Further correspondence with the churches will be made through Mr. Price's office and appropriate listings of material suggested to those planning programs within their own churches.

In 1973, we hope that a representative of DAR will appear before the regular Assembly of West Virginia Council of World Churches and present the invitation for this co-operation. Also, a letter will be mailed through the Executive Secretary's office. Further publicity will follow in 1974 and in 1975, a bibliography of reference materials for such a program will be provided each church.

As plans develop, we hope that each Daughter will become much aware of the importance the early churches played in the establishing of the Country and that each Daughter will offer her assistance within her local community or church.

CONSERVATION REPORT

Thirty-eight Chapters reported eight scholarships totaling \$250.00. Helped youth with Operation Clean State, three historic homes saved and two chapters helped in recycling. 9,807 trees planted on farms, highways and parks, 600 bulbs and four shrubberies planted; 23,755 pounds of bird seed bought at cost of \$1,358.60, one and one-half acres planted in bird seed, two nature centers created, four other wild life fed. Thirty-seven chapters reported conservation programs given with 33 speakers, six slides, two films and three speaking engagements given by members. 132 letters were written to Legislators urging passage of bills to combat water and air pollution.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS COMMITTEE

This committee sponsors the selection of the Senior Girl Good Citizen in accredited public and private high schools within the state.

For 1971-1972 thirty-six chapters were actively involved in this committee work. Two chapters each sponsor the selection of the Good Citizen in eight schools; two sponsor six schools each, and others sponsor from one to five schools. A total of ninety-three high schools participated this year.

The DAR Good Citizen pin and a NSDAR Certificate of Award was presented to each school winner. Many chapters entertained their contestant at a regular or special chapter meeting.

The State Good Citizen was Miss Dianne Lynne Rice, a senior at Elkins High School, sponsored by the John Hart Chapter. She was recognized at the State Leadership Conference at Jackson's Mill in June and was presented a \$100 Series E United States Bond from the National Society DAR. Miss Rice also received honorable mention in the national contest by placing third in the East Central Division which comprises seven states.

West Virginia Chapters should become more active in this committee work. With approximately 200 eligible high schools in the state, fewer than half of the schools honor the outstanding senior girl good citizen through DAR work. Since this committee work is approved by the National Association of Secondary School Principals and by our State Superintendent's office, every chapter should participate, as an opportunity is afforded for good public relations for DAR as well as the recognition of fine qualities of good citizenship among the high school senior girls.

For 1972-1973 increased chapter participation in this committee work is urged. Each chapter not already involved should sponsor the Senior Girl Good Citizen in at least one area high school. Thus the nineteen non-participating chapters could add nineteen more DAR Good Citizens to our next year's report.

DAR SCHOOL

Very early in our nation's history its leaders realized that if a government like ours was to succeed it must have an informed electorate. Therefore education has played an important part in our heritage. The DAR from its inception realized that education must be one of our most important functions; so we have established schools where educational facilities were lacking.

I was disappointed this year in that only twenty-three chapters reported on DAR schools; last year twenty-six chapters reported. I sincerely hope this does not mean a lack of interest by the DAR members in our schools.

From the reports I have gathered these facts: 12 chapters have had programs on our schools; 2 chapters have had slides; 15 packages of used clothing were sent with a valuation of \$675; Kate Duncan Smith received \$30 for scholarships and Tamassee \$17.50. Three Chapters reported having up to date charts on the needs of the schools; 12 have received literature from Kate Duncan Smith, 9 from Tamassee and 6 from Crossmore. Money other than that marked for scholarships is \$86.62.

We often wonder if our trading stamps do any good. Blennard-hasset sent trading stamp books to Kate Duncan Smith. The chapter received word that an unabridged dictionary and brass candlesticks were purchased with them. Five chapters reported sending coupons. Even though a chapter is small, I feel that is a service each chapter could do.

Wheeling chapter was fortunate in having our National chairman for schools, Miss Amanda Thomas as a speaker. Ann Royal had a former teacher at KDS as a speaker, Mrs. Virginia Smith of Clarksburg.

I have had several inquiries about material on schools and programming. There is a new pamphlet "DAR Schools" that can be obtained from Washington, D. C. by writing NSDAR for it.

For fifty cents you can also buy a catalogue of programs from there.

Let's keep pushing for our schools.

VETERAN'S HOSPITAL REPORT

1. Thirty-one (31) Chapters reporting.
2. Blennerhassett Chapter, Parkersburg, W. Va., Most Complete Report.
3. The work reported included money gifts, magazine donations, magazine subscriptions, books, paperback books, comfort items, DAR magazines, lap robes, Christmas gifts, Christmas parties, cakes presented and Service Hours. One DAR lady worked four hours per week, and another worked 271 hours per year. 425 gifts were reported given to patients. 21 donations to different hospitals.

ORIGINAL IDEAS USED BY DIFFERENT CHAPTERS

1. One chapter took part in the Loyalty Day Parade and Celebration, and distributed an original poem "Ode to Veterans."
2. One chapter arranged for "Talking Books" to be loaned to the hospital by the City Library.
3. A drive was made by one group to have packages mailed overseas to Veterans for holidays.
4. One DAR member visited all the Veterans Hospitals in West Virginia.
5. One Chapter placed boxes marked "Veteran Donations" in City Drug stores for their paperback books.
6. Several chapters use their Christmas meeting as a time for collecting gifts or money for their Veteran project.
7. One shut-in DAR member corresponds with crippled patients.
8. Two people reported making home-made candy periodically for patients.

As State Chairman of Veteran Service I was able to attend the Central District Meeting at Beverly, W. Va. on May 6, 1972 and talk briefly of the Veteran's needs. On May 13th I attended the Northern DAR District Meeting in Parkersburg and presented Mrs. Shirley S. Petty, Blennerhassett Chapter as having the most complete Veterans Report of the state of West Virginia. This next year we hope to present certificates, signed by our state regent, to the three best reports. On August 30th we invited the chapters within the Clarksburg radius to attend a tour of the Veterans Hospital there. Mr. Russell Bonasso, the Clarksburg Veteran Hospital Director of Services conducted the two hour tour and question and answer period. It was very beneficial from an informational standpoint, with concrete instances of the help they need in Veterans Hospitals. We hope to have other tours in the future.

By-Laws
OF
South Branch Valley Chapter
OF
National Society
OF THE
Daughters Of the American
Revolution

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be South Branch Valley Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II

Object

The objects of this Chapter are to perpetuate the memory and the spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence and to encourage historical research in relation to the Revolution.

ARTICLE III

Membership

Any woman whose application for membership conforms to the requirements of the National Society may become a member of this Chapter by being endorsed by two members and approved by a majority of the local Executive Board

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Sec. 1. The officers of the Chapter shall be a Regent, First Vice-Regent, Second Vice-Regent, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Registrar, an Historian and a Chaplain. These officers shall constitute an Executive Board.

Sec. 2. Nominations for officers shall be held at the March regular meeting. A Nominating Committee, composed of five members shall be appointed by the Regent prior to such March regular meeting. It shall be the duty of the Nominating Committee to contact each nominee and to determine whether or not she will serve if elected. No nomination shall be submitted by the Nominating Committee unless the person nominated has previously signified that she is willing to serve if elected. The newly elected officers shall be installed at the next regular meeting following their election, and shall serve for three (3) years.

Sec. 3. In case of a vacancy in the office of Regent, such vacancy shall be filled by the Vice-Regent; and in case of a vacancy in the office of First Vice-Regent, such vacancy shall be filled by the Second Vice-Regent. A vacancy occurring in any other office at any time between the times for regular election of officers shall be filled by a majority vote of the members present at any regular meeting at which such election may be held.

Sec. 4. Honorary officers may be elected for life at any annual meeting by a three-fourths vote, which vote shall be taken by ballot, unless by unanimous consent the ballot is omitted. No member shall be eligible to an honorary office who has not filled the Chapter office with the corresponding name.

ARTICLE V

Duties Of Officers

Sec. 1. The officers shall perform the duties prescribed by the By-Laws, by the By-Laws of the State Conference and of the National Society, and by the parliamentary authority of the National Society.

Sec. 2. The Regent shall preside at all meetings of the Chapter and of the Executive Board. She shall be the chief executive officer of the Chapter. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for, and shall be ex-officio

a member of all committees except the nominating committee.
Sec. 3. The First Vice-Regent shall, in the absence of the Regent, perform the duties pertaining to that office, and in the absence of both, such duties shall be performed by the Second Vice-Regent.

Sec. 4. The Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall communicate, whenever possible, with members who are ill or in distress.

Sec. 5. The Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings and attend to the correspondence of the Chapter.

Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to collect and disburse all funds for the Chapter and to act as custodian of same. She shall disburse such funds by the vote of the Chapter.

Sec. 7. It shall be the duty of the Registrar to examine and verify the papers of each applicant for membership. She shall keep a register in which names of each member shall be entered with the date of election to membership, the National and Chapter number and name of ancestors.

Sec. 8. The Historian shall direct such historical work as may be requested by the Chapter in accordance with the historical and biographical papers of which the Chapter may become possessed.

ARTICLE VI

Meetings

Sec. 1. The regular meetings of the Chapter shall be held the third Saturday of each month, unless otherwise ordered by the Chapter.

Sec. 2. The regular meeting held in April shall be known as the annual meeting and shall be for reports of officers and committees and election of new officers and for any other business that may arise.

Sec. 3. Special meetings may be called by the Chapter Executive Board and shall be called upon the request of three members of the Chapter.

Sec. 4. Four members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum, and seven members shall constitute a quorum of the Chapter.

ARTICLE VII

Dues

The annual dues of each members of the Chapter shall be four (\$4.00) dollars. National initiation fee five dollars (\$5.00). The dues are payable in advance at or before the November meeting. Associate members pay one dollar (\$1.00).

ARTICLE VIII

Delegates

Sec. 1. The delegates and alternates to which the Chapter is entitled to be represented at a meeting of the Continental Congress shall be chosen at a meeting prior to such Continental Congress.

Sec. 2. The delegates and alternates to which the Chapter is entitled at the annual meeting of the State Conference shall be chosen by the Chapter at the September regular meeting.

ARTICLE IX

Amendments

These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of The Chapter by a two-thirds vote, provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting.
