THE STAR SPANGLED BANNER

Oh. say, can you see by the dawn's early light What so proudly we hailed at the twilight's last gleaming; Whose broad stripes and bright stars, through the perilous flight, O'er the Ramparts we watched, were so gallantly streaming. And the rockets red glare, the bombs bursting in air; Gave proof through the night that our flag was still there. Oh. say, does the star-spangled banner yet wave O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave?

Oh. thus be it ever, when freemen shall stand Between their loved homes and the war's desolation; Blest with victory and peace, may the heaven-rescued land Praise the Power that hath made and preserved us a Nation! Then conquer we must, when our cause it is just. And this be our motto—"In God is our trust;" And the Star-Spangled Banner in triumph shall wave O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.

THE AMERICAN'S CREED

I believe in the United States of America as a government of the people by the people for the people whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed, a democracy in a republic; a sovereign Nation of many sovereign States; a perfect Union, one and inseparable; established upon those principals of freedom. equality, justice and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes.

GREAT SEAL OF WEST VIRGINIA

The Great Seal of West Virginia. which also is the Coat of Arms. symbolizes the principal pursuits and resources of West Virginia. Described briefly, the obverse side of the Seal bears the legend. "State of West Virginia." together with the motto. "Montani Semper Liberi" (Mountaineers Are Always Free); a farmer stands to the right and a miner to the left of a large ivy-draped rock bearing the date of the state's admission to the Union; in front of the rock are two hunter's rifles upon which rests a I'hrygian Cap. or "Cap of Liberty."

The reverse side of the Seal is not in common use today. It was people, by the people for the people; whose just powers are derived intended to be employed when the Seal was attached to documents by ribbons and suspended in the manner of a medal.

Joseph H. Diss Debar, of Doddridge County, designed the State Seal in 1863 at the request of the first West Virginia Legislature.

STATE FLAG

Before the design of the present State Flag was officially adopted by the Legislature on March 7. 1929. West Virginia had been represented by several flags which had proved impractical.

Prominently displayed on the pure white field of today's flag and emblazoned in proper colors is the Coat of Arms, the lower half of which is wreathed by Rhododendron. Across the top, lettered on a ribbon, is the constitutional designation—"State of West Virginia." The white field is bordered on four sides by a strip of blue, and for parade purposes all but the staff side are to be trimmed with gold fringe.

- Delegates are expected to be in their seats BEFORE the opening of 2. each session.
- Doors will be closed during speeches, musical numbers and reports.
- No delegate shall be entitled to the floor until she rises, gives her name and chapter, and is recognized by the chair.
- No member shall speak more than once the same day to the same question, nor longer than three minutes at one time without permission of the assembly.
- No delegate shall be permitted to vote unless she is wearing her voter's badge.
- The reports of Chapter Regents and State Chairman shall be limited to two minutes each.
- All main motions must be presented in writing and signed by the maker.
- All resolutions must be presented through the Resolutions Committee.
- Robert's Rules of Order (revised) shall be the accepted authority on 10. parliamentary law.

The Secretary moved that these rules be adopted as printed. Motion carried.

The place of meeting shall be set by the State Organization. Reports of officers, State Board of Management, the Chairman of Committees shall be received, and any routine business shall be considered at this meeting.

ARTICLE VIII FEES AND DUES

Another with history in the scraps—a silk campaign ribbon of "Harrison and Morton 1888," with the likeness of Benjamin Harrison woven in the silk. This is especially interesting since President Harrison's wife, Caroline Scott Harrison was our first President General.

This is just a sample of the things accomplished by our committee. It has been a joy to work with this fine group.

CONSERVATION REPORT

Twenty-five Chapters reported 2 scholarships for \$50; 5.713 trees and shrubberies planted mainly on farms; 13,740 pounds bird seed at \$1,460 fed to birds; nineteen Chapters had programs, 13 with speakers, 7 with slides, 2 with films, and one giving conservation program to another organization; 48 letters were sent to legislators concerning strip mining; 3 Chapters participated in recycling; 1 Chapter landscaped Tu-Enn-Wei Park; 1 Chapter gave radio spots for bird feeding; one Chapter cleaned Madonna of the Trail and maintained Washington family burying ground. Deer, squirrel, chipmunk, and rabbit were protected on three farms.

DAR GOOD CITIZEN COMMITTEE

From the reports of 48 Chapters, 42 have actively sponsored DAR Good Citizens in 115 high schools, an increase of 22 over last year. All 105 Good Citizens were awarded official pins and Certificates of Award. Six mimeographed communications have been made available to the Chapter chairmen: State Committee Chairman's letter in Regent's package, order forms, Good Citizen Questionnaire for state contest, September 15 report form, February 1 report form, and now a sample high school information sheet.

Chapter chairmen have frequently requested questionnaires and other forms in advance. The 1974 forms are all available now. Pins and certificates are slower in arriving, but will be available soon. Chapter chairmen are urged to send in their orders by November 1, whenever possible.

The 1973 State DAR Good Citizen was Miss A. Jane McCauley, a senior of Philip Barbour High School at Philippi, sponsored by James Barbour Chapter. She will be honored officially by the State Society at the 1974 Summer Leadership Conference. Four other Good Citizens received honorable mention ratings for the questionnaires and folios.

Our report for the year is good, but let us continue to increase the number of Good Citizens in West Virginia. May I congratulate you for your cooperation in premoting so successfully the work of our committee.

Fifteen Yearbooks, eight Supplements and three Inserts have been received for evaluation this year. Of these, nineteen received First Place Awards, four Second and two Honorable Mention. The National Theme was used in all twenty-five books; the National Molto in twenty-four but the latter not always in the desired place.

Twenty-four Chapters out of our fifty-six are responsible for the following report.

Honor Rell Requirements and Program Suggestions were considered in programming by twenty-seven Chapters.
