Oh, say, does the star-spangled banner yet wave O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave?

Oh. thus be it ever, when freemen shall stand Between their loved homes and the war's desolation; Blest with victory and peace, may the heaven-rescued land Praise the Power that hath made and preserved us a Nation! Then conquer we must, when our cause it is just.

THE AMERICAN'S CREED

GREAT SEAL OF WEST VIRGINIA

The Great Seal of West Virginia, which also is the Coat of Arms, symbolizes the principal pursuits and resources of West Virginia. Described briefly, the observe side of the Seal bears the legend, "State of West Virginia," together with the motto, "Montani Semper Liberi (Mountaineers Are Always Free); a farmer stands to the right and a miner to the left of a large ivy-draped rock bearing the date of the state's admission to the Union; in front of the rock are two hunter's rifles upon which rests a Phrygian Cap, or "Cap of Liberty."

The reverse side of the Seal is not in common use today. It was people, by the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived intended to be employed when the Seal was attached to documents by ribbons and suspended in the manner of a medal.

Joseph H. Diss Debar, of Doddridge County, designed the State Seal in 1863 at the request of the first West Virginia Legislature.

STATE FLAG

Before the design of the present State Flag was officially adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 1929, West Virginia had been represented by several flags which had proved impractical.

Prominently displayed on the pure white field of today's flag and emblazoned in proper colors is the Coat of Arms, the lower half of which is wreathed by Rhododendron. Across the top, lettered on a ribbon, is the constitutional designation—"State of West Virginia." The white field is bordered on four sides by a strip of blue, and for parade purposes all but the staff side are to be trimmed with gold fringe.

ARTICLE V - Section 7, line 5: Any member having served in an office for more than one-half term shall be deemed to have served a term. (This is not only an NSDAR ruling, but Robert's Rules of Order.) N. P. Mrs. Samuel Davis moved that the article be adopted as recommended. Seconded by Mrs. Mary Hubbs. Article adopted.

ARTICLE V - Section 9: Nominations for a candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be made from the floor at an annual meeting of the State Conference. No endorsement shall be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress which must be designated in the motion for the endorsement. The vote shall be by ballot, and a majority vote shall be necessary for endorsement. Mrs. Samuel Davis moved that the article be adopted as recommended. Seconded by Miss Nell Robinson. Article adopted.

ARTICLE VI - Section 2: The State Vice Regent, in the absence of the State Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. If a vacancy occurs in the office of State Regent she shall immediately accede to that office, provided she has been confirmed as State Vice Regent. Mrs. Samuel Davis moved that the article be adopted as recommended. Seconded by Mrs. Lyal Clay. Article adopted.

ARTTICLE VI - Section 4: The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of all meetings of the State Organization, the State Board of Management and of the State Executive Committee. She shall keep a roster of the State Officers, State Chairmen and Chapters of the State Organization and shall notify all Officers, Chairmen and Chapter Regents of all decisions, orders and proceedings affecting or pertaining to them. In the absence of the State Regent and State Vice Regent she shall call the meeting to order and preside until a chairman protem is elected. Mrs. Samuel Davis moved that the article be adopted as recommended. Seconded by Miss Nina Jarrell. Article adopted.

ARTICLE VII - Section 2: The report of the Program Committee, when adopted, shall become the Order of Business for the Annual Conference. A two-thirds vote of registered delegates present and voting is necessary to make a change in the program. Mrs. Samuel Davis moved that the article be adopted as recommended. Seconded by Martha Jane Becker. Article adopted.

ARTICLE IX - Section 1: The Officers of the State Organization, the District Directors and the Chapter Regents, or in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent, shall constitute the Board of Management. Mrs. Samuel Davis moved that the article be adopted as recommended. Seconded by Mrs. Grant Hall. Article adopted.

ARTICLE XII - Section 2: The retiring Regent of a Chapter shall notify promptly the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, the State Treasurer, and the Organizing Secretary General of the election of Officers. Mrs. Samuel Davis moved that the article be adopted as recommended. Seconded by Miss Edith Love. Article adopted.

Report of the Resolutions Committee as adopted by the 83rd Continental Congress was given by Mrs. James I. Baritell, Chairman.

The Resolutions are as follows:

REDEDICATION

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, remind its members, who may be tempted to despair, that only the dead have seen the end of conflict - only in God can we place our complete trust.

AMERICAN REVOLUTION BICENTENNIAL

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution encourage its members to participate actively in making this memorable celebration a worthy tribute to our ancestors whose dedication and foresight made this Nation possible.

RESOLVED, That each member of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution assure the appropriate use of funds allotted by assuming leadership for planning Bicentennial projects in her community.

PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS REVIEW ORGANIZATION

REESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution individually urge the repeal of the provisions of the Social Security Act which violate the confidentialty of the doctor-patient relationship, which set standards for the practice of medicine which would lead to the Nationalization of Medicine.

EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT - SECTION 2

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution continue to oppose the Equal Rights Amendment, which removes from each state legislature and transfers to the Federal Government jurisdiction over all laws making any distinction whatsoever between the sexes.

THE NEW BRICKER AMENDMENT

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution support the so-called "New Bricker Amendment" as a means whereby neither treaties nor Executive Agreements can amend the Constitution of the United States of America.

"LAND USE PLANNING ACT"

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution alert its members to the dangers of the strategy of Land Use Legislation as a tactic for weakening or eliminating private ownership of property.

PRISONERS OF WAR AND THOSE MISSING IN ACTION

RESOLVED, That the members of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution inform the public of the danger of continuing these inflationary practices, recognize the necessity of a sound fiscal policy; and recommend increasing individual initiative, integrity and responsibility to the end that government expenditures may be limited.

RELIGIONS IN THE SCHOOLS

RESOLVED, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution challenge the legality of teaching the occult and pagan religions in the public schools, and call for the return of the reading of the Holy Scriptures and prayer to Almighty God.

HOUSE COMMITTEE ON INTERNAL SECURITY

West Virginia is most fortunate to have one of the twenty-eight Period Rooms in Memorial Hall.

With the fast approaching Bicentennial it is up to our West Virginia Room to tell the story of our State to the hundreds of thousands of visitors who journey to the National Capitol and will not have the opportunity to tour our State.

The file on the West Virginia Room has been reviewed, and found we have almost no information about the histories accompanying the objects on display there.

A list has been made of all items. The Taws piano in our room is one of the finest musical instruments in the DAR Museum. The portrait over the mantle is of Dr. Richard Pindell, a native of Maryland who served as surgeon in the Maryland Army during the Revolution. A small rare desk probably of Virginia origin is also in the room. These are the most outstanding and valuable items we have, but I am confident we can find many more objects of value to be placed there, for West Virginia is rich in heirlooms and priceless items made before 1830. If you know of some treasure handed down from this period, I should like you to think seriously of placing it in our West Virginia Room. There is probably no place where you can share it with more people, or preserve it for posterity, and help perpetuate the memories of our ancestors and celebrate their achievements.

All Daughters of this State have been asked to help find items for our room, and to give generous cash donations. I should like to urge all Chapters to have a program on the DAR Museum to better educate our members on this worthy project.

Offered gifts should be reported to the Office of the Curator General before being sent on approval. If possible, photographs and all available information should also be reported at this time. Where possible, this information should include when and where made, and by whom. Genealogical information on all people mentioned, where and when the object was purchased, or how it descended in the family. In other words tell the whole story.

The cumulative effort of our Chapters, and the response from the public, point up a tremendous out-pouring of patriotic spirit.

As we continue our report, we keep in mind that it is not only the number of points that count but also the quality of personal involvement in the activity that produced those points. Involvement of people - adults, youth, children - is important. For example: School Activities, from and by which children learn the history and significance of the Constitution. Submitted from Elizabeth L. Hagans Chapter is a schedule of Constitution Week Activities which lists:

Citizenship Banner Program Bulletin Board - Constitution Week Theme Library Display of Patriotic Material Display of Flags at Home Study of the Constitution Spot Announcements Drama - The Boston Tea Party Special Study - Pledge of Allegiance Alistair Cook's America Study of the Star Spangled Banner in Reading

This shows real faculty involvement and teacher interest in presenting the Constitution of the United States of America to students.

Schools participated in varying degrees. The principal of one elementary school took the student body outside the building and explained the meaning of the Constitution. A teacher reported, "It was just wonderful." In another school, the Principal reported scheduled patriotic activities with singing of patriotic songs for each day of Constitution Week. After signing the form, she wrote: "P. S. I also observed Constitution Week at my home by flying the Flag." By number, it is true that it is just one more Flag but it shows teacher interest and involvement - the kind that counts . . . the act that is significant.

Some Chapters earned extra points by urging the display of the Flag of the United States of America throughout Constitution Week, and. by implementing original ideas. Import ideas were requests for original poems, essays, dramas, and skits; organization of a parade and Chapter participation in another; organization of a 187 Mile Walkathon; a request to a Congressman for a Flag of the United States of America which had flown over the Capitol of the United States, to be displayed in the parades; this request was granted. As "something that catches the eye", special consideration must be given to the banner that was made by a Daughter and displayed over a bank, and, to the Chapter which succeeded in getting announcement of Constitution Week, September 17-23, on the flashing Time and Temperature Board of the city; like consideration must be given to the observance that took the Constitution Week Program to the Boy Scout Camps and the 4-H Clubs. The making of a Flag of the United States of America, by a Daughter, was an original idea, and, the making of Braille Flags, by several Chapters, was a new feature.

We are pleased that communities, throughout the State, displayed an increased number of Flags of the United States of America, that a greater number of churches participated in the observance, that 40 mayors of cities and towns signed proclamations, and, that Governor Arch Moore issued a Proclamation. We are gratified that, in most cases, we had favorable participation by the news media. The press, with news releases and editorials, was interested and generous; T V and Radio Stations gave time for interviews, editorials, and spot announcements.

It has been a pleasure to work with the Chairmen of the Constitution Week Committees in all phoses of the observance, and we thank the 45 chapters that participated in 1974. We hope to have 100% participation next year. This means that we hope the other 10 chapters will activate Constitution Week observance and submit a report - regardless of limitations - in 1975. We emphasize that it is not the number of points that should be sought but the carrying of the message - revitalization of our appreciation of our great heritage, the Constitution. Contact with every community is important . . . we need to lengthen the cords of our tent.

We thank you for the privilege of working with you in this our great endeavor to do all that we can for preservation of the Constitution of the United States of America.

Fifteen chairmen have sent me their names, plans of Bicentennial activities - either planned for later this year or already a part of that chapter's history; and I feel that so many more of you will be reporting exciting ways you and other organizations in your communities are working together to make July 4, 1976, the culmination of two years' activity that will help us all to understand and remember our history better, with more meaning than ever before. Among those plans . . . the John Hart Chapter in Randolph County is planning to completely refurnish an 18th Century Room in the Randolph County Museum, which will be a reading room with artifacts displayed. We all know how active the Pt. Pleasant Chapter has been in their week long Pt. Pleasant celebration, just completed, with the chapter hostess for a tea on October 6, and a Memorial service on October 11.

Some areas are more steeped in history, lend themselves better to real involvement and large scale planning, and I know it is really difficult for some of you to make big plans for such a celebration. But every chapter can make this a time to find the oldest house, the oldest still used school, church, etc. in the community. Search for history from older citizens and then record it. Compile histories of pioneer families. Join with other organizations for community-wide celebrations, and hopefully plan some project that will continue through the future, like a Museum or Revolutionary soldiers' graves marked, oldest houses, churches, schools marked with appropriate ceremonies.

Be sure you get a copy of the questionnaire, "Bicentennial Action Report" from me during Conference, mail them back to me by February 15 if you wish your chapter's activities to be judged for awards to be presented at the 84th Congress.
