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

ANNUAL MID-SUMMER MEETING — JACKSON'S MILL

EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING, JUNE 25, 1976

The Executive Board, West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, met Friday, June 25, 1976, at 8 p.m., Jackson Lodge, Jackson's Mill, with the State Regent, Mrs. John E. Corbett, presiding.

Mrs. Guy Perkins, State Corresponding Secretary, gave the Invocation.

The roll was called by the State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Leonard E. Hash, and the following officers were recorded present: Mrs. John E. Corbitt, State Regent; Mrs. Homer Martin, State Vice Regent; Mrs. Leonard E. Hash, State Recording Secretary; Mrs. Guy Perkins, State Corresponding Secretary; Miss Gladys Pitzer, State Organizing Secretary; Mrs. Walter L. Spearman, State Treasurer; Mrs. Charles I. Rhodes, State Registrar; Mrs. H. Sheldon Areford, State Librarian, and Mrs. Samuel M. Davis, State Parliamentarian.

The reading of the Executive Board minutes of June 20, 1975, were read and approved.

The following recommendations were made by the Board

- 1. Mrs. Homer Martin moved that the American Heritage camping material be given to the State 4-H Camp at Jackson's Mill. Mrs. Samuel Davis, State Parliamentarian, seconded the recommendation. The recommendation carried.
- 2. Mrs. John Corbitt spoke about the painting of the first State Regent, Mrs. Goff, which was painted in 1921 and sold to the State Organization to be placed in the museum in Washington. After the picture was placed in the museum, a ruling was passed that no more modern paintings be accepted. Mrs. Guy Perkins. State Corresponding Secretary, moved that the picture of the first State Regent, Mrs. Goff, be donated to the Cultural Center in Charleston, W. Va.; and if they don't want the picture, then it be offered to the Sunrise Art Gallery in Charleston, W. Va. Seconded by Miss Gladys Pitzer, State Organizing Secretary. Recommendation carried.
- 3. Mrs. Homer Martin, State Vice Regent, moved that the State Organization purchase necessary microfilm for the filming of past Treasurer's reports and books and for the Finance Committee to review the financial records to be microfilmed. Mrs. Charles I. Rhodes, State Regristrar, seconed the recommendation. Recommendation carried.

Mrs. John E. Corbitt, State Regent, appointed a ByLaw Revision Committee consisting of Mrs. Samuel Davis, Mrs Carl Galbraith, Mrs. Charles Rhodes, Mrs. Walter Spearman and Mrs. Charles Brown.

The State Regent discussed the West Virginia Period Room in Washington. In the West Virginia Room there are 4 chairs and 1 sofa that are not of the period but of the period of 1880 (the 4 chairs). The State Regent gave the museum permission to auction off the 4 chairs and 1 sofa. These furnishings were bought by the state organization, so they will be put up for sale for the state organization and the money will be put back on our account in order to get the furnishings that we do need for the West Virginia Period Room.

The side chair and old drapes, which were of the 1890 period, were sold for \$143.50. This money was placed in the West Virginia Room Account in the museum in Washington.

A discussion of purchasing an addressograph machine for the West Virginia DAR News. The Finance Committee is to investigate the cost of such item before a final decision is to be made.

The meeting adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING June 26, 1976

The State Board of Management, West Virginia Society Daughters of the American Revolution, met Saturday, June 26, 1976, Jackson Lodge, Jackson's Mill, with Mrs. John E. Corbitt, State Regent, presiding.

Mrs. Samuel M. Davis, State Parliamentarian, gave the Invocation,

The minutes of the Board of Management meeting of June 20, 1975, were read and approved.

Mrs. Walter Spearman, State Treasurer, gave the Treasurer's report from September 15, 1975 to June 15, 1976. Balance in Funds at the National Bank of Commerce, Charleston, W. Va., as of June 15, 1976, is \$12,007.13. The total amounts in Savings Accounts and Certificates is \$11,515.71. Mrs. Spearman explained to the Chapter Regents the different forms the Chapter Treasurers are to use in making their reports to the State Treasurer. Also, if a Chapter wants a copy of the State Treasurer's report, please let her know and a copy will be sent to the Chapter.

Mrs. Charles I. Rhodes, State Regristrar reported that National is unhappy about the way some of the papers are coming in. Lineage papers are being sent in with information missing; and when this happens, National cannot approve the papers until they are completed. She discussed supplemental lines and new lines. Supplemental papers will be taken care of after new members lines has been established. The Grandfather File is a separate file.

Mrs. Roy R. Heddleston, Regent of Matthew French Chapter, asked advice from the Board of Management about collecting dues in her Chapter.

Mrs. H. Sheldon Areford, State Librarian, reported seven books has been sent in to National.

Mrs. A. J. Pancake, State American Indians Chairman, instructed the Chapter Regents in sending their reports to her to be sure it is for the American Indians and not the DAR Schools.

Miss Louise Hickman, State Public Relations Chairman, reported that 6,241 inches of publicity was sent to National.

Mrs. Robert L. Reardon, State DAR Service for Veteran Patients Chairman reported that West Virginia received national recognition for their work with the Veterans Hospitals.

Miss Nell Robinson, State Constitution Week Chairman, announced that West Virginia received first place at Contintental Congress for outstanding work during Constitution Week.

Mrs. John E. Corbitt appointed a By Law Revision Committee consisting of Mrs. Samuel M. Davis, Mrs. Carl Galbraith, Mrs. Charles Rhodes, Mrs. Walter Spearman and Mrs. Charles A. Brown.

Mrs. Carl Galgraith made a talk concerning the National Slate of Officers. The acorn is the emblem of the National Slate. She would like to have the names of anyone who would like to serve as hostess for the reception for the President General. This reception will enable the delegates to meet the new slate of officers.

Mrs. Galbraith announced that the National By Laws concerning dues has been changed. Dues now must be in WashIngton by December 1. Amend Article IV, Section 1, By-laws of the West Virginia Society, NSDAR, by striking out "and" before a State Librarian and inserting "a State Parliamentarian".

Amend Article IV, Section 1 - This section should read. The Officers of this State Society shall be a State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Parliamentarian. No two State Officers shall be members of the same Chapter except the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Amend Article V. Section 2, By-laws of the West Virginia State Society, NSDAR, by inserting after the word "districts". Each member shall contact the Chapters in her District asking that endorsements for State Officers be submitted to the Nominating Committee Chairman and to each member of the Nominating Committee, After obtaining the Chapter endorsements, the Nominating Committee shall meet to make up the State slate. The Nominating Committee must have written consent to place a name in nomination for election.

The Section should read. A Nominating Committee shall be elected at the State Conference preceding the Conference at which the State Officers are to be elected. This Committee shall consist of one member from each of the five districts. Each member shall contact the Chapters in her district asking that endorsements for State Officers be submitted to the Nominating Committee Chairman and to each member of the Nominating Committee. After obtaining the Chapter endorsements, the Nominating Committee shall meet to make up the State slate. The Nominating Committee must have written consent to place a name in nomination for election. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be sent out with the Call to Conference. Additional nominations may be made from the floor provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained.

Amend Article V, Section 5, By-laws of the West Virginia State Society, NSDAR, by inserting "elected" before the word officers.

The Section should read: No member shall hold at the same time two elected offices carrying a vote at the State Conference.

Amend Article VI, Section 1, By-laws of the West Virginia State Society, NSDAR, by inserting "She shall appoint a State Corresponding Secretary and a State Parliamentarian after the first sentence.

The Section should read: The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Organization, of the Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall appoint a State Corresponding Secretary and a State Parliamentarian. She shall appoint all committees authorized by the State Conference, call all special meetings, and perform any other duty required of the State Regent by the National Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all Committees except the Nominating Committee. The State Record shall be vested with the State Regent's pin during her term of office.

Amend Article VI, Section 6, By-laws of the West Virginia State Society by adding "she shall be bonded and/or insured at the expense of the West Virginia State Society, for an amount determined by the Finance Committee,

The Section should read: The State Treasurer shall have charge of all funds and securities of the State Organization which she shall deposit in a bank approved by the State Board of Management, She shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements and pay be check all bills only authorized by the State Conference or the State Board of Management or on warrant drawn by the State Regent, The Treasurer shall render an audited report in chart form to the annual meeting of the State Conference. She shall submit a statement of the finances of the State at any other meeting of the State Conference, State Board of Management or Executive Committee. The books shall be closed on the fifteenth day of September each year. An audit of her account shall be made before each State Conference by a Certified Public Accountant or by an Auditor approved by the Board of Management, She shall, within thirty days of her retirement, turn over to her successor all monies, accounts and books of the State Treasury with the Auditor's report to be placed in the State files. In case of the inability of the State Treasurer to serve, the Chairman of the Finance Committee is empowered to sign all checks for payments of bills duly authorized. She shall be bonded and/or insured at the expense of the West Virginia State Society, for an amount determined by the Finance Committee.

Amend Article VI, Section 7, By-laws of the West Virginia State Society by additing, "She shall be cusodian of a card file containing biographic information of each ancestor a member in the State has used to join the Society with those members names, National Numbers and Chapter listed on that ancestor card."

The Section should read. The State Registrar shall assist applicants in proving eligibility claims in towns where there are no chapters and shall give assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage records and shall perform such other duties as many be designated by the Registrar General, by the State Organization and by the State Board of Management. The State Registrar shall keep a

card file containing the name, address, name and rank of Ancestor, National Number, date admitted to the National Society, date of transfer, reinstatement, resignation, marriage and death. She shall keep a roster of State Officers, State Chairmen, and Chapter Regents. She shall be custodian of application papers of members of Chapters that disband. She shall be custodian of a card file containing biographic information of each ancestor a member in the State has used to join the Society with those members names, National Numbers and chapter listed on that ancestor card.

Amend Article VIII, Section 2, By-laws of the West Virginia State Society, NSDAR, by striking out "the first day of January" in line three and by striking out "January 1" in line 5, and inserting "the first day of December" in line three and "December 1" in line 5.

This Section should read: To defray the expenses of the State work, each Chapter belonging to the State Organization shall pay annually to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of December one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) per capita for each member on the Chapter roll and any additional assessments based upon membership of Chapters as of December 1, presented by the Finance Committee and approved by the Conference, said dues and assessments shall be remitted in one payment.

Our DAR Good Citizen State Winner, also won first place in the East Central Division, She is Deborah Phillips from Triadelphia High School in Wheeling and sang for us at the Northern District Meeting as well as at Jackson's Mill Meeting. A beautiful Page, Mrs. Joel Wagoner, from Captain James Allen Chapter, held the Falg for me when I gave my report on State Regent's night at Congress. Another lovely Page, from West Virginia, Mrs. Clarence Pharr, Jr. of William Henshaw Chapter, sang for us at the West Virginia Luncheon where Mrs. Robert Lacy Jackson, National Chairman of the United States of America Bicentennial, spoke to us on "Realizing the American Dream". We are very proud of our Ruth Seibert, who accompanied Mrs. Pharr when she sang Ruth gave a 20 minute Organ Recital at Congress, and I am told that the regular organist says that our Ruth handles this large Pipe Organ better than anyone who has ever played it.

The reason I am going into detail on the Yearbooks is because Mrs. Zimmerman is not here to report. This State has 100% participation on DAR Magazine Advertising and DAR Service for Veteran Patients. Seventeen of our Chapters won the Gold Honor Roll Award; seven, the Silver Award; and fourteen, Honorable Mention. The Honor Roll Chairman will report on this in detail.

Only 23 out of 56 Chapters have completed paying their assessments on the President General's Project. Please get busy and pay your assessment for this Project, so that it can go in with your dues on 1 December 1976. We do not want our State Society to lag behind. Eleven States had theirs paid before the 85th Congress last April. It only amounts to \$1.00 per member in your chapter.

Our State Chaplain, Mrs. Ralph Hedrick, upon the loss of Mrs. Haner, very kindly consented to become Editor of the West Virginia DAR News, when I asked her. We would like to thank her at this time for the excellent job that she has executed.

As Chairman of the DAR Museum and the Adam Stephen House project. I will run these two reports together to conserve on printing.

First the DAR Museum. We must always bear in mind that our Museum is one of the National Society's best public relations assets. We must continually tell our Museum story and encourage the membership to visit frequently. By way of telling the story, did you know that it is possible to present programs on the DAR Museum? Slides are available for the small rental fee of \$3.50. Those available are "State Rooms," "First Seven Presidents," "Samplers and Needlework" and "Ceramics." A script will be included with each set. Christmas cards of the Christmas Parlor scene in the Museum Gallery are \$2.25 per box. The dolls, Benjamin Franklin, George and Martha Washington, and Betsy Ross sell for \$4.50. There are coloring books for \$.80. And, ladies, don't forget to order a copy of "Washington Landmarks" at \$2.50, for it not only gives you a very well written story of the DAR but it carries some excellent photos of the collection in our Gallery and Period Rooms. Funds are always needed to carry to completion the renovation of the Museum Gallery, restoration of samplers and quilts, and general constant care of the many priceless items in our Museum. Our

Curator General, Mrs. Earl Helmbreck has done an outstanding job with the Museum and because of her and other dedicated women we are able to be very proud of our lovely DAR Museum. Above all, don't forget, it is a marvelous place to put those treasures you have been wondering what to do with.

About the General's bedroom in the Adam Stephen House, I want to thank those who sent a cash contribution last year. Will you please continue to support this project. The West Virginia Daughters promised to furnish the General's bedroom and we still need several items before it will take on the appearance that we can take pride in. I have asked many times for a high-boy or a chest on chest. If you know of anyone who might have one they would sell, please contact me. We'll try to raise the money. This past year a chair in the room took on a new look when a needlepoint seat cover was added. The donor used Martha Washington's Shell Design worked in four shades of blue. The background was dark red. The Potty Chair also got a cushion. A quilt square using the Mariner's Compass Design in red, white and blue was set on an off-white background. A friend quilted it for us.

THE WEST VIRGINIA ROOM

Our Bicentennial Project THE WEST VIRGINIA ROOM has been painted, track lighting installed, new red draperies and glass curtains added. We won an award at Continental Congress for the "Most Dramatic Change in a Period Room" This was the first time the room had been painted since 1948 and the draperies were made in 1934.

This is an excellent start, but the room looks bare and we desperately need furniture. We would like a sofa either from Virginia or Pennsylvania, some arm or wing chairs and a southern table. Some prints would be fine, a map of Virginia area in the late 18th or early 19th century.

Your chairman has had numerous requests concerning the furniture and objects in the room so I shall list the most important ones. The piano is, of course, the focal point. It was made by Charles Taws of Philadelphia in 1794, and is one of the earliest handmade pianos. It is also the finest musical instrument in the DAR Museum. The portrait over the mantle is of Dr. Richard Pindell, a native of Maryland who served as surgeon in the Maryland Army during the Revolution. He later moved to Kentucky where the portrait was probably painted. A small rare writing desk of Virginia origin is also in the room. The desk belonged to the prominent Virginia Congressman, Robert Rutherford, who died in 1813, and was buried on the family estate, Flowing Springs, in Shepherdstown, Virginia, now West Virginia. The rug on the floor is oriental Persian in pastel colors. It was appraised by Edward Ablet of Karekin Beshirle, Lts. N.Y.C. in 1969. He considered this rug a Laver Kirman and valued at that time at

\$1,500.00.

The mirror over the piano, possibly 1890's mahogany veneer, gesso and gilt decorations, above glass swags, broken arch, eagle. Should be replaced by one of the right period. Chair: Arm Lyre Back c. 1798. Three Cress Baskets and eight plates, pearlwear; Maker: Wedgewood, c 1779-1790. At the fireplace a pair of Andirons, 18th Century American and Fender, brass and wire c. 1800. Table, console mahogany with satin banding inlay, which does nothing for the room in my opinion. On Ioan from the Museum two Engravings: "Junction of the Potomac and Shenandoah, Virginia," and "View of the Potomac, Virginia," drawn by W. Roberts, Esq. (1757-1803) and engraved by J. Jeakes. Vases (2) porcelain, probably Continental, Circa 1830-1860. Brass Chandelier, probably English 18th Century.

All Daughters of this State have been urged to help find items for our room and to give generous cash donations. We would like articles to be given outright, but we need money to secure the ones it is necessary to buy.

Offered gifts should be reported to your Chairman before being sent on approval. If possible, photographs and all available information should be reported at this time. You should give also the information on all people mentioned, where and when the object was purchased, or how it descended into the family. In other words we need the whole story.

The search for heirlooms for the West Virginia Period Room will continue to be urged as a means of preservation of items for the enjoyment and pride of our posterity.

Thanks again for you interest. Let's make our West Virginia Room one we can be proud to own.

STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP REPORT

Twenty-two chapters returned the October questionnaire for the 1976 State Report.

Pledged for 1976-77 American History Scholarship \$26. Pledged for 1976-77 Occupational Therapy Scholarship \$24.50.

BICENTENNIAL REPORT

I am very proud of the tremendous number of bicentennial projects completed or nearly completed by West Virginia chapters in the year 1975-76. In the space allotted for this report it's impossible to do credit to all the work that has been done. This report includes those activities reported to me through February of last year. Others being reported to me on the new 1976-77 report blank will appear in the later report.

First, our state project. Since so many more persons visit Constitution Hall each year than actually come to West Virginia to visit, the West Virginia Society decided the renovation of its room in Constitution Hall would be a worthwhile Bicentennial project.

So far chapters have contributed \$320.73 toward this project, and the work has progressed to this point: track lighting has been installed, the walls have been repaired and painted. New drapes have been hung, and the state society has now begun to bring everything in the room into the proper period. Only new addition so far is a comb back windsor chair (1830) one of the only two in the entire museum.

Needless to say, this is a project which shall continue following 1976 itself, as all West Virginia Daughters continue to look and search for furniture and artifacts proper for that period in West Virginia.

Out of 56 chapters in the state, 27 officially reported their Bicentennial activities. Winners of the 1976 state contest are:

First Place - Bee Line Chapter
Second Place - Blennerhassett Chapter
Third Place - Captain James Allen Chapter

Honorable Mention goes to Anne Bailey Chapter, Shenandoah Valley Chapter, Wheeling Chapter.

Briefly, the following are short descriptions of the most noteworthy Chapter Projects reported to me:

Kanawha County Chapters took part in a "Charleston Tea Party" July, 1976 at the Governor's Mansion, honoring all state DAR, CAR, SAR.

Blennerhassett Chapter (Parkersburg on Ohio River) presented very well-researched quilt show with slides at Parkersburg Art Center. Second part of exhibit included cases of dolls of historical characters of particular interest to West Virginia. (Seen by more than 2,000 persons). Furnished information to Ohio DAR who sponsored an Ohio River Tour on the Delta Queen. Blennerhassett Chapter presented a special program for our guests when the Delta Queen docked at Parkersburg.

Captain James Allen Chapter (Beckley) contributed \$500 towards restoration of Wildwood House, home of the founder of Beckley and Wildwood Cemetery. Also conducted essay contest for children in 5th - 8th grades.

Anne Bailey Chapter (Charleston) working with other groups toward restoration of Ruffner Cabin (Oldest structure left standing in Charleston) and will furnish it when it is restored. Chapter also plans to re-enact the famous ride of Anne Bailey from Charleston to Lewisburg.

Jennie Wiley Chapter (Kermit) regent's old homeplace will be renovated and restored.

Colonel Charles Lewis Chapter (Pt. Pleasant) national winner in 1975 conducted special memorial services held in honor of men who fell in the battle of Point Pleasant. . 201 years ago. Over 200 attended. Chapter is joint sponsor of Bicentennial Musical Program presented at restored Fort Randolph. Working with other area organizations on restoration of the home of Virgil A. Lewis (W. Va. Historian) and a one room school.

Wheeling Chapter planned a series of minute TV spots on "Women in Colonial Times". School children did the background art work for each of 52 ladies spots will continue for a year. ... a different woman featured each week. Art work will also be displayed in downtown store windows.

Ann Royall Chapter (Harrisville) presented a historic pageant in 1976, collecting books of Ann Royal and wrote a column (Our Proud Heritage) for the local weekly paper.

Ye Towne of Bath Chapter (Berkeley Springs) compiled a book including each member's family history to be presented to the local library. Towne was laid out in Lots in 1776. Members are researching and will place markers on lots, denoting earliest owners, which including 3 signers of the Declaration of Independence.

Shenandoah Valley Chapter (Martinsburg). Chapter members together with the Morgan Cabin of Torytown Association worked hard on completion of the restoration of the Morgan Cabin, properly marked a historical site.

Elk River Chapter (Gassaway) cooperated with county Bicentennial Commission in presentation of a pageant entitled "Valley of Salt", presented in May 1976. Chapter sponsored "Apple Butter Making" as finance project for Bicentennial events.

Bee Line Chapter (Charles Town). The Bicentennial Celebration served as the necessary influence to bring to completion a long time dream of members of Bee Line Chapter. Restoration of the ruins of "St. George's Chapel". A dream that began in 1922 not long after Bee Line Chapter was organized, when two descendants deeded their rights in the property to the Chapter. Two other heirs were reluctant when approached from time to time by the Chapter. In 1968 another heir showed his willingness to deed over his share. Finally in 1973. . . all deeds were clear and Bee Line Chapter was ready to start on its Bicentennial peoject. An association had been set up, the Jefferson County Historical Society, The Harper's Ferry Historical Park Service Youth Conservation Corps and hundreds of others have cooperated in clearing brush, landscaping and stabilizing the ruin from further decay. St. George's Chapel was the feature attraction for the 1976 House and Garden Tour the last week in April 1976. A 54 year dream

completed.

These are only a few of the outstanding reports sent to me in 1976. One more report due, please, before December 31, 1976. In this report, please be specific in answers to questions only. Give as complete a report as possible on publicity, and costs of your bicentennial projects. Every chapter reporting is my goal for this bicentennial year!

Colonel Wm. Lowther Chapter Sales, W. Va.

The Colonel Wm. Lowther Chapter, NSDAR, held ten regular monthly meetings with national defense recognized at each meeting. Our main project for the year was making local history come alive with the reconstruction of a meeting house at Fort New Salem, Salem College, Salem, West Virginia, dedicated on May 30, 1976.

This meeting house is the only permanent memorial to Col. Wm. Lowther in the State of West Virginia. The memorial is in the form of a log structure, reconstructed in the style of an early Seventh Day Baptist Church building. It has been furnished with pews, pulpit and other interior appointments from an old Seventh Day Baptist Church, located near Salem. The furniture is finished in brush painting, a typical art form of furniture painting found in Appalachia.

As it is today, the Col. Wm. Lowther Memorial "meeting house" will be used as a non-denominational building to stand the community and the public much as early meeting houses were used during the settlement period of the last two centuries in West Virginia. Such a building was usually one of the first permanent

structures in a community and was used for much social and religious or even educational purposes. The meeting house will be the introductory building for the many visitors of Fort New Salem, re-affirming the heritage of community strength through religion and democratic unity of West Virginia's earliest settlers. This memorial will stand as a living example, preserving the cultural practices of our mountain people.

The Col. Wm. Lowther Chapter, NSDAR, were also invited to participate in a ceremony for the marking of the graves of the late Greenbrier Billy Davis and his wife, Elizabeth. We dedicated the two gravestones, which have been standing since shortly after their deaths on January 6, 1845, and the recently erected government marker. The special services were held on May 31, 1976. The graves are located in the Salem Seventh Day Baptist Church Cemetery.

The Salem College Heritage Arts Committee invited our chapter to participate in the annual Heritage Arts Festival, held April 23, 24 and 25, 1976. We did so with a Coffee and Tea Booth.

Prior to Memorial Day, our chapter provided the funds for the perpetual care of the Col. Wm. Lowther Private Cemetery.

We completed our Bicentennial Projects by placing a plaque in the Harrison County Sheriff's Office, in memory of the county's first Sheriff, Col. William Lowther. This ceremony, held on June 10, 1976, marked the completion of the gallery of pictures of Harrison County Sheriffs in the Courthouse. However, there was no picture available for the collection at the Courthouse; therefore, we commissioned a county artist, John Randolph, to do a plaque to hang with the other pictures.
