#### STATE REGENT'S REPORT

The actual work of this administration began with the installation ceremonies in Contitution Hall last April. With the installation came the full realization of the work at hand. The following is an enumeration of what has been done in these last six months.

A brief National Board meeting was attended prior to leaving Washington. Back in West Virginia my first duty was to appoint State Chairmen for the corresponding National Committees and Special State Committees. These appointments were made with careful consideration, for Committee work forms the basic structure of all State activity and is the means through which projects and programs of historic, patriotic and education are implemented.

"New Patterns of Action" was selected as the State Theme and it is hoped the West Virginia Daughters will find it inspiring and will strive for excellence in promoting the objectives of this Society.

West Virginia's five District Meetings were attended during May and June. These meetings not only provided personal contact with the various Chapters but an opportunity to assess our strenghts and weaknesses at the District level. The Daughters were found to be eager to be about the work of the Society. More information was desired concerning some National programs. Workshops were requested covering a variety of subjects, and many, many Daughters expressed their interest in working with our President General in a Public Relations Program. It was generally agreed thate here indeed was a weakness of our Organization.

An Executive Board Meeting and a Board of Management meeting were conducted on June 24th and 25th at Jackson's Mill. Your overwhelming support of the Mill meetings was very rewarding. For rather than the beautiful summer days of former Mill meetings, this one was held in a "Tropical Monsoon", but that did not seem to deter any of you from attending. We now know for a fact that neither unbelievable rain, wild winds nor electricity failures can stop West Virginia Daughters or the splendid staff at the Mill who had planned for 130 guests and served all of the 184 who "Came to Dinner"! Our "thanks" to each of you who attended and made it all possible. The workshop entitled "What You Always Wanted To Know About The DAR and Were Afraid To Ask" was another New Pattern and provided DAR education for all and served as an exercise in leadership training for the Junior Members who sponsored and directed to Program. Evaluation sheets completed at the end of the Session will provide information as to the direction future workshops will take.

Official Chapter visitations were begun in May with a visit to Mound Chapter in the Northern District, with following visits to Kanawha Valley, Captain James Allen, John Hart, Pack Horse Ford, Daniel Davisson, Elizabeth Ludington Hagans, and Nathan Davis. An Annual Flag Day Luncheon sponsored by the three Morgantown Chapters, Colonel John Evans, Colonel Zackquill Morgan, and Elizabeth Ludington Hagans, was also attended.

In September the Regent was happy to accept an invitation to attend a day of dedications which included a dedication service at the Old Christ Episcopal Church,

Morgan Chapel, established in 1740. Following this we proceeded to Gerrardstown for the dedication of the Gerrard House built in 1743. And then on to Torytown for the dedication of Morgan Morgan's cabin, Morgan Morgan being the first white settler in what is now the State of West Virginia, having arrived in Berkely County in 1726. A pageant was presented by the local school children depicting the events of Morgan Morgan's life and we were honored to be among the guests at the wedding of a descendent of Morgan Morgan in the newly constructed cabin. The Daughters of the Eastern Panhandle are to be commended for cooperating with the local civic leaders in this restoration.

The State Regent attended a dedication sponsored by the Elizabeth Cummins Jackson Chapter at the Taylor County Court House honoring the memory of twenty (20) Taylor County men who served in the American Revolution.

Throughout the summer much time was consumed with correspondence relating to this conference, in arranging the conference agenda and in preparing the Call. My other mail has been tremendous. I have endeavored to give it my prompt attention and with the help of the Corresponding Secretary have answered all correspondence.

Two weeks ago I attended my first full National Board Meeting in Washington. To say it was a learning experience would be putting it mildly. A wealth of information was gleaned. This information will be put in proper form and distributed to the Chapters.

It has not been my purpose to report activities from September 1976 to September 1977. That privilege belongs to the State Chairmen and the Chapter Regents.

A sincere "thank you" is expressed to the Honorary State Regents who so graciously and generously assisted your State Regent and have given her the benefit of their vast amount of knowledge and experience. Your State Officers have been most cooperative and conscientious endeavor has made it possible for your State Regent to conduct the affairs of The State Society. Appreciation is expressed to each of the Daughters who represented the State Regent at functions she was unable to attend. A special expression of appreciation is given to all Chapter Regents and their members for courtesies extended the State Regent during her visits, making the time spent with them all the more enjoyable.

This project was started under the administration of a previous State Regent and we will use the material collected at that time, so far as it is practical. We hope this could be a money making venture. You will hear more about this in the early spring, but, in the meantime I welcome any comments each chapter would have on this endeavor.

It was a special thrill for your State Registrar to meet so many of you at the Three District Meetings she attended this spring, and at Jackson's Mill. The hospitality and enthusiasm you exhibited was a good send-off for this administration.

#### STATE HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Since last April your State Historian has received reports from 26 Chapters. Although some of them did not seem to think they had done much work along Historical lines the sum total adds up to a very impressive array of activity.

They had 68 Historical Programs for Adults and 17 for Children. They went on 22 Tours to Historical Sites and led 4 such Tours for Children. They instigated 48 Radio Broadcasts and 12 Television Shows. They supplied 3 Markers for Historial Monuments, marked the Graves of 8 Revolutionary War Soldiers and dedicated 8 Markers on the Graves of Chapter Members. They have restored 7 and preserved 9 Historical Sites.

As for individual Chapters, Ye Towne of Bath gave \$235.00 for Cemetery Restoration and Pack Horse Ford had one of their Historical Essays to place second in State Competition, and these are chapters which consider themselves small and therefore not able to be very active. William Henshaw Chapter Members served as Hostesses at the Adam Stephen House and 17 of them have volunteered to be Hostess at the Morgan Cabin of Torytown. Fort Ashby and Potomac Valley Chapters keep their Fort open to the public and the Museum at Point Pleasant continues to be furnished and kept open to the public by Col. Charles Lewis Chapter. Bee-Line Chapter arranged to have spot announcements on the radio each morning of Constitution Week, they secured the Mayor's Proclamation of that Week and had each minister to announce it from the pulpit on Sunday Morning. Members of Shenandoah Valley Chapter helped very substantially in time and money with the restoration of the Morgan Cabin. All the above has been accomplished by less that half of the State's Chapters. I am sure it could easily be doubled with better reporting.

Your State Historian was privileged to attend the Dedication Ceremonies conducted by Ye Town of Bath Chapter at three different cemeteries. She was also honored and privileged to accompany our State Regent to the Dedicatory Services at the Morgan Chapel and Cabin. A third privilege has been the opportunity to sort out and classify the papers of Mrs. M. A. Snodgrass (Sue Stribling), West Virginia State Historian in 1932, for Wm. Henshaw Chapter. These 45 year old documents include several items from Mrs. George C. Baker dating back to 1921/22. They make fascinating reading had have given me a much better understanding of the History of the DAR in West Virginia. Finally, I have acquired a list of Revolutionary War Patriots copied by Mrs. Elizabeth Sprinkle from the Hill Billy Newspaper of the early seventies. It is an eleven page index of names with two columns on each page, a great help in my project of a file of all the names of Revolutionary War Soldiers and Patriots buried in West Virginia.

#### STATE AMERICAN HERITAGE REPORT

West Virginia DAR Chapters reported over 100 programs and projects sponsored in the fields of art, crafts, music, literature and drama and other programs dealing with American Heritage. Five chapters used program materials, slides and manuscripts ordered from NSDAR headquarters. Two chapters submitted programs to the National Program Committee.

Over fifty percent of the chapters reported a growing interest being shown in our heritage and that the programs stimulated better attendence at meetings. One chapter said members did not want to miss a meeting. American Heritage has brought out the abilities of members and stimulated their interests and served as an outlet for their talents. Some chapters have used the DAR magazine for references.

In their communities, DAR Chapters have participated in a wide choice of programs; an exhibit of arts and crafts shown in county and state fairs, festivals and special exhibits of their own chapters, restoration of historic homes, marking old grave sites, established museums, serving as museum guides and many members have joined Historical Societies. Members belong to weavers guilds, art societies, civic and school organizations. They attend historical plays, recitals and musicals, all dealing with our heritage. Window displays of early crafts and costuming were reported. Many DAR members are teaching crafts.

Patriotic music was used in most all chapters, early American songs, Christmas costumes, the history of early churches and architecture as was the history of stained glass windows.

#### AMERICAN INDIANS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Committee was formed to provide assistance in the education of needy American Indians and to alert the members of the National Society and the general public to these and other needs of this neglected minority group.

Two schools have been selected by the Society for special attention: Bacone College in Muskogee, Oklahoma, and St. Mary's School for Indian Girls, in grades 5-12, in Springfield, South Dakota. During each administration there is a National Project at the two schools and money is also needed for scholarships and general operating expenses. It is suggested that some money from each chapter go annually to the National Projects, which are suggested by the schools themselves, until these are complete. All money in excess of that needed for this purpose will go into the General Expense Fund or for scholarships.

The National Project at Bacone College is to assist with the Printing Room during this administration. In the past we provided funds to pay the instructor in silver-smithing. Our National Project at St. Mary's School is to finish paying for the school bus. This bus is needed to take students on field trips and all cultural events. Since this was such a large project some of the other needs of the school were not met. It is hoped that we can concentrate on many vital and necessary needs in every day maintenance, examples, purchasing a new refrigerator or furniture.

American Indian Scholarship Fund: The National Society also has a fund to be used for deserving and needy Indians. Every chapter can assist with this pressing need. Any money sent to the Treasurer General for Indian work, which is not otherwise designated, goes into the American Indians Fund and is available to the National Chairman for Scholarships.

Thrift Shop: Each school has a thrift shop that serves two purposes -- it allows the students to purchase needed items at a very low price and also the money

received from people in the town buying the articles is added to the income of the school. Chapters are asked to send good used clothing, jewelry, household articles, bric-a-bac and Bacone would especially like to have colorful feathers such as pheasant.

Important: All monies must be sent by your Chapter Treasurer to your State Treasurer, who in turn will send it to the Treasurer General. Please mark your contributions very carefully. We want your money used for the purpose you intended.

I have visited both of our Indian Schools and I wish that you could have been with me. I know that each need would be accepted if you could see how fine these schools are. Do visit them if you possibly can.

Other Emphasis: Did your chapter have one entire program on the Ameircan Indian? Did your chapter give other Indian Scholarships? How many and the amount? Describe any other assistance to Indians.

#### C.A.R.-DAR STATE CHAIRMAN REPORT

Since reporting to you a year ago, there has been much work but few results. Last year only 7 chapters turned in their C.A.R.-DAR committee report and only two of these were from chapters with C.A.R. Societies. A chapter chairman is not necessarily the senior society president. A senior C.A.R. society president reports to the local C.A.R.-DAR Chairman and to the Senior State President of C.A.R. No credit is given to work you do if no report from a chairman is given. So far this year I have received chapter chairmen from the following chapters: Ann Bailey, Colonel Charles Lewis, Colonel Zackquill Morgan, John Chapman, Mound, Potomac Valley, William Morris, and Ohio Valley.

There is a need for DARs to be seniors - not only as senior society presidents but as senior state officers and state promoters. The President General has asked each chapter to subscribe to the National C.A.R. Magazine. A state promoter's fee includes a \$2.00 subscription to the National C.A.R. Magazine as well as \$2.00 to the general fund of the National Society as well as \$1.00 to the State Society.

For six years we have tried to get a major benefactor (\$1000.00) for our National Museum from the state of W. Va. So far only one DAR Chapter, Colonel Charles Lewis has contributed to this fund (\$50.00). National is still asking for us to complete our pledge. We still need \$900.00. This is a tax deductible item as is any contribution to C.A.R.

We had a very nice State C.A.R. Conference in Martinsburg, under the

leadership of Mrs. C. Vincent Townsend, Senior 1st Vice President of W.V.C.A.R. This was in March.

I attended the Senior National Board of Management in Washington in April and then attended the National Convention C.A.R.

I attended the joint meeting of the three Morgantown Chapters DAR in June. The three chapters agreed to organize a new society of C.A.R. under the sponsorship of all three Chapters. I was there as the guest of our State Regent, Mrs. Martin, and the Colonial Zackquill Morgan Chapter DAR. Also during June, I attended the Jackson Mills meeting.

During August, I went to Nashville, Tennessee for the Mid-Southern Regional Meeting. While there met with Mrs. Stanley Swan, Senior National First Vice President. Following return of this meeting a state board meeting of members and seniors was held. Members showed up but no seniors.

We have had no new members accepted by National since April, 1977. There is one set of papers in for a member at large. At present there are 6 societies and 160 members in W. Va.

The Mid Southern Regional is to be in W. Va. this next summer (1978). We hope this will be attended by many DARs.

We now have a national officer in the form of William Rardin, III, Fort Randolph Society, who is National 1st Vice President now. If all goes well he will be our National President of C.A.R. next year. Bill would appreciate your aide and concern.

Last year the State DAR Society presented to the State C.A.R. Society a W. Va., flag to be used at state and regional meetings. This year I am presenting to the State DAR Society a W. Va. flat that was used in Washington at the C.A.R. National Convention for many years. It was given to me by the Senior National Historian, Mrs. Merwin, when our flag was replaced. It was not requested to be saved but she thought I would like to have it. I think it worth saving for it is hand painted. They are not made any more. Our State Regent, Mrs. Martin, promised me a good home for the flag if I presented it to her. I do not want it just thrown around somewhere.

May we all work together for a more prosperous year.

#### CONSERVATION

The reports from the local chapters of West Virginia State Organization NSDAR are very gratifying. The reports show that as an organization we are very much aware of the need for conserving our natural resources and native wild life.
