Our Dental Health (Continued on page 11) The project originated in Harrison County and has since spread across the state with various Junior Women's Clubs participating. The original program was launched when the Junior Council voted to loan \$1,000 to the state 4-H for this project, to provide calves to interested youths whose parents could not purchase them one. The Harrison County Agricultural Agent, Vernon Tacey, worked closely with the Juniors in starting the program and with the \$1,000 state loan, and a \$300 loan from the Clarksburg Juniors, the project was underway.

Approximately 15 Junior Clubs in the state have loaned funds for the purchase of additional calves on a local level. These calves will be cared for by the 4-H members, shown in county and state dairy shows and sold in a county sale as bred heifers when approximately 2 years old. The boy or girl will then return to the clubs the original purchase cost of the calf. The additional profit from the sale of the calves will prove beneficial to the 4-H'ers in furthering his, or her, college education.
