The following officers were recorded present: Mrs. Homer P. Martin, State Regent; Mrs. Walter L. Spearman, State Vice Regent; Mrs. H.W. Chaddock, State Recording Secretary; Mrs. Hubert T. Marshall, State Corresponding Secretary; Miss Margaret Ann Scott, State Organizing Secretary; Mrs. Russell Calvert, State Registrar; Mrs. J. Frank Sommerville, State Librarian; Mrs. Samuel M. Davis, Parliamentarian. A quorum was declared present.

The minutes of the Executive Board Meeting, October 19, 1978 were read and approved.

Mrs. Marshall distributed the Directory for 1979-1980.

3. Mrs. Russell Calvert, State Registrar, moved that the Society match the \$3600.00 available grant for the Anna Jarvis Home. Seconded by Mrs. Walter King, State Historian. The recommendation carried.

4. Mrs. J. Frank Sommerville, State Librarian, moved that the Society purchase a bronze marker to be placed at the Anna Jarvis Home, marking it as a State DAR Project. Seconded by Miss Margaret Ann Scott, State Organizing Secretary. The recommendation carried.

5. Mrs. Walter King, State Historian, moved that a marker be purchased and placed on the grave of Anna Jarvis. Seconded by Mrs. Walter L. Spearman, State Vice Regent. The recommendation carried.

6. Mrs. Hubert Marshall moved that the board approve Mrs. Samuel M. Davis as a candidate for interim State Treasurer, Mrs. Clifton Smith, State Treasurer has resigned. Seconded by Mrs. Russell Calvert, State Registrar. The recommendation carried.

The meeting was adjourned so that all could attend a reception in the Jackson's Mill Lounge, with Mrs. Homer P. Martin and her daughter, Mrs. Albert Kave, Jr. as hostesses.

Board of Management Meeting

The Board of Management West Virginia Society Daughters of the American Revolution met at Jackson Lodge, Jackson's Mill, July 7, 1979 at 10:00 a.m. with Mrs. Homer P. Martin, State Regent, presiding.

Due to the illness of the State Chaplain, Mrs. C.W. Hamilton, the invocation was given by Mrs. Russell Calvert, State Registrar.

The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by the State Flag Chairman, Mrs. Warren Campbell.

The roll was called by the secretary with 30 Chapter Regents, 9 State Officers and 3 District Directors present.

The minutes of the October 19, 1978 Board of Management meeting were read and approved.

Mrs. Martin asked the State Officers for brief reports. She announced that the First Vice President General, Mrs. Richard Denny Shelby, would attend State Conference. Dates for Continental Congress are April 19-21, 1980 with hotel headquarters at the Capitol Hilton.

Mrs. Hubert Marshall, State Corresponding Secretary, announced the State Directory with the packet would be distributed at the close of the meeting.

Miss Margaret Ann Scott, State Organizing Secretary, reported that on June 7, 1979 an Organizing Regent had been appointed for a new chapter at Peterstown, West Virginia. 6. That Mrs. Samuel M. Davis be a candidate for the interim State Treasurer. Adopted by the Board of Management. Mrs. Clifton Smith, State Treasurer has resigned due to ill health.

At this time the State Chairmen joined the meeting.

The State Regent read a letter from the President General on the financial condition of Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith DAR Schools requesting that each chapter send any money allocated for the schools immediately.

In order to get 100% reporting the State Regent said a new concept in reporting to State Chairmen would be introduced. A Regents' Questionnaire will be given to each chapter regent. It will contain questions from all state chairmen. After completion, the chapter regent is to send the entire questionnaire to the State Corresponding Secretary who will separate each one and send them to the State Chairmen.

Letters from the State Chairmen to the Chapters will now appear in the West Virginia DAR News with a limit of 100 words and the name of the committee at the top. The deadline to get the letter to the editor of the paper is August 1.

Mrs. Walter L. Spearman, chairman Finance Committee, gave the Treasurer's report. Balance as of June 1979 is \$19,125.16.

Mrs. Richard Powell of Elizabeth Zane Chapter made a motion to change the format for the Chapter Regents' reports at State Conference. Seconded by Mrs. Robert Hagan, Barboursville Chapter. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Mrs. Robert Hagan, Barboursville Chapter, that the chapter regents send their report to the Recording Secretary and one copy to the District Director, who will make a report of the chapters at the State Conference. Deadline for turning in reports is October 1. Seconded by Mrs. Richard Powell, Elizabeth Zane Chapter. The motion carried.

Reports from the State Chairmen were given.

Mrs. Martin stated that a chapter could not bring a project to the State Conference to sell. Only State Projects can be promoted at State Conference.

The meeting was adjourned for lunch at 12:15.

Resolution - National Defense

- Whereas The United States of America is no longer militarily in advance of, or on a par with, the Soviet Union: and
- Whereas The widening gap between Soviet military expenditures and those of this country is bound to have cumulative effects with the Soviet Union acquiring a more formidable and broader military foundation; and
- Whereas The shadow of a superior Soviet force enlarges opportunities for subversion by the Communists in all parts of the world, as has been evident in Cuba, Afganistan, Ethiopia and Zanzibar and presents possibilities of like nature taking place in Panama, Iran, and Taiwan; and
- Whereas With the decrease in power of United States forces, the case for intervention becomes less feasible in those nations vulnerable to Communist-backed aggression such as Pakistan, Yugoslavia, after the death of Tito or Saudi Arabia where the Soviets could turn off our oil supply; and

- Whereas Any SALT II agreement good, bad, or indifferent will not halt the present adverse trends, as proven by the SALT I Treaty, after which the Soviets continued their arms buildup unabated, while the United States of America frittered away our margin of safety;
- Resolved That the West Virginia Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, concerned about survival and freedom, call on our elected representatives in Washington urging a greater increase in our military budget and demanding that the gross negligence of the past be rectified by a rapid upgrading of the strategic forces of the United States of America.

Resolution - Sound Economics

- Whereas It is the responsibility of government to provide the economic environment in which private interprise can prosper and provide employment for our expanding population; and
- Whereas Only the government can print money and inflation is a result of too much money in relation to the quanity of available goods; and
- Whereas The government deficit necessitates that excess dollars be printed to monetize its debt; and
- Whereas The suggested cure for the present inflation is for voluntary wage and price controls with mandatory controls, which have never worked in fact nor in principal, a real threat; and
- Whereas History has proven that military power and economic security are not incompatible with lower taxes, minimal tariffs and the reduction of other barriers to human enterprise; and
- Whereas History has also shown that empires fall when governments incur insurmountable national debts and level excessive taxes on its most productive citizens;
- Resolved That the West Virginia Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as with particular emphasis on the reduction of income-transfer payments - a socialistic scheme which takes from those who have the energy to produce real wealth and gives to those who produce little or nothing.

Resolution - State Archives

- Whereas The West Virginia State Archives in Charleston is of immense value to all people of West Virginia, as well as school children and people who come to our state for research; and
- Whereas The Genealogical Records Department is to be eliminated in compliance with the Sunset Act; and
- Whereas It would be a tremendous loss for all of these records, books to be disposed of and made unavailable.

Resolved That the West Virginia Society Daughters of the American Revolution call on our elected State Representatives and the Sunset Commission with an urgent request that this closing be stopped and the Genealogical Library Department be retained in Charleston Archives.

No approval has been received from National on our new chapter in Peterstown, so I continue to report 57 chapters in West Virginia, with a total membership of 3395, a loss of ten members in the past year. This loss is due to a decrease in new members by application and an increase in deaths. A great number of applications are pending approval by National and this loss will be more than offset when these pending applications are approved.

This has been a busy year for your Registrar. She attended the 73rd State Conference in Harpers Ferry, Continental Congress, Jackson's Mill meeting, 5 District meetings, one chapter Anniversary Luncheon, guest at 3 chapter meetings and her own chapter meetings when not on official duties.

Report of the State Historian

Henry Adams wrote that his education in History at Harvard had been a failure. He had spent 4 years digging Rabbit Holes all over the map of Europe. I too feel that my three years as State Historian have been something of a failure. I have not been able to complete the files of graves of West Virginia Revolutionary War Soldiers. I have, however, collected to pass on to my successor some 800 plus grave sites and the names of approximately 2,000 men and some few women who served as soldiers of the Revolutionary War. This means there are about 1200 soldiers of the Revolutionary War who are out there buried in Rabbit Holes in West Virginia unless you people come forth with other grave locations for the files. It is my hope also that these cards can be maintained until such a time as the grave site locations can be published. Out Historian General writes that "Work is progressing on...a book containing the located graves of the Nation's Revolutionary War Soldiers...about 50,000 of them," so it is possible that our work will not be a complete failure.

Mrs. Fleck also sent me a copy of their Historical Marker Files to be updated. It seems to me that West Virginia has many more Historical Markers than those few which she reported to me. She wrote that she knew that I would update my Marker files. What this means is that I will have to make a Marker file from hers and update and correct it if I can learn of other markers not reported to National. Any of you here who know of any Historical Markers in the state please check with me and let's get them in good order for the next administration.

About the grave markers of Real Daughters - Jane Fugate's grave is not now locatable. General Charles Lewis Chapter, to which she belonged is still checking and no doubt will come up with the complete data, as they always do.

These past three years have been a pleasure and in Charles Kuralt's words "the things I will remember are those...geniuses (in the DAR) who love tackling vexing problems and get joy out of setting things right."

National Committees

Americanism and DAR Manual For Citizenship Committee

Of the 28 chapters reporting, the following is representative of the work they are doing: 28 repeat the American's Creed and had a program on Americanism; 21 placed patriotic literature in the schools; 12 chapters distributed a total of 254 manuals for citizenship to applicants for citizenship and 4 placed a total of 122 manuals in schools. The members of 5 chapters attended naturalization ceremonies and gave approximately 150 Welcome cards and gifts to the new citizens.

251 American Flags and one Braille Flag were placed or given by 13 chapters. Three chapters arranged for young people to attend naturalizatin ceremonies this year. Members of 23 chapters gave approximately 7,400 hours of volunteer service to their comunities. Blennerhassett Chapter presented a DAR Americanism Medal this year.

Outstanding chapters this year are: Blennerhassett Chapter and John Chapman Chapter tied for first place and Kanawha Valley Chapter, 2nd place.

Children of the American Revolution Committee

This committee chairman was very proud of the way the DARs responded to the need for money that was required to give the C.A.R. National President, William H. Rardin III, a party at the end of his term of office. This was greatly helped along the way by the Col. Charles Lewis Chapter of Point Pleasant. However, as I had only 7 chapters send their reports to me, I am not sure what chapters actually gave. Remember, each chapter has a C.A.R.-DAR chairman, whether or not they sponsor a C.A.R.

This year the stress is on membership. If we keep decreasing in membership at the same rate as the last few years, within 5 years there will no longer be any C.A.R.s in West Virginia. The nation as a whole has had an increase in C.A.R.s. We need good senior leadership. This is given by a DAR, S.A.R., or S.R. Where there is good senior leadership there you will find a strong C.A.R. society. The C.A.R. societies already in existence need a boost in membership. Other societies need to be organized. There are plenty of children; we need only to find them.

Another need is to increase our number of state promoters. There have been several chapters that have become state promoters and thus get the national C.A.R. Magazine. That all chapters subscribe to the magazine was a request of President General Baylies. The annual fee for state promoters is \$5.00. This fee is sent to the C.A.R. Senior State President and not to the State DAR Treasurer. The Senior State President fills out the proper form and sends it along with the fee to Washington. Of the \$5.00, \$1.00 stays in the state treasury, \$2.00 goes toward the national C.A.R. Magazine subscription and \$2.00 goes toward expenses of the national society.

For the first time I would like to give some awards to chapters who are working hard for C.A.R. and took the time to report it. To the DAR chapter that sponsors a C.A.R. society and contributed the most money to the state society, a blue ribbon goes to the Col. Charles Lewis Chapter and sponsor of the Fort Randolph Society. To the DAR chapter that does not sponsor a C.A.R. society and contributed the most money, a blue ribbon goes to the Charleston Chapter. To the DAR chapter having the most state promoters, a blue ribbon to the Col. Andrew Lewis Chapter. There is a tie for second place: Charleston Chapter and Col. Zackquill Morgan. Second place to a sponsoring chapter of C.A.R. who gave the most money, James Wood Chapter.

Conservation Committee

During the past year we have stressed tree planting. At the Western District meeting the marker placed at the oak tree planted in honor of our State Regent, Mrs. Homer Paul Martin and President General, Mrs. George Upham Baylies was dedicated. Mrs. Walter L. Spearman was in charge of the dedication. A picture of the marker was taken by Mrs. Martin to Washington to be given to Mrs. Baylies.

I am proud of the responses made by our chapters to our plea for conservation. 54 chapters sent reports showing that 15 chapters had planned Conservation Week activities and 10 assisted in community Conservation projects.

The Elizabeth Zane Chapter gave donation to the Handicapped Clients of Buckhannon-Upshur Work Adjustment Center to buy "mums" to be planted on the West Virginia Wesleyan Campus. Potomac Valley Chapter observed Earth Week and gave out brochures. James Barbour Chapter gave out 100 cherry tomato plants to be planted in local gardens.

28 chapters planted a total of 3,805 trees and shrubs. 47 chapters fed the birds a total of 24,980 pounds of seed at a cost of approximately \$7,491.00.

14 chapters contacted legislators on conservation projects and 7 wrote letters and 2 gave Conservation scholarships.

West Virginia DAR News

West Virginia DAR News has had a successful year with 4 issues being published. In two issues we apologized for being late, but our publisher saved the day and met the deadline on time.

In 1978 we said there had been a 37% increase in subscriptions since the first issue of this administration, Sept. 1, 1977. This year, 1979, the 37% has increased to 60%. We are presently mailing for 2.7 cents per copy the West Virginia DAR News to 650 subscribers.

The paper goes not only to West Virginia but also to the District of Columbia, Maryland, Virginia, New York, Massachusetts, Ohio, Kentucky, North and South Carolina, Florida, Wisconsin, Illinois, Texas, California and Hawaii.

1979 also marks the fulfillment of an obligation to subscribers. Prior to 1977 subscribers had paid for but had not received the paper in full issue. The istuation came about through unusual circumstances of serious illness and even the death of one editor. Because of this situation, we have not gone after deliquent accounts, a few of which go back to 1976. From June 1, 1976 only one paper was published until Sept. 1, 1977.

All chapters have been contacted advising them of any deliquency. Beginning with the December issue those subscribers who do not wish to renew will be dropped. If the paper is not received, a card to me will usually resolve the situation.

West Virginia DAR News exists to serve West Virginia Daughters in providing information. We hope the dissemination of news has been effective. We can continue to exist only if chapters send news and Daughters subscribe.

I wish to thank all State Officers, State Chairmen and chapters for their cooperation and news stories, pictures and the like that they have sent us. Thank you also for the kindnesses

extended to us when we have visited your chapter and District meetings. Only with your help can we serve effectively.

Colonel John Evans Chapter took a trip last summer to Dawson, Pa. to tour Linden Hall, a national historical home. This is a Silver Honor Roll Chapter.

Colonel Morgan Morgan's Chapter regent took her chapter on a "School Tour." Fare for the trip was deposited in little cardboard schoolhouses and a "Tour Guide" took them around and explained what they "saw." Afterwards the money was sent to the DAR Schools. The regent also had each member prepare a brief autobiography which she plans to put into a booklet for each person.

Colonel Zackquill Morgan Chapter is a Gold Honor Roll chapter and is the home chapter of the State Regent, Mrs. Homer Paul Martin. The regent reports an outstanding program on Anna Jarvis and during American History Month her students made radio spot announcements on a local station.

Daniel Davisson Chapter is one of the largest and oldest founded in 1908. This is a Gold Honor Roll Chapter. Anna Jarvis, founder of Mother's Day, belonged to this chapter.

Elizabeth Cummins Jackson Chapter is one of the smaller chapters. It was the regent who urged the state to restore the home of Anna Jarvis.

Elizabeth Ludington Hagans Chapter is the largest with 123 members and the oldest. It celebrated its 75th birthday, May, 1979. The chapter is known for its genealogical workshop under the direction on Miss Marion Tapp.

Elizabeth Zane Chapter reports a great Constitution Week that involved everybody in town, including schools, churches and businesses. The members are currently engaged in a campaign to have everyone fly the flag every day, weather permitting.

The check was presented to the State Regent at the Constitution Day luncheon with all three chapters present.

Western District

Western District is composed of 13 chapters with a total membership of 927. Five chapters have over 100 members each; the other 8 chapters have between 20 and 45 members.

These chapters have done outstanding work. All of their programs were based on DAR objectives and most chapters reported having had the President General's message read and a National Defense report given at each chapter meeting. All national holidays were observed.

Constitution Week observances were an outstanding project of all chapters. This was done by proclamations by mayors, displays in shop windows, bulletin boards and posters in libraries and other public buildings, distribution of patriotic tracts, spot announcements by radio and TV stations and chapter programs. A number of newspapers ran notices for one week urging the observance of Constitution Week. The members of several chapters contacted the churches in their area asking them to mention Constitution Week in their church bulletins.

Much time, money and effort was expended for veterans. Most chapters reported sending personal gifts and toilet articles, books, magazines, lap robes and playing cards to the veteran's hospitals in Huntington and Beckley. Numerous visits were made also. One chapter sent gifts to two patients at Spencer State Hospital.

There are several C.A.R. Chapters in the district sponsored by DAR Chapters. A new C.A.R. chapter is now being organized in Charleston.

American History Month was celebrated by many chapters in February. One chapter had as its program the essays of the winners of the American History Month essay contest. This chapter had as their guests the parents of the 1st, 2nd, 3rd place winners. The Junior Committee Members of another chapter entertained the winners of the contest, their parents and their teachers at a coffee in February to celebrate Washington's Birthday and the 22nd birthday of the chapter.

Western District chapters contributed generously to the DAR Schools, sending money, clothing and Christmas presents. One chapter reported sending 7 boxes of clothing and others costume jewelry to be sold in the schools' thrift shops.

One chapter presented four 25-year membership certificates and two 50-year membership certificates.

An outstanding project of many chapters this last year has been the collecting of slides of old West Virginia churches.

Another outstanding project is the state organization's project of restoring the Anna Jarvis Home. To this end, many dollars have been given.

Books have been given to local libraries and one book was sent to the NSDAR Library.

Contributions have been made to the Helen Pouch Fund, Seimes Microfilm Center, Blanche L. Reymann and Eleanor H. Smith Scholarship Funds, KDS and Tamassee.
