ANNUAL SUMMER MEETING — Jackson's Mill June 27 — 28, 1980

EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING

The Executive Board, West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, met Friday, June 27, 1980 at 7 p.m. in Jackson Lodge, Jackson's Mill, with the State Regent, Mrs. Walter Spearman, presiding.

Mrs. William S. Winfrey, State Chaplain, gave the Invocation.

Mrs. Spearman introduced Mrs. Homer P. Martin, State Chairman Anna Jarvis Birthplace Restoration Project, who said an architect, George Smyth of Morgantown, had been selected and that he had finished the drawings and specifications on the house. She said apublic relations program would be developed for use by each chapter. She briefly explained the Anna Jarvis funds as listed on a folder given to each officer. The state project of the Anna Jarvis tote bags was sponsored and financed by the John Young Chapter.

Mrs. Spearman asked each officer to introduce herself and give a resume of what she hopes will be accomplished during this administration.

The following officers were recorded present: Mrs. Walter L. Spearman, State Regent; Mrs. Samuel M. Davis, State Vice Regent; Mrs. William S. Winfrey, State Chaplain; Mrs. Gary H. The reading of the Executive Board minutes of November 1, 1979 were read and approved.

The State Chaplain explained her state project of establishing family altars.

Mrs. Charles Brown, State Organizing Secretary, moved that the Anna Jarvis funds become a separate account to be handled by the State Treasurer. Mrs. Joseph Groves, State Registrar, seconded the motion. The motion carried.

The following recommendations were made by the Board:

- 2. Mrs. William Winfrey, State Chaplain, moved that Mrs. James Barton, Kanawha Valley Chapter, Western District, be nominated as State Corres-

ponding Secretary. Miss Virginia Bradley has resigned because of ill health. Mrs. Charles Brown, State Organizing Secretary, seconded the recommendation. The recommendation carried.

- 3. Miss Louise Hickman, State Librarian, moved that Mrs. Raymond Bitney, Captain James Allen Chapter, Southern District, be nominated as District Director for the Southern District. Mrs. Wirt Belcher has resigned. Miss Jean Elliott, State Treasurer, seconded the recommendation. The recommendation carried.
- 4. Mrs. Charles Brown, State Organizing Secretary, moved that a \$300.00 advance be given to the Junior Membership Committee to be paid back at the end of this three year administration. At the end of each year the Junior Membership Chairman is to give a full report on the work of the committee and its finances. Mrs. William Winfrey, State Chaplain, seconded the recommendation. The recommendation carried.
- 5. Mrs. Samuel Davis, State Vice Regent, moved that a consideration for changing the closing date of the State Treasurer's books for audit be referred to the Bylaws Revision Committee. Mrs. William Winfrey, State Chaplain, seconded the recommendation. The recommendation carried.
- 6. Mrs. Charles Brown, State Organizing Secretary, moved that \$12.00 be transferred from the Adam Stephen account to the Anna Jarvis account and any further contributions to the Adam Stephen project be deposited in the Anna Jarvis Birthplace Restoration project account. Mrs. Joseph Groves, State Registrar, seconded the recommendation. The recommendation carried.

Mrs. Spearman said a special committee on Energy Crisis is being set up at the national level.

Continental Congress will be April 30 - May 5, 1981 on a one year trial basis.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING

The State Board of Management, West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, met Saturday, June 28, 1980 at 9:30 a.m. in the West Virginia Room, Jackson Lodge, Jackson's Mill, with Mrs. Walter L. Spearman, State Regent, presiding.

Scripture and prayer were given by Mrs. William Winfrey, State Chaplain.

The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States was led by Mrs.

Samuel Davis, State Vice Regent. The American's Creed was led by Mrs. Charles Brown, State Organizing Secretary.

Mrs. Spearman introduced Mrs. Homer P. Martin, State Chairman Anna Jarvis Birthplace Restoration project, who brought the members up to date on the project. She announced an architect, George Symth of Morgantown, had been selected and that he had finished the drawings and specifications on the house. She said a public relations program would be developed for use by each chapter. She then briefly explained the Anna Jarvis funds as listed on a folder given to each regent. The state project for the Anna Jarvis tote bags was sponsored and financed by the John Young Chapter.

The State Regent, Mrs. Spearman, introduced her officers: Mrs. Samuel M. Davis, State Vice Regent; Mrs. William S. Winfrey, State Chaplain; Mrs. Gary H. Mrs. Samuel Davis, State Finance Chairman, explained the savings and certificates of deposit accounts. Total funds in the checking account were \$20,534.60 or \$5,268.82 more than September 15, 1979. Total funds in the various saving accounts and certificates were more than \$13,000.00 for total funds of more than \$33,500.00.

The State Chaplain, Mrs. Winfrey, explained her project of establishing family altars.

The State Organizing Secretary, Mrs. Brown, reported that as of June 19, 1980 the state had a new chapter — Peters Mountain, Peterstown, W.Va. There are 14 organizing members with Mrs. James White, regent.

Mrs. Joseph Groves, State Registrar, reported that the membership of the state society was 3,411.

The Recording Secretary read the recommendations from the Executive Board:

1. That Mrs. William R. Korth, Sr., Central District, be nominated as State Historian. Mrs. F. D. Bolton has resigned because of ill health. Miss Kathleen Morton, Col. Zackquill Morgan chapter, seconded the motion. Adopted by the Board of Management.

- 2. That Mrs. James Barton, Kanawha Valley Chapter, Western District, be nominated as State Corresponding Secretary. Miss Virginia Bradley has resigned because of ill health. Mrs. Lawrence Haynes, Kanawha Valley Chapter seconded the motion. Adopted by the Board of Management.
- 3. That Mrs. Raymond Bitney, Captain James Allen Chapter, Southern District, be nominated as District Director for the Southern District. Mrs. Wirt Belcher has resigned. Mrs. Charles Merritt, Captain James Allen Chapter, seconded the motion. Adopted by the Board of Management.
- 4. That \$300.00 advance be given to the Junior Membership Committee to be paid back at the end of this three year term. At the end of each year the Junior Membership Chairman is to give a full report on the work of the committee and its finances. Adopted by the Board of Management.
- 5. That a consideration for changing the closing date of the State Treasurer's books for audit be referred to the Finance Committee and their suggestions be referred to the Bylaws Revision Committee. Adopted by the Board of Management.

Mrs. Spearman said that as soon as the church slides which were prepared during the last administration can be located, a schedule and fee for using them will be set up.

She said a special committee Energy Crisis is being set up on the national level and any member interested in serving on the committee at the state or national level to contact her.

The State Regent said she would appreciate having several chapters combine their meetings or functions for her official visit.

Mrs. Spearman introduced the State Parliamentarian, Mrs. Charles Merritt; National Vice Chairman, Program Committee, Mrs. Albert F. Kave, Jr. and National Vice Chairman, Junior Membership Committee, Mrs. Gary H. Gess.

Mrs. Spearman noted that it had been 52 years since a West Virginia DAR State History had been printed. She asked each chapter to bring its history up to date. A committee will be appointed to set up guidelines for compiling and having a new history published. A show of hands gave approval to follow through on this project.

The State Chairmen were called in and introduced and asked to give a brief resume of the work they hope to accomplish during this administration. 24 chairmen were present.

The meeting adjourned at 11:55 a.m.

Mrs. Walter L. Spearman, State Regent, presided and welcomed all the officers.

Mrs. William S. Winfrey, State Chaplain, gave the Invocation.

The following officers were recorded present: Mrs. Spearman, State Regent; Mrs. Samuel M. Davis, State Vice Regent; Mrs. William S. Winfrey, State Chaplain; Mrs. Gary H. Gess, State Recording Secretary; Mrs. Charles Brown, State Organizing Secretary; Miss Jean Elliott, State Treasurer; Mrs. Joseph R. Groves, State Registrar; Miss Louise Hickman, State Librarian; Mrs. Charles Merritt, Parliamentarian.

Each officer received a package of official stationery to be used during her term of office.

Mrs. Winfrey, State Chaplain, explained the samplers to be made by the members and judge by the Chaplain General and the submitting of prayers for the Chaplain General's missal. She also noted that the method of reporting deceased members needs to be improved.

Each chapter is to submit their list by December 1. This project is to be completed in time for Continental Congress and Jackson's Mill meeting.

The reading of the Executive Board minutes of June 27, 1980 were read and approved.

The following recommendations were made by the Board:

Amend Article 6, Section 6 of the Bylaws of the West Virginia Society NSDAR by striking out 9th line... The books shall be closed on the 15th day of September and insert... The accounting period shall be July 1 through June 30. 10th line strike out... before each State Conference. 12th line strike out... within 30 days of her retirement and insert... After audit in the year of her retirement.

Article 6, Section 6 to read: The State Treasurer shall have charge of all funds and securities of the State Organization which she shall deposit in a bank approved by the State Board of Management. She shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements and pay by check all bills only authorized by the State Conference or the State Board of Management or on warrant drawn by the State Regent. The Treasurer shall render an audited report in chart form to the annual meeting of the State Conference. She shall submit a statement of the finances of the State at any other meeting of the State Conference, State Board of Management or Executive Committee. The accounting period shall be July 1 through June 30. An audit of her account shall be made by a Certified Public Accountant or by an Auditor approved by the Board of Management. YORKTOWN BICENTENNIAL RESOLUTION

- Whereas October 19, 1981 marked the 200th anniversary of the victory which assured the Nation's independence; and
- Whereas 1981 has been a time to remember with pride the leadership and heroism of the American forces, and the vital role played by our French allies, and
- Whereas General George Washington commanded the combined French and American forces and planned the joint army-navy operation that achieved this mementous victory; and
- Whereas the French fleet under the command of Admiral de Grasse answered the urgent message of General Rochambeau and the French army divisions and achieved a major victory over the British in the crucial Battle off the Virginia Capes; and
- Whereas the struggles and sacrifices made by American patriots throughout the Revolutionary War culminated in the final victory; and
- Whereas the Yorktown Bicentennial has provided the West Virginia State Organization National Society Daughters of the American Revolution a unique opportunity to fulfill our historic objective of perpetuating the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence;
- Resolved, that the West Virginia State Organization National Society Daughters of the American Revolution commend all West Virginians who have commemorated the Yorktown Bicentennial in such a manner as to rekindle love of country and devotion to the principles upon which our Nation was founded.

The following Recommendations of the Board of Management were presented to the assembly:

- 1. That the Blanche L. Reymann Scholarship Savings Account of \$1,294.45 and the Blanche L. Reymann Scholarship Certificate of Deposit of \$1,000.00 be consolidated into one account in a certificate of deposit. The recommendation was adopted.
- 2. That a book be purchased for the NSDAR Library in whatever category they select, preferably one pertaining to West Virginia, to be purchased from the West Virginia Library Fund. The recommendation was adopted.
- 3. The West Virginia Room Museum Savings Account is \$5,915.94. That \$5,000.00 of this amount be transferred to a certificate of deposit with \$915.94 to remain in savings. The recommendation was adopted.
- 4. That the 1981-82 \$250.00 Eleanor H. Smith Scholarship be transferred from the 1981 recipient, Barbara Wilt, to the 1980 recipient, Lisa Burner, who is worthy of the scholarship. The recommendation was adopted.

Mrs. Charles Merritt, State Parliamentarian, read the proposed amendments to the State Bylaws:

Article VI, Section 6, Ninth line: Strike out: "The books shall be closed on the fifteenth day of September each year". Insert: "The accounting period shall be July first through June thirtieth". Tenth line, Strike out: "before each State Conference". Twelfth line, Strike out: "of". Insert: "in the year of her retirement". Thirteenth line, Strike out: "and". Insert: "and the tools of her office".

To read: The State Treasurer shall have charge of all funds and securities of the State Organization which she shall deposit in a bank approved by the State Board of Management. She shall keep accurate account of all receipts and disbursements and pay by check all bills only authorized by the State Conference or the State Board of Management or on warrant drawn by the State Regent. The Treasurer shall render an audited report in chart form to the annual meeting of the State Conference. She shall submit a statement of finances of the State at any other meeting of the State Conference, State Board of Management or Executive Committee. The accounting period shall be July FIRST through June THIRTIETH. An audit of her account shall be made by a Certified Public Accountant or by an Auditor approved by the State Board of Management. She shall, within thirty days, in the year of her retirement, turn over to her successor all monies, accounts book and tools of her office of the State Treasury with the Auditor's report to be placed in the State files. In case of the inability of the State Treasurer to serve, the Chairman of Finance Committee is impowered to sign all checks for payments of bills duly authorized. She shall be Bonded and/or Insured at the expense of the West Virginia State Society, for the amount determined by the Finance Committee.

Mrs. Charles Merritt moved that Article VI, Section 6 be adopted. Mrs. William Winfrey, Matthew French Chapter, seconded the motion. The amendment was adopted.

Article VIII, Section 1, Strike out: "September 1" and add "July first through June thirtieth.

To read: The Fiscal year of the State Organization shall be July first through June thirtieth.

Mrs. Charles Merritt moved that Article VIII, Section 1 be adopted. Mrs. William Winfrey, Matthew French Chapter, seconded the motion. The question of whether or not the IRS gave permission to make the reporting change was answered with the IRS requested the change and had sent forms for such. The amendment was adopted.

REPORT OF THE STATE REGISTRAR

This officer has enjoyed serving on your board during this final year of your administration. Her duties have been pleasant due to the cooperation of the Chapter Registrars around the State.

The Registrar has attended Executive Board and Board of Management meetings, Continental Congress three years, Jackson's Mill meetings, Eastern Central, Southern and Western District meetings.

At the meeting of the Chapters in the Tri-County area of the Eastern Panhandle, I had the honor of introducing our State Regent. I also was privileged to represent our State Regent at the opening of the Jewish Patriot Exhibit.

Informal workshops, consultations or supplies have been offered at every State or District meeting at which I have been present. Information sheets on required cards for the State file have been distributed on several occasions. All correspondence has been answered by the Registrar to the best of her ability.

As of February 1, 1982, West Virginia had 57 chapters with a total of 3,332 members. There have been 40 admissions and 1 reinstatement, increasing our total membership to 3,373. Resignations of 24 and Deceased of 33 reduced our total by 57 for a total membership of 3,316. October 15th, I received a National Print-Out reporting 33 new members. October 16th, I received a National Print-Out reporting 28 deceased, 15 resigned and 3 reinstatements, resulting in a total membership of 3,309, a net loss for the year of 23 members.

It is regretable to report a loss in membership for the year. The Registrar is aware that there are new applications soon to be processed which will help to improve our membership position.

REPORT OF THE STATE HISTORIAN

In 1981 42 chapters reported to the Historian that 98 historical programs were given for adults and 12 for children; \$47.00 was contributed to the Americana Collection; 13 Revolutionary Soldier graves were marked and 38 DAR members' graves were marked.

In 1982 47 chapters reported that 5 Revolutionary Soldier graves, 1 Real Daughter grave and 5 DAR members' graves were marked. 42 Chapters contributed cash or documents to the Americana Collection. Two books dealing with history were contributed to the NSDAR Library; historical anniversaries were observed; presented historical programs for children and adults; supported Historical Preservation by contributions to Anna Jarvis Birthplace Restoration.

Three chapters, Buford, Blennerhassett, William Morris, submitted resumes recognizing Outstanding teachers in American History. These were judged by a committee at Fairmont State College with Mr. Russell L. Hansford II selected as West Virginia's Outstanding American History teacher. Mr. Hansford will receive the DAR American History Medal at the 77th State Conference in Charleston, October 28, 1982.

Letters from our out of state residents requesting information on Revolutionary Patriots buried in West Virginia were received and answered.

The State Historian has attended Central and Northern District meetings, Jackson's Mill meetings, State Conference and 91st Continental Congress.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Comments From the Editor

Since this publication represents the accomplishments of State Chairmen and Chapters for a three year period, it is of necessity larger than past year-books which reflected a 12-month period. As you know, printing costs are high and in order to conserve where possible it has been necessary to edit a goodly number of reports.

Awards have been edited from reports as this list appears in the business sessions of each State Conference. Also removed was the reference to programs following our three objectives as each chapter does endeavor to plan programs in this manner. Listing of deceased members was also edited as these names appear in the "In Memoriam".

NATIONAL COMMITTEES AMERICAN HERITAGE COMMITTEE

During the past three years, the 56 chapters of West Virginia reported 415 programs on American Heritage; 37 entries in the various contests of this committee with 3 chapters receiving National awards; and 22 chapters submitted slides for the Religious Art Slide Documentary program presented to the National Society in honor of Mrs. Homer Paul Martin, Vice President General and Honorary State Regent.

In 1981 the National American Heritage Committee presented the Division Award for Outstanding Achievement to the State of West Virginia in the East Central Division.

The State Project of this committee was the making of a West Virginia American Heritage Quilt. 56 chapters made and designed a square representing an historical place or important event in their area with seven additional squares of the W. Va. State Seal, State Tree, State Flower, State Bird and State Animal, the NSDAR Seal, Anna Jarvis House and Mariner's Compass made by the State Regent and 5 Honorary State Regents. A matching throw pillow was also made. The profit from the sale of "voices" on the quilt and pillow will be donated to the Anna Jarvis Birthplace Restoration Project.

I have enjoyed serving the West Virginia State NSDAR Organization these past three years. The experience has been rewarding and I have learned a lot about DAR. I made many friends and acquaintances throughout the state.

AMERICAN INDIANS COMMITTEE

The West Virginia Daughters are to be commended for their generous support of the National projects at Bacone College, Muskogee, Oklahoma and St. Mary's School for Indian Girls, Springfield, South Dakota. Contributions of \$1,097.00 have been used for a printing room, an arts and craft center, air conditioning college dining room and two outdoor tennis courts. \$163.00 was contributed to the miscellaneous funds of these schools and 29 chapters contributed \$151.00 to their scholarship funds. A total of 85 packages valued at \$5,810.00 were sent to both schools' thrift shops. In addition, gift items and soup labels have been sent.

42 chapters had programs on the American Indian with your State Chairman speaking at 25 chapter meetings and displaying many Indian handicrafts. West Virginia Daughters can be proud of their accomplishments.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP COMMITTEE

Fifty chapters reported that in promoting Americanism over 1,000 copies of the DAR Manual for Citizenship were given to applicants for citizenship and 60 manuals were purchased for schools and libraries. Wherever naturalization courts are found in West Virginia, the Daughters of 20 chapters made that an important day by attending naturalization ceremonies, having teas or coffees to honor the new citizens and giving them flags, copies of flag codes and other patriotic literature.

100 programs on Americanism were given with 30 on radio and TV and 11 chapters reported studying the Immigration Act; Good Citizenship awards were presented to students and thousands of volunteer hours were reported for Red Cross, Meals on Wheels, etc.

One obvious achievement by the chapters throughout the state is their unity in the use of the American's Creed as part of their opening ritual.

This committee also offers a means of recognizing men and women outside DAR who promote Americanism. Three Medals of Honor were given: Orin Atkins, Huntington, W. Va.; Mrs. Marovick; and a female ROTC Officer.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA COMMITTEE

The following accomplishments were reported by 54 chapters in 1980, 48 chapters in 1981 and 47 chapters in 1982: 284 large flags, 3,301 small Flags and 2,407 miniature Flags and 7 Braille Flags were presented; 1,230 flag codes were distributed to members and 715 were presented to schools, youth groups, etc. 18 corrections were made for incorrect display of the American Flag; 19 Flag pins were sold, 15 given as awards and 71 lapel Flag pins either purchased or given as awards. Citizens, including members, were encouraged to fly the Flag.

There were 93 entire programs on the Flag; 59 partial programs; and 17 Flag programs given to other organizations. Newspaper items concerning the Flag totaled 81 with 7 on TV and 6 on radio. All chapters reported opening their meetings with the Pledge of Allegiance and the American's Creed and 6 chapters sing the National Anthem. Chapters presented 682 books to schools, 31 to libraries and 652 to others; participated in 26 special events pertaining to the Flag and made 270 posters. 9 Flag Certificates were given to individuals for proper use, correct display and patriotic presentation of the Flag. A colored slide of the W. Va. State Capitol with the American Flag was sent to the National Flag Chairman.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

The West Virginia Junior Membership Committee is very happy to report that it has had 3 very successful years. The latter has been accomplished with tremendous support of the membership as a whole.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

Forty-three chapters reported on membership of their chapter. A net increase of 50 members was reported from February 1980—February 1981 and a net increase of only 31 was reported from February 1981—February 1982. Deaths, members dropped for non-payment of dues and resignations continue to take their toll so that a decline in total membership is greater than the increase. It is hoped that every chapter will make a special effort to gain new members and encourage members not to resign or drop their membership.

MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMITTEE

This chairman is happy to report a better response to the questionnaire in 1982 — 50 chapters reported as opposed to 30 last year.

"Star Wars" was voted the best movie for family viewing; "Kramer vs. Kramer", best movie for adults with "Mommy Dearest" considered the worst movie. "Little House on the Prairie" was voted the best TV program while "Dallas" was considered the worst.

Sixteen letters of approval or disapproval were written to radio or TV stations, newspapers and advertisers. Three chapters had members appearing on TV and/or radio, while 2 chapters sponsored films for senior citizens and/or children. The Colonel Charles Lewis Chapter purchased a membership in PBS station promotion. 30 chapters reported having programs using TV, radio, slides or movie materials.

NATIONAL DEFENSE COMMITTEE

The West Virginia Daughters have shown great concern over National Defense topics during the past three years. All of the chapters discussed the legislative issues of the Panama Canal treaties, ERA, and Energy. Other topics of interest were Russian build-up of weapons and defense of our Country under the proposed SALT II Treaty; inflation; budget cuts and balancing the budget; trouble with NATO; trend toward world government and the military draft.

This was reflected in the fact that DAR members cast at least 6,900 votes in the past 3 years. It did not stop there as at least 789 letters were written by DAR members, as individuals, to National, State and local legislators. Most chapters devoted at least 5 minutes at each meeting to National Defense and many gave more time with 52 chapters in 1980 and 45 chapters in 1981 and 1982 having one entire program on National Defense. 46 chapters reported studying and discussing Resolutions; most had National Defense literature available to schools, libraries and interested individuals; and 24 members hold an elective or appointed office. 395 Good Citizenship Medals were awarded to high school cadets and 6 Gold Medals to college or university cadets. A total of \$216.51 was donated to Dollars for Defense. The Daughters' concern to be informed led to 49 paid subscriptions to the National Defender in addition to the 114 copies mailed to Chapter Regents and Chairmen.

The results of final yearbook judging have been published in the West Virginia DAR News and yearbooks returned at District meetings to save postage and certification charges.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES WITH NATIONAL RECOGNITION

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH COMMITTEE

In 1980, 41 chapters reported having programs on American History while 39 chapters had programs in 1981. Displays in libraries, schools and store windows were reported by 10 chapters in 1980 and 9 chapters in 1981. Spot announcements were given to radio stations — 387 in 1980; 530 in 1981; 27 in 1980 to TV stations and 70 in 1981. Six members appeared on radio and/or TV on behalf of this committee. Newspapers provided good publicity with a total of 1,014 inches of newsprint and 63 pictures for both years.

Chapters put forth great effort to conduct the Essay Contest. The subject for 1980 was "Industries and Trades During the American Revolution" with 1307 contestants participating from 125 schools (17 for the first time).

SPECIAL COMMITTEES WITH STATE RECOGNITION

ANNA JARVIS BIRTHPLACE RESTORATION PROJECT

In 1980 Mr. George Smyth, AIA of Morgantown, W.Va., was secured to make a feasibility study of the property at Webster. The study was completed and a copy presented to the West Virginia Daughters. Total cost of the project was projected to be \$100,000.00.

The chairman stated that money would be a factor and would control the date of project completion. A survey was undertaken to locate and identify possible funding through grants, gifts, etc.

In 1981 Phase I was completed. This included having the house listed on the National Register; applying for 3 State and Federal Grants; completing a historical study of the house; developing a Master Plan; publishing all materials and delivering copies to the Department of Culture and History and the West Virginia DAR; painting the main roof and temporary repair of the back roof; securing the foundation under the front part of the house and acquiring insurance.

Phase II was begun: preparing contracts and advertising for a contractor, with work to begin in October 1981. The work included new floor in kitchen area, new foundation under the rear of the house and erecting a sign indicating sponsors.

This chairman is happy to report that Part I of Phase II is completed with Part II of Phase II to be completed by December 1, 1982. This work includes window replacement; removal of old porch; re-nailing and repair/replacement of siding; painting of outside main structure with Sears Company to provide their best grade of white outside paint for the project; increasing insurance to cover total investment and the awarding of 3 Federal matching grants to the West Virginia DAR for the project totaling \$18,857.00.

REPORT OF WEST VIRGINIA C.A.R. SENIOR STATE PRESIDENT

This year's National Theme of the Children of the American Revolution is: "Founded in the Past; Building in the Present; Insuring the Future!" These

words could have very well been written to describe the West Virginia Society C.A.R. For it has had a glorious past, but in recent years has suffered from complacency and neglect. Many were under the false impression that the C.A.R. was doing great and was continuing to grow, but this has not been the case in the last decade.

After State President Marie Lockhart and I were installed in office this past Arpil, we returned home to assess the West Virginia Society. We found past records were almost non-existent; West Virginia had only seven local societies, one in jeopardy of being disbanded for lack of members and two had not paid State or National dues; of the 115 members on the National Rolls, only 61 had paid State dues; of the seven societies in West Virginia, only three had held meetings during the past year and only one society was being organized and only two new societies had been organized in the past ten years in West Virginia.

Full of enthusiasm from the National Convention, the State President and I were determined that we would build a strong State Society so that the young people of West Virginia would have the opportunity to work and learn from C.A.R. Believing strongly that the DAR would help us, given the facts and an opportunity to do so, we started our campaign of telephone calls and letter writing. Living up to our faith in them, by May 15, we had 27 senior leaders, several hundred dollars and the pledge of the West Virginia DAR State Regent to promote the C.A.R. throughout the state — all from the West Virginia Daughters!

With the help of Senior Officers and State Officers, we covered the State spreading the word of our needs and plans. In addition, the State President and/or I have spoken at the following DAR meetings: Western and Southern District meetings; 8 Chapter meetings and with two other officers, presented a panel discussion with visual aids at the State DAR meeting at Jackson's Mill.

To help establish the financial independence of the WV C.A.R., the Senior State Board of Management voted to establish a WV C.A.R. Patron Fund and to sell WV C.A.R. pins. A WV Patron can be any person who believes in the value of patriotic training for the young people in the C.A.R. The fee will be \$25.00 for which the Patron will receive a subscription to the state newsletter, a WV C.A.R. pin and a certificate of appreciation. West Virginia C.A.R. members may purchase pins for \$10.00

On June 29-30, 1982, the West Virginia Society hosted the Mid-Southern Regional meeting in Parkersburg. Some 125 Senior National Officers and Chairmen, National Officers and Chairmen, members, seniors and guests from 15 states attended. West Virginia had 20 members, seniors and guests present. We were honored to have from the West Virginia DAR the State Regent, Vice Regent and our Vice President General in attendance for two days. Miss Kathleen Morton served as Regional Chairman.

The WV C.A.R. held a Summer Packet meeting and picnic on August 7, 1982 at Kanawha State Forest. In addition to food and fun, those who had attended the National Convention and the Regional meeting shared with us their knowledge and experiences. The decision was made to make this an annual event. We are pleased to report that every local society in our state, except one, had representatives at the Mid-Southern Regional or at our Packet picnic.

To keep our own members, seniors, National and the DAR informed of the progress and activities of the WV Society, we have given our State newsletter a new, more complete format. It will be published quarterly.

Our summer of hard work is seeing results. The Charleston, Fort Donnally, and Fort Randolph Societies have new Senior Presidents and are active again. The Maria Prince Beckley Society has had an active summer with a booth at the Appalachian Arts and Crafts Fair and has 5 prospective members. The Kanawha Salines Society continues to grow with six new members, three prospective members and on its second birthday, is the largest society in the state. The Middle Island Society in St. Marys has now completed its organization as has the Savage Grant Society at Ceredo.

We have two societies being actively organized and one more with an appointed organizing Senior President. In Hinton, we have the John Summers Sunshine Society, being organized by the Mondongachate Chapter, with eleven members. In Culloden, the Midland Trail Society is being organized by Mrs. Ramona Dobbins.

I am pleased with our accomplishments during the past five months, but we do not intend to rest now. We must continue to build in the present! We need C.A.R. Societies organized in places like Summersville, Wheeling, Morgantown, Harpers Ferry, Lewisburg, Gassaway, Logan and Ravenswood to better serve our young people.

On behalf of the WV C.A.R. I would like to thank our 4 Life Promoters, 17 National Promoters and 5 State Promoters. The C.A.R. could not function without your help. I would also like to express our gratitude to the WV DAR State Regent, Mrs. Walter L. Spearman. Mrs. Spearman has not only spoken out on behalf of the C.A.R. herself throughout her travels but has allowed the C.A.R. to participate in DAR meetings as well. We have felt fortunate and proud to have our State Regent by our side at the C.A.R. State Workshop in Point Pleasant, our State Conference in Charleston, the C.A.R. Forum at Jackson's Mill, the National Convention in Washington, and at our Mid-Southern Regional in Parkersburg.

The leadership, guidance and cooperation that the WV DAR has given our young people is truly appreciated. We look forward to your continued support in the years ahead and hope that our relationship will be of mutual benefit to both the DAR and the C.A.R. Together we can "insure the future".
