VOTING RIGHTS ACT AND CLIMATE CHANGE

The Supreme Court heard oral arguments in the case of Shelby County, Alabama v. Holder in which the constitutionality of Section 5 of the VRA is being challenged. It was under Section 5, that the League

challenged restrictive voter photo ID laws in South Carolina and Texas just last year, and the VRA served as the basis for challenges to a cut back in early voting hours in Florida and to the Texas redistricting plan. The continued relevance of the VRA in protecting the voting rights of all Americans is clear. To drive that message home, the League participated in a rally on the steps of the Supreme Court during the arguments.

The LWVUS also participated in the Forward on Climate Rally! The rally had over 40,000 people attend to voice their support for action on climate change. We can all participate by sending a letter or email to President Obama asking him to lead the climate fight!
