### ANNUAL SUMMER MEETING - Jackson's Mill June 24 - 25, 1983

#### **EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING**

The Executive Board, West Virginia Society Daughter of the American Revolution met Friday, June 24th at 9:30 p.m. in the Walnut Room, Jackson Lodge, Jackson's Mill, with the State Regent, Mrs. Samuel M. Davis, presiding.

The following State Officers were present: Mrs. Davis, State Regent; Mrs. Gary Gess, State Vice Regent; Miss Sarah Ann Ryder, State Chaplain; Mrs. E. B. Dakan, State Recording Secretary; Mrs. Leonard Hash, State Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Richard Bromley, State Treasurer; Mrs. Howard Maxwell, State Registrar; Mrs. Roy Heddleston, State Historian; Mrs. Voris Morton, State Librarian; Mrs. Charles Merritt, State Parliamentarian.

Miss Sarah Ann Ryder, State Chaplain, gave the Invocation. Mrs. Davis asked each officer to introduce herself and to give a resume of what she hopes to accomplish during this administration. Stationery was given to each officer to use during her term of office.

The minutes of the Executive Board Meeting held Thursday, October 28, 1982 in Charleston were read and approved.

Two corrections were noted to be made in the new State Directory .... Page 4 should be omitted, Page 12 should be renumbered as Page 11 and Page 11 should be Page 12. Mrs. Gess stated she would like to institute a State Honor Roll. The authority to start the State Honor Roll was given at the June 17, 1978 meeting at Jackson's Mill but nothing was ever done about it. No awards can be given until next year (1984) at our State Conference. Further information will be included in the Regents questionnaire packet this Fall.

Miss Ryder said that deceased members who had served as State Officers, Chapter Officers or State Chairmen should have an asterisk by her name when turned in to her. She announced that Morning Worship Service would be held Saturday morning at 7:00 a.m. in the Chapel.

Mrs. Hash, Corresponding Secretary, noted that Chapters with the # (number) symbol in front of the code number of the Chapter in the new

Directory indicated that they had not sent in a report. Officers for the past year were reprinted in such cases. Ten Chapters were not heard from last year. She asked that each Chapter send in the names and addresses of their Officers by June 15, 1984 and to please print or type as names are not familiar to her and are not legible when written.

Mrs. Gess, State Vice Regent, moved that the State Treasurer and the State Regent go over the material in the Treasurer's file, and discard everything over seven years old. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Maxwell, State Registrar, and passed.

Mrs. Heddleston, State Historian, stated that the titles for the American Essay Contest will be: Handicrafts During the Treaty of Paris or Peace Maker of the Treaty of Paris.

The Librarian, Mrs. Morton, stressed the restoration of old books in the library in Washington, DC. Chapters retyping old books on acid free paper, having a book bound or giving \$10.00 for binding will be given Honor Roll Credit.

A letter was read by the Secretary from Charles L. Righter, President of the SAR, offering a monetary prize for the Chapter turning in the most names of potential members for SAR.

The National Administration Theme for 1983 - 1986 announced by Mrs. Davis is:

"Do your duty in all things, you cannot do more. You should never wish to do less."

The State Theme for 1983 - 1986 is "A past to remember; a future to mold."

Mrs. Davis announced that her project for 1983 - 1986 will be to see that the Flag Code booklet be distributed to every teacher in every classroom in all schools in each Chapter's area .... to include all grade, Junior and High schools and colleges. More information about this state project will be given at our Fall Conference.

Mrs. Ellen Brown and Mrs. Mary Campbell joined the Board meeting to report that they were giving up the project of being in charge of the bus trip to Continental Congress and suggested that the State Organization take charge. Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Campbell were complimented on doing a successful job and making a terrific contribution to our State Organization.

The following recommendations were made by the Board:

1. The Regent's State project be accepted. The motion was made by Mrs. Christine Maxwell and seconded by Miss Sarah Ann Ryder. Motion passed.

2. Recommend that the State Organization assume the responsibility of the bus trip to Continental Congress. The motion to accept was made by Mrs. Maxwell and seconded by Mrs. Morton.

Mrs. Gess reminded everyone that it is incorrect to pause before "under God" when pledging allegiance to the Flag.

Mrs. Gess stated that it had been suggested to her at several of the District meetings that all Chapter Regents and all members should receive the WVA DAR News. A discussion followed as to how this might be worked out.

It was noted that instructions are given in the Handbook that State and National dues can be paid by a Chapter and Chapter dues can be waived on a delinquent member.

The meeting adjourned at 10:28 p.m.

Scripture and prayer were given by Miss Sarah Ann Ryder, State Chaplain.

The National Anthem, the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and the American's Creed were led by Mrs. Howard Maxwell, State Registrar.

The roll was called by the Recording Secretary with 33 Chapters and 4 District Directors present. Two Chapters, Borderland and John Young, omitted from the roll were added.

The minutes of the Board of Management meeting held in the Holiday Inn in Charleston October 28, 1982 were read and approved as corrected with "of America" being added after the United States in the Pledge of Allegiance.

The State Regent, Mr. Davis, introduced her officers: Mrs. Gary H. Gess, State Vice Regent; Miss Sarah Ann Ryder, State Chaplain; Mrs. E. B. Dakan, State Recording Secretary; Mrs. Leonard Hash, State Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Richard Bromley, State Treasurer; Mrs. Howard Maxwell, State Registrar; Mrs. Roy Heddleston, State Historian; Mrs. Voris M. Morton, State Librarian, Mrs. Charles Merritt, State Parliamentarian.

Each Officer gave a report of what she hoped to accomplish in her office during her term in office.

Mrs. Davis, State Regent, noted that the order of business for the opening of a Chapter has been revised as follows: The Ritual, the National Anthem, the Pledge of Allegiance and the American's Creed.

The State Organizing Secretary, Mrs. R. T. McDonald, was not present due to illness.

Mrs. Gess, State Vice Regent, stated that she would like to institute a State Honor Roll. Information will be in the Regent's packet in the Fall.

The Chaplain, Miss Sarah Ann Ryder, remarked that she would like to have the report form for deceased members filled in correctly by the Chapters.

The Librarian, Mrs. Morton, reported the information about the restoration of books and manuscripts. Honor Roll credit will be given Chapters participating in this project. Chapters can contact Mrs. Morton for more information.

District Directors making reports were: Mrs. Pat Valentine, Central; Mrs. Pat Currier, Eastern; Mrs. Fern Nutter, Northern District; and Mrs. P-osley Wagoner, Southern District.

The Recording Secretary read the following recommendations from the Executive Board:

Recommend that the State Regents project of the Chapters distributing the Flag Code to each classroom in West Virginia be adopted. The recommendation was accepted.

Recommend that the State Organization assume the responsibility of the bus trip to Continental Congress. The recommendation was adopted.

Committee Chairmen making reports were: American Heritage, Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship, Children of American Revolution, Conservation, DAR Museum, DAR Service for Veterans-Patients, the Flag of the United States of America, Honor Roll, Junior American Citizens, Junior Membership, Membership, National Defense Program, Public Relations, Insignia, WV Fifty Year Club, Anna Jarvis Birthplace Restoration Project, Blanche L. Reymann Memorial Scholarship Fund (Miss Sarah Ann Ryder), Finance, Pages, and Parliamentarian.

Mrs. Davis asked that all Chapter Regents have a program on or near September 3, 1983, the date the Treaty of Paris was signed.

The James Allen Chapter, Beckley, donated \$50.00 to the Anna Jarvis Project from the sale of the booklet published on members and their ancestors.

It was announced that \$530 was made on the American Heritage Quilt and this sum was donated to the Anna Jarvis Project.

A letter from Charles Righter, State President of SAR, was read by the Recording Secretary regarding a monetary gift to be given the Chapter who turned in the most names of potential members for the SAR.

Mrs. Warren Campbell gave a report on the Jackson's Mill meeting. Mrs. Douglas Currier reported on the State Conference to be held at Cliffside Inn in Harpers Ferry October 27, 28, and 29, 1983. Deadline for reservations is October 1, 1983. It was noted that there was a change of Box Number for Mrs. Warren Campbell from Box 466 to Box 426.

Mrs. Davis announced that any news for the West Virginia DAR should be in the hands of the Editor one month prior to the date of publication.

If a Chapter feels there was an error in their Honor Roll award please contact Mrs. Gess for the name of the person to contact in order to correct the error.

### **EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING**

The Executive Board, West Virginia Society Daughters of the American Revolution met Friday, June 15, 1984 at 9:00 p.m. in the Walnut Room, Jackson Lodge, Jackson's Mill with the State Regent, Mrs. Samuel M. Davis presiding.

The following State Officers answered the roll call: State Regent, Mrs. Samuel M. Davis; State Vice Regent, Mrs. Gary H. Gess: State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Betty B. Dakan; State Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Leonard Hash; State Treasurer, Mrs. Richard Bromley; State Registrar, Mrs. Howard Maxwell; and State Librarian, Mrs. Voris Morton.

Mrs. Davis, State Regent, gave the Invocation in the absence of the State Chaplain.

The minutes of the Executive Board held Thursday, October 27, 1983 in the Berkeley Room, Cliffside Inn, Harpers Ferry, WV were read and approved.

The following Recommendations were made and adopted by the Executive Board:

1. Recommend that the State Dues be raised \$1.00 (one dollar) so that each member can receive a copy of the West Virginia DAR News.

2. Recommend that sufficient funds be transferred from the contingent fund to the WV DAR News fund to pay the Fairmont Printing Company for the last issue of the WV DAR News.

3. Recommend that the Blanche L. Reymann Scholarship be increased from \$200 (two hundred dollars) to \$300 (three hundred dollars).

4. Recommend that the State Librarian be given permission to hold a contest on Library programs and offer as prizes a total not exceeding \$25.00 (twenty-five dollars).

The Treasurer's Report was given and filed for audit. It was announced that all monies of the State Society are to be handled by the State Treasurer. No Committee will handle any money due to the possibility of our losing our tax free status with Internal Revenue Service.

The Vice Regent, Mrs. Gess, moved that the State dues be increased \$1.00 in order that all members might have a subscription to the WV DAR News. The motion was seconded by the State Registrar, Mrs. Maxwell. The motion carried.

Due to insufficient funds in the Treasury to pay the Fairmont Printing Company in Fairmont for the last printing of the WV DAR News, a motion was made by the State Librarian, Mrs. Morton, that sufficient funds be transferred from the contingent fund to the WV DAR News Fund to cover the cost of printing the last issue of the News. The motion was seconded by the State Registrar, Mrs. Maxwell, and passed.

The chairs (5) in the West Virginia Box in Constitution Hall, Washington, DC have been reupholstered. Mrs. Maxwell, State Registrar, moved that the sum of \$200.00 (two hundred dollars) be transferred from the WV Room Fund to reimburse the General Organization the cost of same. The motion was seconded by State Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Hash, and carried.

A letter was read from Mrs. Florence Moore, State Regent of Daughters of American Colonists, asking if the agenda for the DAR Conference could be changed since there was a conflict in the schedule of meetings for each organization. The conflict was the time scheduled for the DAR Board Meeting. Mrs. Bromley, State Treasurer, will write a letter to Mrs. Moore and explain that it was impossible to change the time of the DAR Board Meeting.

A letter was read from Mrs. Walter Spearman, Honorary State Regent, asking that the money in the fund to pay for the printing of the Histories to put in a Money Market Investment Account Certificate to draw interest until the books were printed. It was stated by the State Treasurer, Mrs. Bromley, that the money is in a NOW Account and already earning 5 1/4% interest. The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Hash, was instructed to so inform Mrs. Spearman and ask her to give a status report at the State Conference regarding the publishing of the History Books. (Cost, facts & figures, etc.) Permission was given to purchese the American History Medal from the J. E. Caldwell Company to be presented to the Outstanding History Teacher of the Year. The outstanding teacher this year is from Point Pieasant and is a member of DAR. It will be presented at State Conference. The motion to purchase the medal was made by State Librarian, Mrs. Morton, seconded by Vice Regent, Mrs. Gess, and passed.

Mrs. Maxwell, State Registrar, made a motion that the Blanche L. Reymann Scholarship be increased from \$200 to \$300. The motion was seconded by the Vice Regent, Mrs. Gess, and passed.

A reminder was made of the State Regent's Project to place a Flag Code in every school room in West Virginia sometime during Mrs. Davis' three year administration. A letter to the Superintendent of each school asking permission should be sent before the codes are distributed. # SEVENTY-NINTH ANNUAL STATE CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

### **EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING**

The Executive Board of the West Virginia Society Daughters of the American Revolution met at 9:00 a.m. in the Holly Room of Canaan Valley State Resort, Thursday, October 25, 1984 with the State Regent, Mrs. Samuel M. Davis, presiding.

All Officers answered the roll call: Mrs. Samuel M. Davis, State Regent; Mrs. Gary H. Gess, Vice Regent; Miss Sarah Ann Ryder, State Chaplain; Mrs. Betty B. Dakan, State Recording Secretary; Mrs. Leonard Hash, State Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. R. T. McDonald, State Organizing Secretary; Mrs. Richard Bromley, State Treasurer; Mrs. Howard Maxwell, State Registrar; Mrs. Roy Heddleston, State Historian; and Mrs. Voris M. Morton, State Librarian.

Mrs. Davis thanked the officers for doing their jobs so well, stating that they were the "backbone of the Society".

The Invocation was given by Miss Sarah Ann Ryder, State Chaplain.

The minutes of the Executive Board held June 15, 1984 in the Walnut Room, Jackson Lodge, Jackson's Mill at 9:00 p.m. were read and approved as corrected.

The State Chaplain announced the winners of the card design contest. The winners were members of Daniel Davisson and South Branch Valley Chapters.

The State Vice Regent, Mrs. Gess, announced the winners of the 1st State Honor Roll. She gave 24 awards; 5 Gold, 10 Silver, and 9 Honorable Mention. She did not hear from six Chapters. Mrs. Bromley, State Treasurer, replied to a letter from Mrs. Maxine Spearman, immediate Past State Regent, in which she had requested the investment of the fund in the account to print the Histories by saying "the money was already earning 5 1/4% and the sum of at least \$2500.00 had to be invested before the State could purchase a CD, and that no further action would be taken at the present time. The Financial Report was distributed to the Board Members. The Treasurer's Report will be filed for audit.

Mrs. Maxine Spearman, Past State Regent and Vice President General, appeared before the Board to report the disbanding of the Lieutenant Daniel Shumate Chapter of Mullins, WV as of July 20, 1984. Mrs. Spearman turned over the records and cash from the disbanded Chapter. \$11.17 in cash was turned over to the State Treasurer, Mrs. Bromley. The records showed a bank balance of \$161.71. Mrs. Davis, as State Regent, will request the disposition of the remaining funds (\$150.54). According to the Bylaws the records of the Lt. Daniel Shumate Chapter were turned over to the State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Betty B. Dakan.

Mrs. Spearman asked about the action taken on her letter requesting the reinvestment of the funds in the account to pay for the printing of the History of the State Organization. The printing of the History was the project of Mrs. Spearman's Administration. Mrs. Bromley, State Treasurer, stated that \$2323.04 was in the account at the present time. Mrs. Bromley stated that according to her information that a CD could not be purchased for any amount under \$2500.00. After some discussion it was decided that Mrs. Bromley should investigate and find if the smaller amount could be invested at a higher rate of interest. Mrs. Spearman stated that the printing costs should be approximately \$3100.00. She stated that she hoped the books would be available in October, 1985.

Due to a conflict of dates our meeting at Jackson's Mill will be held on June 7th and 8th. Since this meeting is scheduled earlier than we have met before, the Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Hash, asked that all Chapters have their reports in to her by April 1, 1985 if they are to be published in the Directory.

Mrs. Maxwell, State Registrar, gave her report. She announced that she had ordered and received 3000 Registrar's cards at a cost of \$100.00 and that they were available for Chapter Registrars. She was excused to attend a Daughters of American Colonists meeting.

Mrs. McDonald, State Organizing Secretary, announced that she was compiling a record of all Chapters. She has heard from 22 Chapters and has 17 of those typed. She asked that Chapters type and double space a list of their membership with name, address and National Number of each and send it to her as soon as possible. The State Historian, Mrs. Heddleston did not have a report. She did state that some Chapters are sending her the lists of their deceased members. These names should be sent to the State Chaplain and to the State Regent.

Mrs. Morton, State Librarian, reported that two books had been typed and been accepted by the Library in Washington. A book has also been donated to the Library on West Virginia. She has a letter from the Librarian General listing the books available for typing. She stated that 3 Bookworm Pens had been awarded. These pens are awarded for indexing only not for the retyping.

Mrs. Spearman, Past State Regent, Vice President General and DAR Museum Chairman of WV, gave permission for the piano in the West Virginia Room in Constitution Hall to be exhibited in the Museum Exhibit from October 5, 1984 to January 4, 1985. A motion made by Miss Sarah Ann Ryder and seconded by Mrs. Leonard Hash authorized the payment of a bill of \$45.00 for the conservation of the wood case of the piano. It was announced that the piano is now playable.

Some discussion was held about the removal of articles from the West Virginia Room, namely 2 chairs which were sold and the picture of Mrs. Goff, West Virginia's first State Regent. Both of these articles were removed some years ago. Miss Ryder made the motion and it was seconded by Mrs. Morton that in the future no articles in the West Virginia Room be removed or sold unless approved by the Board of Management of the West Virginia Society. (See Article XVI ... PROPERTIES of the Bylaws of the WV State Organization NSDAR ... which read: "No property of the WV State Society NSDAR, shall be transferred and/or sold without the consent of the State Board of Management."). A copy of the above motion is to be sent to the Curator General. The motion passed.

After some discussion a motion was made and passed that the State Regent, Mrs. Davis, offer help and/or assistance to several Chapters who were having trouble staying active. (Jennie Wiley, King's Wood, Potomac Valley, and Vandalia mentioned).

Mrs. Davis, State Regent, has been asked by the National Bicentennial Committee to do a 30 minute video cassette tape about someone in the West Virginia Society to be given in 1990 when the National Society will be 100 years old. Mrs. Davis chose Mrs. Mary Ann McClaugherty, Honorary State Regent and Honorary Vice President General for Life. Mrs. Davis announced that Mrs. Walter Hughey King, President General, and Mrs. Eldred Martin Yochim, 1st Vice President General, would be guests at the Conference.

## REPORT OF THE STATE REGENT AT THE 79TH STATE CONFERENCE

The past year of this administration has been a happy and gratifying one for the West Virginia State Organization Daughters of the American Revolution and for your State Regent.

It is with pleasure and pride that she reports the work accomplished in this office; none of which would be possible without the full cooperation of our dedicated members. She has been happy to represent our 56 Chapters and almost 3,200 members at the 93rd Continental Congress of the National Society and at four meetings of the National Board of Management. She participated in the 1984 DAR School Tour and attended the Yorktown Celebration on October 19th. This Regent has visited eighteen Chapters this past year. She has attended all five District Meetings. At each she gave a report on Continental Congress. She planned and conducted the workshops at Jackson's Mill and presided at the 78th State Conference.

Our current project, "Patriotic Education in West Virginia Schools" has been well received and is progressing well with almost every Chapter in our state working on this project. We believe the Flag Code will be placed in every school room by this time next year and that most teachers will be teaching its directives.

At the 93rd Continental Congress last April, West Virginia received the following awards: The American Heritage Outstanding State Award - East Central Division with Kanawha Valley Chapter earning a Special Chapter Award; a Certificate of Award - East Central Division for Conservation; the West Virginia Constitution Week Scrapbook tied with California for second place in the nation; State showing the Greatest Percentage Increase in JAC Clubs - third place award.

Four West Virginia Juniors served as Pages to the 92nd Continental Congress: Miss Kathleen Morton, Miss Eileen Covey, Mrs. Randall Rumberg, and Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner. Mrs. Wagoner served as a Personal Page to Mrs. Richard Denny Shelby, President General.

April brought the election of officers and the appointments of new chairmen. Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner was appointed West Virginia Junior Membership Chairman with Mrs. R. M. McCollam serving as Vice Chairman in Charge of Sales, Mrs. Randall Rumberg, Vice Chairman in Charge of Publicity, and Mrs. Clarence Pharr, Vice Chairman in Charge of the Junior Bazaar.

The Junior Membership Committee met at Jackson's Mill in June and voted to publish a Junior newsletter and to compile a West Virginia DAR cookbook to benefit the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. The first issue of "The Patriot", the Junior newsletter, was mailed out in the early Fall, 1983.

Two West Virginia Juniors were given national recognition. Mrs. Randall Rumberg of the Kanawha Valley Chapter was named National Advisor to the DAR Museum, and Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner of the Captain James Allen Chapter was appointed National Vice Chairman of the East Central Division for the Motion Picture, Radio and Television Committee.

### 1984

October, 1983, brought the Seventy-Eighth State Conference in Iarper's Ferry, West Virginia, and the Seventh Annual Junior Membership Dinner. Mrs. Charles W. Merritt, National Vice Chairman of the Membership Committee for the East Central Division, was the featured speaker.

As of March 1, 1984, contributions to the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund totaled \$502.40. This was the direct result of the sale of DAR Insignia stationery and other DAR approved items.

West Virginia Juniors contributed to the National Junior Bazaar, and four served as pages to the Ninety-third Continental Congress.

The West Virginia Junior Membership Committee's State Project for 1983-86 was completed this year. The West Virginia DAR Cookbook with 727 recipes representing 48 out of 56 chapters came off the press September 30, 1984, just in time for the Seventy-Ninth State Conference.

West Virginia DAR Cookbooks were donated to the National Junior Bazaar.

As an additional project this year, West Virginia Juniors decided to sell West Virginia DAR canvas tote bags.

On behalf of West Virginia Juniors, State Chairman, Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner, received an award at Continental Congress for 100% participation in the National Junior Survey Project.

## **CONSTITUTION WEEK COMMITTEE**

#### October 28, 1983

The following Chapters of West Virginia State Organization, NSDAR, furnished good reports concerning their Constitution Week activities, September 17-23, 1983. Forty Chapters participated in this program and responded to the questionnaires which were received and sent to the Chapter Regents very late this year.

In the group of 1-50 members, Anne Royall Chapter received a Blue Ribbon for First Place with 31,225 points.

Borderland Chapter received a Red Ribbon for Second Place with 28,649 points.

In the 51-100 membership group, First Place with 19,340 points went to Matthew French Chapter. They received the Blue Ribbon.

Captain James Allen Chapter received the Red Ribbon for Second Place with 15,975 points.

In the 101 and over membership group, Blennerhassett received the Blue Ribbon for First Place with 128,237.5 points. Blennerhassett submitted the only Chapter Scrap Book which is excellent.

Three chapters, Colonel Morgan Morgan, Major William Haymond and West Augusta combined for their observance of Constitution Week and earned 38,048 points. Each Chapter received an award.

#### October 26, 1984

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All of the Chapters that have reported to date have compiled good records of their activities for Constitution Week in 1984. As of today, we

have received thirty-one completed questionnaires which I sent to each Chapter Regent.

Placing first and earning a Blue Ribbon for chapters with a membership of over 100 was Blennerhassett with 150,830 points.

Placing second and earning a Red Ribbon in the same group was James Wood with 108,328.

Scoring first and earning a Blue Ribbon for Chapters with a membership of 51-100 was Captain James Allen with 32,560 points.

Placing second and receiving a Red Ribbon was Kanawha Valley. This Chapter celebrated its 70th Anniversary during Constitution Week.

In the Chapters having fifty resident members or less, the Blue Ribbon goes to Matthew French with 46,805 points.

In that same category, the Red Ribbon goes to Anne Royall with 36,895 points.

Three Chapters united for their observance of Constitution Week. Major William Haymond, Colonel Morgan Morgan and West Augusta each earning 12,400 points.

Other Chapters are to be commended for your reports also. You have shown dedication, hard work and worthwhile results all over this great Mountain State.

### ANNA JARVIS BIRTHPLACE RESTORATION PROJECT

Enclosed find copy of the Governor's letter announcing the awarding of a \$20,000 matching grant to West Virginia Daughters to continue our restoration project of the Anna Jarvis home at Webster. One of the stipulations in this grant is that the work must begin by January 1, 1984 and be completed by August 1, 1984. It will be necessary for us to begin at once to raise our matching money (\$20,000). We would like to have our share ready by December 1st, if at all possible. Please double your efforts, we do not want to lose this grant. If we cannot match, we will have to forfeit the grant award.

This \$40,000 will take the project a long way. I am thrilled and I know you are too - that we have this wonderful opportunity for help with our project.

We are still finding the \$25 memorial gifts are the easy way to raise the money. Two ladies from Morgan Morgan Chapter raised \$1,100 in two days and did not leave their homes! They used the phone to contact friends and acquaitances and invited them to honor their mothers, daughters, friends, etc., with a \$25 memorial. Remember, this is the way Louisa McClaugherty of Matthew French has raised over \$5,000 to date. Name of person being honored to be included in the Memory Book. This will a beautiful Memory Book and will have a permanent place in the house when completed.

#### October 25, 1984

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The work covered by Grant #54-003 was completed on time at a cost of \$40,193.32. The Daughters were successful in raising their match of \$20,000 +.

Insurance was increased to cover this phase of the work.

In the mean time, let us continue our efforts and have our matching funds ready to take advantage of the next grant when made available.

Know that the Marion Country Chapters are addressing the problem of a parking lot and are raising the money needed. Hopefully this could happen in the coming months.

### Report to 79th State Conference NSDAR

On February 14, 1984, an amazing event will take place! Over 211,000 ladies will all be doing the same thing - helping a 98 year old lady get spruced up for her 100th birthday. This date has been designated by the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution as "LIBERTY LOVE DAY".

This project will help to involve your community. The money is not to come from the Chapter Treasury. The money is to be collected on or before February 14, 1984.

During the past summer, each Chapter Regent received LIBERTY LOVE DAY materials from the National Society. You were instructed to appoint a LIBERTY LOVE DAY Chairman.

Let's all get behind this great project and have 100% reporting of the Chapters in West Virginia.

# LIBERTY LOVE DAY COMMITTEE (New Committee)

#### 1985

This Chairman was asked by the State Regent to speak at Canaan Valley Resort on the NSDAR campaign to involve all 211,000 DAR nationwide in a campaign to collect money for the restoration of the Statue of Liberty. The campaign was to be known as LIBERTY LOVE DAY and was to take place on February 14, 1985. During this State DAR Conference, this Chairman also distributed over 1,000 Lady Liberty brochures and 250 Liberty Love Day tote bags.

In January, she wrote to each Chapter Regent, reminding them of the LIBERTY LOVE DAY campaign and giving detailed instructions for collecting and reporting monies collected. Reports and money continued to come in all spring and into the summer. In the end, 48 of 54 DAR Chapters participated in collecting money for this project. LIBERTY LOVE DAY was a success not only in the amount of money collected, but in the goodwill, cooperation with other community groups and favorable publicity generated for the DAR statewide.

This Chairman wrote and had published news articles in five larger newspapers, three shopping guides, in two school newspapers. The State CAR newsletter and three articles in the WV DAR News. In addition, more than 40 Chapters reported coverage by the news media, some was outstanding.

Chapters reported contributions by 1,900 members and over 4,000 non-members. The final total contributed by West Virginia Daughters through the WV DAR State Treasurer was \$8,110.58. State Awards for LIBERTY LOVE DAY are as follows: 1st place - Buford Chapter with \$1,969.08; 2nd place - Captain James Allen Chapter with \$538.00 collected and Best Press Coverage; 3rd place - Kanawha Valley Chapter with \$502.00 and Most Television Coverage.

At Continental Congress, the National Chairman of Liberty Love Day reported that contributions far exceeded the goals of \$100,000, having already received more than \$460,000. We were so close to being able to donate a half million dollars, it was decided to continue receiving donations this coming year. We only have to collect a few thousand dollars to reach this goal. If everyone gives a little in 1985-86, \$500,000 can be given toward this worthwhile project.
