ANNUAL SUMMER MEETING

EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING, AUGUST 11, 1989 Jackson's Mill

Mrs. Adams introduced Mrs. Gary H. Gess, Corresponding Secretary General, who announced that materials from her office were on sale at the meeting.

Mrs. Adams then introduced Mrs. C. William Moore, Past Vice President General and Honorary State Regent.

It was announced that the President General will attend the 1990 State Conference to be held in Wheeling. The American Heritage Committee is in charge of a quilt made up of squares representing each chapter which will be a gift to the President General from the West Virginia State Organization.

EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING

NOVEMBER 1, 1989

Morgantown, West Virginia

The Executive Board, West Virginia Society Daughters of the American Revolution, met Wednesday, November 1, 1989, at Lakeview Resort and Conference Center in Morgantown, West Virginia, with State Regent, Mrs. Jack R. Adams, presiding.

Miss Kathleen Morton, State Chaplain, gave the Invocation.

All State Officers were present.

The minutes of the October 26, 1988, Executive Board Meeting were read and approved.

The Treasurer's Report was given.

Mrs. William E. Cooey, State Corresponding Secretary, announced that she would be distributing the annual questionnaire.

Mrs. Randall G. Rumberg, State Registrar, reported 40 new members listed on the October printout with no transfers in or out and no deaths. There was a net loss of 13, and she reported a loss of 181 since the last reporting period.

Report of the State Regent at the 84th State Conference

It is a pleasure to greet the West Virginia Daughters with this first report.

To say that the past six months have been busy, challenging and rewarding goes without saying.

That it was ALL jolly fun and pleasure is also better left unsaid. There WAS fun and pleasure — a great deal; but there was also a lot of hard work and not a few frantic days when everything seemed to be due yesterday— those days measured by 19 typewriter ribbons, a new set of Michelins and several overweight envelopes from Ma Bell.

A big hug and thank you to all the Daughters who have invited, accompanied, supported and applauded the State Regent, and also to those who have devotedly and discreetly bitten their tongues when they disapproved or disagreed.

Your State Regents deep appreciation for the display of unity. The work that the officers, chairmen and chapters accomplished is abundantly evident, and likewise much appreciated.

In the "fun column", your State Regent attended three national board meetings where she had the pleasure of meeting the National Officers, including Mrs. Bloedorn, and the other State Regents, including our guests from Kentucky and North Carolina, Mrs. Stokes and Mrs. Dietzel.

Your State Regent also made the usual trips to Jackson's Mill, to Lakeview, and to Wheeling to help the respective chairmen set up those meetings.

Your State Regent was honored to install the officers of John Hart Chapter. She spoke on the Bill of Rights and their attendant responsibilities at the anniversary luncheon of Kanawha Valley Chapter and at a Joint Constitution Week luncheon in Mannington to the Colonel Morgan Morgan, Major William Haymond and West Augusta Chapters.

On the invitation of Elizabeth Cummins Jackson Chapter, she helped unveil and, on behalf of State Chairman, Mrs. Homer Paul Martin and the West Virginia Daughters, accepted the watercolor of the Anna Jarvis Birthplace, executed and contributed by Mr. John Janes, Jr., a former resident of Grafton.

A great deal of time has been spent on the status of our state project, the Anna Jarvis Birthplace. While many of the plans are still nebulous, your State Regent has been working with the State Chairman, the Internal Revenue Service, the State Tax Commissioner, the Secretary of State, the State Department of Vocational Education, the Postal Service, the architect, a foundation, and some individuals.

The West Virginia Daughters have indeed been "over the river and through the woods" with this project, but, to change metaphors, there is substantial evidence and hope that the end of the rainbow is in sight, and that the project will become self-sustaining and a tribute to the West Virginia Daughters of the American Revolution.

The state theme has been divided into three parts, one for each year of this administration: "Town Square, West Virginia, 1890" — "1990" and "2090", to enable our programming to focus on different aspects of our work.

Two new committees have been formed. A Referral Committee, composed of an experienced and uniquely qualified cross-section of West Virginia Daughters, which functions as a "think tank" and which has been charged to ignore the idea that "we never did this before."

The second committee is publication of a Procedures Manual at little or no cost to the West Virginia State Organization. It is composed of experienced organizations and editing personnel. It will outline and clarify procedures to be followed by officers, chairmen and regents. It will not replace the National DAR Manual, but will contain more specifics which apply to West Virginia (It will also clarify our procedures for the October and February reports as we change administrations.).

Most rewarding, of course, is the opportunity to get to know all the Daughters more intimately. Our appreciation is again expressed for all the courtesies the chapters and the Daughters have extended your State Regent.

This National Centennial Administration will present a challenge to all the Daughters in all the states; the West Virginia Daughters and their State Regent pledge to move forward eagerly to meet it.

Report of the State Regent at the 86th State Conference

Hearty congratulations on your increase in membership; we know you have all worked hard to achieve this.

The State Regent's personal appreciation for the unity you have displayed. It is deeply appreciated. As is customary, there were changes in procedures; we experimented with the summer meeting, the District meetings and the State Conference; so now you all are in a position to make your comments known to your State-Regent-Elect.

There have been changes in reporting and you have graciously accommodated them all. A few perhaps have bitten their tongues, for which we thank you.

Your State Regent has attended all the Congresses, all the National Board meetings, regular and special, during this "ties that bind" administration, and all state and district meetings with the exception of two District meetings which were scheduled during the time of a National board meeting.

You, the West Virginia Daughters, have entertained 5 national officers (including, with pride, our own Kathy Gess), 7 State Regents, 2 Honorary State Regents, and you have been generous with your hospitality. Thank you.

By the end of this administration, your State Regent will have visited 47 of our 50 chapters (and a special thank you to those chapters who held joint meetings). Unfortunately we have two chapters whose membership has fallen below the required number, and we must make that our immediate concern. One of those chapters has no resident members remaining on its rolls. We have managed to keep in the fold one chapter which had considered disbanding. Several of its dedicated members have breathed new life into it.

Especially flattering were the invitations to the State Regent to come back. Thank you.

We also want to express our appreciation to the officers and chairmen who have cooperated so willingly with the theme, as we have progressed through "Town Square West Virginia 1890", with emphasis on our history; through "Town Square, West Virginia", with its emphasis on outstanding Daughters; and this year, "Town Square 2090", with its emphasis on our young members and associates, and the challenges we face in helping determine the future of our society three or four generations hence.

We are indebted to our Honorary President General for her address and for issuing that challenge; and to our guests who have chipped in with their time and their talents to help us make this a memorable conference.

As we review the reports of our officers and chairmen, we are struck with the amount of work that we have accomplished; but we still have work to do. Just two weeks ago we had to take a copy of "Know the DAR" to a highly placed official.

Moreover, we have developed some alarming statistics. Approximately half of our chapters responded to the request for categories of members. The report showed 421 members over age 75, or about 14 %. We have no reason to believe that if al I the chapters had reported, the percentage would vary significantly. Members over age 90, 26; or probably 52. Members over age 80, 46; or probably 92. Members over age 100, 2 reported, although it is our belief that there are more.

Reported were 290 members who work outside the home, or possibly more than 500; or more than 114 of our membership. Obviously many of these are in the lower age groups. And we have too few junior members.

The returns also indicate that we are losing potential members to volunteerism. New members especially complain that the meetings are not sufficiently diversified—that "when you've been to one, you've been to them all. It goes without saying that we need more interesting programs.

Since the Anna Jarvis restoration is a continuing state project, your State Regent has worked with state agencies, with the committee, and with the people in the area. Although this project was dormant for awhile due to the illness of the chairman, we have "full faith and confidence" that the enthusiasm will be rekindled. You have seen some evidence of that with the enthusiasm surrounding Anna's Attic at this conference. Thank you to all who fetched in and all who toted it off.

Our special appreciation goes to our Honorary State Regents have given freely of their advice and support, and to our

Corresponding Secretary General for all her help to West Virginia with advice, answers, intercession and for bearing her good will for us across the country. We are so proud of West Virginia's first national officer in a long time.

We thank you all, West Virginia Daughters, for your wholehearted support and enjoin you to continue West Virginia's long tradition of unity, dedication and accomplishment.

REPORT OF THE STATE ORGANIZING SECRETARY

The wonderful spirit generated by the Centennial Celebration of our National Society was very apparent by the formation of 20 new Centennial Chapters. With the formation of a new chapter in Summersville, West Virginia is meeting the

challenges of the Second Century with enthusiasm and an emphasis on increased membership.

The Nathan Davis Chapter disbanded on June 2, 1989, because of the lack of leadership. On October 18, 1989, Anne Royall Chapter changed the spelling of its name. Ravenswood Chapter did revive and now has its new officers.

West Virginia has 50 chapters, eighteen of which did not submit a list of current officers to the National Society in 1990. A new ruling states that only changes in officers should be reported to the Office of the Organizing Secretary General, the State Corresponding Secretary and the State Organizing Secretary.

In 1991, all West Virginia chapters met the requirements for both primary (12 members) and secondary (25 members) chapters. Two chapters fell below the legal membership of 12 and have one year to bring the membership back up to 12.

It is possible now to acquire not only a pin for 25, 50 and 75 years of service, but for 60 years of service to the National Society.

This State Officer attended all State Conferences and Continental Congresses, the Executive Committee meeting in Pence Springs in 1990, Western, Southern and Central District meetings in 1990, the summer meeting in Elkins in 1991 and the Organizing Secretaries' Workshop in 1991.

Truly the heritage of the past is a trust in the present and insurance for the future. Each DAR chapter has or can have a tremendous impact on its own community. REPORT OF THE STATE REGISTRAR

In 1988 - 1989, this State Officer attended the Western and Northern District meetings in the early summer and was privileged to attend the National Society Sons of the American Revolution's Centennial Gala in Louisville, Kentucky. August found her at the Jackson's Mill Meeting, and by October, the National Chairman's Forum found her in Washington, D.C. at our National Headquarters.

With only partial reporting from the Registrar General for October, 1989, the State Registrar would like to file the following report: Totals: +168 gain in membership (including 25 Junior members); a loss of -181 due to deaths, drops, transfer-outs and resignations; 16 members requesting Member-At-Large status (yielding no state dues revenues); yielding a net loss in membership of 13 for the reporting year (Oct. 88 - Oct. 89). This report will be amended by the next reporting period, so as to clarify the total for net losses for the year. As this State Officer is well apprised of the loss of almost 2,000 members nationally during the reporting year, our net loss of West Virginia members will be much higher than the present -13 that appears on the books. With this in mind, West Virginia Daughters must make membership the number one priority during this Centennial Administration.

In 1989 - 1990, this State Officer attended the Western and Southern District meetings in August and Continental Congress in April.

The State Registrar would like to file the following report as tabulated by the National print-outs from the Office of the Registrar General: Totals: 94 member gain; a logs of -173 due to deaths, drops, transfer-outs and resignations; yielding a net loss in membership of 79 for the reporting year (Oct. 89 - Oct. 90). This can be further tabulated by 85 deaths, 28 resignations, 22 transfers-out, and 38 drops. On the bright side, we received 68 new regular members, 26 Junior members (totalling 94 new members), 13 reinstatements, and 22 transfers-in.

With this in mind, West Virginia Daughters must make membership the number one priority during this Centennial Administration.

In 1990 - 1991, this State Officer attended the Western District meeting, the summer meeting in Elkins and celebrated Columbus Day in Washington at the National Chairman's Forum. Although the October 12 Board of Management's acceptance of new members cannot be included in this report, we are pleased to report that West Virginia received 62 new members of the 4,239 members accepted just 2 weeks ago. West Virginia's total Centennial membership campaign yielded 154 new members and these lucky Daughters will receive a special commemorative Centennial membership certificate.

One chapter has indeed been busy increasing membership by having a most accomplished Daughter taking up residence at the State Archives. The State Registrar would like to recognize Miss Virginia B. Johnson, Past Vice President General and Honorary State Regent, for securing, at last count, 25 new members for the John Young Chapter.

The State Registrar would like to report the tabulated results received from the Office of the Registrar General covering October 1, 1990 through October 1, 1991. New members 92 (26 of which are Junior members under 35); Deceased 71; Resigned 35; Transfers Out 25; Reinstated 14; Transfers In 21 and Dropped 20; yielding a loss of 24 for the reporting year. However, our March report will reflect new members from the October 12 meeting as well as December and February results which, as of today, reflect a gain of 38. What a wonderful way to celebrate 101 years of DAR's Century of Service to the Nation.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH COMMITTEE

During 1989 - 1990, twenty-eight chapters participated in the Essay Contest with .,499 contestants from 129 schools; 27 schools participated for the first time.

The State winners for American History Essay Contest are: 5th Grade: Brandi Jo Beth Champ (South Branch Valley Chapter); 6th Grade: Andrew Michael Shott (John Chapman Chapter); 7th Grade: Margaret Elaine Williamson (Westmoreland Chapter); 8th Grade: Susan Elaine Lilly (Captain James Allen Chapter).

Thirty-seven chapters had programs on American History and 30 chapters sponsored American History Month displays.

One hundred seventy-two awards were presented to students for excellence in American History. Students were awarded 154 certificates, 27 medals, 2 historical books, and 8 candy bars.

Thirty posters and 166 stickers were purchased by chapters.

Publicity was provided with 217 spot announcements on radio, 7 on television, and 2 members appeared on television and/or radio on behalf of American History Month. There were 1,018 inches of publicity and 45 pictures in the press.

The Governor and 29 mayors/town officials proclaimed February as American History Month.

During 1990 - 1991, twenty-four chapters participated in the Essay Contest with 1,907 contestants from 174 schools; 18 schools participated for the first time.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS COMMITTEE

 $The Junior American \ Citizens \ Committee \ activities \ in \ West \ Virginia \ have \ steadily \ increased.$

In 1989, West Virginia received four National Awards during the Ninety-Eighth Continental Congress which were: SECOND Place-State with greatest increase in JAC members; SECOND place-State with greatest increase in schools, clubs & groups (combined); SECOND Place-State sponsoring most JAC schools, clubs or groups (combined); and THIRD-State sponsoring most JAC members.

Within the State, chapter participation doubled from three chapters to six sponsoring JAC clubs for a total of 117 clubs. Anne Royall sponsored 74 clubs, Captain James Allen 29, Colonel Charles Lewis 6, Elk River 1, John Young 5 and Westmoreland 2. A total of 36 NEW clubs participated. Total membership in JAC was 9,980. This surpassed the 6,000-member goal set by the 1986-1989 JAC chairman.

Seventy-two students participated in the JAC contest. These entries produced forty-seven State winners, fifteen Division winners and NINE National winners. National winners included two honorable mention, one third place, four second place and two first place. First, Second and Third place winners received certificates and monetary awards from the National committee.

State winners were given certificates and first, second and third place ribbons. All participants were given cards to recognize their participation in the JAC contest.

Two of the six participating chapters received National recognition as follows: Anne Royall - FIRST place Chapter sponsoring JAC in the most schools, clubs & groups (combined); FIRST place - Anne Royall-Chapter with the most publicity and SECOND place Captain James Allen for chapters sponsoring the most JAC members.

Mrs. John D. Stonestreet, 1986-1989 West Virginia State JAC Chairman, was presented the Thatcher Award during the Eighty-third State Conference opening session October 27, 1988 by Mrs. Gary H. Gess, State Regent. The pin recognized Mrs. Stonestreet's distinctive qualities of dependability, leadership, service and dedication to the activities promoted by the Junior American Citizens Committee.

The Anne Royall Chapter presented three Thatcher Awards to JAC directors during their May awards presentation.

In 1990, West Virginia received two National Awards during the Ninety-Ninth Continental Congress which were: State Sponsoring Most JAC Members-Honorable Mention and State Sponsoring Most JAC Groups-Third Place.

Within the State, chapter participation increased slightly from six chapters sponsoring JAC activities to eight. These eight chapters sponsored a total of 12,595 members and a total of 83 clubs.

One hundred two (102) students participated in the JAC contest.

All one hundred and two were sponsored by the Anne Royall Chapter. These entries produced fifty one County and State winners, Eight Division winners and Six National winners.

National winners included five first place and one second place as follows: First place: Kristie Lea Wolfe-Genealogy, Ninth Grade; Jay M. Cline-Banner, Ninth Grade; Brian L. Deem- Essay, Eleventh Grade; Brian L. Deem-Poetry, Eleventh Grade; Ritchie County High School JAC Club-Community Service Project, Twelfth Grade; and Second Place-Amy Dawn Pierson-Genealogy, Eleventh Grade. These National winners were recipients of monetary awards. County and State winners and county participants received ribbons, certificates, cards and posters. Grades K-through-Eighth first place winners received books and ninth-through twelfth graders were presented medals by their teachers. Three of the eight West Virginia Chapters participating in the JAC committee received National recognition as follows: Anne Royall Chapter, National Chairman's Award to the Chapter with the Most Outstanding Accomplishments - Honorable Mention and Chapter Sponsoring Most JAC Groups-Third place. The Matthew French Chapter received Second Place for Chapter Sponsoring Most JAC Members. The Barboursville Chapter received Third place (tie) for chapter with the Largest Donation to JAC Fund.

Junior American Citizens Committee activities in West Virginia are reaching the public as there were twelve articles and one picture published.

It is this Chairman's goal to increase genuine interest in JAC. I do not want reports indicating the entire county school population are JAC members unless the JAC

chairman has enrolled each member with a card and introduced the JAC contest to the schools. The information distributed during District meetings from this chairman noted that the contest will only be available to K-through-Eighth-graders this year. West Virginia will have to work hard to have quality JAC contest entries and to again be recognized Nationally for our outstanding JAC activities.

In 1991, West Virginia Chapter Chairmen of the Junior American Committee continued to promote the goals of the committee increasing JAC State membership, contest entries and State, Division and National awards.

West Virginia received National First place awards for State sponsoring the most JAC Groups (category A) and State with the most contest participants. A Third place award was received for State with the most contest entries at the National level.

The Captain James Allen Chapter received two National awards, National first place (category A) for sponsoring the most JAC groups, and National first place for chapter sponsoring the most JAC members.

In addition to these honors, West Virginia students received 9 Division and 7 National awards. Division winners included:

Junior Members were honored at the 11th Annual Junior Dinner held at the 83rd West Virginia State Conference in Martinsburg in 1988.

As of March 1, 1989, contributions to the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund were \$620.

There were 17 new Junior Members added in 1988-89, which constitutes a West Virginia state total of 222 as of March 1, 1989.

West Virginia Juniors serve as Senior State Officers and Chairmen for CAR and a Junior Member is serving the State as Chaplain.

The Junior Newsletter, <u>The Patriot</u>, is being revitalized as a means of communicating special items of relevance for Junior Members.

A card file listing the names and addresses of West Virginia Junior Members is being completed and updated as members are added. I have had limited response for the request for the names and addresses of Junior Members from Chapter Chairmen, but hope to have contact with all chapters before February 1990.

West Virginia Juniors are still selling tote bags at Junior Bazaars and a new National Society item - gift wrap - is being marketed.

Plans for a new state Junior Project are currently being developed. Voices will be sold on a quilt which will be given away in 1991. Proceeds will benefit the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund.

Voices on a quilt, the new junior project, are currently being sold. The quilt will be given away at the 86th WV State Conference in 1991. The support of chapters with purchases of Junior products is much appreciated. The James Wood Chapter is to be commended for their outstanding support. The Committee is also very grateful to those chapters who made and donated items to the State and/or National Junior Bazaar. Several chapters took their items to Continental Congress and did not inform this State Chairman so, unfortunately, appreciation could not be immediately conveyed.

Several Chapters sold Innisbrook wrapping paper, the National Junior Committee fund-raising project. Special appreciation is expressed to the Anne Royall, Shenandoah Valley, William Lowther, and Andrew Lewis Chapters for their support of this project.

The WV Junior Membership Committee contributed \$620 to the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund in 1989-1990.

Only 18 chapters reported in 1989-1990. Of those reporting, Buford Chapter received the most prospective member forms. Westmoreland Chapter had the largest membership increase. West Virginia has 50 chapters with a total membership of 2,799; 14 members were reinstated; 37 dropped; 80 deceased; 88 new members of which 24 were Juniors; 33 papers pending. Net gain - 26 members.

Forty-one chapters reported in 1990-1991. There were 2,956 members in 50 chapters. There were 14 reinstated; 35 resigned; 25 transferred out of state; 21 transferred from other states; 20 dropped their membership; 71 were lost by death. The decade of the 90's presents a challenge. 22 chapters responded to the survey for members over 75 years of age, those working, and Junior members. The results were astounding. Members over 75 were 386; 20 are over the age of 90; 46 are over the age of 80; and 2 are over the age of 100. Only 63 juniors were reported while those working were listed at 274. Our Society is in serious trouble if there is not a concentrated effort to increase membership. Attrition alone is a threat to our future. Awards were presented to large chapters (over 51 members) and small chapters (12-50 members). Anne Bailey won the blue ribbon for large chapters, and James Barbour and Blackwater Chapters tied for the blue ribbon for small chapters. General Andrew Lewis had the most prospective new member forms submitted.

Only 16 chapters reported, but many WV Daughters expressed opinions on the most popular motion pictures, television programs and radio broadcasts.

NATIONAL DEFENSE COMMITTEE

The National Defense Committee has urged all Chapters to challenge members to stay informed on current concerns and to work constantly to preserve the sound spiritual and constitutional principles upon which our country was founded. All Chapter Defense Chairmen receive free of charge our NATIONAL DEFENDER and reprints of National Defense articles from the DAR Magazine. During 1988 - 1989, 40 Chapters had at least one entire program devoted to a National Defense topic while 46 Chapters devoted at least five minutes each meeting to a National Defense message. Most of our Chapters provided National Defense materials to persons outside of their chapter. Thirty-nine Chapters studied and discussed the 1989 Resolutions.

During 1988 - 1989 our Chapters presented 17 Bronze ROTC medals and 4 Gold ROTC Medals. Twenty-two Chapters contributed \$61.50 to the ROTC Award Program.

133 members wrote to Congress regarding legislation or treaties and 145 wrote their State Legislators regarding legislation. Forty-seven Chapter Chairmen urged their members to vote and provided assistance to their members to enable them to vote. Eleven of our West Virginia Daughters hold elective or appointive public office. This includes a State Senator.

The three legislative issues that the members showed the greatest interest in were: Environment/Litter/Solid Waste. The five national defense topics that were of greatest interest to our members were: Foreign Relations/USSR, Middle East, Central America/Contras; Education, Schools/Curriculum, Textbooks/Language, Geography; Defense/Arms/SDI; Terrorism; Constitutional Convention. The outstanding program was Dr. Stephen Bird talking and showing slides of the National Guard in Honduras.

During 1989 - 1990, and on this occasion of our Centennial, the National Defense Committee is proud to have contributed to the patriotic education of DAR members as well as our communities. We have the best Constitution the world has ever known and our organization has worked to preserve this Constitution. Our National Defense Committee was established in 1926. In 1934, Mrs. William A. Becker, our National Defense Chairman, published a handbook which included this: "National Defense is the peace program of the Daughters of the American Revolution. National Defense means not only military defense - an adequate Army and Navy - it means the preservation of the Constitution of the United States. It means the preservation of American institutions - Home, School, Church. It means the preservation of our spiritual heritage."

All Chapter Defense Chairmen receive free of charge our National <u>Defender</u> and reprints of National Defense articles from the DAR Magazine. Our state had 45 chapters who had a National Defense message at every meeting while 38 chapters devoted a whole program to a National Defense topic. We had 41 chapters who studied the 1990 Resolutions.

During 1989-1990 our Chapters presented 89 Good Citizenship medals. We presented 17 ROTC Bronze Medals and 4 Gold Medals. Twenty-six of our chapters contributed \$119 to the ROTC awards program.

During the past year we had 145 members who wrote to members of Congress regarding legislation or treaties while 135 wrote their State legislators regarding legislation. Forty-five chapters urged members to vote. Our state has 18 Daughters who hold elective or appointive office, including a State Senator and an Assistant Superintendent of a County school.

The three legislative issues the members showed the greatest interest in were: Medicare/Medicaid; environment/pollution; and child care. The three National Defense topics that were of greatest interest to the Daughters were: Panama Canal Treaty; SDI (Strategic Defense Initiative); and Defense in Europe. The outstanding National Defense Program was "Women's Role in National Defense."

During 1990 - 1991 the National Defense Committee has urged all Chapters to stay informed on current concerns. Our country has engaged in a War since the last report. I am pleased to report that 45 of our 50 Chapters devoted five minutes on National Defense. 38 Chapters had an entire program on National Defense - a favorite topic being "Operation Desert Shield and the Gulf Crisis" with military men as speakers. 41 Chapters studied and discussed the 1990 resolutions.

During 1990-1991 our Chapters presented 87 Good Citizenship medals. We presented 17 ROTC medals and 5 Gold medals. 21 Chapters contributed money to the ROTC Award Program for a total of \$50.

This past year we had 197 members who wrote to members of Congress or our legislature regarding legislation. Our state has 15 Daughters who hold elective or

appointive office, including a State Senator and an Assistant Superintendent of a county school.

All Chapter Defense Chairmen receive free of charge our <u>National Defender</u> and reprints of National Defense articles from the DAR Magazine. Our National Chairman, Phyllis Schlafly, urges every member to check schools to see if they are teaching that drug use is wrong. The new law requires every public school to make available to the public full information about its program and how it is complying with the new law. Other National Defense topics of great interest were "Women in Combat" and "Respect for Our Flag".

SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER COMMITTEE

The objectives of the Seimes Microfilm Center are:

- I. To build a resource for genealogical research for DAR members, prospective members and the public engaged in research. Materials include DAR applications, Federal and State census, State, Regional and Family records.
- II. To work in cooperation with the Librarian General, the Registrar General and the Lineage Research and Genealogical Records committees.
- III. To encourage individuals, Chapters and State Organizations to contribute microfilm and funds for purchase of microfilm and for general use in the Center.
- IV. To give recognition to donors of special gifts, Certificates of Appreciation are sent to contributors of \$100 dollars or more. The names of contributors of \$100, given as Life Members, or as donors of Memorial Tributes, and those of honorees and those in whose memory the Tribute is given, will be inscribed on a plaque in the SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER.

The National Chairman's project is to "Complete the 1900 Census Soundex". This is an urgent task! As of now, only about one-third of the total rolls were obtained during the past administration and now this project must be completed. Many genealogical collections such as the Half-Pay Claims and the Papers of the Continental Congress should be added to our Microfilm Library.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES WITH NATIONAL RECOGNITION

BICENTENNIAL OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA COMMITTEE

The committee theme: 1989-1992 — "Your Rights, Your Heritage, Your Risk and Your Responsibilities". Material received from the National Chairman, Vice Chairman and Division Chairman have been distributed to the chapters as well as material from the Bicentennial Commission. It is hoped that all chapters will continue to include the Preamble to the Constitution in their meetings as well as plan programs on The Bill of Rights.

Awards were presented to the following chapters in 1989: Anne Bailey, Blenner-hassett, Elizabeth Zane, Shenandoah Valley, Westmoreland, Ye Towne of Bath.

In 1990, a letter and copies of material received concerning the Bill of Rights were prepared and sent to the West Virginia Chapters who were asked to have a program on the Bill of Rights. We are pleased that most all of our chapters were able to have some type of recognition of the Constitution during the year.

We would like to recognize: Ohio Valley Chapter for their program discussing freedom of speech and the right to a fair trial; South Branch Chapter who gave Braille copies of the Constitution to the State School for the Blind; Elk River Chapter visited George Mason's home, distributed materials and gave talks from the visit, the source of the Bill of Rights, Washington, Mason, etc.; and Westmoreland Chapter for reading the Bill of Rights and having a member give a speech describing our Constitution. This chapter had a display in the bank and gave copies of the Preamble and American's Creed to a Boy Scout Group.

Blennerhassett Chapter distributed 58 Wall Charts and 58 Bicentennial School applications to Wood County Schools and James Wood Chapter has made a slide program available to schools during the 1987-1991 Commemoration.

We are continuing to celebrate the Bicentennial by encouraging all chapters to have as many programs on the Bill of Rights as possible. Offer to have programs for Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Clubs, Circles or share materials that you find that commemorate the 200th anniversary of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights.

This chairman wished to express her thanks to all of the chapters for their 100% reporting in 1991.

The National Division Vice-Chairman praised West Virginia during the workshop in Washington, D.C. in April for our 100 percent reporting, our activities, and the promptness in sending our report.

Our bicentennial celebration will close on December 15, 1991. "Bill of Rights Day" marks the 200th anniversary of the ratifications of the Constitution's first ten amendments. Since "Bill of Rights Day" is a Sunday this year, let us ask our ministers to ring church bells at noon on December 15, 1991 and to speak about freedom and religion. Let freedom ring!

A letter with other suggestions and poster was sent for distribution to each chapter at the Elkins Meeting.

Your final report will be a short statement about your plans for a program or activity commemorating the Bill of Rights in 1991 or this program year.

I have received reports from six chapters. Bee Line Chapter is planning a very special luncheon meeting with the President of Shepherd College speaking on the

Bill of Rights. Ministers will speak on freedom of religion during their services on December 15.

Buford Chapter had a program on the Bill of Rights and in December will read the names and honor the 55 men who gave this country the Constitution and the Bill of Rights.

Blennerhassett Chapter had a slide presentation with local buildings and activities emphasizing and personalizing the Bill of Rights in our daily life. A tree was planted in the City Park in observance of the Bicentennial of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights.

James Wood Chapter held a tea during which they were visited by an "Eighteenth Century Lady" telling about the conditions and activities leading to the establishment of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights.

Blennerhassett and James Wood members were involved in a Jefferson Meeting to celebrate the Bill of Rights. This chairman set up the meetings for September 17-18 with the help of the local Bar Association and Dr. Bernard Allen, WVU-P. Seventy-five area residents participated as delegates and alternates.

This chairman is asking each chapter to have a program on the Insignia and to keep a record of all pins bought by chapter members. In 1989, this chairman gave, as her State Conference Report, a brief history of the DAR Seal. 1989 awards went to the following chapters: First Place - Westmoreland Chapter; Second Place - Charleston Chapter; and Third Place - John Hart and Elizabeth Zane Chapters.

During 1989-1990, there were 156 pins and Insignia reported to have been secured. One chapter reported the acquiring of 14 pins, one 10 pins, another 8 pins, three chapters 6 pins, three chapters 5 pins, and several chapters reported 1 or 2 pins. Twenty-seven chapters reported buying at least one pin or Insignia. Each chapter chairman needs to keep a list of all Insignia and pins bought. Since this is our Centennial Year, the National Society is encouraging the buying of the Centennial Pin. For every pin sold, J.E. Caldwell will donate to the National Society \$5.00 for the NSDAR /JAC Scholarship Fund. Caldwell also donates 7% of every purchase of NSDAR Insignia and pins to the National Society. Anyone who contributes \$50.00 to the President General's Project is entitled to buy the "Ties That Bind" pin. There is a new pin for those who were C.A.R. members who are now DAR members. The National Chairman is asking each chapter to have and display the Banner (Flag) of NSDAR as well as the Flag of the United States of America.

During 1990-1991, 4 chapters purchased DAR Banners, making a total of 27 chapters owning Banners. A total of 80 official pins were purchased as well as 1 DAR charm and 9 DAR recognition pins. Two programs were held on the Insignia, and 12 copies of the Insignia booklet given out.

Both the State Conference and District meetings featured and/or mentioned Centennial items and materials. Chapters continued to have centennial programs, teas, special events and special observances. All Centennial projects came to a successful conclusion in 1991. All West Virginia Daughters have learned a great deal about our heritage as Daughters of the American Revolution. May our minds remain open to future projects that would continue our great heritage as privileged American women.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES WITH STATE RECOGNITION

ANNA JARVIS RESTORATION PROJECT

It is very pleasing to see some of the old enthusiasm returning. Unfortunately we have had a set of circumstances which put it on hold temporarily.

The committee met at the house in August, with an architect present (the former state employee who had approved the first grant for the project). There was substantial agreement between the architect and the committee, although the committee had a few reservations. The architect has quoted a price which is said to be not unreasonable, but the committee will continue to explore.

The State Department of Vocational Education is interested in using its students for restoration work, and the Vo-Tech instructors are generally very qualified to oversee. The Department of Corrections at Pruntytown (the Superintendent is personally interested) is maintaining the grounds and has offered to do any labor of which they are capable free of charge, with the State Society furnishing the materials. The architect says that the exterior needs repainting, and the committee is exploring the possibility of a donation of paint.

Interstate, an inter-city agency for Taylor County, is beginning applications for grants for the project (generally non-matching grants). This is at no cost to the Society, and it includes free services of an architect for purposes of the applications.

We need to explore further the necessary liability insurance, but this has been substantially alleviated by the fact that we have incorporated the Society.

We now have a Daughter on the Grafton City Council, which we feel will inure to the benefit of the project. There are ways in which the City of Grafton can be helpful.

We realize that there has been much negativism associated with this project; however, it would be highly unlikely that we could make any kind of disposition of the property in its present state. Moreover, that would not be in keeping with the image of the West Virginia Daughters.

However, the outlook lately has taken a very positive upturn, and we appreciate all the cooperation that has been offered.

We are going to pursue this project to the point where we can be proud of its status and it can return to the Conference for evaluation. As West Virginia Daughters we can do no less.

ELEANOR H. SMITH SCHOLARSHIP FUND

This scholarship was created in honor of Mrs. Eleanor H. Smith, member of James Wood Chapter, Parkersburg, following her term of office as Honorary Vice President General, NSDAR. The motion to establish this scholarship originated with her chapter and was passed by the state organization.

It provided students with a small stipend which was greatly appreciated in the 1950's and 60's. Qualifications for recipients of the scholarship, however, were very limiting and perhaps led to the problems we have had in its distribution for more than a decade.

The scholarship is available to a young woman intending to major in one of the areas of Home Economics, preferably Foods and Nutrition, or the Extension Education Program. Regrettably, these worthy subjects are all but impossible to find. Home Economics has disappeared from the list of academic majors at most colleges and universities and replaced by such titles as Human Resources, Human Development, etc. Areas of specialization within Home Economics have been reassigned to other college departments.

Several years ago one student was identified as attending Shepherd College, majoring in Home Economics, and who applied for the Eleanor H. Smith Scholarship. She changed her mind at the last minute and withdrew from college. That was six years ago, and the last time the award was offered.

After some effort to develop an efficient process of locating candidates for this scholarship, a request was made to discontinue the scholarship and restore the money to the State Organization's general fund. James Wood Chapter was asked to initiate this action because they had originated the motion.

A few of the members who knew Mrs. Smith were polled, as well as the currently active members. The chapter is unanimously in favor of discontinuing the Eleanor H. Smith Scholarship and releasing the money to the general fund.

PROCEDURES MANUAL

This is a new committee.

The goal of the committee is to develop a procedures manual to supplement the National Handbook. The Manual is to help state officers and chairmen by providing specific guidance in areas which the National Handbook does not cover. The information for the Manual will come from those of you who've held an office or been a committee chairman, and didn't know exactly what to do. We want you to compile a list of the questions you had with no obvious answers, as well as what the answers were and how you arrived at them. Also, give us any ideas you have to improve the efficiency or effectiveness of your area. We will then compile everyone's inputs into a manual, so the next administration doesn't have to "reinvent the wheel." The manual will be edited by past officers and chairmen who've been active in many different areas of DAR.

As of the State Conference, 1991, the Procedures Manual has been compiled from input given by several daughters. It is to provide individual procedures and traditions in West Virginia, and is a supplement to the DAR Handbook, the National packet, the files of the preceding officers and state chairmen, and the National, State and Chapter bylaws. Some Daughters provided excellent information and suggestions; others were never heard from. For those who did provide information, thanks are in order. In some instances, information provided duplicated what was already in the DAR Handbook, or applied to only one individual (such as State Conference Chairman). To avoid duplicity, and to try to compile information that is useful to most, some submissions were omitted.

One copy of the Manual has been allotted for State Officers, State Chairmen, District Directors and Chapter Regents. The printing and supplies for the manual were contributed at no cost to the State Society, so publication was limited. The manual is being distributed at the 1991 State Conference.

Revisions to the manual are expected and are, in fact, necessary if it is to remain as a viable supplement outlining how the West Virginia Daughters conduct business. Copies must be turned over to each individual's successor, so they may have the benefit of the manual's contents. Each Daughter should continue to make submissions indicating how the manual can be improved.

WEST VIRGINIA DAR NEWS

The West Virginia DAR News was published 3 times in 1988-1989. Issues are mailed in March, June and September.

Our mailings, which geographically and literally cover from North Pole, Alaska, to Key Biscayne, Florida, have stabilized with 2,900 copies printed per issue. When undertaking this chairmanship in 1986, circulation was around 3,100, so mailings are down by 200 copies presently.

One big time saver for both the State Regent and this State Chairman is receiving the same National Printout as the State Registrar. Hopefully this will keep our mailing lists current and without duplications for new members. Deceased, dropped, resigned and transferred members can be deleted in a timely manner.

Few chapters have utilized chapter mailing labels for dues billing and correspondence. At a mere \$.02 per label, this is a real bargain. We urge chapters to take advantage of this label service, as proceeds go towards the West Virginia DAR News budget.

Please note that Chapter News is an integral part of our publication. Regents, have your Chapter Vice Regent or designate to send in items by the deadlines so that all Daughters can read all about your Chapter projects and meeting programs.

The West Virginia DAR News was published 3 times during 1989-1990, with the circulation stabilizing at 2,800 per issue. Issues were mailed in March, June and September, totaling expenses of under \$3,800 for printing, labeling and postage. We're sure you'll agree that the DAR News is a most timely publication, consolidating National, State, and Chapter news with an organized format. This chairman has contained cost by once again printing and posting labels on her home computer from the Treasurer General's print-out that she receives as State Registrar. Data is updated routinely and the entire state membership list is scanned prior to printing labels for each issue. Chapters have been most helpful to notify this chairman prior to National's notification.

It is hoped that each chapter will send at least one typed news item per year, so that all Daughters can read about your Chapter's accomplishments, programs and

projects. We also urge chapters to utilize chapter labels for dues or chapter correspondence from this Editor.

The West Virginia DAR News, with a circulation of 2,850, was published 3 times in 1990-1991. New items of interest were the inclusion of highlights from the President General's Circular Letters to the National Board of Management and a series on Columbus, giving insight on the Columbus Quincentennial. It is hoped this series will provide members with interesting details for chapter discussions as well as broader knowledge about the upcoming Quincentennial. On a personal note, since this is my last report after 6 years as the Editor, let me thank each and every chapter and Daughter who has helped in supplying committee and chapter news. Your efforts were most appreciated by our entire membership.

The amount spent per issue averaged \$1,200. This fluctuates when more photos are printed. As the threat of yet another postage increase looms overhead for 1992, let me reassure you that the <u>WV DAR News</u> is absolutely the best deal around. Only \$1.35 of your dues goes towards the <u>News</u>, and quite honestly, I doubt if one can buy 3 magazines for only \$1.35 total. My point is our <u>WV DAR News</u> is the most valuable resource we have as members, so we all need to continue to support the new Editor with an infusion of new ideas, chapter and committee news and address updates. Also, let me remind you that all articles must be typed and double spaced. Untyped items will not be used.
