THE AMERICAN'S CREED



EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGJune 10, 1992

A special meeting of the Executive Committee of the WVDAR was held on June 10, 1992, at 1:00 p.m. at the Four Corners Restaurant in Grafton, West Virginia with the State Regent, Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner, and the substitute secretary, Miss Marguerite Miller present.

Mrs. Wagoner presided and presented each officer with a packet of material

containing information about the responsibilities of her office.

With one exception (State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Argil Sams) all State Officers were present for this Board Meeting.

The Invocation was given by Mrs. Frederick Valentine, Jr. State Chaplain.

The final audit of Mrs. Charles Printz, Past State Treasurer was approved and a copy is included in the minutes.

Mrs. John A. Davis, State Treasurer, announced that a proposed budget would be submitted in August and she also requested and received approval to implement a computer ledger bookkeeping system. Tax exempt numbers were distributed.

A motion was made by Mrs. Cora P. Teel, State Vice Regent, to purchase a new minutes book. The motion carried.

Miss Mary Louis Taylor, State Organizing Secretary, moved that the proceed-

ings for the past four administrations be bound. The motion carried.

Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner, State Regent, announced that National by-laws take precedence over State and Chapter by-laws, and the West Virginia Societies by-laws would be reviewed, amended and brought into compliance with National by-laws.

There was no unfinished business.

The State Regent, Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner made the motion that Mrs. Randall Rumberg be appointed Parliamentarian. The motion carried.

State Conference sites and the dates were announced.

1992, Charleston, West Virginia, October 29, 30, 31

1993, Martinsburg, West Virginia, October 28, 29, 30

1994, Morgantown, West Virginia, undecided

Mrs. Roy A. Gilkeson made a motion to investigate the possibility of the 1994 State Conference being held in the spring. The motion carried. Members were asked to submit ideas or recommendations to the State Regent.

A discussion was held concerning the usefulness of District Meetings in their present format.

Mrs. Gary Greenfield reported that C.A.R. meetings will be three times a year. She recommended clustering in the districts and questioned the feasibility of contest participation.

Changes in Continental Congress dates were announced.

1993 - Tuesday - Saturday, April 20-24, 1993

1994 - Wednesday - Saturday, April 20-23, 1994

1995 - Wednesday - Saturday, April 19-22, 1995

The State Regent, Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner, distributed packets of material on the restoration of the Anna Jarvis properties, and a discussion followed the examination of this data for the past fifteen (15) years.

A status report from Mrs. Fran Adams, Past State Regent, was received by most members of the Executive Committee. Mrs. Cora Teel, State Vice Regent,

moved that the report be accepted. The motion carried.

After touring the Anna Jarvis property and examining the records, the members decided to make a recommendation to the Board of Management and then, to the State Conference, about the disposition of the property. The motion carried.

Mrs. John A. Davis, State Treasurer, moved that the State Regent be authorized to select the lawyer. The motion carried.

The resolution that the State Treasury be reimbursed for the money spent on the restoration of the Anna Jarvis Property, from the balance of \$22,000.00 in the Anna Jarvis account was accepted.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:15 p.m.

The Executive Committee Meeting of the West Virginia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution was held on Friday, August 14, 1992, at 9:00 PM in the Board Room, Conference Center, Holiday Inn, Gateway, Huntington, West Virginia with the State Regent, Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner presiding, and the State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Argil E. Sams, present.

The State Regent called the meeting to order and Mrs. Frederick Valentine,

Jr., State Chaplain gave the Invocation.

A roll call of State Officers was called by the State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Argil E. Sams and the following were present: State Regent, Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner; State Vice Regent, Mrs. Cora P. Teel; State Chaplain, Mrs. Frederick Valentine, Jr.; State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Argil E. Sams; State Corresponding Secretary, Miss Marguerite Miller; State Organizing Secretary, Miss Mary Louise Taylor; State Treasurer, Mrs. John A. Davis; State Registrar, Mrs. Roy Gilkeson; State Historian, Mrs. Gary Greenfield; State Librarian, Mrs. Lyle McCullough and Mrs. Robert Hollinsworth of the Finance Committee, Southern District.

Mrs. Robert Hollinsworth, Southern District Representative, presented the report of the Finance Committee in the absence of the Chairman, Mrs. Robert Waters. The report is attached and made a part of these minutes. The motion to accept the Report of the Finance Committee was made by Mrs. Cora P. Teel, State Vice Regent. There was a second and the motion carried.

The State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Agril E. Sams, read the minutes of the October 23, 1991 Executive Board Meeting. They were approved as read.

The minutes of the June 10, 1992 Special Executive Committee Meeting were read and approved.

A report of the State Officers followed:

The State Vice Regent, Mrs. Cora P. Teel, reported that plans were in progress for the West Virginia State Luncheon. The State Chaplain, Mrs. Frederick Valentine, Jr., reported work on the Memorial Service for the State Conference was in progress. The State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Argil E. Sams, reported that a bid has been received for the purchase of a new minutes book and the cost is about \$75.00. The State Corresponding Secretary, Miss Marguerite Miller has packets ready for distribution to the Board of Management Meeting. The State Organizing Secretary, Miss Mary Louise Taylor, reported that the Kings Wood Chapter was disbanded and that Mondongachate Chapter will be disbanded at the October National Board Meeting. Fort Lee and William Morris, Colonel John Evans and Elizabeth Ludington Hagans will merge.

The State Treasurer, Mrs. John A. Davis, gave the Financial Report, which was filed for audit. The State Registrar, Mrs. Roy Gilkeson reported 2,722 West Virginia Daughters. She continued by stating that she had received no print out of members dropped for non-payment from National. Mrs. Gilkeson stressed membership as a priority. The State Historian, Mrs. Gary Greenfield, reported that her materials had been received. The State Librarian, Mrs. Lyle McCullough, reported that five books were forwarded to the National Library.

Unfinished Business

The 89th State Conference will be held on October 28 - 30, 1994, at the Ramada Inn, Morgantown, West Virginia.

New Business

The report of the proposed by-laws changes was read.

ARTICLE VI, SECTION 5 - Election of Officers - as revised October, 1990: With the exception of National Officers, no member shall hold at the same time two offices carry a vote at the State Conference.

Proposed Change: A member holding two or more offices each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

The motion to accept the proposed by-laws change was made by Mrs. Roy Gilkeson, there was a second and the motion carried.

ARTICLE XI COMMITTEES, SECTION 3 - (First Line Only)

The Resolutions Committee shall consist of three members appointed by the State Regent.

PROPOSED CHANGE: The Resolutions Committee shall consist of at least three but no more than five members appointed by the State Regent.

The motion was made by Miss Mary Louise Taylor to accept the proposed by-laws change, there was a second and the motion carried.

A motion was made by Miss Mary Louise Taylor, State Organizing Secretary, to recommend that "The West Virginia State Society Daughters of the American Revolution, upon the sale of the Josephine C. Peters Home, 609 Hall Street, Charleston, West Virginia, adopt the Guest Cottage at Tamassee DAR School as the West Virginia Guest Cottage." This motion was seconded and the vote by secret ballot was unanimous.

Mrs. Roy Gilkeson, State Registrar, made the motion, "That the Anna Jarvis Birthplace Restoration Project by discontinued." There was a second and the vote by secret ballot was unanimous.

A motion was made by Mrs. John A. Davis, State Treasurer, "That all future expense of the Anna Jarvis Birthplace Restoration Project, insurance and etc., come from the Anna Jarvis Fund and not the General Treasury, and that the \$3,821.00 spent during the June 1, 1989 through 1992 time period be reimbursed to the General Treasury". This motion was seconded and the motion carried.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 28, 1992

The Executive Committee of the West Virginia State Society Daughters of the American Revolution met Wednesday, October 28, 1992 at the Holiday Inn, Charleston House, Charleston, West Virginia. The State Regent, Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner, called the meeting to order at 9:00 P.M. Miss Marguerite Miller, Acting Secretary was present.

The Invocation was given by Mrs. Frederick Valentine, Jr., State Chaplain.

The State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Argil E. Sams was unable to attend the meeting because of serious illness. Miss Marguerite Miller, State Corresponding Secretary assumed the duties of State Recording Secretary. A roll was called with seven (7) State Officers in attendance. The minutes of the August 14, 1992 Executive Committee Meeting were read and approved as corrected.

The State Corresponding Secretary, Miss Marguerite Miller, reported that Master Questionnaires were ready for distribution to Chapter Regents when

they register for the Conference.

The West Virginia State Luncheon will be held on Friday, April 23, 1993, from

12:00 Noon until 2:30 PM at the Capital Hilton Hotel, Washington D. C.

Miss Mary Louise Taylor reported that all members of Mondochate Chapter transferred to the John Chapman Chapter, and that the Fort Lee/ William Morris merger will be called the William Morris Chapter. There are forty seven (47) active chapters.

The Treasurer, Mrs. John Davis, reported a balance of \$4,063.96. Her report was filed for audit.

The 1994 State Conference will be held in Morgantown on October 28, 29 and 30, 1994. These dates were incorrect in the Directory.

The State Registrar reported twenty-two (22) new members, four (4) junior members, seventy (70) deceased members, and twenty-seven members dropped. The present membership is 2,808, compared to last year's membership of 2,790.

The proposed by-law changes and the recommendations from the State Board

of Management were briefly reviewed.

Mrs. Randall Rumberg gave a report on the disposal of the Josephine Peters House. The Recommendation will be made that the \$47,477.10 from the sale of the house be given to Tamassee DAR School for the West Virginia Cottage. The investment will be sufficient for maintenance of the property. Mr. Randall Rumberg will attend the Business Meeting on Friday to answer questions concerning the disposal of the property.

Miss Rose Ann Adams accompanied a representative of General Accident

Insurance Company on an inspection of the Anna Jarvis House.

The Executive Committee agreed that future moneys for the Anna Jarvis House should be taken from the Anna Jarvis House Fund, and that the \$3,821.00 taken from the General Fund be reimbursed to the General Treasury.

The Parliamentarian, Mrs. Randall Rumberg, reviewed the correct procedure for Motions to Table, and the Removal of Motion from the Table and also the role of the Regent and the State Recording Secretary.

Mrs. Carolyn Pappas will conduct a Genealogy Workshop one hour prior to

the business meeting.

The State Regent reported from the National Board meeting, a new service from National that will direct calls to the proper source. She also gave 749415 as the last national number issued. The paging age has been extended the 40. The J.E. Caldwell Company has been purchased but there will be changes in the operation.

SAR member John Smith has sent letters to each chapter encouraging them to

report the grave site of all revolutionary veterans in West Virginia.

The Executive Committee agreed that the present operation of Girls and Boys State is working well and that the WVDAR should not become involved as a Society.

The Executive Committee will put flowers in the West Virginia Room during Continental congress.

The Invocation was given by Mrs. Frederick Valentine, Jr., State Chaplain. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Mrs. Cora P. Teel, State Vice Regent. Mrs. Gary W. Greenfield, State Historian, led the American's Creed.

The State Regent, Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner, welcomed daughters and introduced the State Officers present.

 - b. A copy of by laws. Each Chapter's by-laws must be in compliance with the State and the National Society's by laws. After the vote by the General Membership at the Business Session, each Chapter's by laws should be revised to reflect the changes.
 - c. The third item needed is a brief Financial Statement of budget and expenses.

Mrs. Wagoner gave a suggested time table as the October 1994, State Conference in Morgantown. These three items should be sent to the State Parliamentarian, Mrs. Randall G. Rumberg.

There are 849 Life Members and the last number issued was 755843. The average age of members is 52 years.

The Executive Committee of the West Virginia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, met on Friday, August 5, 1994, at 8:00 pm in Room 522, Blennerhassett Hotel, Parkersburg, WV. The State Regent, Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner, called the meeting to order. The State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Argil E. Sams was present.

The State Vice Regent, Mrs. Cora P. Teel, gave the Invocation.

A roll was called with the following members present: Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner, State Regent; Mrs. Cora P. Teel, State Vice Regent; Mrs. Argil E. Sams, State Recording Secretary; Mrs. R H. Walls, State Corresponding Secretary; Miss Mary Louise Taylor, State Organizing Secretary; Mrs. John A. Davis, State Treasurer; Mrs. Gary W. Greenfield, State Historian; Mrs. Lyle McCullough, State Librarian; and Mrs. Randall G. Rumberg, State Parliamentarian.

Mrs. Robert Waters, State Chairman Finance Committee, gave her report. Mrs. Roy A. Gilkeson, State Registrar, recommended that five cents be deducted from the budget for C. A. R. and credited to the West Virginia DAR News because of an increase in postage scheduled. There was a second and the motion carried.

The Invocation was given by Mrs. Cora P. Teel, State Vice Regent. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Mrs. Roy A. Gilkeson, State Registrar.

The American's Creed was led by Mrs. W. S. Prince, State Chairman, Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship.

The State Regent, Mrs. Joel M. Wagoner, introduced the State Officers and the State Parliamentarian.

A roll was called of State Officers, District Directors and Chapter Regents by the State Recording Secretary. Present were, nine State Officers, four District Directors and twenty-four Chapter Regents.

Mrs. Gary W. Greenfield, State Historian, thanked the Elizabeth Ludington Hagans-Colonel John Evans Chapter for preserving a relic from the U. S. S. West Virginia, sunk at Pearl Harbor, and returning this relic to the new U. S. S. West Virginia.

Mrs. Greenfield asked daughters to consider making donations of personal property to the DAR Museum that would be suitable for the Museum or the Americana Collection. An Outstanding Teacher of American History can be submitted until January 1, 1995. She asked that the final resting places of DAR Members and Revolutionary War ancestors continue to be marked.

In 1991-1992, two chapters received National First Place awards in Category A (50 or fewer chapters). Capt. James Allen for Sponsoring the Most JAC Members and Anne Royall for Sponsoring the Most JAC Groups. West Virginia received four National First place awards as follows: State Sponsoring Most JAC Members, Category A; State Sponsoring Most JAC Groups, Category A; State with Greatest Increase in JAC Groups; and State with the Most Contest Participants, Category A.

In addition to these honors, West Virginia students received the following Division JAC Contest awards; 6 first place, and 1 second place. National JAC Contest awards totaled four; 2 third, 1 second, and 1 first place winner.

The total number of JAC members in West Virginia is 9,518. The three chapters sponsoring the most JAC members were Capt. James Allen, 7,716; Anne Royall, 1,027; and Westmoreland, 500. The total number of WV clubs was 91. Anne Royall sponsored 52 clubs, Capt. James Allen, 25; and Col. Charles Lewis, 6.

Twenty-six chapters contributed to the National JAC Fund. The James Wood and William Henshaw Chapters tied giving the most at \$25 each.

A total of 793 JAC members participated in the JAC contest. Eleven statewide newspaper articles were published including seven pictures.

In 1992-1993, the West Virginia chapters received one National First Place Award. The Captain James Allen received Chapter Sponsoring the Most JAC members in category A-states with 50 or fewer chapters. The total number of JAC members in West Virginia was 7,285. The three chapters sponsoring the most JAC members were Capt. James Allen-6,000; Anne Royall-938; and Barboursville-300. SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER COMMITTEE

The objectives of the Seimes Microfilm Center are:

1. To build a resource for genealogical research for DAR members, prospective members and the public engaged in research. Materials include DAR applications, Federal and State census, State, Regional and Family records.

2. To work in cooperation with the Librarian General, the Registrar General and the Lineage Research and Genealogical Records committees.

3. To encourage individuals, chapters and State Organizations to contribute microfilm and funds for purchase of microfilm and for general use in the Center.

4. To give recognition to donors of special gifts, Certificates of Appreciation are sent to contributors of \$100, given as Life Members, or as donors of Memorial Tributes, and those of honorees and those in whose memory the Tribute is given, will be inscribed on a plaque in the SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER.

We are back on the Honor Roll and hope that your donations will be large enough to complete the 1096 rolls of Compiled Service Records of Soldiers Who Served in the American Army During the Revolutionary War which go along with the General Index. Chapters are encouraged to purchase at least one roll of this film at \$23 each.

There was a total of \$98 donated to Seimes Microfilm during 1993-1994 and \$100 was donated for a life membership. There were 29 Chapters donating.

The slide presentation, "Columbus in America," has been shown to four chapters with two additional viewing scheduled. The State Chairman presented the program, "The Crossing," to two chapters. The slide program is available for chapter use as well as member use in other organizations and schools.

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS

1992 – On June 4, 1992, the National Board of Management established a new special committee, Commemorative Events; to serve as an umbrella to cover all special events taking place during this Administration and those planned in the future.

Even though the Oct. 5th date of the Centennial of the Pledge of Allegiance has past, I feel it is an event that is extremely important and we should continue to promote it throughout the year; especially in our schools and through our work with youth groups.

Oct. 12th was the Columbus Quincentennial, there are video's available to your chapters to use a programs.

Oct. 13th was the Bicentennial of the laying of the cornerstone of the Whitehouse.

Coming up Feb. 13, 1993 is the World War II 50th Anniversary of the Four Chaplains Day, to commemorate the heroic act of 4 clergymen who gave their lives for others in the North Atlantic. I have a poem about this event available for your chapter.

April 13, 1993, marks the 250th Anniversary of the birth of Thomas Jefferson. Sept. 18, 1993 is the Bicentennial of the laying of the cornerstone of the US

Capitol.

Since this is a new committee and I am new to this wonderful organization, I would appreciate any ideas or plans for special celebration in your respective areas around the Great State of West Virginia.

1993 - This committee has developed over the past year into one that has proved to be both interesting and challenging. Material was mailed to each chapter about Four Chaplins Day and I heard back from some chapters as to how it was used. On February 4, 1993 I was able to attend a National Prayer Breakfast in Washington, DC to commemorate Four Chaplins Day.

The main focus of this committee has been WWII, in the spring of this year I mailed all chapters events that happened during WWII. The recommended use was as monthly newspaper articles or possibly radio announcements of events that happened that day in history 50 years ago. Each chapter was provided information from the Dept. of Defense about becoming a Commemorative Community.

I was able to visit each district meeting in August of this year, again the focus was WWII at each meting there was a speaker.

They are as follows: Western District - Lt. Col. Willie C. Lucus; Southern District - Dr. Robert S. Conte, Greenbrier Historian; Eastern District - Dr. Howard Malin; Northern District - Col. Edward J. Peters USAF Ret.; Central District - Col. D.M. Jack Squires, US Navy Chaplin Ret. For the Board of Management Meeting on Sat. there was a WWII Comm. Luncheon with a speaker who was a nurse who saw active duty during the war.

I have prepared a program about how the war affected the homefront. I have presented this program for two organizations outside DAR. On Oct. 5, 1993, I traveled to Beckley and presented it to the Captain James Allen Chapter. I have three more chapter programs scheduled tat this time and I am willing to try and

work any one who is interested in this program into my schedule.

Locating WWII Veterans has been another project of this committee and I have the necessary forms to fill out to order the 75th Anniversary medals for any that you have located. ELEANOR H. SMITH SCHOLARSHIP FUND

This scholarship was created in honor of Mrs. Eleanor H. Smith, member of James Wood Chapter, Parkersburg, following her term of office as honorary Vice President General, NSDAR. The motion to establish this scholarship originated with her chapter and was passed by the state organization.

It provided students with a small stipend which was greatly appreciated in the 1950's and 60's. Qualifications for recipients of the scholarship however, were very limiting and perhaps led to the problems we have had in its distribution for more than a decade.

The \$250 scholarship was available to a young woman intending to major in one of the areas of Home Economics, preferable Foods and Nutrition or the Extension Education Program. Regrettably, these worthy subjects are all but impossible to find. Home Economics has disappeared from the list of academic majors at most colleges and universities and replaced by such titles as Human Resources, Human Development, etc. Areas of specialization within Home Economics has been reassigned to other college departments.

After some effort to develop an efficient process of locating candidates for this scholarship, a request was made to discontinue the scholarship and restore the money to the State Organization's general fund. James Wood Chapter was asked to initiate this action because they had originated the motion. At our October 3rd meeting, the James Wood Chapter voted unanimously in favor of discontinuing the Eleanor H. Smith Scholarship and releasing the money in that account to the general fund.
