





Dear Club Women:

As I write this message to you, the last one I shall write as President of the West Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs, I am reminded of a group of twenty mature men and women who spent an evening seeking the answer to this question: "Would I be willing to relive my life?" Only two out of the twenty were willing to play a repeat performance. Even those two had no desire to live their life over again. They preferred to keep on accepting what the future offered. Adlai Stevenson, whose life certainly was rich and fruitful, had no wish to repeat. He said:

"If I had my life to live over again, and if I were given the choice to accept it from infancy to old age, without a disappointment, the shadow of a loss, a hurt, or a pain, I should not dare to take life on such terms. cup. If the raising of my hand would save those whom I love most from all pain throughout eternity, I should not dare raise my hand. What is universal, what comes thus to all, I believe is not evil, but good." When I ask myself the question

When I ask myself the question "Would I want to live again my term of office?" the answer would have to be "No." Yet, the past two years have been good years made so by your cooperation, friendliness, and hard work. Many things I should have done differently or better, and these I shall always regret. But overshadowing everything I did or might have done are the memories of contacts with you, in regional meetings, local club meetings and the Convention. I did not see nor hear any grumbling, unfriendliness, petty bickering or dispute. These may come, I realize, at some time in club work. As club women you demonstrated only the best as I saw you in action.

MAY YOU HAVE enough happiness to keep you sweet; enough trials to keep you strong; enough sorrow to keep you human; enough hope to keep you happy; enough failure to make you humble; enough failure to make you cager; enough friends to give you cager; enough friends to give you comfort; enough faith and courage in yourself, your business, and your country to

banish depression;

enough wealth to meet your needs; enough determination to make each day a better day than yesterday.

Thank you for the privilege of serving as your President. Having worked with you I have no fear for club work in the future in West Virginia. It is in good hands. Your worthwhile projects, your contaglous enthusiasm, your unselfish service will lead the way.





In Review

The responsibility for, and possible solutions to the many educational problems of today were given the members by a most forceful and qualified speaker, Dr. Delmas Miller, head of the Educational Department of West Virginia University. In his message, "Building with

In his message, "Building with Youth," Dr. Miller explored all areas of this subject and commenting on the erudition and unquestioned influence of the members of the Federation he assured them that they have the power to bring about any needed changes in the educational structure of their communitics which will result in greater success in the "building with youth for a better world."

"Are you Cinemate" the thought provoking subject of Mrs. Thomas R. Houde, GFWC Communications chairman, stirred her audience to further study and action on behalf of today's children as they were informed of the adverse influence of many of the movies and the undesirable publications readily available to persons of any age. Mrs. Houde reminded members of their personal responsibility in guiding their children and youth into an understanding of the need for developing strong moral values if they would become happy, discerning and responsive adults. A workshop in Parliamentary Procedure presented by Mrs. Keith Wharton, state parliamentarian, was well received by all attending the sessions as it offered a valuable opportunity to gain a knowledge of proper procedures in conducting club meetings, and facilitating business transactions in an acceptable manner.

Action was taken by the convention in passing several resolutions, these included, the support of kindergartens for West Virginia children: the support of a constitutional convention for the purpose of modernizing the constitution of West Virginia; the support of the 1970 White House Conference on Children and Youth. It was recommended that the Federation give serious consideration and supportive action for the report of the President's Committee on Mental Retardation.

Two emergency resolutions were presented, one concerning the urgent need for stronger air and water pollution laws and one favoring the National Recreation area at Spruce Knob-Seneca Rocks as it is presently constituted. These will be sent to the proper state authorities.



Mrs. Hoylman received the gavel of office and the acclaim of the convention. In her inaugural address she established the new Federation theme as "Volunteers Make A Difference." She stated that "During the next two years we will use this theme as we redouble our efforts as unpaid volunteer workers, united to keep America strong. We will have three main goals. 

are too strong to be broken, and I have already accepted a committee assignment from the Ripley Senior Woman's Club!




