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



of all beginnings, and represented with two faces, one looking forward and the other backward. From him, the month of January was named. It is the time to glance backward over the activities of the past year in Women's Club work as we look forward with hope to beginning again.

It is good to salute the Juniors in this month of beginning again. Their good works will always be an inspiration and joy to us. May this new year bring only happiness and fullfillment to them.

I should like especially, to give each of you the following recipe:

To this add a dash of fun, a sprinkle of play, and a heaping cupful of good humor.

Pour into the whole mixture love ad libitum, and mix with a vim. Cook thoroughly with fervent heat, garnish with smiles and a sprig of joy, then serve with QUIETNESS, UNSELFISHNESS, and CHEER-FULNESS, and A HAPPY NEW YEAR is a certainty.

It is collecting plastic and clean scraps of cotton material for the Cancer Society, and whole jars of pennies for Penny Art. It is the sponsoring of Scouts, and doing "drives" and starting classes for the illiterate.

A club is friendliness to the foreignborn resident. and making new friends in the next block.

A club is meetings. minutes, and moments of madness brought on by those reams of reports at the end of the year, and it's the suspense, disappointment—sometimes a whirl of excitement as we listen for our club's name in the list of awards at convention.

A club is telling stories to a group of bright-eyed youngsters on a Saturday morning at the public library, and collecting a ton of good used books for the State Mental Hospital.

A club is knowing that you have given fifty children in Mexico a school so they may have the opportunity of an education.

A club is individual growth, in leadership, civic responsibility, and even more improtant—fellowship.

It is being such a good member of the group that one's daughter will ask, with envy, "Say, how old do you have to be to join the Jr. Woman's Club?" And the youngest one will add wistfully. "Gee, you have all the fun-getting to go to Convention."

But more than any of these things, it is the awed and proud look on a husband's face when someone stops him on the street and tells him how well you represented the JWC at the Town Meeting last night, or when your picture appears in the local newspaper presenting a large check to the Mayor for a swimming pool.

It is the thrill of singing and acting on a real stage with other club members, and the drudgery of selling ads for the program.

A club is a little tiredness, a great deal of excitement. It is making new friends and enriching old friendships. It is a satisfactory addition to a busy woman's life, and it is exactly what we make it by what we put into it.

Club work is exactly what we make of it and each member is a leader, and to each of you I say:

Blessed is the leader who knows where she is going, why she is going, and how to get there.

Blessed is the leader who knows no discouragement.


Marianna Fanning

May I take this opportunity to thank each club treasurer for being so efficient and prompt in forwarding checks to me. This has made my job so much easier!


I have always found a great satisfaction in club work, although I feel the greatest reward is my association with the friends I have made all over the state—especially YOU.

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


