IN THIS NATION ...

- ... AND BEYOND

Is everyone who is eligible for food stamps receiving them? How much red tape is involved in obtaining emergency assistance? Where could you turn for assistance if faced with sudden unemployment, large medical bills and no health insurance? What are the roles of each level of government and the private sector as they relate to social services? What should they be? These are just a few of the many questions posed by the League's Meeting Basic Human Needs (MBHN) study.

The League is not a newcomer to these issues. In 1971 the national League adopted its current position on income assistance programs, child care for low-come families, and employment and training programs.

Welfare reform is once again on the nation's domestic policy agenda. The MBHN study is a means of positioning the League to address the critical issues that will be raised in the upcoming policy debate. The study will focus on meeting four basic human needs in the US: food, shelter, basic income level and health care. (Background information in the Sept/Oct national VOTER.)

During the first year of the study, Leagues will be obtaining community profile information designed to help identify needs that may be unmet. We have until March 31, 1987, to gather demographic data and information on programs and participants, conduct interviews with public officials and program administrators, and complete some fascinating case studies.

Nancy Mullen, 522-9045, is coordinating the study for our League. We need volunteers to help gather information. A committee meeting will be held Jan. 14, 3 PM, 1006 13th Ave.

As a result of our study of US Relations with Developing Countries, the League's 1986 Advocacy Agenda now includes "Create a climate for meeting the long-term social and economic needs of developing countries by opposing aid to the Contra forces in Nicaragua." This statement applies our position on reducing the risk of military conflict. promoting sound management of global resources, protecting human rights, stimulating economic growth and improving the quality of life in developing countries.

It is also important, with a new budget coming up, to remember the poor financial condition of the United Nations. In view of the League's long support of the UN, we should urge Congress to restore funding for it and put a stop to efforts to circumvent peace-keeping programs already in place. Let our representatives and senators hear from you; even those who agree with us need our backing.

SPECIAL ALERT:

"Land of the Canaan." For many years the League has supported the establishment of Canaan Valley as a National Wildlife Refuge. West Virginia is the only state in the nation which does not have a National Wildlife Refuge.

A richly diverse bereal ecosystem thrives in the Canaan Valley. The wetlands provide feeding and breeding grounds for numerous fish and wildlife species. Rare and endangered species of plant and animal life depend upon the area for survival. National Wildlife Refuge status was proposed by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service as the best way to protect these valuable resources. The League also believes establishment of a refuge would provide for outstanding educational and recreational opportunities for West Virginians and the 45 million people who live within a 300 mile radius.

Unfortunately, the proposal for a pumped-storage hydroelectric power facility threatens the possibility of a Refuge. At present this proposal is under legal challenge, but according to the Charleston Gazette, Governor Moore has indicated West Virginia is ready to pull out of this legal challenge.

Please write to Secretary of Interior Donald Hodel, Main Interior Building, 18th & C Streets, NW, Washington, D. C., 20240. Urge him to recommend the protection of Canaga as a National Wildlife Refuge.

Te the Cabell County Commission:

The League of Women Veters of the Huntington Area is concerned about the trash dumped in areas all ever the county. Cleanup programs are organized from time to time, but the effects of such programs are short lived. Trash soon appears in the cleaned up areas.

Studies of the Tri-State area indicate that there is a petential for many more recreational opportunities here. The League believes that if our county intends to be successful in attracting tourism, it must change its image.

In order to clean up Cabell County on a permanent basis, the League urges the Cabell County Commission to adopt an ordinance requiring mandatory garbage pickup service. Private haulers are already in business here and provide voluntary pickup service in the areas outside municipalities; however, some people who do not subscribe to the garbage pickup service dump their garbage and trash in rural areas, on other people's property, along the readsides, or wherever they wish.

Illegal dumps are a health hazard as well as an aesthetic disaster. Rats and other disease—spreading vermin preliferate in such dumps. Runoff waters from such dumps enter our streams, rivers, and semetimes even the groundwaters which are well water sources.

The League realizes that to begin a mendatory pickup system will involve planning. We urge you to show your concern about the trash problem by assigning the planning formal mandatory program to the planning commissioner whatever agency you believe will do the job.
