ANNUAL MEETING – March 15 - The League's annual meeting is scheduled for Monday, March 15, 6pm at the Ponderosa Restaurant, Rte 60, East.

The speaker will be Brandi Jacobs-Jones, Director of Administration and Finance for the city of Huntington. After dinner and Brandi's speech and Q and A's, we will conduct our annual meeting to elect officers, adopt a budget, and vote on our program for 2010-11. We also want to hear from our members on what activities the League should carry out in the coming year.

Brandi Jacobs-Jones will speak on the finances of the city. Huntington's income continues to be stressed (especially in the light of the recession) even after the council adopted increases in taxes. The mayor indicated furloughs of city workers probably will be a future measure to balance income and expenses.

Because the city's services are essential for the inhabitants of Huntington, it is important for us to understand how the city will meet its needs. An occupation tax is one of the suggestions to replace some of the present taxes and yield more income.

We invite League members and friends to attend the March 15 meeting to learn more about the city's finances and give the League's board of directors input for future activities.

RECENT LWVUS ACTIONS - The League's national president sent a letter to the Senate urging it to update campaign finance laws in the wake of Citizens United. A recent *ABC News-Washington Post* poll showed that the League is not alone in this fight: 80 percent of Americans of both parties oppose the Court's decision. Enhanced disclosure is the most basic step needed to protect the role of the voter in making decisions in elections. It is now possible for corporations to secretly provide funds that another corporation uses to intervene in an election through independent expenditures. **This is not acceptable.** The League supports strong disclosure requirements for both those who receive election funds and those who provide such funds.

The League sent a letter to the House of Representatives urging members to oppose legislation from Representatives Moran and Pomeroy that would overturn the EPA's scientific finding that global warming pollutants endanger public health.

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
