OBITUARY

Those of us who knew and worked with Peg Schroeder in League were very sorrowed to learn of her death on November 30. Peg had served on State Board and was president of the local League from 1963 to 1967. Her portfolios included P.R., Voters Service and Election Laws. Besides her activity in League, she was a dedicated supporter and worker in Community Players, a Girl Scout Leader, and a member of the Library Board. In 1972 Peg and her family emoved to Holland, Michigan, where she really put her talents to work. She was elected the first female ever to serve on the School Board, was a member of Right-to-Read committee, for six years worked as a volunteer in the Help Line Program where she supervised other volunteers, was telephone Crisis Counselor and volunteer coordinator.

THE CONTITUE SYSTEM

The committees are the actual "working face" of the Legislature. After a bill is introduced on the floor of the House or Senate, the bill is referred to the appropriate committee. The committee then studies the bill and may:

- (a) hold the bill without taking action;
- (b) hold the bill but substitute & report out another bill;
- (c) report the bill back to the house.

The committee may amend the bill before reporting favorably or adversely to the house.

THE RULES CO.LITTEE

Usually in the last fifteen days before the end of the session, the Rules Committee may put the bills which it thinks should have priority on the Special Calendar. The Special Calendar takes precedence over the Regular Calendar on the floor of the House or Senate. Generally, if a bill has not been placed upon the Special Calendar by the last few days of a session, it has very little chance of ever being voted upon.

WRITE YOUR LIGISLATOR

It is the carefully thought out individual letter that a lawmaker appreciates. Here are some guidelines for writing:

- 1. Be informed on the subject you are writing about.
- 2. Be courteous at all times, personal when appropriate.
- 3. Identify the subject of your letter by the bill number or issue.
- 4. State the reasons for the position you are taking.
- 5. Show how you, yourself, will be affected.
- 6. Use your own words.
- 7. Request action.
- 3. Sign your name legibly or type it, if necessary.
- 9. Write a letter of thanks when your legislator's action pleases you.
- 10. Don't stop with one letter; keep your legislator informed how you feel.
- 11. Form letters, long telegrams signed by lists of people and other mass entreaties carry little or no weight.
- 12. If possible, send your letter before the session begins. A single, intelligent letter months before the bill is to be voted on, while the legislator is still forming his opinion, is the most effective one. But a letter anytime is read with interest and appreciation.

HUTAN RESOURCES

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Linda Lowis-Vatkins

The West Virginia Human Rights Commission is concerned about the minimum number of complaints received in the area of housing. Since it is apparent that discriminatory practices still exist, the Commission is circulating a questionnaire relating to such alleged practices in the sale and rental of homes and apartments. Specific questions deal with the possibility of lending institutions denying loans for home improvements or the purchase of homes to minorities or women and whether realty companies provide full and adequate service to our prospective buyers. The Commission currently is circulating a pamphlet entitled, "Danger-Discrimination in Housing" which cites examples of subtle discrimination.

WHERE DO VE STAND ON THE ISSUES?

Helen Gibbons, our State President, recently wrote a letter to our legislators outlining some of the governmental issues we have studied and our positions on them. The following is a synopsis of that letter:

CONSTITUTIONAL REVISION: The League urges adoption of a constitutional amendment to allow counties to choose alternative forms of government.

EDUCATION: The League supports the present school aid formula and favors changes to provide more equitable distribution for pupils....supports expanded vocational and technical education programs for people of all ages.

ELECTION: League approves of reforms to include: -Binding the delegates to the national presidential convention proportionately to the results of the state presidential primary.

-Vesting prosecutory powers of election law violations at the state level. -Requiring the preparation of new training films with mandatory attendance by the election officials. There should be three separate films so that all the methods of voting--paper ballot, voting machines, or electronic devices---will comprehensively outlined for the election officials.

INVIRON.ENTAL QUALITY: League believes it imperative that strict regulations to protect air, water, and land be maintained.

HUMAN RESOURCES: We feel welfare recipients receive funding adequate to meet basic human needs. Cost of living and inflation continue upwards yet welfare payments have remained unchanged since 1974.

JUVINILE SERVICES: League supports allocation of state financing of appropriate facilities/services for delinquent juveniles and status offenders...urges upgrading education for children in correctional institutions to aid these young geople to have a more productive life on their return to society.

LAND USD: The League supports measures for effective regulation of sedimentation, and erosion, especially relative to timbering, mining, and construction practices....(and)...state should assume control because of lack of land use planning by local authorities.

FINANCES: The League feels salaries of administrative departments should be upgraded.

MASHINGTON, D.C.: The League supports the federal constitutional amendement to give voting representation in the Senate and House of Representatives to D.C. citizens.

UEST VINGINIA LEGISLATURE: We believe roll call votes in the House of Delegates and on definitive action by committees in both houses are necessary to ensure an open, democrative process.
