I was ceftainly surprised and delighted to receive your letter dated Feb. 19th and honestly, I had every intention of answering it long ago. The thing that stopped me was your request for pictures. I do have some somewhere, but for the life of me I can't locate them. They probably are in boxes or trunks stored in the garage and I simply haven't had time to look for them. Then I was surprised with a telephone call from a Mrs. Miller who had recieved a letter from you indirectly, with a request for her to call me concerning data for a book, I believe you are preparing for publication. We had a long and very pleasant chat; the following day I received the letter you had written, which she forwarded to me.

I am so happy to know that you are enjoying good health at your age and Ers Miller says you spend a good deal of your time in Washington, D. C., doing research for biographies you are writing. Wonderful! Having avid interests in life surely keeps one young in spirit. Here are some of the answers to your questions.

Ly home was in Carmel, Indiana, although I was working in Indianopolis, Ind. when I quit my office job to accept that teaching job in w. Va., on a trial basis. I had never taught before.

I was graduated from De Pauw, Greencastle, Ind. June 1927, where I majored in Romance Languages---my must was English. My position at G. V. H. S. was teaching French and English.

I was not relieved in June 1935, (for political reasons I always thought) and the following Jan. 1936, I took a position

teaching English and Auditorium Subjects. (Pantomines one act paays)
at etc) at Battle Junior High School, in Mishawaka, Ind. where
I taught until June 1940, when I was married and went to Chicago.

In 1932, I studdied six weeks in the graduate school at Dale Univ. Durham, N. C. and in the summer of 1937 I attended summer school of speech and drama in Chicago. That is the extent of my formal schooling.

As for my memories--- they are many. I shall never forget when the bus stopped and let me off at that little one-room roadside store near the school building. I arrived on a Saturday. I asked someone ve in the little store if I might lean my luggage there for a-while.

I walked up to the building and couldn't for the life of me understand how equals school could be in session in a building only under construction as it was. There was a Board meeting in progress in your office.

The business at hand---providing uniform for the athletes---I met your Mr. Scott and Geeley Issacs. Having no place to goe, Geeley invited me up the hill to their house where I spent the week end, certainly a new experience for me.

Monday morning I met the other teachers, Thelma Riggs, Velma Calhoun, the coach, John--? that she married, etc. They were very nice and some invited me to live in Branchland with them; others in West Hamlin. Later in the day you ask me where I was going to stay. I told you I hadn't made up my mind, but it would be one of the little towns, whereupon, you informed me that it would be neither. If I wasn't willing to live right there among the people I could go back to Indiana and you would get someone whom would. I said, but I can't live like this, they don't have screens at the windows and doors. And you said, "thats what I want you to do, teach them how to live as you have been used to" Well, I didn't want to go home---I wanted to get some teaching experience, so that

first year I lived across the road at Greeley Isaccs. Ruth Cash lived there too, one year, I can't recall whether it was my first year there.

Another exciting incident was when I was standing at the Auditorum door taking money for a B. B. game. Suddenly you came running down the hall with that big, double fisted janitor (I don't recall his name, he had a daughter in school) running after you. You ran into me, knocking me into the wall and you cowered against the me, protecting your glasses, while he was pounding you. little Margaret Chapman from Hubbell screamed, "Oh Miss Loveless and reached in and grabbed me by the clothes and pulled me out from under and I ran down in the basement and shook for a while. I stayed down there until I saw the janitor run out to the road and get in a car. We later learned that he drove to Hamlin to pay a fine for assault so that he wouldn't be arrested (queer justice). Remember. knew what the trouble was. I had 68 pupils in freshman English that first year --- 2 on a seat ---. And, believe me, we got away remarkably well under that circumstance. The favorite passtime at noon was loosers fights; so I had to keep the Bosers locked up. Remember when there was a wave of a mysterious illness which followed recesses there for a while and we discovered that pupils were smoking Larijuana cigaretts on the school grounds. Some one got ahold of one and hrs Scott took it and analized it in the chemistry lab. and discovered what it was. Some soldier in the neighborhood had just returned from a stint of service in the Phillipines and brought back a supply. I don't remember about the dishonest home economics teacher. Maybe I never knew about that. Who was she?

I taught in summer school that first year down there. I know I have a very good panaroma photo of the student body. I believe you, Mr. Scott and I were the entire faculty.

Elizabeth H. Compton

Elizabeth Henderson Compton was born in Williamstown, W. Va. (Wood County) on March 19, 1879. Her parents were Caroline Snodgrass Henderson and Henry Clay Henderson(Dartmouth 1867), a former State Senator. She was a lineal descendant of the first settlers of Williamstown, W. Va. and Alexander Henderson of Dumfries, Va. who was a friend of George Washington.

She attended school in Williamstown and completed the course given at that time. For her preparation for college she attended the Academy of the College for Women, Marietta, Ohio. After completing her work there, she entered Elizabeth College for Women, Marietta, Ohio. While she was in college, Marietta College which heretofore had been a Gentlemen's College gradually became a Co-educational College. The ladies from Elizabeth College came down to Marietta College for some of their classes. The transition was gradual and although there was much talk and some discension, the Glass of 1898 graduated ten girls and nineteen boys with two sets of honors - one for each sex. Elizabeth Compton graduated from Marietta College in 1899 with honors in English, French, and Philosophy.

Prior to her marriage June 18, 1908 to William Edward Compton, she taught in the Williamstown School and Parkersburg High School. In 1915 her husband died leaving her with a six year old 'daughter, Mary Elizabeth Compton.

In 1919 she returned to teaching in Williamstown High School at Williamstown, W. Va. and taught there through the 1927 - 1928 school year. At that time, due to a political change, only one out of sixteen high school teachers was reappointed for the following year. She taught at Guyan Valley High School 1928-29.

From 1929 through the 1938 - 1939 school year Elizabeth Compton taught at Stoco High School, Besoco, W. Va. (Raleigh County). She retired from teaching at the end of the 1938-1939 school year.

Following her retirement, she returned to her home in Williamstown, W. Va. and lived there until her death on February 5, 1958.

Until she became ill with heart trouble in 1955, she had been very active in Community affairs in Marietta, Ohio, Parkersburg, and Williamstown. She was a lifelong member of Christ Memorial Episcopal Church, Williamstown, W. Va. Mrs. Compton had served as president of the Williamstown Senior Woman's Club and the Auxillary of Christ Memorial Episcopal Church. She was active in the Marietta Chapter of the American Association of University Women, the Chi Omega Mother's Club and the Fifty Year Club of Marietta College.

She also had been active in the Centennial Chapter of the Daughters of the American Pioneers in Parkersburg.

She enjoyed travelling and had the ability to bring so much of interest home from any trip she took. All through her shut in days, she kept alert and had a keen interest in world affairs. Her family and friends have many happy memories of their association with her.

When I last wrote you, I stated that I thought Adam Bias was the father of Obediah Bias, who was in the war of 1812. Since that time, I have a woman working for me, at Washington, and she has found a record of and Obediah Bias in the Revolutionary War.

This Obediah Bias may be the same man as the one who was int the war of 1812, or, it might be has father. The last record of Obediah Bias, of Cabell County, was in 1818.

If he was 80 years old when he died, he would have been born, in 1738, several years before the French and Indian war, and he could have been, in all three wars, but it was unusual for it was unusual for a man to have served in two wars. His gravestone, on Hewetts Creek, in Boone County, shows no dates.

A LESSON FROM THE PAST

The last hundred years has taught us important facts about those birds and animals which inhabit the fields on which our food is grown.

To begin with, we have learned that fertile soils yield more of nearly every land product-be it wheat, rabbits, eggs, tomatoes, beef, or pheasants. And since the country's best soils are now in agriculture, it follows that these areas are potentially very high in their ability to yield game, fur, and other wildlife.

Today it is estimated that 80 percent of the small game and 40 percent of the fur harvested annually in this country come from farmed lands. Although such productivity looks high, we know that this annual crop is far below the possibilities. In general, the nation's farm lands are in poor condition for wildlife.

Everything that grows on the farm-

Living fences of multiflora rose are rapidly becoming an accepted addition to the American farm landscape.

More and more of them are being planted each year as farmers become acquainted with their advantages and as the supply of planting stock increases.

Multiflora rose living fences will keep your livestock at home and often will help keep your soil at home, too. A living fence of multiflora rose is the least expensive fence you can establish and the cheapest to maintain. Once established, it will last a lifetime. Multiflora rose furnishes walcome for song birds, game birds, rabbits and other kinds of farm wildlife. Compared with drab wire or wood fences, a living fence of multiflora rose is a thing of beauty. In the spring, it has masses of white blossoms, in the fall and winter its red fruits add color to the fields. The thick, twiggy growth of multiflora rose canes provides nesting cover for song birds.

Multiflora rose seedlings are available in many States from State nurseries. Information about this source can be obtained from your State Conservation Department.

Multiflora rose is also available from commercial nurseries. Watch the farm newspapers and magazines for advertisements. Be sure the plants you buy are of the thorny, upright variety.
