Chas. T. Everett had a farm between 7th & 11th Sts. Huntington extending from the river to the hills and had numerous slaves to work it. He was taken to Camp Chase 1861 for southern leanings, and died there. His body was brought back in a leaden coffin and buried in Holderby Cemetery, later moved to Spring Hill Cemetery. He had two children, Kate and George. George died young. Kate married James Clark in 1884 and had 3 sons. After Chas. Everett's death the Framptons moved to Okla. Mrs. Clark went to Chicago, Ill. She visited in Huntington in July 1937. She was born in 1861 at Maple Grove now the foot of 7th St. Huntington.

Rebecca Jane Frampton's father was Isaac Frampton, her mother was Jane Mann. Five children were born to them: Ephriam, David, Hiram, Isaac Jr., and Rebecca Jane. Isaac Jr. died single.

In 1813 Barboursville was made County seat of Cabell County. It rovedto Huntington in 1884. Several skirmishes of the Revolution took place in Barboursville. In 1812 Capt. Brumfield's cavalry spent a night in Barboursville, and , and in 1842 Elisha McComas formed a company there, most of whom later died of Mexican fever. In 1822 La Fayette came from Guyandotte, where he spent the night at the Inn of Madane La Tulle through Barboursville, en route

1/19/1883. The third and last child was born in 1803. They moved again, to a point three and a half miles east of Barboursville, (the James Dundas farm, near Blue Sulphur) at which place he died of paralysis, in 1837. Mary Clymer died near the same place, at the home of her daughter Sallie, Mrs. Nathan Everett, the poor farm at Ona, now, 1943). Twenty-one years later, 1858, both were buried on their farm at Blue Sulphur, the old James Dundas farm, but were taken up in and buried again at Fifth Avenue and Main Street, Guyandotte, by the D.A.R. This by authority of records Buck Co. Pa. and Pension Dep't D.C. On June 24, 1838, a pension was granted Mary Clymer, widow of Allen. Joseph Rice came along with Allen; and in 1806 married Mary Harman, b 6/29/ 1782; died 1877. A daughter of Thomas A. Harman was Anna F. (Nancy Walker) Harman, sister of Elizabeth Harrison, whom Allen Rice married.

Records of the appointments of the first twenty-three Sheriffs in Cabell County, from the time of Thomas Ward, first Sheriff in 1809, the year of the county's political creation until the tenure of Abia Rees, in 1839, when the appointment system was discontinued, were indexed yesterday by the County Clerk, R.S. Douthat, following several days research among separate volumes in the record room.

"The appointments of these first Sheriffs evidently had not been entered in books now used for the perpetuation of such records, and inasmuch as they are of legal and historical significance, I felt that they should be made available," Mr. Douthat said.

Included in the list are the names of many heads of prominent families still residing in Cabell County; nearly all of them, in fact, are names familiar in any chronicle of the important events of the community, down to the present time.

An epitome of the records showing the sequence of officers, all appointed by the Governor of Virginia (West Virginia not having become a state until 1863, reads:

1. THOMAS WARD, appointed Sheriff of Cabell County by John Tyler, Governor of Virginia February 14, 1809, and gave the several bonds required, with Jeremiah Ward, Nathaniel Scales, and Mancah Bostic, sureties.

2. HENRY BROWN, appointed Sheriff by Hon. John Tyler, gov-

ernor on July 2, 1810; gave the several bonds required, with Edmund Morris, Mark Russell, Henry Haynie, and John Rodgers as sureties.

3. JESSE SPURLOCK, appointed Sheriff by George W. Smith, Lieutenant Governor of Virginia, on March 26, 1811; gave the bonds required, with sureties.

4. SAMUEL SHORT, appointed Sheriff by James Barbour, Governor, on July 3, 1812; giving bonds required, with Thomas Ward, Elisha McComas, and John Wellman, sureties.

5. MARK RUSSELL, appointed Sheriff by James Barbour, Governor, on June 25, 1814; giving bonds required, with Elisha McComas, Manoh Bostic, and Samuel Short, as sureties.

6. MARK RUSSELL, appointed Sheriff by Wilson C. Nicholas, Governor, on June 7, 1815, giving bonds required.

7. JAMES HOLDERBY, appointed Sheriff by Thomas Man, Randolph, overnor, ~~with Elisha McComas, Manoh Bostic~~ on July 5, 1820, giving bonds required, with John Everett, Jesse Toney, John Hannan, John Laidley, and John Samuels, sureties.

8. WILLIAM TONEY, appointed Sheriff by Thomas Man Randolph Governor, on July 25, 1821 giving bonds required, ~~with~~ giving bonds required, with Jesse Toney, John Everett, Jr., John Hannan, Elisha McComas, as sureties.

In 1822 La Fayette came from Guyandotte, where he spent the night at the Inn of Madane La Tulle through Barboursville, en route

Abia Rece came along also, and in year 1808(12/27/1808) married Elizabeth Harman (b. 1/9/1785) , (died 1/9/1861) and settled on Mud River, near Mud Bridge, and built a brick house and ran a ferry boat in 1814. (C.C.Records) across Mud River, on the old James River turnpike. This old house served as an inn for the stage coach line, which ran from about 1835 until 1873. The ferry was run by John Morris, of Teays before this, and was known as the Morris Ferry. In 1814 (7/5/1814) Abia posted a bond with John Everett, security, to run the ferry; and in 1817, 5/27/1817, the ferry rates were increased. Abia was Judge of the Circuit Court in 1818(2/24/1818) at which he was present, along with Jas. Holderny, Wm. Buffington and Wm. Fullerton.

"PLEASE EXCUSE ME" SAYS MRS. RICKETTS, DISCUSSING BALLOT.
Sept. 1920.

It may do very well for women of this day to vote, but please excuse me, was the answer of Mrs. Jennie Everett Ricketts, 455 Seventh Avenue, who recently celebrated her ninety-fourth birthday, when asked if she intended to exercise the right to vote, recently conferred upon her sex.

"In my day", she said, "Womans place was in the home. I can't even go to church, and as for going to the polls, here Mrs. Rickett's smile flashed like a girl's and she made a gesture with her hands as if putting the idea from her--"please excuse me. "Yes", she continued, "tell them that Mrs. Ricketts begs to be excused."

"I believe that we ought to favor whatever may tend to bring about peace and love, and a rest from all the strife and dreadfulness which is disturbing our country today. Sometimes, I can't sleep at night for thinking of some of the awful things that happen, even in our own city.

"If suffrage had been necessary to bring about prohibition I would have been fully willing for it but we have prohibition now, and I think its a wonderful blessing. Even the cruel (the civil) war in which two of Rickett's sons served, and one fell, wasn't as bad as the saloon." Mrs. Ricketts, one of the few women now living whose sons fought in the Confederate army lived in Guyandotte when that struggle began. Her sons went with Albert Gallatin Jenkins and the Thirty-sixth, serving in the famous border rangers. One fell in that battle. The other, Lucien C. Ricketts, was with Jenkins when the leader fell at Cheat

Mountain. He lived to become a brilliant lawyer at the Cabell County bar, but died more than a decade ago. From girlhood Mrs. Ricketts has been interested in public questions. She is a student of public affairs, reading the papers regularly, and carefully, and while she doesn't intend to vote, she is decided in her political views, being an ardent admirer of President Wilson, and a supporter of Jimmie Cox.

She realizes, she says, that things are different today than during her more active life, and that there have been great advances and great changes, which, she thinks, probably justify the extension of suffrage to women.

Mrs. Ricketts is the grand daughter of a Revolutionary soldier, John Everett who lived in the Teay's Valley and often on her visits to his home as a girl, told her wstories of fights with the Red Coats. To his dying day, she says, her father would not wear any hat save of the style of revolutionary days. These had to be ordered especially, and his style in hats, if nothing else, set him apart in the community.

Her father was John Everett, who built a home on the east bank of the Guyandotte, and just south of Pat's Branch well over a hundred years ago; There Mrs. Ricketts was born and married, and there she saw her four sisters married. Her mother and father died there. These and many other recollections of her younger life were centered about the old home, the decaying remnants of which were recently removed from their foundations by the owner, H.C. Everett, nephew of Mrs. Ricketts. She asked the newspaper man who called on her about the old home, exoressing regret that the removal had been found necessary.

Before thw war she and her husband, Dr. Ricketts, lived

in Guyandotte. He died in the fifties, leaving her a young widow. with a growing family. For forty years, perhaps, she has lived in Huntington. She makes her home with her sons, George, Girard C. and Charles Ricketts. Her only daughter, Mrs. Rankin Wiley, lives at Point Pleasant.

Soon after the celebration of her 94th birthday, in the spring, Mrs. Ricketts contracted pneumonia, and attending physicians told the family that she could not possibly live. Her great vitality, however, triumphed, and, and she is again well enough to sit in her wheel chair and move about the rooms and ~~expensive~~ corridors of her spacious home. The caller found her sitting alone in her room. She was dressed in white and looked to say the least, much younger than ninety-four.

"Why", she laughed, as the discussion of woman suffrage was on, "you had better not be quoting me--they'll say I'm in my dotage". But no one need deceive themselves so. And if her remarks quoted here are not sufficient proof, she's at home daily, and likes visitors. Indeed, Her only complaint is that the modern world is so busy that her friends don't find time to come to see her as often as she'd like. And so serene is her presence and so delightful her personality that a little chat with Mrs. Ricketts is a real elixir.

The death of Mrs. Virginia Everett Ricketts occurred at her home in Huntington, W. Va. She had passed her 97th year. Mrs. Ricketts belonged to one of the old, staid, respected and noble families of the state. She was blessed with beauty, ~~xixixixix~~

intelligence, love for piety and a happy career through a long life. She was a member of the Johnson Memorial church, in Huntington, from which place her funeral was conducted.

NINETY-FOUR CANDLES ON HER BIRTHDAY CAKE. April 23, 1920.

"There will have to be more farmers--you can patch your clothes, but you can't patch your stomach."

Thus did Mrs. Virginia Everett Ricketts, celebrating her ninety-fourth birthday, sum up her opinion of the present economic situation to a Herald-Dispatch reporter who called at her home, 555 Seventh Avenue Friday night. Though Mrs. Ricketts is a living link between the present time and the days of the revolutionary war her interest in current situations is keen and acute and her discussions of contrasts between the present and the past, or her recollections, are highly interesting.

She remembers quite plainly when candles were the only means of domestic illumination, save in the more humble homes, where pine torches often served. She has had many birthday cakes, too, but yesterday was the first time she ever saw a birthday cake with candles on it. It was her birthday and her cake, with ninety four candles on it, cake and candles having been sent, with a letter of congratulation from Mrs. Thomas Hope Harvey.

Pinned on Mrs. Rickett's gown last night was the Bar of Honor, little gold souvenir sent by the Confederate Memorial Association, in token of the fact that she is one of the few remaining women whose sons followed Lee and Jackson. The pin was put in place by the tiny hands of John George Ricketts, the second great grandson.

The Rickett's living room, wherein Mrs. Ricketts sat last night, and yesterday, and received friends and relatives who called to offer congratulations, was a bower of flowers, many such

offerings having been received for the occasion. Mrs. Ricketts loved flowers, but it is probable that her deepest appreciation yesterday was the bunch of lilacs from the door yard of her girlhood home, on the Guyan River road, just above Guyandotte. There, in a house about to give way to the march of progress, Mrs. Ricketts was born, brought up, and married. Her father, Colonel John Everett, was many times a Member of the Virginia Assembly. He knew and numbered among his friends the illustrious Henry Clay, and one of his daughter's most interesting recollections is of having been presented by him to Mr. Clay in the parlor of Wright's Hotel in Guyandotte.

As a child and young woman, she often visited her great grand parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Everett at their home in the Teay's Valley. John Everett, the Elder, was a soldier of the Revolution. His grand daughter remembers him as having clung to the fashions of Colonial days, and wearing a broad brimmed hat and knee breeches.

Mrs. Ricketts has been a widow for more than sixty years, her husband, Dr. G. C. Ricketts having died in 1859. One son was killed in battle during the civil war. Another son, the late Lucien C. Ricketts, a distinguished soldier of the confederacy, and a prominent attorney of Cabell County, died a number of years ago. She lives with her three sons: George, Girard C. and Charles Ricketts. Her only daughter, Mrs. Rankin Wiley, of Point Pleasant, was unable to be with her yesterday.

Mrs. Ricketts was up yesterday morning at seven o'clock; and at nine in the evening she was still receiving callers. To inquiring friends she said she was not ill, though she always felt a little tired. However, she said, she felt that she could not

murmur, but must rather feel appreciative of her blessings.

To the fact that she has been able to regard, with serenity, the trials which beset her path, keeping cheerful through the years, she attributes her long life. The sunny disposition which has marked her entire life remains with her; for, at 94, she is an exemplar of a cheerful Christianity. Deeply spiritual, she she possesses the gift of imparting to her visitors something of her own joyous serenity. She enjoys company, and there is always a welcome for the friends who call at her home.

DRIVER EXONERATED IN TRAFFIC DEATH. 12/13/47

Charges against Kenneth McKay Reynolds, 26, of the 100 Block of twenty-seventh street, in connection with the traffic death Thursday of James Alexander Everett, 73, of Milton, were dismissed after a hearing before Magistrate Rex D. Connelly this morning. Squire Connelly said the charges were dropped because of "a lack of any criminal evidence or negligence". 

There seems to be considerable confusion in regard to John Everett, John Everett Jr. and their wives Sarah Dedman and Sarah Woodson. No doubt many of the discrepancies were brought about by the similarity of names.

John Everett was born February 20th 1753, died February 13th, 1845, married Sarah Dedman, daughter of Samuel Dedman who moved to Albemarle County in 1768. Sarah was born in 1755 and died in 1838. They first lived on the waters of Moore's Creek adjoining the old Lewis place, now known as Birdwood, Va. His second home was what is still known as the M.E. Parsonage. He laid out a town and called it Travelers Grove. He later changed this name to Pleasant Grove. In 1807 he and his wife Sarah came to Cabell County where they owned a large farm near Ona. John Everett, a revolutionary soldier, and his wife Sarah are buried on the South knoll of the old Everett farm at Ona, now W.Va. a gravestone marks their resting place. Their children were Samuel, Nathan, Peter, John Everett Jr. Sarah and Richard O. A copy of his will is of record in the Cabell County Court House, Huntington, W.Va.

John Everett Jr. born February 15th, 1788 in Albemarle County Virginia died 1871 at Guyandotte, Cabell County, W.Va. He married October 6th, 1808 Sarah Woodson daughter of Tarlton Woodson. Sarah was born September 1785 and died June 8th 1855. John Everett Jr. and his bride rode horseback through to Guyandotte on the Ohio River; this was the end of the old James Rive Turnpike. Colonel Everett, as he was called, was for several years in succession member of the Virginia legislation, member of the County Court and sheriff. He is buried on the old home place at Guyandotte, now W.Va. and his wife Sarah who died June 8th, 1855 lies beside him. Gravestone and markers are in excellent condition. Their children were Peter, Talton Woodson, John, Henry, Susan, Eliza, Caroline, Sarah, Mary and Virginia. Late in life John Everett Jr. married the widow Mrs. Russell. There was no issue to this marriage.

In connection with the above information you will note that each family had a son and daughter named John and Sarah.

Everett, and Peter Everett, and the said John Everett is the duly authorized Executor of the last Will and Testament of the said James Everett, deceased.

The first book from 1809 until May 3, 1814 was lost and cannot be found.

Dear Friend:

Glad you came again and hope you sometimes come for a long talk. I did not know there was any doubt about Sarah Woodson, but I am enclosing a copy of Cabell County records and also a map of the old Everett cemetery made in 1910. I at first thought I had the two two women switched; but after reading the C.C. Records again I think I have it right while Sarah Dedman is undoubtedly at the top of the hill at Ona there is no real proof of it as far as I know. She died in 1838 and Nathan in 1839 and John, Sr. in 1845 we know for a fact (See plat of cemetery) Burdett always said that a soldier of Rev. James Turley was buried on that hill; but we could not find any grave. While I think Sarah Dedman came out here with Col. John I expect most all her children were by S. Woodson and Talt was named after her people You will note that Samuel had a "D" in his name . This Dedman might have been HIS mother although I always thought that Peter and Samuel were the ones that never came out here.

In 1835 several well dressed Everetts visited at Ona, but but who they were has been lost. Mr. James Everett was then about 12 years old. H.C. Seckey of Guyandotte, my Uncle, said once that Peter owned where the negro home is now. I have no records of his and seldom go anywhere. I do not know if I could look those census reports in the Court House I could do more. If Sarah Woodson was the first wife, and had all the children I expect he had married Sarah Dedman, 2nd and came west with three or four children. Some

one drove her prairie schooner out here with his furniture; and it was most likely Nathan, he being about 12 years old at that time. He and his wife rode horseback, so it is said. Am also inclosing a copy of the Reece cemetery which I made in 1943. I would like to know where Mary E. was buried. As they lived on the Berkley place I expect she was buried by John Morris on Kilgore place at Morris Memorial hospital. This old burying ground has about gone out. Well, come in some time, and we will talk some more.

I, John Everett, Senior, of the County of Cabell and State of Virginia, being weak in body, but of sound mind and memory, thank's be to God for the same considering the uncertainty of this mortal life, to the end that I may be better prepared to leave this world whenever it pleaseth God to call me hence, do make this my last Will and Testament in the manner following, that is to say, First, I give and bequeath to my beloved wife, Sarah Everett, for the natural love and affection I have for her, all my Estate, both real and personal, to have the same for her proper use and benefit during her natural life, and, and after her decease it is my will and desire that it shall be disposed of in the following manner, viz: First, I give and devise to my son, Nathan Everett, my tract of land on which I now reside with all the appurtenances, for and in consideration of which he is to ^{pay} two hundred dollars, equalizing money, to my other heirs within four years after my said wife's decease.

Secondly, I give and bequeath to the lawful heirs of my son, ^{Richard} Richmond O. Everett, deceased, viz: Susannah Morrison, Lucinda and Nancy Ann Seventy-four Dollars each, and the residue of my Estate, both real and personal I devise and bequeath to my heirs, viz: John Everett, Jr., Samuel Everette, Peter Everetg, Sarah Dedman, wife of Elijah Dedman, and my grand-daughter, Elizabeth Love, wife of William Love, Jr. to be equally divided among them. It is further my will and desire that the legacy coming to my daughter, Sarah Dedman, shall be placed in the hands of my son, Samuel Everett, to be disposed of by him for the proper use and benefit of

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my said daughter, Sarah Dedman as he may think best so that so that it may not fall in the hands of any other person acting for her. It is further my Will and desire that my negro slaves should have the liberty of choosing their master

and lastly, I hereby appoint my son, John Everett, sole Executor of this my last Will and Testament.

In Witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and seal the 3rd day of October, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand, Eighteen Hundred, Thirty-two (1832).

Mary Velerlein was born near the French border, in Germany. When she was two years old her father and mother and a brother, Henry Velerlein. They visited James Alex. Watson and his wife. Peyton in New Orleans. Mrs. Watson was a daughter of Capt. Thomas West Peyton I and Agnes Dundas Peyton, dau. of John and Agnes Hepburn Dundas. They had a daughter Sophia Matilda Dundas b. Feb. 24, 1791, in Alexandria, Va., dau. of John and Agnes Peyton, married Thomas West Peyton I, Feb. 21, 1811, and died March 13, 1870, in Cabell Co. Buried at Blue Sulphur.

Sophia and Thomas West Peyton I had a daughter Ann Virginia Peyton, born in Alexandria, Va., 12-15-1811 and m. James Alex Watson of New Orleans. They were m. at Manzanillas, Cuba. Nov. 1830. Ann Virginia died Jan 15, 1870 in Cabell Co., buried by the side of her mother, at Blue Sulphur.

Aunt Virginia had a brother
Mr. Craven Peyton b. 8-5-13, ad
Alexandria, Va., m. Jeannette
Brodie 2-8-55 in New
York City. He was doctor on
board one of 5 Watson ships,
and was buried at sea.

Mrs. Watson (Mary Veterlein)
was b. in Germany near the
French border, spoke French
fluently, b. 10-31-1836, d
12-8-1904. She was adopted
by the family of James Alex
Watson in New Orleans. Her
parents were well off, being
wine merchants in ~~Vogau~~
Germany, no children. The
father and mother - Veterleins,
died of yellow fever, in
New Orleans, leaving a boy
Henry and a girl Mary.

The Watsons adopted both
and sent Henry to Heidelberg
to College, but the ship was
never heard from, and he
was lost at sea. Mr. Watson
d. about 1854. All the others
came to W. Va.

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and went through the Civil
War at the old Edwards
Armstrong house, near Blue
Sulphur. After the Civil War
Mrs. Watson, Mary Velerlein
m James Everett 1-15-1873,
and lived near Union Church,
near Millon, W. Va. ? and died
there in 1904, leaving three

Mrs. Watson was a Peyton of
New Orleans and was related to

She came again, in 1858, when she was 23. In 1873, she m. James Everett, at 37, and d. in 1904, at 68. Buried at Rice Cemetery.

James A. Watson was living in 1840.

In 1852, Mary Velerlein danced to the czar of Russia, in New Orleans.

The Watsons - 5 brothers owned 5 ships, each commanded by one of them.

Thos. West Peyton II was b. 5-13-1821, m. Sarah O'Hound, in New Orleans 2-3-50, and Jan. 1863, at Battle of Murfreesboro, Tennessee.

Ann Virginia Watson, at her death, made a will leaving all her ^{personal} property to Mrs. Mary Velerlein Everett, an adopted dau. of the Watsons, who had no children. (See the wills)

Mrs. Watson (Mary Velerlein) told me that when they left New Orleans. They left 4-5 mahogany high post beds, a dining room mahogany suite, a grand piano, two ware houses filled with Brussels carpets, (what was left of the carpenters was stolen by negroes ^{slaves}) They all went to Pennsylvania from the farm in Virginia (at Fredericks Hall - owned by Charles Swalls -

After Sophia Malinda Peyton and Ann Va. Watson, her dau, died Mary Velerlein Watson (Single) sent to New Orleans, money to New Orleans for Elizabeth Peyton dau. of Mrs. West Peyton I, to stay with her. She came here and lived with her. ^{Elizabeth} She married Frank (?) Peyton who with his bro. Thomas were raised by Mary Velerlein Watson (Widow) Elizabeth P. was dau. of the O'Hound woman J. W. Peyton 2nd (m. O'Hound) wrote here asking killed at Battle of Murfreesboro, (Jan 1863)

They were young.

He was b. May 13, 1821 in
~~his name~~
Sarah O'Dowd 1850, killed at
Battle of Murfreesboro.

Sarah O'Dowd of New Orleans
wrote here asking the diamond
cross. They sent it & it was
sold probably & was lost to
the family. Then she wanted the

at B'ville & probably used the
diamond cross for expenses

He disappeared (5/23/1848) from records. Rev. Edgar Woods, Albemarle County in Virginia
(Charlottesville, Va., 1901), p. 189 is the
account you have in mind.

adjoining the old Lewis place, the
present Birdwood. This place he
purchased from John Spencer in 1781,
and in 1788 sold it, and removed to
a farm near the Cross Roads, which he
bought from Joseph Claybrook. His
second home was what is still known
in the neighborhood as the old Methodist
Parsonage. Here he laid out a town
about the beginning of the century,
called Traveller's Grove, but it never
advanced beyond the sale of three or
four lots. When the prospects of the
town had lost their roseate hue, the
Colonel, as he was known, changed the
name to Pleasant Grove, and under this
designation conducted a tavern for some
years. He was somewhat of a sporting

The Everetts.

Col. John Everett was a Revolutionary soldier. He and his wife were said to have ~~been the~~ come to Cabell County, on horseback. They were the first of the Everetts to come to Cabell County, and settled on a farm, at Ana, near the mouth of Fudge Creek, about the year 1807. The first account we have of him is found in Rev. Edgar Woods' "Albemarle County in Virginia" p. 189. "John Everett was the first of his name to appear, in the county. At one time, he lived on the waters of Moore's Creek, on the place adjoining the old Lewis place, the present Birdwood. This place, he purchased from John Spencer, in 1781, and in 1788 sold it, and removed to a farm near the Cross Roads, which he bought from Joseph Claybrook. His second home is what is known in the neighborhood, as the old Methodist Parsonage. Here he laid out a town, about the beginning of the century, called Traveler's Grove, but it never advanced beyond the sale of

three or four lots. When the prospects of the town had lost their roseate hue, the Colonel, as he was known, changed the name to Pleasant Grove, and under this designation conducted a Tavern for several years. He was somewhat of a sporting character, raised fine horses, and had a training track on his place. He was twice married, first to Sarah, daughter of Tarleton Woodson, and secondly to Sarah, daughter of Samuel Hedman. In 1807, he disposed of his property and removed to Cabell County."

Col. John Everett was born Feb. 28, 1753, and died Feb. 13, 1845. He was buried in the Everett Cemetery, at Ona, Cabell County, West Virginia. The statement of Reverend Woods, quoted above, that he first married Sarah Woodson, is not correct. He never married Sarah Woodson at all. This can easily be seen from the fact that he was

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born in 1753, and the marriage
to John Everett to Sarah Woodson,
was ^{m.} in Oct. 6, 1808, and, at that
time, he would have been 55
years of age. He came here
before 1808, and had a
family, ~~at that time~~. His
son, Col. John Everett Jr., mar-
ried Sarah Woodson, in Albe-
marle County, Virginia,
1808. If any further proof
is needed, an examination
of the old Ricketts Bible, will
show that Sarah Woodson
was the wife of John Everett Jr.
Sarah Dedman was born
in 1754, and died Aug. 15,
1838. She was buried beside
her husband, in the Everett
Cemetery, at Ona.
