German Citizens.

There were many German and other nationalities, who settled in Cabell County, most of whom have descendants here to day. Among these, were Emil, ^{and Agnes} Telgener, who settled on Union Ridge, Valentine Leist, of Barboursville, August Wittke, a butcher, who lived, on Cyrus Creek, near the left fork of Louis Creek, He was about 80 years old when he died. The Telgeners came from near Mannheim, Germany. The Herrenkohls lived near Hall School house. Mr. Leist was a hard working man, and talked but little. He was a subscriber to the Folks Blatt, published, in Berlin. He sent them to the Herrenkohls, and they passed them on to the Telgeners, and other German settlers, all of whom spoke German, while their children used the English language. Mr. Leist came to ~~Barbours~~ Cincinnati, when he was seventeen, or eighteen. He was a Presbyterian, in Germany.

He didn't believe, in lodges. 2

The first of the Stowassers was Henry Stowasser, who settled, on Union Ridge. Henry Stowasser settled, in Barboursville, where he ran a store, on Center Street. He married ^{Side} ~~Side~~ ^{bottom} of Barboursville. She is living yet, with her daughter, on Main Street, near the Baptist Church.

Arnold Westhoff built the Tannery, later owned by Mr. Leist. Baker and Westhoff sold it to Mr. Leist.

Samuel A. McConkey was born March 3, 1864, in Roanoke County Virginia, son of James G. and Betty (Gourd) McConkey, who came to Roanoke Co., Virginia, from near Edenburg, Scotland, and settled, at Catawba, near Roanoke, or about sixteen miles from it. This was in the Shenandoah Valley, and only a few miles from Craig County. He d. April 8, 1941, at Salem Va., at 78 yrs, 8 mos, 5 days. His grandmother, Mrs. Priscilla Woods, brought him, and three brothers, John, Allen, and Samuel McConkey, uncles, from whom he was named. He died April 8, 1941, at 78 yrs, 1 mo, 5 days. His mother Betty (Gourd) McConkey, was one of three orphan children. The other two went to Missouri. She died when Dr. McConkey was about five years old.

Valentine Leist was born in Germany,
and died, in Barboursville,
about 1915, at 83 years old. He
married Nancy Elizabeth Weems, from
near Knoxville, Tennessee, where
they were married.

Philip Leist, brother of Valentine Leist, came to Barboursville, in 1868, but probably did not remain very long, but returned to Cincinnati. These German citizens often visited Mr. Leist, at Barboursville.

Livery Stables

By R. M. Cackley

Henry Thornburg ran the first livery stable, on the corner of the alley ^{opposite} where Brennan now has a grocery store, or where ^{is} restaurant now is. Parley Thornburg built the building, for a cattle barn. John Meadows and Tom Thornburg, Jr., bought it, and added about fifty feet, to the rear end, and ran a livery stable.

Mr. Meadows, later, purchased the building of Thornburg, and R. M. Cackley, got it from Meadows, and ran it for about eight years. He quit, about 1915. This was the last livery stable, in town.

Morris Nipps ran a two horse hack between Huntington, and Barboursville.

Mr. Cackley bought out John Meadows, in 1905, and ran the livery stable till Feb. 18, 1913, ^{and sold his horses} This was the last one, in Barboursville. The principal trade was telephone and traveling men.

Early Bus Line.

Joe Henderson ran a very early bus between Barboursville and Huntington. This was on January 1, about 1915. ~~Previous to this time, Joe Morris~~

Mr. R. M. Cackley also ran a bus continuously, until March 4, 1938, when he sold out to Herwood C. Wade

Peter Martin, a good colored man, ran a dray here.

Morris Nipps ran the first hack, I ever knew of, between Barboursville and Huntington. He quit, about 1906, but had run a hack, for a long time before that. I think he charged about 50¢, a trip.

The first regular scheduled bus line was run by Mr. Cackley from 1918, till 1938. It was a twelve passenger car. The fare was 50 cents. About 1920, he purchased a larger bus. He did most of his own driving.

Cecil Mounts, now deceased, owned the first automobile, ^{a Buick,} in Barboursville. He lived, on Center Street, adjoining the present post office, Mr. Frazier owned it later.

Mr. Cackley kept from ten to eighteen horses, and twelve or fourteen buggies of different kinds.

This Indenture, Made this the 7th day of July, 1848 between Philip Baumgardner and Mary Hart, all of the County of Cabell and State of Virginia, Witnesseth: That, whereas, a marriage contract is about to be entered into between The above named parties, it is therefore understood and agreed that between them that the said Mary does hereby relinquish all right, and interest of dower which she will be entitled to as the wife of the said Phillip, and that for and inconsideration of which the said Phillip binds himself to afford her, the said Mary, a comfortable support during his natural life, and at his death the said Mary is to have, out the estate of said Phillip, one hundred dollars in money, one bed and necessary bedding and bedstead, one cow and calf, one set of chairs, one table, and table furniture, one cupboard and cupboard furniture, one-half of the cooking utensils which the said Phillip may have at ~~his death~~ the time of his death, one sow and pigs, five head of stock hogs, five head of sheep, , one dozen hens, one hoe, one axe, and the said Mary is to have and retain everything which is hers at the time of entering into this contract.

And this contract now entered into between the said Phillip and said Mary is to have full force as a solemn contract between them. And in testimony whereof they have hereunto set their hands and affixed their seals the day and year above named.

James Baumgardner died in 1897, at 70 years, being born in 1807.

I lived in the home place 'til I was 22 years old.

Phil Dirton lived at Houchen place, a small frame.

Joe Wiley lived above Lue Baumgardner's.

Nan Joy lived at the Tom Barnett place.

Old James Cremeans lived above John Ad's, where Homer Baumgardner lives.

Charles Waugh lived on Merritt's Creek, above John Ad's, to the right, and up a hollow.

Joe Wiley did live at John Ad Bowen place.

Rev. David Ash lived at John Ad place before John Ad came there. He was Jack Ash's father, and Carrie Belle and a sister Jack, Pete and John's. Daniel was a Baptist.

I saw Wm. Collins buried. He lived in Low Gap, between Little 7 Mile and John Ads. His son was Enoch. Several children, Enoch, Aaron. I knew Zelpha Collins: she died before he did. I was a small boy when he died.

Jim Warden, a brother to Wm. Warden, lived up the main branch, where Henry Warden now lives. Last house at that time. Houchins came later. All first family are dead. I, Grant and Charley are living, so far as I know.

I stayed with an Uncle, William Baumgardner, in McLeansboro, Ill. His wife had died, and he married second, a girl that he and his wife had reared. He had no children by either wife. I think he married both wives there. He was blind, and she left him.

The Baumgardners.

Two Baumgardners, said to be brothers came, at an early date, to Cabell County, from Virginia. Their names were Jacob Baumgardner and Philip Baumgardner.

Philip Baumgardner made his will July 8, 1852. It was probated, in Cabell County, March 27, 1854. He ~~must have been~~ married twice, as he mentions "the child his ^{last} wife had after their marriage". He did not give the name of this child, but left it two dollars, in accordance with a contract with the same and divided the balance of his property among the nine children ^{by} his first wife. I ~~have not been~~ ^{found} able to find this contract, ^{in Deed Bk No.} hence have ~~no way of finding~~ the name of his second wife, Mary Ann Hart.

His first wife was Elizabeth Keister, his second as shown by contract dated July 7, 1848, was Mary Ann Hart. A deed shows that his first wife was living in 1834.

The Baumgardners.

It is claimed that the Baumgardners were Pennsylvania Dutch. Two brothers, Jacob and Philip Baumgardner came to Cabell County, about 18 . Philip settled in or near Barboursville. The exact date of his birth is not known. His tombstone on Peat Ridge, near the old Mount Baumgardner house, states that he died Feb. 27, 1854, at 76 years of age. The record of deaths, in Record Book No. 1 of Cabell County, states that he died on the above date, and that he was 74 years, months, and days old. He was a man of some prominence. He served as jailor for many years, at least from 1816 to 1828 inclusive, but possibly longer. He was indicted in 1825 for carelessness in connection with the jail, ^{& seeing prisoners} but ^{escape} nothing seems to ^{have} come of it for he continued to serve for the next three years. The record of his death states that he was born in Bedford Co., Va., and that his wife's name was Mary and that he had a son John.

However, his wife Elizabeth died Feb. 21, 1847, aged 60. She is buried beside him. His second wife came from Augusta County, and her father left her part of his estate, which, by agreement, went to her

Baumgardner - Philip

Three Baumgardner brothers, are said by tradition to have left Germany, about 1765. They were of the Hohenzollern line, and ruled over a principality there.

One of these brothers was the father of Philip Baumgardner, and tradition further says that he was one of the men who dressed as an Indian and threw the tea overboard, at Boston.

As stated Philip Baumgardner was born in Bedford Co., ~~West~~ Virginia. He came here from Staunton, Va., about 1812, and built his home on Pea Ridge. Later he came to Barboursville, and built his home on Guyan-dotte Street just west of the M.E. Church South. When the town lots were sold, he purchased several of them Nos. 2, 3, 4, & 5, near the ^{N.E. corner} of the Public Square beyond where Mrs. Kelley now lives on Center Street and it is presumed that he lived on one of them.

Jacob Baumgardner came to Cabell County in 1818, from a Pennsylvania Dutch settlement. (See Hist. of the Upper Ohio Valley, by Brant & Fuller)

He had a saw mill at the Falls of Mud.

He had a son, James Marion Baumgardner born March 21, 1829, at Doolittle's Mill, later known as Howell's Mill.

He served in Company E., 8th Va. Cavalry under General Jenkins, and was in the Battle of Cloyd's Mountain where Jenkins was mortally wounded. He lived in Barboursville nearly four years, from 1846 to 1849, then moved to Guyandotte and kept the Eagle Hotel for about four years. He then bought the other Hotel owned by Aaron (Orren?) Moore. Moore died in Guyandotte during the war (from interview with James M. Baumgardner about 1910.)

Henry Childers said: "Jacob Baumgardner came here as a miller, and ran the Howell Mill for a time My father worked there & repaired the mill and knew him. He came from Wythe Co. He was a cousin to James Baumgardner. I think he was a brother to Philip Baumgardner.

John B. Baumgardner, ^(Fatty) ran the old Merritt Hotel, ^{N.E.} corner of Main and Center Streets, where the late George E. Thornburg had his brick residence. It was one of the two most famous hotels in the town, the other one being run by Robert McKendree, and later by Evan Beune. He was well thought of - in fact, was quite a favorite with all classes of the community. He was not a descendant of Philip Baumgardner, but came from the Dutch settlement in Pennsylvania, thus making it appear probable that he was related to him and his brother Jacob Baumgardner. He married Louisa Baumgardner, a daughter of Philip, hence all his descendants are direct descendants of Philip Baumgardner.
