

## Open Educational Resources

- Anything instructional
- Free to use and distribute
- "Educational" is...subjective. All in the eye of the librarian
- "Resource" can also mean any medium that contributes to education









## Copyright is also a little subjective. Just a little

- Copyright protects intellectual property.
- There are some guidelines about what copyright infringement looks like
- Is the use for profit? How much are you using? Are you giving proper credit?











#### Is fair use as fair as we think?

- I see whole bunches of fair use overreaching from professors
  - Paywall protected PDF distribution
    - Chapter scans
  - PowerPoints without any citations
- Just because you declare that it's fair use doesn't make it true











## Copyright vs. Fair Use

### Copyright

- Professors get permission to distribute every semester<sup>1</sup>
- Photos, images, and graphics are protected
- Control Digital Lending<sup>4</sup>

#### Fair Use

- Professors can distribute one copy per student for only one semester<sup>2</sup>
- Screenshots fair use upheld by courts<sup>3</sup>
- Linking to free books through Amazon









## Fair Use and OER Similarities

#### OER

- Open Education Resources have copyright attached to them in terms of authorship<sup>5</sup>
- Creators waive their restrictions on distribution as a whole as long as they still receive credit<sup>6</sup>
- Allows for modification of materials, and you become a new author

#### Fair Use

- Fair use requires attribution to the author and source<sup>7</sup>
- Fair use is portions of materials that do not have copyright permissions attached in terms of distribution<sup>7</sup>
- Modification in terms of parody, commentary, and research are permitted<sup>7</sup>









## So...What's the big deal about OERs?

#### Fair Use

- Fair use cannot be distributed over and over again without permission
- Fair use alteration must turn the work into something new

#### OER

- OER has no limitation on distribution
- OER can be changed into whatever you need


