C. W. McNULTY, BUILDER, DIES

Veteran Contractor Erected Many of City's Important Structures

C. W. McNulty, 72 years old, for more than thirty years a prominent figure in the building contracting business in Huntington, died suddenly at his home in North Kenova, Ohio, late yesterday afternoon. Death was the result of a heart attack.

One of the leading contractors in the life of Huntington, Mr. McNulty directed the construction of some of the larger buildings in the city, including the Deardorff-Sisler building, on Ninth street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues. The brick building on the Hotel Frederick building was also done by his firm.

Built Big Plants

Some of the largest chemical factories in South Charleston and the plant of the H. R. Wyllie China Co., in Huntington, were among the important projects completed under the direction of Mr. McNulty. The first Huntington high school building, on the present site of Central junior high school, was also constructed by his firm.

Until a few years ago when he retired from active business, Mr. McNulty had been identified with the contracting business in southern West Virginia for 31 years.

Funeral arrangements had not been completed last night, pending the arrival of a son, Herman Leroy McNulty, who was in Decatur, Ill., on business, when his father died.

Born In Maryland

Mr. McNulty was a native of Laurel, Md.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Rebecca Gosnell McNulty, one son, Herman Leroy McNulty, of Huntington, four daughters, Mrs. C. S. Kane, Mrs. John Henry Rhene, of Fries, W. Va., and Misses Clara and Stella McNulty, of 2216 Adams street, one brother, H. B. McNulty, Atlanta, Ga.; and one sister, Miss Daisy McNulty, Laurel, Md.
