Whereas, by letters patent the Commonwealth of Virginia dated 12th day of February, 1786 there was granted to Philip and Janet More and William Lemke a tract of land containing 6998-1/4 acres and 21 perches situated in the then County of Montgomery, but now in the Counties of Mason and Cabell but mostly in Mason County which in said letters patent is described and bounded substantially as follows:

*base faulty*

*thence S. 38 W.*

Beginning at an ash & runneth <sup>E.</sup> 1058 poles and two links to a post and ~~dogwood~~ <sup>blackoak</sup> S 52 degrees, E 1058 poles and two links to the Beginning. And whereas 5590-1/4 acres of the said tract of land became forfeited to the said Commonwealth under the several Acts of the General Assembly thereof concerning western land titles, and whereas, by a decretal order of the circuit superior court of Law and Chancery for the County of Mason, made at the term of April, in the year 1841, the undersigned Commissioners of Delinquent and forfeited lands for the said County duly appointed & qualified, by and before the said Court, were required after having first advertised the same as ordered by law, on the first Monday in June then next, being the first day of the next general term of the Court of the said County to proceed to make sale of the 5590-1/4 acres of land, either in the aggregate, or in parcels by public auction to the highest bidder at the door of the Court House of said County requiring the purchaser, or purchasers of to pay one fourth of the purchase money in hand and give bond, with good security, for the payment of the residue thereof, twelve months after the day of the sale, reserving the title, as further security for the payment of

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the deferred installment but the rights and interests of occupying claimants, if any on the said land, to be reserved to them, respectively, under the provision of the said Acts. And, whereas, the said Commissioners, having advertised, as aforesaid, did on the said first Monday at the place, in the manner, & on the terms aforesaid, offer for sale Lot No.2, of 510 acres, part of the 5590-1/2~~22~~ acres of land so forfeited, as aforesaid, subject to the rights and interests of occupying claimants, as aforesaid, to him, John Bryant, being the highest bidder, became the purchaser thereof, at the price of 4-1/4 cents per acre, or of twenty-one dollars and 67 cents for the whole and has fully complied with the terms of the sale. And, whereas, by another decretal order of the said Circuit Superior Court of Law and Chancery, made at the term of September, in the year 1841, the said sale was confirmed, and the said Commissioners were directed, upon the payment of the deferred installment, to convey to the said purchaser, his heirs, or assigns, all the interest of the said Commonwealth arising under the said forfeiture in and to the said 510 acres of land, but without warranty, and subject to the rights and interests of occupying claimants, as aforesaid all of which premises will more fully and at large appear by the reports, orders, and proceedings made and had in relation to the said 6998-1/4 acres and 2 perches of land now remaining of record in the said Circuit Superior court of Law and Chancery in the book of record of land causes in Chancery. And, whereas, since the said purchaser, the said John Bryans, has departed this life and the administrators of the Estate of the said John Bryans, has paid to the said Commissioners the said deferred installment, amounting, together with

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the money paid in hand, as aforesaid to the sum of twenty-one dollars & 67-1/2 cents.

Know all men by these presents that we, Nathan Smith and George W. Strickling, Commissioners, as aforesaid, in consideration of the premises do hereby for, and on behalf of the Commonwealth of Virginia, convey to Jacob Bryan, William Bryan, Margaret Knight, wife of Henry Knight, formerly Margaret Bryan, Mary Casell, wife of Charles Cassell, formerly Mary Bryan, s Gabriel Bryan, Lawrence Bryan, & Nimrod Bryan, being representatives of the late John Bryan, dec'd all the interest of the said Commonwealth forfeiture, aforesaid, in the said Lot No.2, containing 510 acres of land being the same, more or less, which said Lot No.2 is bounded as follows: Beginning at a white oak, hickory and beech, a corner to No.1, thence with a line S. 85 degrees E. 46 poles to a gum and beech, corner to No.4, thence with Nos. 4 and 35 18 degrees East about 492 poles to a stake in the outline of the entire survey, corner to No.3, thence with said outline N. 52 degrees, W. to the line of a survey of 90 acres patented to John Harman, thence north-easterly with the lines of the same to the lower end of the said survey, thence still with the lines of the same south-westerly to the line of the entire survey; and thence along said line N. 52 degrees W. so far that a line bearing N 72 degrees E. will strike the place of Beginning containing as above, 510 acres, more or less. To have and to hold the said 510 acres of land hereby conveyed unto the said Jacob Bryan, William Bryan, Margaret Knight, Mary Casell, Gabriel Bryan, Lawrence Bryan, and Nimrod Bryan, their heirs and assigns forever, but this conveyance is without prejudice to the rights and

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interests of occupying claimants on the said 510 acres of land ,  
shewing themselves to be within the provisions of the said Acts  
of the General Assembly, and is without warranty, general or spe-  
cial, of the said Commonwealth, or of the undersigned.

All that certain Lot or Parcel of land situate, lying, and being on the south side of Little Guyandotte Creek, in in Cabell County, State of Virginia, being part of a tract of land containing 6998-1/4 acres and 21 poles patented to Philip and James More, and William Semple in 1786 and which part conveyed is bounded as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a white oak, original old corner to the 6998-1/4 acres, and 21 poles, standing on north side hill, near the top thence with a line of the said N 38 degrees, south 123 poles to, a black gum in a line of 400 acres patented to Thomas Hannan, on side hill; thence with a line of the 400 acre patent 16 degrees E. 102 poles to a to a small sugar and beech, near a branch and corner of aforesaid Hannan, thence with a line of same N. N. 60 degrees, E. 30 poles to a beech on N.W. side hill, corner to the said Hannan, thence with a line of the same N. 78 degrees 116 poles to a sugar and beech near a green corner of said Hannan, thence with a line of the

William Carroll and Nancy Margaret Carroll, his wife, Sarah Catherine Barker, Anne Bryant, Francis M. Bryant, and Chapman M. Bryant, by Lucien C. Ricketts, Special Commissioner, as hereinafter mentioned, parties of the first part; and Maurice Ellis Bryant, party of the second part, Witnesseth, that Whereas that by a certain decree made and entered by the Circuit Court of the County of Cabell, in the State of West Virginia, on the 3rd day of August, 1872, in a certain cause therein pending on the chancery side thereof, wherein the said John T. This Deed, Made this 6th day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand, eight hundred and sixty-nine between Strother J. Yates and Ellen, his wife, John William Yates and Julia, his wife, Jones T. Herndon, and Mary Ann Adaline, his wife, late Mary Ann Adaline Yates, Matilda J. Crawford, now a widow, late Matilda J. Yates, Mordecai A. Summers and Caroline F., his wife, late Caroline F. Yates, James C. Cox and Margaret, his wife, late Martha Yates, and Elizabeth Yates; the said Strother J., John W. Mary Ann Adaline, Matilda J., Caroline F., Margaret, Susan and Martha, being the children heirs at law and devisees of William P. Yates, deceased, and the said Elizabeth Yates, being his widow, and James T. Herndon and John W. Yates, Executors of the last Will and Testament of the said William P. Yates, deceased, of the first part, and James R. Burde and Elizath, his wife, late Elizabeth Ystes and also one of the children, heirs at law and devisees of the said William P. Yates, deceased, of the second part.

Whereas, the said William P. Yates, deceased, did by his last will and testament, among other things, devise and bequeath to the said Elizabeth Yates, then his wife, but now his widow, all his real estate, both real and personal, during her widowhood or natural life, and that after death the same should be sold by his creditors, and the proceeds divided among his said children, as specified in said will; and, whereas, the said William P. Yates has lately departed this life, leaving his said widow and said children herein named, his surviving; and, whereas the said William P.

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Yates died, seized of a tract of land hereinafter mentioned, and ~~wake~~ which by the terms of said will, belongs to his said widow during her life or widowhood; and, whereas, the said widow of the said William P. Now, Therefore, this deed Witnesseth: That for and in consideration of the premises, and of the further consideration of two thousand dollars, to be paid as hereinafter provided, the said parties of the first part have bargained and sold, and by these presents do bargain, sell and convey unto the said parties of the ~~second~~ part , their heirs and assigns forever, all that certain tract, or parcel of land lying and being in the County of Cabell and State of West Virginia, on Mud River, it being the same tract of land conveyed Esom Harmon to the said William P. Yates, bearing date the 24th day of December, 1833, and of record in the ~~office~~ office of the Recorder of Cabell County, in Deed Book "E", page 285, and for a more particular description of said tract of land reference is had to the said deed. But this conveyance is subject to the following deductions and reservations, to-wit: Fifty acres, which was sold and conveyed from the lower end of said tract by the said William P. Yates in

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his life-time to James P. Herndon which deed is of record in the office of the said Recorder. And one-fourth of an acre where the graveyard now is, which is hereby reserved, together with a right of way to pass and repass to and from the same, from the operation of this deed as a family burying ground, the residue of said tract of land is hereby conveyed to the said parties of the second part, being two hundred acres, more or less.

To have and to hold the said tract of land hereby conveyed with its premises and appurtenances, unto the said parties of the first part, their heirs and assigns forever.

And the said parties of the first part, for themselves and their heirs, hereby covenant to, and with the said parties of the second part that they will warrant generally, the property hereby conveyed. And the said parties of the first part do hereby reserve a lien on the said tract of land and premises hereby conveyed for the payment of two thousand dollars, the purchase money thereof with interest thereon, from the first day of April, 1871, and the like sum and interest on the first day of April, in each year thereafter until the whole of the said sum of two thousand dollars, with interest thereon, as aforesaid, is fully paid off and discharged.

Whereas, by a decree of the Circuit Court of Cabell County, Virginia, pronounced at the spring term, 1855, in the case of Washington Gwinn and wife against La Fayette Ball, et al among other things it was decreed as follows, to-wit: and it is further adjudged, ordered and decreed that the said Washington Gwinn and wife, and La Fayette Ball do prepare an apt and proper deed of conveyance or deeds of conveyances, with covenants of Special Warranty conveying, releasing and confirming to each other, as well as to the infant defendant, Hetty Ann Ball, Martha Ball and Jeremiah Ball, their interest to each other according to the metes and bounds abuttes set out in the survey and Commissioner's report and this decree, and upon the failure to do so. within twenty days from this date, that Henry J. Samuels, who is hereby appointed a Special Commissioner for that purpose do prepare a like deed on behalf of each of the adults, as fail to convey and that he also prepare a like deed for, and in the name of on the behalf of Hetty Ann Ball, Martha Ball and Jeremiah Ball, who are infants, confirming the partition set out in the surveyor's and Commissioner's report, inserting in such deeds, the boundaries of the several tracts of land hereby conveyed.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises, and and the further consideration of One Dollar the said Henry J. Samuels, for and in the name of and on the behalf of Washington Gwinn and Martha, his wife, La Fayette Ball, Hetty Ann Ball and Martha Ball doth hereby grant unto the said Jeremiah Ball Lot D containing 128 acres, and bounded as follows, to-wit: Beginning at an

ash, hickory and two poplars on the S. Bowen Plymouth was b. near Lyons, France, and came to the United States, as a soldier under Lafayette, in the Revolutionary War. When the great French general, so intimate with Geo. Washington, returned to France at the close of the war, about 400 of his soldiers chose to remain here, and among them was Bowen Plymouth. He left his wife and dau. in France, but they soon followed. The dau. became the wife of John J. Montague of Richmond, Va. His posterity still do business in Richmond, under the name of "John J. Montague Sons" Gov. Montague of Va. was a grandson of John J.

Among the children born to John and wife, the names of John, Anthony, William, and Hugh appear. As was customary with pioneer families, the brood included also five or six daus. two of whom n. Joel and Thos. Roe.

Joel and wife walked after their marriage to Kanawha Falls, and were employed by a man named Stockton. While employed there, they constructed a canoe and loader their very meager effects, they paddled down the Kanawha and Ohio, to Cairo, Ill. They ascended the creek, as far as possible and there established their new home.

The only child of this marriage couple, ~~of~~ born before marriage (which was not unusual with pioneers) was a son called Isaac.

They adopted a little girl called Lucy Glasscock, who visited the Pymales of Gallia Co., in the winter of 1865-6. Isaac Irion of Gallia county followed her to her Va. home and there married her. When last heard from, they were living on the old Roe homestead, back in old "Virginia"

Thos. Roe and wife came to Ohio, about 1827, and continued to live here. They were the parents of Neal, William and

The boy Isaac, lived with his 5  
grandfather, and was known as Isaac  
Peymale, He and his family lived  
in Boyd County, Kentucky, but moved  
to Arkansas, in 1872

When Giles Co. Va. was organized,  
Bowen Peymale became sheriff,  
and held the office for 35 years.  
In the year 1811, James Peymale

of again, until 1855, when his  
brother Hugh found him in  
Lille Rock  
Arkansas. John and Anthony  
went to Wayne Co. to reside,

Whether he ever reached Europe, or was thrown into prison, or secured his rights is not known. But the younger brother became the sire of the American Plymouths. to Giles Co. He pioneered cutting
