J. C. S. Miller engaged with Kilgore to excess in drinking. Kilgore, for reasons above, became involved for several thousand dollars which John S. Miller well knew. A guardian was appointed for Kilgore, at April term 1856, p. 95 of order book

John S. & E. S. Miller frequently visited & drank with Kilgore, at his house. & Kilgore dealt at Miller's store where they frequently invited him up stairs & urged him to drink with them.

Various debts were contracted, & executions placed in the hands

George F. Miller Sr., sheriff
at that time & bro. of
John G. & C. S. Miller.

That Kilgore's personal
property consisting of
a "family of valuable
negroes" - to \$3500 or
\$4000 in value, and
much stock, & these
could have been sold
for these executions
He had at least \$8000
worth of pers. property.

came to his house
and persuaded him
to execute a deed of
trust to M. S. Thorburn

pose (Kilgore to pay
the \$10000 + int. in 12 mos)

Prior to this — on Feb. 21, 1856, Kilgore conveyed 70 a to his dau. Elizabeth Kilgore, retaining stating she should not have the right to transfer same or any part of, in Kilgore's life time. The intention being to reserve a life estate for Kilgore & family. He remained on same until Spring of 1858, when he was dispossessed.

Elizabeth Kilgore m. Geo. W. Williams who with Elizabeth united in a conveyance to Geo. & Miller Sr. of the 70 a. while Kilgore was in possession.

The deed of trust was recorded before deed was made to Elizabeth, but her deed was first in the office of Co. Clerk. Thornburg & Millers knowing such.

The Court set the Case aside
because Kilgore didn't secure costs.

Dec. 7, 1857, Thornburg
adv. for sale said farm -
except the 70 acres & John
G. Miller purchased same
for \$10000. Then by
some sort of agreement
with Geo. F. Miller Sr., John
G. Miller bought the 70
acres at another sale
for \$2100, he having
notice that Elizabeth
was not to transfer same
in Kilgore's life time.

The claim of \$10000
debts was not correct
The Wilcher mortgage
didn't amount to \$3000
as interest was paid
to May 1856 The
land, at the time
was worth \$25000
Millers never furnished
Kilgore an amount
of the debts - nor to
the trustee. Land
was not advertised in

Bill Everett run the Tannery about where the old Everett home — the Tannery was below the house Page & Everett had a broker in Pittsburg & also in Cincinnati.

The pushboat men took back flour, meal, coffee, sugar, salt, lard & bacon. Page & Everett brought it by the ton. Push boats went back loaded full. This ended when

Tea, spices, salt, etc. went up. Salt was barrell salt.

Page & Everett owned the biggest store — a large 3 story building. Everything from up the river came to the wharf boat

Thomas C. Billups 100 acres in Teays Valley.

William Billups owned 800 acres in
Teays Valley on Big Hurricane Creek
which were Land Office Treasury
Warrants issued to him between
1812 & 1837.

John Billups & wife Margaret lived in
Lawrence Co., O. before going to
St. Joseph Co., Mich. While in
Lawrence Co. he sold to Thomas Billups
100 acres on Ohio River 1½ miles
below Guyan River which was
