My dear Mr. Lambert:

I wish to acknowledge your check, and thank you for it.

I am afraid that we are playing in a little hard luck.

There was a John Buckingham in Baltimore County, known as John Sr., but so far, I have not come up with John Jr.

I first checked the information that you sent, because I had never heard the name Prizzell, and knew many by the name of Frizzell which this name turned out to be.

The Baltimore County Marriage License Records, showed the license of John Buckenham to Rachel Frizzell, 19 March 1803, but the John showing on the Land Deeds with Benjamin, was married to a Mary.

At the Maryland Historical Society,  
I found among the Frederick  
County marriages, performed by  
the Rev. Burgess Nelson, 1801-1803,  
that the marriage of John Buck-  
enham to Rachel Fritzell took  
place the 31 of March, 1803.

So while the license was  
gotten, in Baltimore County, on  
the 19th of March 1803, the  
marriage took place on the  
31st in Frederick County.

I searched the Baltimore  
directories for your John, but  
he does not appear. I also  
searched the parish records of  
Frederick without results.

But one will of the  
Buckingham family appears in  
Baltimore before 1850. That was  
the will of Thomas Buckingham  
made 4 Oct. 1837, in which he  
names sons Amos, Isaiah, Samuel,  
Caleb, Edward, Joel, grand dau.  
Elizabeth Gardner, son Johnsey  
Buckingham, Exec.

Thomas Buckingham married Rachel Gardner, Sept. 21, 1785. I judge grand dau. Elizabeth Gardner was his daughter.

John Buckingham had  $95\frac{1}{2}$  acres of Buckingham's Goodwill, which he obtained by a mortgage from Henry Neff, in 1805. This, I think was John Sr., for John Sr. held that tract, as did Benjamin.

Nathan Buckingham married Micah Frizzell.

I have nothing more to report at this time, but will write to you again, before long.

Most of the Buckinghams of Baltimore came up from Anne Arundel County. There are lots of them, but your John's name is Buckenham, whether just a mistake of the clerk, I do not know. Sorry not to find more. The trouble is, if they went into Frederick County, then on to West Virginia, it is difficult to place them. Anyway will try again.

My dear Mr. Lambert:

I am sorry to have been so long writing, but I do have so much work, that I am delayed.

Don't worry about the name Frizzell, Prissell, Frigel, etc., etc., that name has been on the Maryland records, since the time of its settlement. First appearing in St. Mary's County, then in Anne Arundel and Baltimore. The family of Anne Arundel and Baltimore are the same.

There is no doubt at all that your John and Rachel are the Baltimore Branch of both families.

The Baltimore marriage records, not only show that John and Nathan married a Frizzell, but just about the same period, George Frizzell married Helen Buckingham.

So far, I have not placed their parents but hope to.

It was on the 21 of Feb. 1722,



that John Baker sold to John Buckingham of Anne Arundel County, "Baker's Delight" on the main falls of the Patapsco River (Baltimore Deeds JS # 8, p 165)

On 29 July, 1758, for 4 pounds sterling, Benjamin Buckingham sold to John Buckingham 66 acres of "Buckingham's Good Will", on which John Buckingham was living when he made his will in 1800 (Baltimore Deeds B # 8, p. 192.)

Benjamin Buckingham Sr., on Feb. 29, 1772, sold to William Buckingham 100 acres of Teague's Rambles, for 10 pounds.

Will of John Buckingham, made 15 Nov. 1800, leaves to son William Buckingham, "Buckingham's Good Will, where I now dwell, at death of William to go to William's eldest son, Levin,  $\frac{1}{2}$  acres of said land to be reserved for a burying ground." He also names sons Thomas, Bazel, dau. Aprillah Delphi,

dan. Hannah Delphie, dan. Ann Abbit,  
Will probated 3 Sept. 1800 (Wills  
Liber 6, p. 327) (No son John men-  
tioned)

Now, there was in Baltimore  
about this time, a John, who  
called himself John Sr. He had  
a wife Mary. He must have had  
a son John, or he would not  
have been John Sr.

In 1810, John Buckingham Sr.  
and wife Mary sell part of  
Buckingham's Good Will, but John  
Jr. does not seem to come on  
the records, so I judge it is  
because he and Rachel left  
Baltimore.

The Frizzells had land "Peach  
Brandy Forest, and Windsor Forest  
Corrected." John Frizzell died in  
Baltimore County, in 1798, leaving  
minor children, John, Newrod, Han-  
nah, Elizabeth, Anne, (\*) wife Han-  
nah. He may also have had older  
children.



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William Buckingham born 1744,  
died in Baltimore 1816. He left  
Ruth, Beale, Wrey, Joshua, Richard,  
and perhaps others. Here is a  
Ruth (Buckingham). Perhaps she  
is the one who married George  
Frizzell.

I didn't want to put off  
writing any longer, or I would  
have waited until I felt more  
~~secure~~ sure about the parents of  
Rachel, etc.

I searched the Frederick County  
marriage records, but did not  
find Elisha. I searched the  
deeds. Not there.

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Elisha Buckingham was born in Baltimore, Maryland, about 1804. Nothing is known of his early life except that his parents were James and Rachel Prizzell Buckingham, who were married at Baltimore, March 19<sup>31</sup>, 1803. Whether he had any sisters or brothers is a matter of conjecture. He came to Lewisburg, Virginia, about 1825, and married Ruth Daugherty, daughter of

The following depositions are taken this 6th day of April 1855 at my office in Lewisburg pursuant to notice to be read in the above cause depending in the Court of the County of Greenbrier on behalf of the defendant, Beirne & Co.

Toll Stephenson, a witness of lawful age being first introduced by Bierne and duly sworn, deposeth and saith:

QUESTION FIRST. Do you know when Elisha Buckingham absconded or left this part of the country for one of the Western States, if so, state?

ANSWER: I know he has left, but at what time I know not.

QUESTION, BY SAME: What his pecuniary condition about the time he left?

ANSWER. I discover from the executor's book . . . . .

Court Clerk's office that an execution.....  
office in May 1835, returnable 1st Monday in July thereafter in the name of Bias & Nesmith for J. A. North vs. E. Buckingham upon which execution I made the following return, to-wit: Nor property found liable to distress.

. . . . .

And further this deponent sayeth not.

John W. Dunn, being next introduced and duly sworn, upon oath sayeth as follows:

QUESTION BY BIERNE'S COUNSEL. Be good enough to answer ~~questions~~ the questions propounded to Joel McPherson.



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ANSWER: My impression is that he left home in the year 1840 or '41.

Mostly inclined to think it was in 1841.

ANSWER TO SECOND QUESTION: I know that he was much involved about that time--cant say that he was insolvent or not. I furnished him with some bacon and other property amounting to about \$70.00 which I could not get pay for;

QUESTION BY H. Erskine's Exrs: From the date of the deed of trust to the debt Bierne (August 1827) to the time of Buckingham's departure from this County was he not in possession of a large amount of property, such as wagons, Horses, plows, household and kitchen furniture and such like?

ANSWER: In 1833 and 34 he had two wagons and teams, cart, &c. and his home comfortably furnished and other property. My impression is that he held pretty much the same amount of property up to 1840.

QUESTION BY BIERNE'S COUNSEL: Was not the property of which you have spoken, encumbered by trust deeds, &c.

ANSWER: I am not informed whether or not.

QUESTION BY SAME: In addition to the trust deed filed in this cause in favor of Erskine & Co. and P. Bierne & Co. have you heard of another trust deed; and if so, in whose favor?

ANSWER: I have heard of none other until this morning except one to George M. Taylor. I have just heard it stated that Brown, North & Co. had a trust deed. And further he sayeth not.

James A. Frazier, a witness of lawfulness, being first duly sworn, deposeth and saith:

QUESTION BY BIERNE'S COUNSEL: Be good enough to answer the first question propounded to Josl McPherson.

ANSWER: He left this country in the fall of 1841 or winter of 1841 and 1842 is my impression.

QUESTION BY SAME: What was the pecuniary condition of Elisha Buckingham at the time he absconded or left the country, and for many years before he left--state particularly.

ANSWER: When he left this country he had no property here that I know of or could find but what was encumbered by deeds of trust and executions, and for several years before he left his property was in this condition.

QUESTION BY SAME: Were you not acting as Deputy Sheriff of the County before he left, and did you not, in that capacity, sell him out?

ANSWER: I was acting as Deputy Sheriff at the time he left, and I sold some few things under a distress warrant, but could not find near enough property to make the rent. I sold some of the property under an old execution due Julia Ott. All the other property was sold by another Officer who was entitled to sell, which I learned from reference to the Clerk's Office of this County.

QUESTION BY SAME: Do you know when Marcus H. Goshen, the Trustee in the trust deed in favor of P. Bierne & Co, left this country for Missouri?

ANSWER: He left here for the West in the fall of 1842, is my impression.

By H. Erskine, Exr.: State as near as you can the age of the Julia

Ott execution, and the amount made upon it. What other execution

ANSWER: I dont recollect the age of the Julia Ott execution, nor  
the amount of it or the amount made. I do not know if the  
other officer sold under an Execution, or was Trustee. I dont know  
the age or the amount at this time, but did know at the time of sale.  
The sale was not forbid by Mr.Bierne that I recollect.

QUESTION BY SAME: Was the sale forbidden by Brown, North & Co. or  
by Erskine & Co.

ANSWER: By Brown, North & Co it was, and I dont recollect by Erskine  
& Co.

QUESTION BY SAME: Do you know that the property sold was embraced  
in the trust deed in favor of P.Bierne & Co.?

ANSWER: I dont know. And further this deponent sayeth not.

QUESTION BY BIERNE'S COUNSEL: Do you know when Marcus H. Goshen the

ANSWER: In the fall of 1842 in the month of Sept. or Oct. of that year. He died in June 1853. He wrote often of returning to this place, but never did return. And further he sayeth not

THESE RESPONDENTS RESERVING TO THEMSELVES THE BENEFIT OF ALL EXCEPTION TO THE PLAINTIFF'S BILL FOR ANSWER THEREUNTO, SAY THAT IT IS TRUE, AS STATED IN THE PLTF'S BILL THAT THEIR TESTATOR, HENRY ERSKINE, DID OBTAIN FROM THE DEFT BUCKINGHAM A DEED OF TRUST UPON THE LOT IN THE BILL MENTIONED, DATED ON THE 7TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 1830, AND RECORDED IN THE CLERK'S OFFICE OF GREENBRIER COUNTY ON THE 12TH DAY OF SAME MONTH. THE DEED OF TRUST IS HEREBY EXHIBITED AS A PART OF THEIR ANSWER.

ON THE 18TH OF APRIL, 1835 THE DEF'T BUCKINGHAM SOLD THE LOT OF 34 ACRES TO THE SAID ERSKINE AND PUT HIM INTO THE IMMEDIATE POSSESSION THEREOF, WHICH POSSESSION WAS HELD BY HIM, THE SAID ERSKINE FROM THAT TIME DOWN TO THE TIME OF HIS DEATH AND HAS BEEN HELD BY HIS WIDOW EVER SINCE, CLAIMING IT UNDER THE TITLE BOND AFORESAID. THE TITLE BOND IS HEREWITH EXHIBITED AS PART OF THIS ANSWER.

THE SAID ERSKINE WAS TO GIVE \$700.00 FOR THE LOT TO BE PAID ON THE ~~DEBTS~~ DEBTS OF SAID BUCKINGHAM, AND THE LOT WAS TO BE CLEARED OF ALL INCUMBRANCES.

THE DEBT MENTIONED IN THE DEE OF TRUST OF \$1043. HAS NEVER BEEN PAID SO FAR AS THE RESPONDENTS KNOW, OR BELIEVE, EXCEPT SO FAR AS THE PURCHASE MONEY OF SAID LOT MAY DIMINISH THAT SUM.

RESPONDENTS SUPPOSE THAT AT THE TIME OF THE PURCHASE OF SAID LOT THE SAID ERSKINE HAD NOTICE THAT A BALANCE OF PURCHASE MONEY WAS DUE TO THE PLTF WHICH OPERATED AS AN INCUMBRANCE UPON THE LAND, AS NO TITLE HAD BEEN MADE. BUT THEY DO NOT ADMIT THAT

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THE SAID ERSKINE HAD EITHER ACTUAL OR CONSTRUCTIVE NOTICE OF THE DEBT DUE THE FIRM OF P. BIERENE & Co, AND INSIST THAT SUCH NOTICE, IF ANY, SHALL BE PROVED.

RESPONDENTS ARE INFORMED THAT THE DEBT TO P. BURNE & Co MENTIONED IN THEIR TRUST DEED WAS PAID TO THEM BY THE DEFENDANT BUCKINGHAM IN WORK, AND THEY FURTHERMORE RELY UPON THE LAPSE OF TIME AND THE PRESUMPTION OF PAYMENT AFFORDED BY TIME AS A PROTECTION AGAINST SAID DEBT.

TION OF THE SUM OF ONE DOLLAR TO THE SAID ELISHA BUCKINGHAM, IN HAND  
PAID BY THE SAID M. H. GOSHEN AT OR BEFORE THE ENSEALING AND DELIVERY  
OF THESE PRESENTS, THE RECEIPT WHEREOF IS HEREBY ACKNOWLEDGED; HE THE

BIERNE & CO. NEVER ACQUIRED ANY RIGHTS UNDER THE ACCEPTED ORDER DRAWN BY BUCKINGHAM IN THEIR FAVOR UPON NORTH. THEY NEVER GOT POSSESSION OF ~~THE LAND~~ EITHER LAND OR TITLE, AND THEY CLAIM NOTHING UNDER IT IN THEIR ANSWER.

Dear Sir:

In reply to your letter of Jan.30th, I am only glad to state herei  
in the history that I have of my father's family.

Elisha Buckingham, Sr. (My grandfather) Came from England ( I do not know at what age) and settled in Virginia. Later, he went to the State of Kentucky; then to West Virginia. He resided at White's Cree k, W. Va. at the time of his death. I understand that he married four times, but I do not know who his various wives were.

I only know that my that my father's mother's (his fourth wife) name was Hoosier.

If I remember correctly, I've heard my father say he married once in England, before coming to America.

There is a Buckingham County in Virginia. The County seat of said county is also named "Buckingham". I've often wondered if my grandfather settled there, and thus the County was named.

My father, Elisha Buckingham, Jr. was born at White's Creek W. Va. October 23, 1864. His mother died, leaving him an orphan at the age of seven, his father having died three years earlier. His father's death occurred at White's Creek, W. Va. ( I do not know the date). His mother later moved, with her family, to Maysville, Ky., where she lived until her death. She was married three times, having married a Mr.Faulkner; after his death a Mr.Herbert, before she wed my grandfather. ) I presume you have gotten this information though--if you saw my Uncle, John Herbeert at Canton,Ohio)

After my grandmother's death her son, William Faulkner took the three small children, Elisha, James and Thomas to West Virginia



(White's Creek), where they found homes with friends.

My father was reared in the home of George and Jane Johnson; they were very generous, and he was given a good education. He attended the public school at White's Creek; later, the Oakview Academy at Wayne, W.Va. taught by Prof. T. B. McClure. He began teaching at the age of eighteen in the public schools of Wayne County, and he taught for forty-five years before retiring. He married Nettie Moore (Daughter of G.W. and Martha Moore) October 17, 1888. To this union was born four children: Georgia (now Mrs. C.W. Booten), Olive, myself, Russell, and Mary, (now Mrs. Virgil Aker), and all of whom are living.

I am sorry I do not know who Andrew J. Buckingham's mother was: I only have a record of his death--which occurred April 27, 1882.

Mr. Dan Smith was my husband's father. His mother's maiden name was Staley (Beulah Staley). We have no record of when, or where they were married. However, this was his second marriage. We know not who his first wife was. (You could get this information from Dock, or Bud Smith, his children by the former marriage. Dock lives near Dickson in Wayne County, and Bud somewhere near Wayne.

Curtis doesn't know his grandfather and grandmother Staley's name. They moved West soon after his mother was married, and he never saw them. His paternal grandparents were Jack and Jane Smith, she being Jane Hazelet before marriage.

Dan Smith was the father of thirteen children, there being five by his first marriage, as follows: Bud, Dock, Fanny, Ella and Mahala. To the second union were born eight children, as follows: Clara, who died in infancy, Curtis, William, Anna, (now Mrs. J.L. Sprecker), Frank, Clyde,

and Pete )Pete died in infancy).

I am sorry I haven't got records of the generations further back.

I trust you will pardon my delay in writing. Our boy who had been overseas for more than two years, returned shortly after your letter came; and there was too much excitement, joy and tears for me to concentrate.
