Madame Marie Therese Clotfield Gardner, nee Raison de la Geneste was born at Bordeaux, France, August 25, 1786. Her father, Marquis Louis Marie, a de Raison de la de la Geneste had inherited some coffee plantations and negroes in the West Indies, and had come in 1798, with his wife and three children to look over his new possessions. Pleased with the new country he decided to go back to France, settle up his affairs and return to Santo Domingo to reside permanently. Leaving their children, Marie Antoinette, aged 11, Marie Therese Clotfield, aged 13, and Louis, aged 9, in care of some American friends, Monsieur and Madame Raison de la Geneste sailed for France, where they remained for some time, and were just ready to return to the West Indies when the Marquis died suddenly.

Joseph Gardner, born in Boston, Mass March 17, 1774 had graduated in law from Harvard; but his ancestors had been seafaring men, and, as he said, it was in his blood to follow them. Law did not appeal to him, so, having money, he bought a ship and sailed to the West Indies in 1798. His cargo was consigned to the Commission House of Wilberforce & Company. Mr. Wilberforce was from Boston, and Joseph Gardner became a guest in his home, and there met Marie Therese Clotfield Raison de la Geneste and fell in love with her. She refused to marry him without the consent of her parents, so he went on to France to ask it. Arriving there, he found that the Marquis Raison de la Geneste had died, and that Madame Raison de la Geneste was more than anxious to return to her children; so they returned together, and Madame Raison de la Geneste were married in Santo Domingo in 1799. Do not know the day, but the bride was only 14 years of age. The widow and her children

then became the heirs of the coffee plantations and eight hundred negroes. Joseph Gardner, a lawyer by profession, and with practical New England ideas, became a great help to his mother-in-law in adjusting her affairs. The outlook was promising, when suddenly the negroes rebelled over the island, made one of their own color the Emperor and put to death many of the whites. Fearing their own slaves, as well as the others, the family left their home and took refuge in a more secure place, waiting all the time for a chance to escape. Finally, after many harrowing experiences, they managed by the help of some faithful slaves, to get on a boat owned by the Girards of New York, and in that way, came to Boston. Madame Raison de la Geneste did not stay very long there, but went on to New Orleans to join her younger daughter, Marie Antoinette, who had become Madame Fortaine de Chaussenelf. The son, Louis, remained in Boston, but as soon as his mother was settled in New Orleans she began urging him and the Gardner family to come there. After some time, several years, they decided to go. Arriving at Pittsburgh, they thought there would be no trouble in reaching their destination. They took a boat, and got as far as Wheeling, but the river was so low that the boat just dragged along ; and after days and days spent in coming from Wheeling to Greenupsburg. Ky. it had to lay up and wait for rains to raise the river, but it was midsummer and no rain came. Soon after landing at Greenupsburg, Madame Gardner took typhoid and was ill for several weeks; and by the time she recovered her family had become a part of the little village, and they stopped there for a time. Later, Joseph Gardner and family moved to Guyandotte about 1820, and afterwards to Barboursville, where Monsieur and Madame Gardner spent the

rest of their days. Owing to their long wanderings and illnesses, all the money was used up. As soon as he could arrange to get some more money Monsieur Gardner went to France to gain indemnity for their losses in the West Indies. He was promised payment and returned home, expecting the pension to follow shortly, but months passed, and no money came in; so he made a second trip to France. This time he was successful, and from 1835 to the time of their deaths the pension came to them.

Madame Gardner used very little of it for herself, as she was always giving "The Cup of Water" in a substantial way to some one, especially foreigners, for she said that she never forgot that she had been a stranger in a strange land. She had been raised a Catholic, but became a member of the Methodist church at Barboursville and as she had been baptized in France, the Methodist church accepted it, and did not rebaptize her. A child of the Nobility and used to every luxury in her young girlhood, it was marvelous how she bore all the hardships and privations and remained young at heart beautiful and typically French to the last. She died at Barboursville April 17, 1854. She was the mother of eight children: Evelyn, born at Santo Domingo, married Dr. Green, of Greensburg, Ky. George, Benjamin, and Harry all settled in Kentucky. Emelie became the wife of Absalom Holderby. Eliza became the wife of William C. Miller. Hamilton went to New Orleans and became a rich man in plantations and negroes, but lost everything in the civil war. One daughter, Elizabeth Gardner Vonnord, lived in Oagka, Miss. Another daughter, Clotilde Inilll, lived at Ocala, Fla

Joseph Gardner died at Barboursville June 27, 1855. He and his wife are buried in the old cemetery there.

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When Monsieur Gardner returned from his first trip to France in regard to the indemnity he brought back the wedding gowns, and other finery for his daughters Emelie and America. They were Josephine gowns, of mousseline de Svie , "Embroidered" The second time he returned he brought Emilie and America each, an Alabaster clock. They were married, and housekeeping. The one belonging to Emilie, (Mrs. John Samuels) is owned by Mary Miller Nebel. The one belonging to America (Mrs. Absalom Holderby) is owned by her granddaughter, Mrs. Jennie Laidley, of California, and Joseph Gardner's diploma and Masonic apron is owned by Lee A. Miller, of Detroit, Michigan.

Added by Thomas E. Miller, as told to him by his father:

He never gave the exact year Joseph Gardner moved to Barboursville from Guyandotte. When he first came to Barboursville he opened a Stage Coach Inn in what was later the old Baumgardner Hotel, located on the corner of Main and Center Streets where the Poindexter Apartment now stands. Do not know just how long they lived there, but for some time. Louis Raison de la Geneste returned to Santo Domingo and gathered together a shipload of sugar and coffee. I do not know just where it was to be secured--if from the plantations they had left or as a merchant, and sailed to France to sell it. It was supposed he was poisoned, as he died right after eating dinner. That was why Joseph Gardner went to France to collect indemnity for the cargo. This indemnity amounted to about \$50.00 per year.

DEED.

This Deed, Made this 7th day of March, 1904, between I.E. Gates, Special Receiver of the Central Land Company, of West Virginia, and I. E. Gates, Special Commissioner, parties of the first part, and the Huntington Land Company, a Corporation created by and existing under the laws of then State of West Virginia, party of the second part.

(Whereas, heretofore, The Central Land Company of West Virginia, a Corporation created by and existing under laws of the State of West Virginia, had acquired by purchase a large tract of land lying on the Ohio River, immediately below the mouth of the Guyandotte River, containing 364 acres, more or less, a tract of land lying on the Kanawha River, at St. Albans, above the mouth of ~~the~~ Coal River, containing 230 acres, more or less, a tract of land at Hurricane, Putname County, containing 167 acres, more or less, a tract of land known as the Dickinson farm, on the Kanawha River, near the mouth of Field's Creek, , containing 577 acres, more or less, and a tract of land in Summers County containing 92 acres, more or less, and had laid out the land into streets, avenues, alleys, lots, and blocks, incorporating the land in Cabell County as the City of Huntington, and the land at the mouth of Coal River on the Kanawha River, as the town of St. Albans, the land at Hinton, in Summers County, as the town of Hinton, the land at Hurricane, Putnam County, as the Town of Hurricane, and still owns the Dickinson farm in Kanawha County, subject to the right of waythrough the same

heretofore sold to the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway Company.

And, Whereas, after the purchase of said property by various conveyances and contracts, and title bonds to make conveyances were made by the Central Land Company from time to time, out of the said holdings of the said company until the 16th day of December, 1890, when the Corporation being about to expire, a suit was instituted in the Circuit Court of the United States for the District of West Virginia, in the name of C.P. Huntington, and others, stockholders, against the Central Land Company of West Virginia . for the purpose of winding up the Corporation, of which suit the stockholders in the Company had notice, and in which C.P. Huntington was appointed Special Receiver, and after the appointment of C.P. Huntington, Special Receiver, various sales were made by him as such up until the time of his death, when by proper order entered in said cause, I E. Gates was appointed as Special Receiver, in room and place of the said C.P. Huntington, and various conveyances were made by him up to, and until the 5th day of June, 1903, at which time the said I.E. Gates, as Special Receiver, agreed to sell and convey all of the property belonging to the Central Land Company of West Virginia, or the said C.P. Huntington, Special Receiver, or I.E. Gates, Special Receiver of the said Company to the Huntington Land Company in consideration of the sum of \$340,000.00 and the assumption of certain liabilities of the said The Central Land Company of West Virginia, growing out of the suit of John B. Laidley against the Central Land Company of West Virginia.

And, whereas, after the said contract of sale was made, the same was approved by the Circuit Court of the United States for the Northern District of West Virginia, in which Court the suit of I. E. Gates, Special Receiver, , and others, against the Central

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Land Company, and others was then pending on the 1st day of July, 1903, and The Huntington Land Company directed to pay over the balance of the purchase money to the said I.E.Gates, Special Receiver; and, whereas, after the said decree was made, the said Central Land Company, through I. E. Gates, its Receiver, jointly with the Huntington Land Company, sold and conveyed certain real estate to various purchasers thereof, including all of the property at the Town of Hinton; and, whereas, after this done, the said The Huntington Land Company paid in full the amount due on its purchase to the said I.E.Gates, Special Receiver, and on the 1st day of March, 1904, a decree was entered, confirming the said sale and vesting all the title of the Central Land Company of West Virginia in all of its property in West Virginia in The Huntington Land Company, and directing a deed to be made therefor to the said, The Huntington Land Company by I.E.Gates, Special Receiver of the Central Land Company of West Virginia, and also as Special Commissioner for and on behalf of the Central Land Company of West Virginia, conveying to and vesting in the Huntington Land Company according to the said decree, all of the holdings of every sort and description of the Central Land Company, of West Virginia, in the land at Huntington, Cabell County, Hurricane, Putnam County, St. Albans, Mingo County, , Hinton, Summers County, and at Field's Creek that is known as the Dickinson farm in Kanawha County, and elsewhere in either, or all of said Counties, save, and except such parts thereof as the Central Land Company, or its Receivers might have sold and conveyed, or agreed to sell and convey, as shown by the records of the Central Land Company and its said Receivers and of the various Counties in which the land was situated).

tian van Doorn. He was born at
Utrecht, Holland July 23, 1824, and was

 later moved to Oua.

 Church South before the Civil
 War (about 1858), and was a
 steward in his home church for
 more than 35 years. He was mar-
 ried twice.

Some years ago Frank L. Burdette copied from the notes of his brother, William A. Burdette, a sketch of Peter White. From this, I gather the following:

Peter White was born in Utrecht, Netherlands (Holland), July 23, 1824.

In 1838 he was persuaded by a sixteen year old neighbor boy to join the navy at Amsterdam. The latter boy forged his parent's consent to this undertaking. In 1840, after two years of drill, he went to Gibraltar. He also went to Naples and Tunis. When he became seasick after a week or so he would have given the world to return home.

The expedition of which he was a member was after money due Holland from Turkey. When a fleet of French ships (allies of Turkey) arrived an escape was made to Malta after a two week's stay. They remained in the vicinity of that island until 1844, when they returned to Holland.

Upon the expiration of his enlistment about this time, he came on an expedition to New York city. One Sunday evening he deserted with John Bazez, coming to shore, under some pretense, with the Captain. The friends were hidden from the officer of the ship by a boarding master, who placed them on the fourth story.

Peter White then went to the West Indies in another ship. When the vessel sprang a leak he went ashore in an unknown town that was afire. He received \$10.00 to rescue a marble mantel.

The ship was then put on the docks at Charleston, South Carolina, and Peter was discharged.

He enlisted on a ship gathering rice along the rivers at twenty dollars to twenty-five dollars. Next, he enlisted on a ship bound from Charleston to Liverpool. On this trip someone got into

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his chest and stole \$130.00, his watch, and a silk handkerchief. A mesmerist described the man who stole them, stating that he (White) was out after a meal at the time. The rogue denied any guilt, and took passage to Baltimore. (This was learned from the same mesmerist in a second interview.)

Peter White, whose original name was Peterus Christian Vandoren then returned to New York city, where he had a millionaire Uncle (his father's brother).

White's wages per month on a war vessel were sixteen to twenty guildens, (the Dutch silver coin called a gulden, also called guilder and florin, is worth 40.2 cents. He once mentioned on account of tainted meat and molded bread, and because of the Captain's trampling a leader under foot.

He went to Calcutta on an American vessel, but left on account of the drunken Captain shooting among them.

He was bitten on the middle finger of his right hand by a shark just drawn up on the deck.

In 1849, he went to New Orleans. In the same year he came to Cincinnati. He met a person by name of Dusenberry, who lived near Barboursville on Guyand River, and came home with him.

He was hired for a year at eight dollars per month. At the end of a year he went back to Cincinnati for John Bosee. He found that his sweetheart in Cincinnati had married. John Bosee stayed at Dusenberry's one year; then he went back to sea, in 1851.

White worked about ten months on Guyan River locks and dams. Then, in 1852, he came to run Ambrose Doolittle's water saw mill. In 1855, he married Mary Blackwood, who died of cancer, in 1875. Elisha McComas officiated at this marriage. White's only daughter, Emma, died of tuberculosis in 1878.

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From 1855 to 1857 White lived in Barboursville, running a saw mill for W.C. Miller. In 1858 he ran C.L. Roffe's farm, He then came to Howell & Switzer's mill. He bought an interest in this mill in 1872, and ran a saw mill there until 1882. In 1878, he married Lucy Gwinn Rece. He sold his interest in this mill on or about 1882, but worked some in it until about 1884. He lived in his home until 1856, under recommendation of C.L. Roffe and H.J. Samuels.

"On July 6, 1936, your office made inquiry as to the living relations of Peter Christian van Doorn, born at Utrecht on July 23, 1824. We have been informed that the names of these persons, which were compiled some time ago, have not yet been forwarded. The family has paid the costs, and herewith I send you the list. Please advise me of the name of the person in the United States who requested the data.

Your letter of the 2nd requesting data on Goodwin family. I will send you my line from about 1500 which Dr. Wm. Hugh Goodwin lost in civil war and came from King Harold-Godwin II.

There are now known fourteen generations nine in America. I am sending you the nine in detail.

J. C. Goodwin, my father, came to Cabell County in 1873 the first telegraph operator at Milton on the C & O., relieving Joseph Killgore, Agent at that time. Joe was not an operator.

No other Goodwin in Cabell County is any near relation that I know of. I have much more data of these other Goodwins of Major James' generation.

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GOODWIN.

The Goodwin family started in England about the year 1000, A.D. The tradition in our family is that Canute about this time had come to England after the death of his father, Sweyn in order to take the Government of England over as King. As he and his brother were walking by the side of a river (supposed to have been the Severn) near the mouth, Canute's brother fell in the river and was in danger of being drowned, when young Godwin, being near herding some cows (and was called the cowherd from this) came to his rescue, and after some time got the King's brother out. Canute was much pleased, and gave young Godwin an office (I think he was a J.P.) He, however, kept his eye on him afterwards and gave him several more places in the army, &c. until in 1020 he commanded the entire English army. He saved Canute and his army in 1025 in Sweden, and shortly after married Canute's sister, Thirra, 1019 and had nine children--Edith, Swain, Harold, Tostig, Gurth, Leofwin, Woolnoth, Gunhild and Elgiva. Canute died in 1035 and Godwin, made Earl, governed long in England under several Kings.

He put Edward the Confessor, on the throne and married him to his daughter, Edith, and Edward invited the Norman William to succeed him and banished Godwin and his family to Denmark. In two years Godwin appeared before London with four hundred ships, and the English army said they would not fight; so Edward said he would allow the Earl to come back and live as ever. He invited them to a banquet about one year afterward, and Godwin fell sick at the banquet table and died four days afterward, of poison, April 15, 1052. He was buried at Winchester in old church.

Edward, the Confessor was then King until Jan. 5, 1066, when

he died and was buried in Westminster Abbey, which he had just completed. Edith was afterward buried by his side, 1075. As he left no heir the Wittengamote or Great Council, conferred the crown on Harold, who was at that time Commander-in-Chief of the English army. 108

Harold married at this time a sister of Mörker and Edwin (two chiefs of England, Algeth by name. He also had a common-law wife, Edith Swanneshals and at this time had several children Godwin, Edward and Magnus, Two sons by Algeth, Harold, Jr. & Wulf, died a baby. Edith also had two daughters, Gunhild and Gytha, by Harold.

Gytha went to Denmark, where she Vladimir Czar of Russia, and was married to him, and lived at Kieff, in Southern Russia. They had one son, Harold Msißslave had two daughters, Malfred and Ingebard, who married the King of France, and Sweden. All descendants of Earl Godwin, of England (Freeman's History of Norman Conquest Vol 123 & 4)

Earl Godwin's father was Wulnoth & lived in Gloucestershire, near the Severn River. Earl Godwin's brother, Aelfurg, fought at Battle of Hastings (Vol.3-428, Harold began to rule as King all England, but did not have time to do much. In the fall of 1066, the Norweigians landed on the coast and Harold fought the Battle of Stanfordbridge Sept. 25, 1066. On the 28th, three days later, William of Normandy landed on the south of England, and Harold marched south to meet William with what was left of his army and on Oct.14, 1066 (Harold's birthday) was fought the Battle of Hastings and Harold was killed in battle. Aelfurg, Harold, Gurth & Leafwin were all killed in this battle. 60,000 men lay dead on the field of battle Not a prisoner was taken.

- Goodwins in England -

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According to a record of Goodwin, back to the Battle of Hastings, kept by Dr. Wm. Hugh Goodwin, of Louisa Co., and Richmond, Va. and lost in the war between the states, in 1861, he had a record of all Goodwin descendants from Harold, 2. The record as now known, ~~xxx~~ starts about the time of Columbus (1492) and comes down fourteen generations.
