Biographical Notes:

George Hechler was born in Schwaigern, Germany, and came to America in 1854. He settled in Marietta, Ohio, and enlisted in the 36th Ohio Volunteer Infantry Regiment of the Union Army in Parkersburg, West Virginia, then Virginia. He fought in a number of engagements and was wounded at Antietam. His younger brother, John Hechler, fought in the same regiment and was captured at Chickamauga and died in Andersonville prison in Georgia in September 1864. Both had an older sister, Kate, to whom George is writing. After the Civil War George moved west to Missouri and settled in Dalton in Chariton County where he operated a large farm. George Hechler is the grandfather of Kenneth Hechler, West Virginia representative and secretary of state for decades.

Four officers and 136 enlisted men died in battle or of wounds, and 163 of disease before being mustered out on July 27, 1865.

Scope and Content:

This collection is primarily composed of letters from George Hechler to his sister Kate Hechler during his service in the 36th Ohio Volunteer Infantry in the Civil War. The letters discuss George's experience in the Civil War, covering camp life at Parkersburg and Summersville, to the battlefields of Lewisburg, Antietam, Chickamauga and others. All letters include typescript transcriptions of the text in separate folders, and one letter includes a piece of printed ephemera as an enclosure.

Also included in this collection are three Civil War era envelopes kept by Kate, a single letter to Kate from Jacob Salat regarding her brother's death at Andersonville prison, discharge and promotion documents for George, one letter from John to Kate, and typescript copies of articles published by Ken Hechler in The Parkersburg News regarding the letters sent from George.

Additionally, one folder of four additional letters and envelopes from John and George to their family was found misplaced in accession 0777 of the Ken Hechler papers and added to this collection.
