Dear Mr. Lambert:

I have gotten the pension record of your grandfather which is shown below. The cards in the folder are not in chronological order and I will not attempt to order this record, but copy it as I read it.

John H. Lambert, Corp., Company G., 1st Ohio Vol. Heavy Artillery. Form dated July 28, 1890 when he was 64 years old, a resident of Center Township, Monona Co., Iowa, Castana, P. O. states he enrolled July 17, 1863 in Company G., 1st Regiment. He was honorably discharged at Knoxville, Tennessee July 25, 1865. He has kidney and heart disease and general disability. Nov. 23, 1893, he states that he was 37 years old at enlistment and was 62 as of February 26, 1891. He filed under Act of June 29, 1890 but his disability was not considered a ratable degree.

Application for pension filed May 17, 1894 states he was then living at Winnebago, Thurston County, Nebraska.

In March 1897, he filed again when living in Castana, Monona County, Iowa. He claims heart disease at this time.

Medical Referee signs slip September 21, 1897 and says patient should be examined for deafness, diarrhea, kidney and heart disease and general disability and partial paralysis.

Affidavit files April 5, 1893, age 66 years, gives address Monona County, Iowa. He states at one time that he lived in a number of places but all in Monona County, Iowa.

He states he enlisted June 17, 1863 for five years. During the five years before that he lived in Bates County, Missouri, Lawrence County, Ohio, Gallia County, Ohio, and was a farmer. Since his discharge he has resided in Gallia County, Ohio in the Fall of 1865, then to Lawrence County, Ohio and in 1869 to Iowa about April 5.

He was able to perform two-thirds of a day's work until 3 years ago and since then has not been able to follow his occupation of farmer. Another statement says he was mustered out and returned to his home Walnut Ridge, Ohio for one month then to Aid, Ohio for three years, then to Macedonia, Iowa for 16 years, then to Moorhead, Iowa, Soldiers, Iowa, Mapleton, Iowa, and Castana, Iowa his present address. Most

of these places were in Monmouth County, Iowa. He claims the attack began during the march from Covington, Kentucky to Nashville, Tennessee. The deafness was caused by a shell bursting at Hartsoga River, Tennessee. He has had many periods of being disabled from one day to one month and for the last two years has been totally disabled. (March 18, 1892)

November 15, 1895 he was living at Pileole, Monmouth County, Iowa. His claim was rejected because no reliable disability is shown. September 4, 1897 rated for disability on account of heart disease only and given \$3 per month. He was living at Aida, Lawrence County, Ohio at this time. February 27, 1894 in Monmouth County, Iowa. Carter Twp. aged 63 years. July 31, 1890 at Gustons P. O., Monmouth County, Iowa. Also in February 12, 1892. May 17, 1894 in Pileole P. O., Iowa. February 9, 1898 Superintendent of Lawrence County Infirmary states he is an inmate and is paralyzed and unable to help himself in any way. (Dresden, Ohio)

Letter from F. B. Lambert dated December 16, 1929 asks information.

Letter March 14, 1930 from Widow Elvada to F. B. Lambert states that soldier married Almestena Rankins who died February 1849 and then Sarah Ann Reynolds who died about 1895. He is now a widower. He had 6 children (2 boys and 4 girls) by last wife and 1 boy now living and 47 years old, by first wife.

He evidently had been on pension until at Des Moines, Iowa as his record was transferred from there to Columbus, Ohio.

February 11, 1898 - Says he is a widower, wife Sarah Ann Reynolds died about three years ago. He was married about 35 years ago in Bayne County, Iowa by Clark of Court. His first wife, Almestena Rankins died February 1849. He was born in Lawrence County, Ohio and enlisted at 37 years of age. His enlistment record shows he was 5 feet 10 inches in height, fair complexion, blue eyes, dark hair, occupation farmer. He was in Knoxville, Tennessee July 25, 1865 (date of discharge?)

I did not copy the war service record as he seemed to remain in the same company throughout the war. It is his home life in which you are interested I understand.

This will be fine. Let me know if I can help you further. Do hope your vision has improved and you can continue your work.

Dear Father and Mother,

Your letter of the 5th of February is before me. It afforded me great pleasure to hear from you all once more. We are all well except my wife. She is about the same. I don't see that she improves any. She is able to sit up some days a few minutes at a time, and other days she can not be up at all.

We have had a very open winter. There have been but two snows here this winter that would cover the ground. One lay on the ground two or three days, and the other about one day.

I am going to teach this summer, and I have about three acres of ground to tend - all in the river bottom, and it is good rich ground. I give \$50.00 a year for house and ground.

I was glad to hear that you were doing well, and had sold 1300 bushels of corn, and that looks like business.

I intend to come out to see you next Spring if my wife gets able to come or if I can leave her with any degree of satisfaction and come myself.

Tell Charles that he draws well, but my advice would be to practice writing more than drawing.

It will be of more benefit to him, Charley, you must go to school you have to learn to be a good and useful man. You have to take the place of the man that is now getting old and there will be a vacancy and a demand for a good intellect (and for what you or I know) you may be called to fill some responsible place of honor, trust and profit. And if such place should present itself, try to be competent to fill it. Don't forget in the summer what you learn in the winter, but study right along the same as if you were in school.

A few lines to Margaret. You wished to know what became of Barbara. She did not turn out as I did, but married a Dutchman by the name of Gruver, and lives on John's Creek not far from Waterloo, Ohio.

You said your hand got tired of writing. You must learn to hold your pen differently, then it won't tire your hand. Father, buy plenty good books for the children to read, such as histories, works on mathematics, geographies, etc.

Then your boys will stay at home to read, for they'd rather do that than any thing else, but if they have nothing to read they will seek amusement elsewhere.

And that is what ruins many
a young man, I have no more to
write to you. This is more than I
wrote before.

Henry Lambert

I was born February 29, 1849 near a small town called Marion in Lawrence County Ohio and attended the public schools from 5 years of age until I was about 15 years old.

I generally was along with my classes and at the age of 17 (1865-66) taught a couple of schools that were then called subscription schools. I did not have any certificate at that time.

In 1867 or '68 I went to Kanawha County and was examined by County Superintendent D. F. Field. A very fine young man and a scholar for that day. He was a graduate of the high school at Charleston so I understood. From him I got a certificate and went on to Cabin Creek obtained a school at Wyatt Settlement that had about 12 or 15 pupils, two of them are now residents of Huntington - Mr. Samuel Hanna and Mr. Crawford, I do not recall his given name.

I then went about 3 or 4 miles up the creek and taught another school in the Keeney Settlement and then went up about 4 miles farther and taught in the McVay settlement. The first two of these schools I repeated the same and part of next year.

I then came back down into Lawrence County Ohio went for an examination, obtained a certificate and taught a school at the Shattuck School house one term. I then obtained a school at Marion and taught 4 or 5 years at that place. I went to school two or three months at a time, some of these schools were called High Schools at that time. I studied hard all the time and was constantly getting ahead of my schoolmates who often as soon as they got a certificate quit until about the time they wanted another certificate. Then many of them would either come to school to me or someone else to prepare for the coming examination. These schools were called high schools and the reason for this was that the pupils were a little farther along in branches of study than the average pupils attending the primary schools.

A Mr. Shirley who perhaps was the best scholar of any of us and myself usually taught these schools - two at same time at each school. In about 1872 or '73 (all these dates are given from memory and might not be exactly correct but are as I recollect them) I came to Cabell County and taught at Salt Rock the next year at Huntington and have taught a school every year from that time until now in Cabell County.

I taught Indian schools in state of Washington, parts of 2 years, schools were only 4 months there so I taught 4 months before I went into Indian Service which was November 1, 1891 and got sick and resigned in 1892, about April or May. Came home and taught a term.

taht year so I taught a school in each at the time or year that I was in Indian service wether this will count for two years or not someone else will have to decide. I then commenced at Mill Branch in Meleanas District about July 1 or the first Monday in July.

I filled the Justice Office in Union District, Cabell County for 12 years.

Have filled several other little offices such as Secretary of Board of Education, School Examiner.

Proctorville, Ohio
Nov. 23, 1881
Monday evening

Dear Father and Mother:

It has been a good while since I wrote you, not since last winter, I believe. The last letter I wrote to you. I thought I would come out there in the Spring, but circumstances were so that I could not come there. We are all in good health except my wife, and she is very much better than when I wrote to you last. I still live at Proctorville and I am teaching at this place. I have concluded to move out there in the spring if everything works right.

I want you to write to me and tell me all about that country. How much per acre do you have to pay when you rent. How much does land sell for in that country? How much per acre do you have to pay when you rent cash rent. How much the rent of common ordinary houses are per month. What teaching is per month. I get I mean the best schools in your country and I think I can teach the best ones there. Now I want you to tell me all about it. Everything you can think of that you think would interest me.

Mr. Coffman of Avoca, near your place, to stay two nights with me.

He was accompanied by his wife. They were here on a . The promised to hunt you up, as soon as they go back home. They are going to start next Wednesday. They recommend that country very highly. I would be glad if you will hunt him up if he doesn't come to see you, then he could tell you all about me. I am getting fair wages for teaching. I am getting \$65 per month this winter and my expenses have been so high for the last two or three years on account of sickness that I have not made much clear money.

So you see I will not have very much clear money when I come there, but I will have some.

Now about our folks. Jonathan's wife is dead, the rest well. Uncle Thornton lives in a house you moved out of. He drinks some yet. Neal lives on John Litch's place yet. Bennett and William at the same place. That is about all I know about them. You might look out for me in April for I am coming this time. I wish you would look around for a house or see where you can get one for me if I should come, and write and let me know what success you met with. Hoping this may reach you and find you all in good health. I remain

As far as my fathre's people, I do not know anything about them as I was only three years old when he moved to Iowa and I never seen any of his people at all. One of my aunt's girls is here in Nebraska. Her name is Mrs Lena Swat Swain. She is one of the finest women you would find anyplace. I never knew the name of my father's first wife. I know he got a pension when he left here and was trying to get a raise but don't know whether he did or not. I used to get letters from one of uncle Benjamin Lambert's daughters. Her name was Addie. She got married and quit writing so I lost track of her. I will get my father's picture if I can and send it to you and also I will ahve our family group taken and sent to you as soon as I can and any of the rest of their pictures I can get and send I will be glad to do so. I will be glad to get your father's and mother's picture. I used to get letters from your father quite often. Is your mother still living? Have you more than one brother? I remember you had one and it seemed you had two but I did not remember.

There is no doubt that Josiah or Josias was the name of the Father of Richard, Green Lambert, who was a relative of Reuben Lambert, my Uncle, and about his age, remembered Josiah it is on the church records in Harrison County, together with his children.

Mr. F. B. Lambert's Father says that Joannah died first and that Josiah lived for a time with Johnathan, who lived on the lower part of the Lambert land.

The name Josiah and Wife are indexed on the books at Woodland Cemetery but the book of plots was burned when the Woodland office burned.

Aunt Elizabeth Fisher told us to write down the names of Josiah's brothers before she died. A man by the name of Carpenter who lived in Catlettsburg told her the names/ She said the name of one began with Ger, she did not remember the exact name, thought it was something like Gertrunde. We thought possibly it was Gershom since it is a family name. These names were tradition and may be wrong.

The younger Johnathan in Harrison Co, W Va may have been Josiah's brother or cousin. Dear Mrs. Reynolds: -

I have just been reading over some of your letters and will make a few comments:

1. I note you had an Uncle Amos born at Arabia. That is not strange as his father Reuben Lambert (Son of Richard) lived out there, owned a farm there. I don't know the exact location, but can find it from records & by the map, as the county was laid off in Townships, sections, quarter sections, etc.

2. I note that Rev. Benj. Carpenter was step-father of Margaret McFarland, wife of ~~Richard~~ Jonathan Lambert, my father's great grandfather. My father Henry Lambert, b. 1849, remembered Margaret and Jonathan Lambert as she d. 1863. he 1856.

3. In your letter of Jan. 6th, you state that D.A. R's claim a Benf. Carpenter who was in the 10th Penn., b. 1750, m. Polly (Mary) Ferrer, etc. as their ancestor. Possibly, that is correct, but your ancestor is the one who married the Morgan sisters, and I would advise you to search and note every item about any Benf. Carpenter of that period, in the Pennsylvania Archives, and probably then you will know.

4. In your future letters to me, please write only on one side of the paper, number each sheet, and if you quote make clear whom or from what you quote, with exact page, Volume, etc. If Pennsylvania or other archives, etc. are quoted from, please note the Series, Volume, page, etc., as old letters become confusing. Don't forget to date

5. I have spent many hours interviewing the Lambert girls at Ironton. They have a lot of unorganized material, and know much local material, but I believe I have practically exhausted all they knew. They have no opportunity to hunt records. Two of their brothers have died in the last two years. Two of the girls work, and one keeps house for them. Mrs. Arnold and her sisters knew very little. Abby Lambert told you that Job Lambert (son of Josiah) was Joseph. That is not correct. Joseph lived and died at Ironton, and Job first settled on the Ohio river after he left Ice Creek, in Ohio, & then moved to Wayne Co., Va., an adjoining Co., to Cabell, and his descendants are partly in Wayne, in Cabell Co., and in various counties of Eastern Kentucky, and, no doubt, elsewhere. Job Lambert settled on the site of

Replying to your letter of September 2, 1935 regarding the early records of the Lambert family, wish to say that in the early history of the county there were a number of Lamberts in Harrison county. There is a deed of record in Harrison county which is dated September 2, 1805 made by the heirs of Jonathan Lambert to William Lambert \$300 acres of land lying on both sides of Brushy Fork of Elk creek, which is now in Elk district of Harrison county. At that time all the parties to the deed resided in Harrison county and is recorded in Deed Book No. 6, page 13. It is signed by Ann Holden and Benjamin Holden, her husband; Hannah Davis and William Davis, her husband; Susiana Parks and Robert Parks, her husband; John Lambert, single; Amos Lambert and Sarah, his wife; Josiah or Josias Lambert, single; and Aaron Lambert, single.

William Lambert the grantee in the deed is no doubt, another son of Jonathan Lambert, that is, a brother of those who signed the deed.

The marriage records will also give some information along this line, but in as much as there were two families residing here at the same time, it is pretty hard to distinguish one from the other. However, I am willing to work with you on this line, and am enclosing herewith a blank form which I would like you to fill out giving a record of your branch of the Lambert family and I will see if I can fit it in with the information I have received from other descendants and if there is anything I have in addition to what you are able to furnish, I will be glad to make and send you a copy of such information.

You speak of your family stopping in Tazewell county, Virginia before coming to Harrison county. I rather doubt that they went that round about way to get here, although it is barely possible. It is more than likely that they came from New Jersey through Pennsylvania to Harrison as that was usually the route which was traveled by New Jersey Colonists to this section of the country. As the Davis family came this route, the Randolph family, the Masxons, the Bonds, Suttons and various others of the 7th Day Baptist group.

The Veterans' Administration has referred to the National Archives your request of November 16, 1944 for information concerning several veterans. This is also in reply to your request of December 1, 1944.

During the existing national emergency it is necessary that the National Archives give priority to services that contribute to the prosecution of the war. Because of the volume of such services it is impracticable at this time to supply an inquirer with genealogical information concerning more than one veteran.

Among the pension records in the National Archives is a file, numbered as above, relating to the claim based upon the Civil War service of Lafayette Lambert as Private, Company I, 173rd Ohio Volunteer Infantry. A summary of such of the information in that file as appears to pertain to your inquiry is enclosed.

Among the Revolutionary War pension records in the National Archives no files have been found for Josiah (Josias) Lambert, Joseph Lambert or a Jonathan Lambert who died in Harrison County, Virginia. Among the War of 1812 pension records in the National Archives no file has been found for a Jonathan Lambert.

Pension records in the National Archives may be examined in its search rooms by you or your representative. Upon request we will send you a list of local genealogists who may be able to undertake investigations in your behalf for a stipulated fee.

Dear Cousins:

I received your two letters, and thanks so much.

Yes, it looks like Moses might be the father of Josiah, but how are we to prove that he is the one who married Joannah Woodward. I don't believe there is any doubt about them. It is not absolutely necessary to have the proof of birth if you have proof of marriage; but you do have to have proof of the connections and the births seem the easiest way, although if you can find wills or deeds they accept them, as I have showed you. I have proof of all the marriages, but I cannot connect ~~these~~ mine to my father, and my father to his father, and while I have not sent for these deeds of Josiah's to Richard, I am sure they accepted that, as their only criticism was Richard and ^{Reuben} my grandfather.

I think they would accept your cousin's record of Richard. I did not have that when I sent in my papers; but I believe if I could prove that Reuben, my grand-father was William's brother that would settle that question, but how they won't take anyone's word. They had Mrs. Welch's word that she was raised by my grand father. I sent letters she had written.

I am sending you a check, if you would like to get either the will of Moses, or the land grant. I cannot see just what good they will would do unless it would say to Josiah and wife, Joannah. It seems like the land grant might be a good idea; but I believe you said you had found where he sold all his land in Harrisburg, or was that in Virginia. I certainly appreciate all your effort. I wish you would try for the S.A.R. or that Mrs. Hilmer

try for the D.A.R. You are back there where you can look up things: I have to depend on someone else. You have been wonderful. Mrs. Hilmer and the Abbie Lamberts have sent me a lot, but sometimes they won't even answer my letters. I suppose they are getting tired and think they have sent everything they know.

My dear Mrs. Lambert:

I was very much pleased to receive your letter. We also have worked on our line for a number of years. Father's sister, Mrs. Mrs. Fisher, , who lived on a farm below Russell, Ky, was always very much interested in keeping the record, as was also Alfred F. Lambert, of Kansas, who was . In 1896 he visited in Ironton and tried very hard at that time, to get it. I do not know what record his family now have. I wondered if the Charles M. Lambert, of Horton, Kansas, might be a descendant of his. I would like very much to get in communication with the family. We have not heard from them for years. Mrs. Fisher had so worn her family out with the family history they turned a deaf ear.

Fearing she might die, and the tradition be lost, she visited our family, and requested that we write it down, which my sister did over twenty years ago, when . When Mrs. Welch wished to trace the family we were very glad we had it, as it made the way much easier. We gave her a copy, and it has proven very correct. It was the understanding at the time that if we gave her our records she would give us what she found, and as long as she was able, I think she did so; but during the last year of her life we received very little, although she continued to work on it. She told us she had found additional war records of Josiah, but did not say what they were. Upon her death her husband promised to send the record back to some of the family, but has failed to comply to a number of requests for it. I fear we shall never get it. However, we are again trying to trace the record. We have not worked on it for two years, or more. I am pleased to hear that the contact

with Mrs. Welch was pleasant and helped. I understood that you were trying to trace the record, and sent your address to Mrs. Welch. I know she found it very pleasant. You speak of someone compiling the whole. More than two years ago I called upon Beulah Wyatt Phillips and looked over a book she had purchased of her mother's family, , tracing it back to the Mayflower. In it were a number of Lamberts and carpenters with our family names. She offered to allow me to copy anything I might wish to out of it, but did not do so, as other things have taken my time. There is an Evans ~~xx~~ Pioneer Record of Southern Ohio. It may be found in the library at Portsmouth.

I should like very much to join you in having the Lambert research made, and will gladly pay ~~the~~ \$2.50. I agree that it would not seem fair to us for others to use our information free when we have worked so hard for it and have paid the expense of same. Do you think that we might ask that our records not be used by anyone unless they pay for them. The sum of \$2.50 seems very small to me to ask those who have done no work. My idea would be to make it a point of honor for others not to use our records unless each one pays for same. Could we not get some money this way to continue the search? Maybe, a Mayflower connection. Please feel free to say if you do not like this suggestion.

I am not sending your records back to you at this time nor sending you our family record, as I wish to go to Woodland and check up a little.

It is cold again, after some warm spring weather, and I wish to wait until it is more pleasant.

Have you Richard Lambert's dates? I refer to Josiah's

son. You will find a repetition occurs in in several places which is due collecting material from a number of sources. I am giving it to you just as I find it.

Have you the Jonathan Lambert record I have Jonathan and Thomas, his sons.

I am very much interested in the romance of the pioneers, as well as the direct genealogy. Is there any in the Lambert family? Kindly let me know where your records do not agree with mine that we may endeavor to get it as true as possible.

The history of John Davison, whom Susannah Lambert married, states that Susannah, daughter of Josiah, was born in New Jersey twenty days after the signing of the Declaration of Independence. According to history, the inhabitants were very much interested, and all who could possibly do so, left Trenton.

According to tradition, the Lambert family lived for a time in Bucks Co., Pa, near Washington, and in Tazewell County, Va. after leaving Trenton. In the first census of Harrison County, 1784, some of the Lamberts were there. Tradition says the family first lived in Rowley, Mass, then in Long Island, then in New Jersey. The Carpenter family history states that that the Lamberts belong to the Long Island branch. The Carpenters also knew the family in New Jersey and in Harrison County. Josiah's son Richard married ^{Bethemial} Benjamin Carpenter in 1802, or 1804, after coming to ~~Lawrence County~~ ^{Lawrence County}. According to tradition, which has run very true, in the Lambert Family, three brothers and a sister came to Harrison County; Jonathan, who stayed in Harrison Co., Josiah, who came to Ohio; Gerson, who was supposed to be unmarried, and

left there , perhaps to go back to New Jersey (He must have been married, and returned to his wife). Some one found a marriage in New Jersey of Gresham Lambert, Hunterdon County, and Mary Barberry, January or June 15, 1976 may be the one.

Great, great Grandfather Carpenter came from Blochester Co., N.J. It is said Hannah, the sister, Hannah, the daughter, , and Anna did not come with the family at the time . All the rest of the family were said to have been killed in the Revolution. Traditoon said that Hannah had married twice, one husband's name being Barnes. Mrs. Wrlch was able to trace her through the tradition. They were a very fine family. Josiah settled on the farm above Hanging Rock, obtaining a grant for same. He owned from the ~~xxxxx~~ J.M.Kelly (John Lee) place almost to Hanging Rock, and from the river, including some of the hills. I am not sure how many hills back, but had coal mines in some of them in the early days. He built his first ~~hm~~ house, a log cabin, , about where the Stowers place was, at the foot of the hill which is almost straight back from the Mary Williams house. The next houses built were the Richard Lambert house, just below the M. Williams' place and the Jonathan Lambert house, which is the Kris Ward house (still standing). It is very old, being built soon after 1800, from from the trees cut in clearing the place. The Richard Lambert house was built about the same time. Both were log houses. The R.L. house burned years ago. I have a newspaper account of the fire.

Thomas Lambert, Jonathan's son, built a house on the lower part of Jonathan's place. I have heard it was the old Herridge house. William (Squire Richard's son) , built a home on the lower part of his father's place, The house we used to live in, a frame with hewn log foundation, about 1830. Part of it is

standing. Josiah's house, at the foot of the hill, , was standing in the ^{1860's} 60s; they called it the old house. I do not know when it was torn down. Reuben, Richard's other son, had a farm in the country, part of which is now included in the A.R. Johnson farm, Johnson's big cave having been part of the Reuben Lambert farm.

Old Uncle Reuben, as they called him had in his possession some things Josiah carried through the war with him: a comb, a knife, razor, and I do not know what else. Tradition also runs that Josiah served in the war Josiah Lambert and Joshua Lambert. This was told us by Mrs. Elizabeth Fisher, , who was my father's sister and a half sister of Mrs. Welch. She obtained this information from a Mr. Carpenter, who lived in Catlettsburg, and knew the family well. Mrs. Fisher did not know whether he had served under both names in West Virginia--or rather, Virginia--and New Jersey, or ~~not~~ in just one state; but she said he had served in both states and under both names. It was not known to her whether both names were really his, or it was in error. Surely, Joshua must also have been his name, as a man would not be likely to serve under a name not his own. This is something you will run into in different places. This change of name makes it very confusing.

Mrs. Fisher, who was a daughter of William, had a very keen mind and a wonderful memory. She was very much interested in the genealogy of her family, and had always talked to the older people of her day, in regard to same. (In fact, she had so worn out her family with it that they turned a deaf ear; and knowing that the tradition would be lost when she passed away, she ~~asked~~ asked us a visit and asked us to write it down, which my sister did over twenty years ago. It was the only record, or tradition in the family

unless there is some in Kansas. Father's oldest brother, A.F. Lambert

who lived in Kansas, tried to get the record in 1896; but I do not know how much he succeeded in getting. Both he and Mrs. Fisher have been dead for years.

Josiah and also his father were quakers. A Mr. Wilgus, who settled at Proctorsville soon after 1800 and who came from Trenton, six miles above, knew the Lamberts and had their history. He said they were quakers. That was the first time I ever heard it, to the older people in her day in regard to same. In fact, her family had become so tired of it, they turned a deaf ear and she, knowing the value and that the tradition would be lost upon her death, visited us and asked that we write it down--which my sister did over twenty years ago. When Mrs. Welch became interested a few years ago it was the only record or tradition in the family, unless there is some in Kansas. Father's eldest brother, Alfred F. Lambert, who lived in Kansas, tried to get the record in 1896, but I do not know how much he succeeded in getting. Both he and Mrs. Fisher have been dead for years. Josiah and also his father were Quakers. A Mr. Wilgus, a Quaker who settled at Proctorville soon after 1800 and came from six miles above Trenton, knew the Lamberts and had their history. 34 years ago. At that time, I am sorry to say, I was not interested. The Wilgus record may be in the family yet. Some of them still live around Proctorsville.

He was said to have records of early pioneers extending far back of the time he came here. Do you have friends up there who would find out? I believe his name was Charles Wilgus: he had a grandson by the name of Charles.

It is said the Lamberts descended from a John Lambert,

who settled in Rowley, Mass. with his four sons, between 1745 and 1746. The sons were John, born 1715; Gresham, born 1717; Thomas, born ^{no date} ~~1717~~; Jeremiah, born ^{no date} ~~1717~~.

Gov. John Lambert, son of Gresham, was born in Aims well Springs 'now Lambertville) 2--24--1746. The Governor's children were all girls.

We may have descended from the original John, and one of the other sons; it may be Thomas. There are several Jonathans in Massachusetts and Thomas Lambert of Burlington Co. will 1732 wife Ann in lieu of dower ^{\$1600.} Grandchildren, Thomas, and Margaret Biles, left a tract in Aims well, Hunterdon Co. By decease of his brother John he had become an heir at law to a plantation in Bucks, Pa. which he sold to Thomas Yardley of same place, County. Remainder of estate to four daughters, Elizabeth Biles, Hannah, Achsals, and Margaret.

According to the Lineage Books of New Jersey, all the Lamberts there came from New England, New York, or Pennsylvania. According to the Carpenter Family records our ancestors came from Long Island, altho they may have gone to Mass. first. The first Lambert that came to Mass. came in 1635. The Lamberts settled in a place called Lambert's Run, Harrison Co. Jonathan, Sr. transferred 1200 acres of land to Hezekiah Davidson adjoining Josiah Allen's property. (Col. Henry Haywood's History of Harrison County.)

I am glad to know that Mr. Haney is giving the information about Josiah that he evidently is. I had quite a time keeping Josiah's record at Woodland. Some years ago, while looking up some information regarding our own plot I saw the record of the first who were buried at Woodlnd. At that time, I learned of the Baptist Church plot my grand father, Wm. L. purchased, a plot when Woodland was first laid out: and he had his own family, fourteen, I believe, moved there. That is, he had arranged to have them moved, but died before they were really moved; therefore, they were in the first record book. While looking up some information in regard to them, I found these removals from the Davisson's burial plot. When the residence at Woodland burned, Mr. Haney did not have the first record book in the vault, and it was burned I am sorry to say, as it showed just where they were buried. Mr. Haney would not acknowledge they were burned for quite a while; but since I knew

of the record and insisted upon seeing it, he owned it had burned. The index, which was in another book, ~~is~~ still there. As if having one record burned was not enough, he decided to make a new copy of the index book; and, not being familiar with old style handwriting, he copied Josiah's name, Isaiah. I had Mr. F. B. Lambert, who is a professor in West Virginia, and a descendant of Jonathan, go to Woodland and carefully examine the name, and he said it was, without doubt, Josiah. So, you see I have almost had to stand over the record since I found it.

There are no stones to the grave of Josiah and his wife. My grandfather had intended placing new stones to the graves of his immediate family upon their removal to Woodland, and I suppose he intended to place new ones at their graves, also, at the same time; hence, the stones were not placed at the graves. He died soon after ¹⁸⁷⁶ ~~1896~~ and none of the removals of his own family had their stones placed; neither were the new stones ever provided. I am very sorry it was so. They all had nice ones. Josiah is buried by the side of John D. ^{Wilson} and Suzanna. One thing I have noticed: Something always seems to happen to Josiah's record.

I am glad you liked the record of the Baptist Church. I have read ever so many old Registers hunting records, I was delighted when I found that one. I would like to have a personal history of each member, , merely as a record of old pioneers. I was especially glad to find it, as it established Josiah's residence here. However there is an old deed ^{Mr Robert} Goldeamp has it, of the Kruzee place,, describing it as the Josiah Lambert land.

Do you suppose the Elizabeth Powell Elias married was a

daughter of this Joseph Powell in the record, and how do you account for Jonathan's son living in the upper end of town. I

thought Joseph lived there. Where was Joseph's farm? The John Stover who was buried in the Stover cemetery was the father of Elizabeth Stover whom my grandfather, William Lambert, married. We do not know where they came from, nor anything about them. The burial plot back of the Belfont mill was not the Amaziah Davisson plot, but the John D. ^{Anderson} plot. I do not believe Amaziah came here. Josiah and his wife were buried on their daughter's farm. The row in which they are buried are all relations of their's: Heplars, Davissons, Lionburgers, &c. All seem to have stones except Josiah's ^Ywife. Mr. Capper still has an amusement Park below Hanging Rock.

According to my records, Josiah, brother of Samuel B., and Isaac, married Elizabeth McIntire 2-15-1821.

John H. was a son of Thomas, ~~grandson~~ ^{son} of the Jonathan born in ^{Jan 1,} 1826. John, son of Jonathan, born 3-5-1801; Elias, born 10-22-1802. I always believed Elias was a son of Joseph; but in looking over my records, I find that he was a son of Jonathan, and that Jonathan was in the War of 1812. Yes, I have a copy of the book, "Our Old Citizens!" I purchased it when Mr. ^{Haney} ~~Henry~~ first wrote it. I can correct some of it, and add some to it. I will mail you a copy when I have time. It will not help us much. I am so interested in hearing about the book your daughter's friend is writing, including some pioneer families. May I ask if there is anything pertaining to some pioneer families we are connected with. Both my father and mother came from old, pioneer families in every connection. Would you be kind enough to tell me if he knows anything of

the history of Peter Lionberger, , who lived on a farm in the center of Ironton, John Stover, who lived in the upper part of town, Stauffer and earlier Von Stauffer, the Dilly family of Oak Ridge, Lawrence County, the Golden family of Oak Ridge and Coryville, the Carpenters, of upper Hanging Rock. I intend tracing some of these if possible. I know nothing of any except the Carpenters and Goldens.

NOTES.

Lamberts, Kellys and Davissons came to Ohio on a flat boat, together. Lamberts wished to settle in Kentucky; so the Kellys stayed here and the Lamberts went on down the river, it is thought about Limestone, (now Maysville). The land in Kentucky was not open for ~~se~~ settlement, belonging to Daniel Boone. Therefore, Josiah and his family came back, and he settled on the next farm to his friend, (Luke Kelly 1796) Mr. Carpenter. That is why the Kellys came earlier than the Lamberts. It is said Josiah stayed a year or two in Kentucky. Some of his family may have stayed in West Virginia when he came, and ~~have~~ have been married after he left, as Mary, Hannah, his daughter, ~~has~~ Hannah, his sister, Anna, and Jonathan's family were there. The dates of some of the marriages make it appear that he did not come so early. The Kellys came in 1796 or 1797; so he must have left Harrison County before the last of his family was married there. Some give the date as 1798, as in the John Kelly records; some, 1800, and some as late as 1802. I think it is 1798.

In the first census of Harrison County, taken directly after the foundation of the County, in 1784, there appears the name of Jonathan Lambert, who listed with a family of eight, including himself and wife. In the tax list Josiah's name appears with

Jonathan Lambert's in 1789. In 1791 the name of Joseph appears, and comes on the list. Jonathan and Josiah seem to have been brothers; and Joseph, Josiah's son, was married that year-1791, and went on the tax list. Seems to have gone on the tax list as they returned from war.

Albert B. Lambert, son of Samuel and Sarah Sparling, born in Lawrence County 9-5-1849. Samuel Lambert, his father, born March, 1811 and his mother, a native of Belmont County, Penn. born 2-22-1813. Albert married Eliza J. Livesay, born in Lawrence County 3-12-1853. There were two children: Clarence, born 7-12-1872 in Boyd Co., Ky.; Samuel Arlington, born in Lawrence County, Ohio 7-28-1876. Parents of Mrs. Lambert are Hiram W. and Marget (Davis) Livesay. The former died in 1855. Two brothers of Albert B. were in Civil war: Samuel H. enlisted in 1861; Whitfield enlisted in 1862 in 4th Ohio vol. cav., for a term of three years. His time had almost expired when he was killed at ^{the} Battle of Cedar Creek, Va. and buried at that place.

Bazil D. Talbot married in Lawrence County 10-25-1858 to Sarah E. Lambert, born in Lawrence County 18-22-1843.

Elias, father of Mrs. Talbott, born in Lawrence County 10-22-1802. Grandfather was Jonathan Lambert, and served in the war of 1812. Elizabeth Powell, mother of Mrs. Talbott, was born in Greenup County, Ky. 3-3-1809; died May 13, 1862. Elias died 7-14-1855 (Copied from Historical Atlas).

John and Abigail Lambert Kelly, parents of Mrs. Collins, came to this county in 1798. Died 3-30-1859 and 6-9-1845. Ann

Kelly Collins born in Lawrence County 9-19-1819.

The parents of Mrs. Collins, (Anna Kelly) are John and Abigail Lambert Kelly. They came to this county in 1798 (Atlas).

Polly Lambert married Whitfield Kelly, son of John Kelly Sept 2, 1828 V 1-2-3 P.121. Recorded at Ironton, Ohio.

Mr. Yangling came to Lawrence County in 1798. His father, Andrew Yangling, served in the Revolutionary war seven or eight years.

Two brothers of Alfred B. Lambert were in the Civil war. Samuel H. enlisted in 186⁴ in 4th Ohio Volunteer Infantry, serving one year. Whitfield, son of _____ enlisted in 1862 in 4th Ohio Vol Cavalry for a term of three years, and almost served his time, when he was killed in Battle of Cedar Creek, Va. and was buried at that place.

Richard Lambert, son of William, killed at Battle of Scary Creek, 7-17-1861. He was the first soldier killed from Lewis Lawrence County. He was brought back to Ironton and buried in Henry cemetery; afterward removed to Woodland in William Lambert plot--moved about 1877 or 8. A member of Capt. George's Independent Cavalry.

Marriage records in Harrison County date from the foundation of the County, in 1784.

Lambertville, N. J. from 1733 until 1814 was called Coryellis Ferry. The name was changed to Lambertville because John Lambert, then a Senator in Washington, had a Post Office established there, and the place was named in his honor.

Copy of a letter written by Mrs. Addie Hilmer: We went East through Parkersburg, Clarksburg, Harrison County, West Va. Lamberton, and on to Lambertsville, N.J. and also called on the President of the Historical Society; but I did not get any further information than ~~that~~ we had. However, I spent some time in the library at Morristown, N.J. and read up a lot of Lambert History. You see, Etta's brother lives near Morristown; so, the next time I go I expect to go to Trenton, as that is the place to go, I believe, to get real information. However, Corgell's Crossing, Aims well, or Lambert's Crossing, as it is known, is on the Delaware, where Washington crossed, and Bucks County, Penn. is on one side of the Delaware and Lambertsville on the other side. Also

South Trenton used to be called Lamberton. I have loads of information, but it would take a long time to write it (So say we all).

#67. Sec. 4. They were buried on the John Davidson farm. He was *an* outstanding man of his time. Was also known as a great wolf hunter. He removed to Woodland Sept. 2, 1873. Lot donated by Woodland cemetery to Church.

I find Daniel Lambert, son of Isaac B., who was son of Joseph and Ruth, born in 1835 in Franklin Co., Va. was brought to Woodland by his son, William Lambert. (From Woodland Records).

Gov. John Lambert, son of Gresham, was born in Ainswell Springs, now in Lambertville 2-24-1746. The Governor's children were all girls.

Mrs. Fisher, my father's sister, from whom a great deal of the

tradition came, told us, ~~xxxx~~ that Josiah had served, also under the name of Joshua. I do not know whether it was in West Virginia, or New Jersey. It may have been in both. She did not know whether both were really his name, or if it was an error. This is probably what you will run into.

Joseph Lambert married Margaret Winkler in 1850. She was raised by her Aunt, Mrs. Sperry, on Ice Creek (Isaac?). Joseph died of typhoid while in the civil war. They had one child, a daughter named Mary. She never married, and lives at Wheelersburg. Her mother is also dead.

In the history of John Davison it is stated that Suzannah, his wife, was born in New Jersey twenty days after the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Josiah and his wife are buried by the side of John D. ^{Wilson} and Susannah, on First Baptist church lot. There are no stones to the graves of Josiah and his wife.

May I ask where you found the date of Richard's marriage to Bethemiah Carpenter? Also, where was he married.

Josiah was a prisoner on board the Castel Hostage, to be exchanged for British prisoners. Privateer taken Casco Bay by British ship, Milford. Taken in sloop. No date given.

Mrs. Wlech found above in Libray in North Dakota. She said later she found other war records, but did not send them to us. Casco Bay is on the Atlantic coast, just south of Kennebec River.

There is a record in the Wilgus family, or was, who settled ~~Quaker~~ Bottom in the early days. I think Mr. Wilgus' name was Charles. He was a Quaker, and came from Trenton, N.J., or about six miles above Trenton. Mr. Wilgus was in possession of facts dating back much further than the date of his arrival. He knew Josiah and Richard well. Andrew Yingling - served eight years in the Rev. War, ^{and} was in war of 1812.

"Thomas Lambert, aged 23 years, born in Lawrence County, Ohio, and by occupation a farmer, was enrolled and mustered in October 28, 1861, at Ironton, Ohio, for three years as a private of Captain Barbour's Company "H", 6th Ohio Volunteer Infantry, Civil War, and died at Washington, D.C., June 30, 1863, while serving as a private of that organization. He was buried in Grave No. 5176, Soldier's Home, National Cemetery, Washington, D.C.

Thomas Lambert's Bible says he was born Jan. 27, 1838. Henry Lambert says he died of inflammation of the brain. Uncle Nral (Cornelius) put up his gravestone. This Thomas Lambert was a son of Thomas Lambert, grandfather of H.L. hence, his Uncle.

Lucy Goff, mother of G.M.Coffman, Rocky Fork, Colorado. Sister to

Sarah Goff Swartwood (F.B.Lambert's grandmother) Daughter of Jeremiah Goff. She had had other sisters, Demarius Jones, Malinda Goff (unmarried), Lucy Goff, and one brother, James Goff, only son. All born in Greenbrier County, now West Virginia. Also Harriett Thompson, Mahala Halliday can probably give Jeremiah Goff's Wife's name. They are supposed to be of Irish descent. Mr. Coffman says Martha Spear was also a sister to Harriett, &c. Maud was a sister to G.M.Coffman (not his real name) She married Roe Johnson who lives yet, at Miller, Ohio. The Goffs settled on Paddy'd Creek, ~~at~~ Ohio. Mr.Coffman says he remembers his Aunt Harriett Thompson telling him when a child that her father had about 75 slaves, and that one of them ran over him with a team and wagon. My mother (Sarah Swartwood) told me the slave probably rolled a barrel of salt over him. She thought the Goffs came from Botetourt Co., Va.---so Henry L. says.

Dear Cousins:

In reading over the Lambert history that Abbie sent to me, and I sent to you, I find Will of Moses Lambert, of Washington Co., Pa. 2-27-1782, named wife, Osie and sons Moses and Josiah, the eldest a minor. If this is the will you are sen'ing for, we are on the wrong track again. She says Moses may have been a brother to our Josiah, and of Jonathan, of Harrison Co., W Va. If you will look this over, you will find a map that shows where Josiah's land, that he and others gave deeds deeds for. In the deeds it also locates it; among other things it says: "And corner to Jonathan Lambert". Didn't you say that at one time you had been there. It seems like, with all this, it would not be too hard to find the land grants. I think I told you in last letter that the Land office was established in Chillicothe, Ohio, in 1801, but suppose all these papers have been moved.

I do not have all my papers here, but I have a clipping or a copy which tells of an old land mark being destroyed on the old Reuben Lambert place. I thought when I received it that Josiah might have had a brother Reuben, but I believe now, this must have been my grand father's place. I know that William and my grandfather Reuben were brothers and that my grand parents raised Mrs. Wrlch. I had her picture for years, until I sent it to Mrs. Hilmer, and her name is in the old family Bible but that does not mean a thing to the D.A.R.

Mrs. Hilmer sent me copies of some papers in her handwriting. She states: Benj. Carpenter married Grace Morgzn

had one daughter, Sarah. He married Mary Morgan and had four sons, Abel, Samuel, John, and Randell. He married Eliz. McFadden the mother of Nancy. A son, William, who settled above Hanging Rock, and also Linnie and ~~will~~ four. What makes you think Nancy was the daughter of one of the Morgan girls? In this Lambert history, it speaks of an old Mr. Carpenter--or maybe, it was in the photo that you sent me. Who was a Baptist preacher and had a son, William, who moved to Missouri? I imagine this was the one my grandmother went to visit at Weston, Missouri. I wish it had given his first name.

Dear Mr. Lambert:

I was in San Francisco over last week end, and put in almost two full days at Library. I took all the papers the D.A.R. sent back and showed them to the ladies in the Gen. branch of the library. I have become very well acquainted with them, and they are very kind and helpful. They think I ~~was~~ on ~~the~~ roof and were very disgusted with this D.A.R. lady.

They piled the table high with books that might be of some help, one they thought would be good, "The Early Settlers of Ohio². It gave pictures of maps of early days, showing grants and public lands. (Mistake: That was part of Historical Collections of Ohio, by Howe. Vol. 2.).

They think if we could find where Joshua had this land (The deeds given Richard and Jonathan show this) that it might show that he was granted this land for Rev. service. This will give you something to work on. I feel helpless about it out here. If you will look through the history of the Lambert family I sent you, you will find these deeds. Also notice what Abbie says about Joseph and Josiah being brothers. Sarah, daughter of Joseph, married Peter Lionbarger Jr. and a Bible record that states Sarah is daughter of Joseph and Daniel, Joseph's father. She said once this Bible was in S. F. but I have not been able to find any Lionbarger s there. They gave me a History of the Lionbarger family at the library, but I am not sure if it is Abbie's line. I have sent her a copy of the Will of Peter Lionbarger, to see if to see if it is. The name was spelled four different ways. I notice in one place she says: "Tradition says Josiah had a brother, Joseph, and another brother--Gershom. I did not copy this, but found Gershom's will. I was looking up Francis Lambert, and his and Lance-

descendants of Roger, he must be closely connected to Francis.

I have just been looking in an old Reference book about Ohio. It says, in 1794 a treaty was concluded with the Indians, adding a great portion of territory. Chillicothe was made the seat of Government. I notice the name of Chillicothe mentioned in several places in Abbie's Notes, and as a Capitol building was erected there I have wondered if that would be a lead in finding Josiah's grant, but perhaps you have thought all about this.

If you ever see the N. E. Historical and General Register you will find a lot about Francis J. Lambert.

Just found some more Notes: It lists Gershom, son, in Francis will. Hon, John Lambert, Acting Governor of N. J. 1802-3. Gov. Lambert was a son of Gershom, and a grand son of Joh, Abigail (Bumpstead) Lambert, Vol. 32, Page 236 of N.E. Hist. Gen. Register. Abbie sent me copies of deeds from Josiah to Richard, so that takes care of that connection; and she says she found where Richard deeded land to William; but I haven't anything to show that Richard was Reuben's (my grandfather) father. It looks like if he left William something he would have left Reuben and Belinda something; but that is my trouble in both the Lambert and Carpenter lineage. I have proved to their satisfaction the first two generations. I had Bible records. Benjamin Carpenter married Mrs. McFarland, Nancy's mother, Morgan's sister.

I found the marriages to Morgan's sisters in Penn, archives, even to the churches, , but haven't any idea where he married Mrs. McFarland, nor where Nancy was born. Evidently, they accept the Amos Carpenter book; for they said I would have to prove that this Nancy Carpenter was the Nancy Carpenter Richard married.

There is a Reuben in William's family also. I haven't my papers with me, but you have all that I think I told you. Gen. Eisenhower's mother was an Elizabeth Stover. She gave me the address of a Dr. Stover in Detroit. He promised to write me more information but never did. I wrote to Lottie Stover, but not much ~~from~~ there.

Dear Cousin:

I received your letter a few days ago. In the same mail I received a letter, of which I am sending a copy to you, and all my papers. As you know, they rejected my application on Josiah because they did not think he was the one mentioned in Mass. Sailors and Soldiers, and because I did not have legal proof that Richard, Josiah's son, or that Reuben was Richard's son. Since then, Abbie sent me copies of deeds that Josiah made to Richard and Jonathan, but I haven't anything yet to show that Reuben was Richard's son.

I did not make application on the Carpenter line, but sent them all the information I had and asked them if it was any use in going on. Her letter will explain the things I will have to find before they will accept the Carpenter family. I really don't believe that the Benj. Carpenter who served in the 10th Penn is but she did not seem to doubt that part; so I will keep still.

About Josiah: they accept the N.J. records on Josiah and Joanna's marriages, so I do not believe it is necessary to get their marriage bond. I will look up the Josiah and Moses in the Penn. Archives.

They have a good history of the Launcelot Lambert family in the library, but it does not mention any Josiah. I think I sent you some of it, and that is the family of Lamberts that Mrs. Sparrow, of Boston, belongs to. I am sure I sent her letter to you.

Thanks, so much, for the information you sent. Every little helps, and I will see if I can get some information about Richard's

birth from Hanover and Shrewsbury Township.

My dear Mrs. Reynolds:

We received your returned duplicate application on the record of Josiah Lambert, and the additional data, which we have examined. We are sorry to report that we find no authoritative proof of the Lambert lineage, other than the marriage date of Josiah Lambert and Joanna Woodward. We need definite authority for the dates of birth and death of Richard Lambert and Nancy Carpenter that they were the parents of Reuben Lambert, born in 1805. While family letters, &c. have been submitted, data can be accepted only from personal knowledge Bible records, cemetery inscriptions, church and court records, and the like, not from family traditions. We have the Amos Carpenter Genealogy to which you refer, and while it states that Benjamin Carpenter had a daughter Nancy, , born Jan. 26, 1789, it will have to be proved that she was Nancy Carpenter aged between 15 and 16, who married Richard Lambert in 1804. It, therefore, seems best to return your duplicate paper herewith, together with the data you sent, and also the records sent in October, 1944, which have been in our Return Files here.

I see your last letter is dated June 22. I am sorry I have been so long answering. We were all so upset over the death of my sons, son-in-law, and busy too. I came to Calif and then to Soda Springs where my son Ralph has a cabin. I took care of it in the summer time, and they come week ends, or as often as they can. They usually have guests; so I am pretty busy, as we do not have help now.

I will be glad to get the photostatic copies of the newspaper clippings, and will re-imburse you for any expense or trouble. I am just waiting for them now, before I send in another account to D.A.R. I am afraid tho they will not accept it as they seem to demand a lot, almost birth certificates.

I have written several places in Ohio, trying to find just where my grand father; or rather, to find if they have any record of my grand father's birth, thinking that might give some proof he was Richard's son; but no luck, so far. I sent you the pictures of my grand father and grand mother: Did you receive them? What do you think it means, then, when it gives Josiah Lambert 1st list of fecand Josiah 2nd list of prisoners, &c. Did you look in Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors of the Revolutionary war, Vol. 9, Page 443?

I asked the Librarian about this being in the Mass. book, and they being from New Jersey. She said it was all the same at that time. I do not know enough history to know, myself.

Mrs. Helmer also says "This information from Secretary

I have a copy from Compendium 7 of a Lambert, Oscar Doane, B. Jennings W. Va. June 2, 1888, descendant ~~from~~ of George L. from Scotland. Oscar's father was James B. L. of Parsons, W. Va. Among the things it says of Oscar is Graduate of Shepherd Coll. A.B. W. Va. V. 16; P.H.D. Johns Hopkins, 1929. Author Pioneer Leaders of Western Virginia and Presidential Politics, Home 52 College Avenue, Buckhannon, W.Va. I have never written to him and thought I would ask you first.

I am sorry I cannot tell you where I found Jonathan Lambert and Mary Woodward, but imagine in New Jersey archives. I will look it up when I go back to San F. in October.

Just above this note I have something about Benj. Carpenter, taken from Penn. archives 3d series, Vol.3, ; and just below it some more about B. Carpenter, taken from "Soldiers of the American Revolution who lived in Ohio, but hardly think *you received them*

Received your card, and was very glad to hear from you. So we have done all that human power could do and have nothing to regret, but I get so lonely as Roll works all the time. We took two weeks off at Thanksgiving to Sioux City, Iowa to Charley's, and to Winnebago, Nebr., to see Lizzie. Had a nice visit. Did you know your Uncle Charley is so near blind he can scarcely see to get around; and Aunt Lizzie's husband fell about 11 months ago and broke his hip, and he can't walk yet. He is around 85 years old. I doubt x very much if he ever walks again, but hope so.

We are having winter here, two below yesterday morning and a lot of snow. Been snowing all day, to-day also. I saw my brother Logan from Dakota, too, when I was at Lizzie's. Will close, hoping to hear from you again. I had written you twice and never received an answer.

I thought you might be interested in this Roger Lambert, of Willshire, England, was the father of John Lambert, who emigrated to this country, settled in Westfield and was the father of James Lambert, who was born the 14th July, 1755 and Miss Hannah Littell, the oldest child of Moses Littell, son of Benjamin, and Abigail Thompson, daughter of Thomas Thompson, of Connecticut farm, N. J. (See Littell and Thompson families: also Warren Tucker.

NOTE: The name, Roger Lambert is in the first list of the Elizabethtown Association.

James Lambert and Hannah Little had fifteen children: Moses, born 1776, died young; Moses, 2nd, born in 1778, married Betsey Dunham; Mary, married William Pongo; James married Eliza Leslie; Charlotte married Andrew Rogers; Rachel married Ruff; Phebe married Coles; Sarah married Sayres; Hannah married Benjamin Radley, twin to Hannah Isaac, Adeline, Simon Freelove Littell. Enoch married Adaline Force; John married _____; Susan married Isaac Brokaw. Moses Tucker married Elizabeth Lambert, sister of James Lambert. (Taken from Genealogy Littell). Note that this Hannah Littell is in the Roger Lambert genealogy.

There are preserved in possession of grand daughter of Hon. John Lambert, Acting Governor of New Jersey 1802-1803 the following letters from Jeremiah Bumpstead, or his wife, to her sister Abigail, married John Lambert and her husband, Birton April 19, 1714, &c. These letters are of interest, containing items of historical and gen. information, and throw light on some entries in the diary of Mr. Bumpstead, printed in Reg. 15, 193--204, 305. Gov. Lambert, of New Jersey was a son of Gersham (Francis had a son Gershom, and grandson of John and Abigail Bumpstead Lambert.

Thomas Ricker Lambert was a son of William and Abigail Ricker Lambert, born 1804-1809; his father, William Lambert and Apphia Gage Lambert, born in Rowley, Mass. in 1772. Thomas R. Lambert was the seventh generation in descent from Frances Lambert, through Thomas 2nd, and wife Edna Northend; Thomas 3rd and wife Sarah. Thomas 4th and wife Apphia Gage, and , and William, above, married his father, wife Abigail, daughter of Capt. Ebenezer Rucker of Rollinford, 1516. Their son William Thomas.

Letter written by Tho' Seabrook.

Miss Elizabeth Seabrook, daughter of James Seabrook, says her father, in 1825 was living in a small house on his father-in-law, (John Lambert) farm, moved to Lambertville, N.J. about three miles from Lambertville. In this letter of Thom. Seabrook he says "remember me to and sister Marion. NOTE: Aunt Hannah, his mother's sister, Hannah Little, who married first Major Benjamin Dennis, of Monmouth County, and second, John Lambert. She was the mother of Merriam Lambert, wife of John James Seabrook, James and Merriam were first cousins (This is taken from New England Genealogy. The above book, Geg. 15 was out; so I did not get to read the letters and I am going to Folsen about Saturday, so will not get to now.

I am just wondering if this Hannah Little and John Little are the same are the same as Hannah Littell and John Lambert in the Roger Lambert Gen. If so, Roger and Frances must closely related.

THE LAMBERTS AND THEIR NAME

The name of Lambert is claimed by some authorities to have been derived from the Anglo-Saxon word lamb combined with beorht, meaning "brightness", and therefore would mean "Lamb of Glory". Other authorities, however, give the name a Norman origin. It is found on ancient records in the various forms of Lambart, Lambard, Lambert, Lombert, Lombard, Lambett and Lambert, of which the last is the generally accepted form of today.

It is thought most probably that the family was of Norman origin as quite definite records connect the family with one of the followers of William the Conqueror in the Norman Invasion of England in 1066. This Norman knight was Rudolph de Lambert and he settled in England on lands granted him by William the Conqueror in return for his services on the field of battle.

Rudolph was the father of a son named Hugh, who was the father of Sir William, who married Gundred, grand-daughter of William the Conqueror, and had Henry, who was Standard-Bearer to King Henry the Second and married the sister of the Earl of Essex, by whom he had a son John, who had Sir Edmund and Thomas, of whom the first had Edmund, Richard, and Sir John, the last of whom was the father of Edmund, Sir Thomas, and Godfrey, the last of whom was the father of John, who had Thomas, who had John, who was succeeded by his eldest son John, who had Benjamin, Josias and Samuel, of whom the second was succeeded by his son John in the early seventeenth century.

Of the Wiltshire line, one Nicholas Lambert, probably a younger branch of the Yorkshire Lamberts, was a Member of Parliament for Wilts in 1343. He was the father of Edmund and John, of whom the first had a son Richard and the last had Robert and Edmund, the last of whom was the father of William (Mayor of Salisbury in 1499), Thomas, Richard, Gilbert, Christopher,

Mary, and Sir Nicholas (Lord Mayor of London). Of these, Thomas was the father of William, who had John (died young), Thomas, Elisabeth, John, William, Christopher, and Jane in the early seventeenth century.

It is not definitely known from which of the several illustrious branches of the family in England the original emigrants of the name to America were descended. All of them were, however, of common ancestry.

Probably the first of the name in New England were Michael and Richard Lambert, both of whom emigrated to America about 1637 or before. It is not known whether or not they were related.

Michael made his home at Lynn, Mass., and is believed to have had no issue by his first wife, Elisabeth, who died in the year 1657. In 1659 he married Elinor Furnell, by whom he was the father of Michael, Mary, and perhaps Moses, Rebecca, and Abigail. The eldest of these children, Michael, is said to have married Elisabeth Starke in 1688 but no further record of the family has been found.

Richard Lambert, before mentioned emigrant, resided at Salem, Mass., and is believed to have been the father by his wife Sarah of at least three children, Richard, Esther, and Elisabeth.

Francis Lambert, another early emigrant from England, made his home at Rowley, Mass., and had issue by his wife Jane of John, Ann, Jonathan, Gershom and Thomas. Of these sons, Gershom is thought to have married Deborah Frink and had John, Gershom, and others; and Thomas married Edna Northend and had Thomas, Nathan, and two daughters whose names are not given.

In 1663 one John Lambert of Lynn, who is believed to have been the brother of the emigrant Michael, removed to Salem with his son John, whom he had brought with him from England at a much earlier time. This son was married about 1650 to Preserved Gaskoyne or Gaskin, by whom he had issue of John, Elisabeth, Daniel, Sarah, Ezekiel, Samuel, Mary, Jonathan,

Hannah, and Ebenger.

Roger Lambert came from Wiltshire, England, to Elizabethtown, N.J., with his wife Eleanor and their son John, who was the father at a later date of at least four children, John, Richard, David, and Solomon.

Another John Lambert was at Saybrook prior to the year 1668, at which time he married Mary Ives. It is thought that he later removed to Hingham and thence to Scituate. He had one son named John and probably others.

Jesse Lambert, cousin of Roger, before mentioned, came from Wiltshire, England, to Milford, Conn., about 1680. He married Deborah Fowler in 1688 and had issue by her of Rachel, Martha, Richard, Sarah, Jesse, Deborah, Elizabeth, and David, of whom the sons Jesse, Jr., married Mary Gillet and had Mary, Jesse, Martha, Richard, Rachel, David, and Hannah.

Others of the name who emigrated to America at early dates but left few records of themselves and their families were William of Massachusetts in 1555, Thomas of Dorchester in 1637, Robert of Boston in 1665, and Ezra of Salem in 1689.

The descendants of these various branches of the family in America have spread to practically every State of the Union and have aided as much in the growth of the country as their ancestors aided in the founding of the nation. They have been noted for their courage, resourcefulness, perseverance, integrity, piety, industry, energy, moral and physical strength, ambition, power of will, and artistic ability.

Among those of the Lamberts who fought as officers in the War of the Revolution were Captain George of Virginia, Lieutenant Joseph Emanuel of Pennsylvania, and Ensign Josiah of Massachusetts.

John, Richard, Thomas, Michael, Gershom, Edmund, Robert, David, and Jonathan are some of the Christian names most highly favored by the family for its male members.

A few of the many members of the family who have distinguished themselves in American and other parts of the world in more recent times are,

John Lambert, English navigator and writer,
1776- . . . date of death unknown;
Eugene Louis Lambert, French painter, 1825-1900;
Louis A. Lambert of Pennsylvania, American Roman Catholic
clergyman, 1835-1910; and
Alexander Lambert of Poland and America, pianist, 1862- .

One of the most frequently recurrent of the many coats-of-arms of

the Lambert family is described as follows:

ARMS. -- "Gules, a chevron between three lambs passant argent, a chief
chequy or and azure."

Crest. -- "A sphinx passant guardant or, face proper, holding in the
dexter foot a rose gules, seeded and leaved vert."

Please pardon the long delay in replying to your letter but we have had quite a number of things to make it impossible for us to work on the genealogy since we saw you last. My brother has been ill also sister Harriet has not been well. She found it necessary to go to the hospital and have her tonsils removed. She is getting pretty well over the operation now. Is back at work.

I worked some on the family of Josiah just after you were here but have done nothing with it recently. I will begin again soon. As strange as it may seem what I had written about Josiah does not seem up to date now. That is, I thought at the time he came to Harrison Co. by way of Taxwell Co. now I believe he came through Maryland, Washington Co., down into Berkeley Co., Va. and directly west to Harrison Co., W. Va. This is an almost direct line from where they were in New Jersey. May have been up in Pa. for a time too.

Mrs. McMullan wrote me and said she had attended a Lambert reunion in Indiana. She met a man by the name of Bertsch. She gave me his address, also gave him my address. He is descended from a Barnabus Lambert, who settled near Chillicothe before 1800. The chain lengthens.

I received a letter from the man at Clarksburg who is looking up the Lambert family. His name is Guy W Tetrick. He sent me quite a bit of information which I am sending you a copy of. I have not replied to his letter. Of course I will do so when I have time. I know I should have done so before this.

Mrs. McMullan said she had found the family bible she had been looking for. In it she found Josias from whom her family descends was born in Berkeley Co., W. Va. He was a son of the Jonathan in Harrison Co. W. Va. I now believe our family must have been in Washington Co. and then come down into Berkeley Co., W. Va.

I haven't time to write more at present. I hope you are all well. Will be glad to see and your wife also if she cares to come at any time.

This office is in receipt of your letter of
December 10, 1937.

You are advised that according to our records,
the fr'l Sec. 18, T. 1 N., of the Ohio River base, R. 18 W.
of the State line and fr'l Secs. 12 and 13, T. 1 N. of
the Ohio River base, R. 19 W. of the State line, Ohio,
were entered at the Chillicothe land office January 4, 1810
by Josias Lambert, William Dollarhide and Thomas Sperry
under credit final certificate No. 958 (Prior), recorded
in Miscellaneous Vol. 7 page 61.

Apparently this office intended on January 4,
1810, to issue a patent on this entry but the record of
the same is imperfect, for it carries neither the name
of the President of the United States nor the name or

initials of the Commissioner of the General Land Office.

It is the practice of the office not to furnish copies of such imperfect records. The present owner of any portion of the land involved, however, may procure the issuance of a new and perfect patent in the names of the above mentioned entrymen by complying with certain office requirements which are plainly set forth in the circular herewith enclosed.

Emily, daughter of Thomas, married Sam Drummond who was father of James. Sam Drummond married a second wife--a Saunders, and has sons by her one of whom is Sam Drummonds of Huntington--a

drunkard. He was worth considerable money.

Jeanette (Aunt Jane) married Thomas Drummond. Both are dead. They lived on Symmes Creek 5 miles above Waterloo. Had sons and daughters as follows: Sam and an older brother, Dughters

Dr. A. A. Drummonds is a son of this Sam Drummond.

Bennett, Married Viney Branner, daughter of Campbell Branner, who lived on Ice Creek which flows into Ohio River above Ironton. They has several children some of whom were Marion, Edgar, Effie, etc. Effie lives across the creek from Charlie Russell's

William C. married Mahala, some of the children were; Willie, Charles, Ella, married a Hall. Lives on Ples McKnight hill, because Ples McKnight lived at foot of the hill toward Marion, when I was a boy. One daughter married a Payne and lives on Long Creek 7 or 8 miles from Millersport.

Connelius, married Tilda Wiseman, had a large family, Roma a daughter was head nurse at Hall's hospital Cincinnati about 15 years ago. All have moved to Northern Ohio, I think near Cleveland.

Harriet, Married Thornton Drummond, was mother of Frank Drummond.

Thomas Lambert, son of Thomas my grandfather, died in the Army in 1863. He belonged to the Sixth Ohio Cavalry and was said to be the strongest man in it. Buried at Washington City. He was some kind of an officer.

Mary E. died of Pneumonia at grandfathers house. She is buried at Marion Cemetery.

Jonathan Lambert was buried at Marion or Wilgus. Thornton Margart, and Mary E. were buried (I think) on Lincoln Ridge, John Henry at a soldier's house in Ohio, Jeannette upon Symmes Creek, I think. Bennett in Kansas where two of his sons took him. He died of Chronic diarrhoea. William C., I think, was buried at Wilgus. Connelius, died back of Wheelersburg.

Query, who was the Elizabeth Lambert, recorded in Thomas Lambert, Bibleas dying May 16, 1862. This may have been daughter of Jonathan Lambert, Sr. Father of Thomas Lambert. If so, she was a sister to my grandfather's.

I was on Kanawha River teachin my first school, 1868, and came back past Crown City, in the winter Vint Rankins told me of my grandmother's death--probably winter of 1868-9. Grandfather lived 3 or 4 years. Victoria daughter of Thornton was staying with him after I was married. He could not stand her cooking and asked me to move in with him and let my wife do the cooking, he to furnish everthing. I think we staid about a year when Harriet came in a couple weeks or so before he died and I moved up the road. I first went to housekeeping at Oak Hill Furnace about 4 miles up Symmes Creek where we lived a v very short time, a week or two.

MRS. A. B. WELCH AND F. B. LAMBERT

The Lamberts from whom our family were descended came to Lawrence County, Ohio, according to direct tradition, in 1802. The first of these Lamberts was Josiah Lambert, who was born very likely in New Jersey, as a well-authenticated tradition coming direct from (Richard) a brother of Jonathan Lambert stated that several of the Lamberts enlisted from New Jersey and were killed in the Revolution. This tradition according to Mrs. A. B. Welch, the oldest member of the family of said William (son of Richard) Lambert and one of his direct descendants, states clearly that the Lamberts came from New Jersey. It is not known where they lived before settling in New Jersey. My father always understood that Jonathan Lambert was a German and spoke that language. On the contrary, Mrs. Welch maintains that her investigation makes them Scotch. My father had seen Jonathan Lambert once, and remembered his foreign brogue. As he was only eight years old when he died, it is easily seen that he would not have known one language from another. It seems Thomas Lambert, being a son of the son of Jonathan Lamberts would have known by direct statement, the ancestry of his father. My father's uncle always spoke of Jonathan as being a "Raw Dutchman." I do not know what Mrs. Welch's conclusions were based on.

My father always understood that Jonathan Lambert, came to Ironton from Tazewell county, Va. It may be that his father Jonathan came from New Jersey to Tazewell Co., in fact, I am convinced that that is correct. But, it is certain that they moved to Harrison County, Virginia because the records there show conclusively that Jonathan Lambert married Margaret McFarland there Jan. 17, 1797. He was born April 2, 1772, and

died 1856., hence was past 83 when he died. She was born April 8, 1782 and died 1863, being almost exactly the same age as her husband.

As stated, Josiah is the oldest member of the family of whom we have any record. I do not know when he was born or when he died.

He must have been born at least as early as 1750, as Jonathan was born in 1772. (Later he was married in 1766, hence must have been born as early as 1745-50, possibly earlier)

He came here with three sons, Jonathan, Richard and each of the sons established a branch of the Lambert family. Many of their descendants live today in Lawrence Co., Ohio, and other places.

Note by F. B. Lambert, October 28, 1933--I went to Proctorville, saw Frank Drummond and wife. He showed me a book printed in Scotland and containing a list of Scotch clans, with their list of clan dress in colors and also showing their coat-of-arms. Frank Drummonds "adopted" daughter Louise married a Scotchman who brought over this book. He states (says Frank D.) that the Lamberts were well known in Scotland. They are not, however, listed but the Drummonds and Rankines are. My father Henry L. thought both Rankins were German, he could easily be mistaken. His reasons in both cases were largely guess-work. His uncles referred to Jonathan Lambert., great grandfather of H. L. as a "raw Dutchman". He spoke a foreign accent and wore a little red cap. In the book were referred to above, I note many Scotchmen wore a tuft of red in their caps. Mrs. A. B. Welch now deceased stated to me that her husband's investigation convinced them the Lamberts were Scotch. It is worth investigating and I will look into it.

The following is a copy of a second letter received by Henry Lambert, Sr. by a relative in North Dakota.

Mandan, North Dakota
March 13, 1929

Dear Mr. Lambert,

I received your letter yesterday, and will answer at once and send you the data I have from Jonathan Lambert's Bible. Jonathan Lambert was a brother of my grandfather, Richard Lambert, who had two sons by his first wife who was Linnie Carpenter (daughter of Benjamin Carpenter) and sister of William Carpenter who came to Ohio and settled just above Hanging Rock, Ohio, and later moved to Weston, Missouri with his family. He was in the mercantile business and died there. Their children were Reuben Lambert born 1804, William Lambert, November, 1806. I am the youngest child of William so I guess I belong to the same tribe) I am the only living member of his family. The others were Richard II, Alfred, Richard who killed at the battle of Scary Creek Virginia, during the Civil War. Whitfield who died when about 12 years of age. William G. (who was in the same regiment with William C., your uncle and there was another William in the same company. He was called White Bill). Your uncle Red Bill, my brother Black Bill. White Bill was a cousin, but I do not know to what family he belonged. He was killed in battle, at least, was never heard of after the war. And Elizabeth my father was twice married. My mother was Martha Ward, sister of Edmund and Shadice Ward, her family was, George Washington, Cynthia Carlyle, Laura Morrison, Florence Virginia, Henry Clay, Adelaide Ball, the writer of this data. The family are all buried in Woodland Cemetery at Ironton, Ohio. When Jonathan and Elizabeth McFarland Lambert, your great grandfather and grandmother are buried just east of our family lot-then Richard. My great grandfather had two daughters, twins, one still born, the other one Balinda married, who married J. A. (?) Stover. They had four children, John, Richard, and two girls. Reuben Lambert, Sr. sold his share of inherited land to William, my father and moved out near Arabia. They had 11 children-William, Harrison, Amos, who married, own Lilie of Marion, Barbara, James, Henry and Mary Ellen, who married James B. Greenlee. They had some that died when young and are buried in the family graveyard which is on their old place all except James Henry moved to Kansas in 1870. Atchinson County, Atchinson, they all died there, except Amos who moved to Montrance where he died several years ago. If you want to look up your ancestors, go to Clarksburg, West Virginia-at or near there is where they came from to Ohio. The early records in Lawrence County, Ohio are piled in a heap in the attic of the Court House at Ironton and I am going to try and get the commissioners interested in building additional vaults and preserve them, altho I have been sick most of the past year and have not been able to take it up with them as yet. I just has a letter and book yesterday from Gral Barnes, Bridgeport, West Virginia Rt. 2, sending me the genealogy of the Barnes family.

Indoymests a line that we can obtain much data of the Lambert family in Harrison County, where they came from to Ohio. Jacob Barnes married Hannah Hull whose maiden name was Barnes.

in 1802, and remained in West Virginia. She was a sister of my grandfather, I believe, they had a large family of 14 children and raised them all to manhood, and if you meet a Barnes in West Virginia, they no doubt are related, at least are descendants of the family. They say in their genealogy that the Lamberts were Scotch. I will still contend they came from England but they originally came from France into England about 800. My husband Major A. B. Welch served in the world war with General Liggett on his personal staff and is one of the best historians in the country. I hope this finds you well I and that these notes will be of interest to you. You may hand them to your son after you look them over. If I get more, I will send to you. I will be glad to hear from you again before you go to West Virginia, Harrison County.

I was born February 29, 1894 near a small town called Marion in Lawrence County Ohio and attended the public schools from 3 years of age until I was about 15 years old.

I generally was along with my classes and at the age of 17 (1865-66) taught a couple of schools that were then called subscription schools. I did not have any certificate at that time.

In 1867 or '68 I went to Kanawha County and was examined by County Superintendent D. F. Field. A very fine young man and a scholar for that day. He was a graduate of the high school at Charleston as I understood. From him I got a certificate and went on to Cabin Creek obtained a school at Wyatt Settlement that had about 12 or 15 pupils, two of them are now residents of Huntington - Mr. Samuel Hanna and Mr. Crawford, I do not recall his given name.

I then went about 3 or 4 miles up the creek and taught another school in the Keeney Settlement and then went up about 4 miles farther and taught in the McVey settlement. The first two of these schools I repeated the same and part of next year.

I then came back down into Lawrence County Ohio went for an examination, obtained a certificate and taught a school at the Shattuck School house one term. I then obtained a school at Marion and taught 4 or 5 years at that place. I went to school two or three months at a time, some of these schools were called High Schools at that time. I studied hard all the time and was constantly getting ahead of my schoolmates who often as soon as they got a certificate quit until about the time they wanted another certificate. The majority of them would either come to school to me or someone else to prepare for the coming examination. These schools were called high schools and the reason for this was that the pupils were a little farther along in branches of study than the average pupils attending the primary schools.

key
A Mr. Shirley who perhaps was the best scholar of any of us and myself usually taught these schools - two at some time at each school. In about 1872 or '73 (all these dates are given from memory and might not be exactly correct but are as I recollect them) I came to Cabell County and taught at Salt Rock the next year at Huntington and have taught a school every year from that time until now in Cabell County.

I taught Indian schools in state of Washington, parts of 2 years, schools were only 4 months there so I taught 4 months before I went into Indian Service which was November 1, 1891 and got sick and resigned in 1892, about April or May. Came home and taught a term

last year so I taught a school in each at the time or year that I was in Indian service whether this will count for two years or not someone else will have to decide. I then commenced at Mill Branch in Malcoms District about July 1 or the first Monday in July.

I filled the Justice Office in Union District, Cabell County for 12 years.

Have filled several other little offices such as Secretary of Board of Education, School Examiner.

Dear Mr. Lambert:

I have gotten the pension record of your grandfather which is shown below. The cards in the folder are not in chronological order and I will not attempt to order this record, but copy it as I read it.

John H. Lambert, Corp., Company G., 1st Ohio Vol. Heavy Artillery. Form dated July 28, 1890 when he was 64 years old, a resident of Center Township, Monona Co., Iowa, Castana, P. O. states he enrolled July 17, 1863 in Company G., 1st Regiment. He was honorably discharged at Knoxville, Tennessee July 25, 1865. He has kidney and heart disease and general disability. Nov. 23, 1893, he states that he was 37 years old at enlistment and was 62 as of February 26, 1891. He filed under Act of June 29, 1890 but his disability was not considered a ratable degree.

Application for pension filed May 17, 1894 states he was then living at Winniebago, Thurston County, Nebraska.

In March 1897, he filed again when living in Castana, Monono County, Iowa. He claims heart disease at this time.

Medical Referee signs slip September 21, 1897 and says patient should be examined for deafness, diarrhea, kidney and heart disease and general disability and partial paralysis.

Affidavit files April 5, 1893, age 66 years, gives address Monona County, Iowa. He states at one time that he lived in a number of places but all in Monona County, Iowa.

He states he enlisted June 17, 1863 for five years. During the five years before that he lived in Bates County, Missouri, Lawrence County, Ohio, Gallia County, Ohio, and was a farmer. Since his discharge he has resided in Gallia County, Ohio in the Fall of 1865, then to Lawrence County, Ohio and in 1869 to Iowa about April 5.

He was able to perform two-thirds of a day's work until 3 years ago and since then has not been able to follow his occupation of farmer. Another statement says he was mustered out and returned to his home Walnut Ridge, Ohio for one month then to Aid, Ohio for three years, then to Macedonia, Iowa for 16 years, then to Moorhead, Iowa, Soldiers, Iowa, Mapleton, Iowa, and Castana, Iowa his present address. Most

of these places were in Monona County, Iowa. He claims the diarrhea began during the march from Covington, Kentucky to Nashville, Tennessee. The deafness was caused by a shell bursting at Mantoga River, Tennessee. He has had many periods of being disabled from one day to one month and for the last two years has been totally disabled. (March 18, 1892)

November 15, 1895 he was living at Ticonic, Monona County, Iowa. His claim was rejected because no ratable disability is shown. September 4, 1897 rated for disability on account of heart disease only and given \$8 per month. He was living at Aid, Lawrence County, Ohio at this time. February 27, 1894 in Monona County, Iowa. Center Twp. aged 63 years. July 31, 1890 at Castana P. O., Monona County, Iowa. Also in February 12, 1892. May 17, 1894 in Ticonic P. O., Iowa. February 9, 1898 Superintendent of Lawrence County Infirmary states he is an inmate and is paralyzed and unable to help himself in any way. (Ironton, Ohio)

Letter from F. B. Lambert dated December 16, 1929 asks information.

Letter March 14, 1930 from Widow Division to F. B. Lambert states that soldier married Almesena Rankins who died February 1849 and then Sarah Ann Reynolds who died about 1895. He is now a widower. He had 6 children (2 boys and 4 girls) by last wife and 1 boy now living and 47 years old, by first wife.

He evidently had been on pension roll at Des Moines, Iowa as his record was transferred from there to Columbus, Ohio.

February 11, 1898 - Says he is a widower, wife Sarah Ann Reynolds died about three years ago. He was married about 35 years ago in Wayne County, Iowa by Clerk of Court. His first wife, Almesena Rankins died February 1849. He was born in Lawrence County, Ohio and enlisted at 37 years of age. His enlistment record shows he was 5 feet 10 inches in height, fair complexion, blue eyes, dark hair, occupation farmer. He was in Knoxville, Tennessee July 25, 1865 (date of discharge?)

I did not copy the war service record as he seemed to remain in the same company throughout the war. It is his home life in which you are interested I understand.

We had dinner with one of the daughters. They came and got us and brought us back in the evening. We are having beautiful weather right now and we are both very well. I haven't been able to find out a thing more than I have told you.

I'm sorry I'm so late in answering your letter but I'm so busy that the time I take to write is really a sacrifice.

I drive out nine miles every day to teach school. Besides this I do all my own housework, washing, ironing, etc. Then with church and certain civic duties I never have a moment to spare. But I like it that way--I'm not complaining.

I can tell you very little about my mother. She died at the age of 22 years with Tuberculosis. I was only four years old so all I know is what I have been told. I did gather a little information.

Her father - John Collins moved to Nebraska from Iowa.
John Collins's father - John Mason Collins came from Missouri to Ia.
His mother - Becky Stevenson also from Missouri.

Virginia Argyle (wife of John Collins and my grandmother) born in Missouri.

Her mother - Jane Barnes

Her father - Huxley Argyle came from Scotland - direct descendants from Duke of Argyle.

That is all I know. An aunt started to trace the family tree but died before she finished it.

As to my full brothers and sisters I have none. One brother died shortly after my mother when he was four years old. He probably had Tuberculosis, too.

I have 2 half sisters who live in Seattle, Washington - one near Clark, South Dakota, and one in Madison, South Dakota. One half brother whom I haven't see for many years who lives in Missouri and one in Aberdeen, South Dakota. The one in Aberdeen is the youngest one in our family. He married a German girl while over there in the army. They have 2 children - a boy and a girl.

Phyllis a sister in Seattle has 2 little girls. Mae the other one in Seattle has only one boy (an adopted child). My sister near Clark has 3 girls and 1 boy. Blanche, the half sister in Madison, has 1 girl and 2 boys.

I have one daughter who has her Master's Degree and works in a school system as a Guidance Counselor. She has one daughter (my only grandchild) who is named after me and my grandmother, Virginia Argyle. My middle name is Virginia, you may know. I am sorry I do not have any pictures to send you now. I may later. All of mine are slides.

People going to Church at old Bloomingdale, Bethesda, Mud River kept the roads on Sundays etc, full of horses and buggies. They came long distances up on Ohio River and all parts of Country.

I don't think he ever taught in Lawrence County. He kept store at Marion for a while before he bought above the house.

I remember following as early settlers around Marion: William Wilson and family lived near the Symmes Creek at upper end of Marion. Emily Wilson was his wife. They had several children among whom was George, Mag, Lucinda, Lettie, Hettie and at least another girl. George died about 30 years ago or longer--even before his mother. Mag married W. H. H. Miller. He moved to Washington D. C., died and was buried at Marion. He was raised at Millersport. Lucinda married a Jordan who lived at Ashland the last I knew of him, he boarded with me at Marion once and went to school.

Allen Boggs lived just beyond the Burton house where Sam F. Jobe family living, he runs the Independent Transfer Co. Allen Boggs learned to the confederacy. His daughters were named Cinda, Suzan, Lutisha. Union Soldiers came home on the furlough and shot into his house with his family there in his absence. He moved them to Covington, Kentucky. Suzan married James Hunter a gambler.

Dr. Manasses Litch Lived on the corner--the first house on right of the road up Symmes Creek from Huntington. Manasses, George and Lincoln, John, James, William, and two girls, Minerva Romain were his children. Minerva who married Nat Burges. Romain who married James Henry Lambert a third cousin to my grandfather. Litch practiced medicine some but drank more liquor. William was killed in the army and the others moved into the northwest--North or South Dakota. John died in Gallia County. I don't know what became of the others.

Dr. George Shattuck had following children--Simeon who went into union army and discharged at end of the War but was never heard of. He was down on Mississippi River probably at Memphis, took a boat for Cincinnati but when the boat reached Cincinnati he was not to be found. John, Charles, and William all became doctors and all are now dead John was about a year older than I. William younger than Charles who was about a year younger than I. Two daughters--May and Sophia.

Nat Shattuck a brother of Dr. George was in the union army, and came home and put up a saloon and kept it for a year or so sold out and went West. His boys were General George Shattuck who married an Irish girl before the war, came back after the war and moved with her to Chicago. I never heard of him since. Reuben another son was killed in the army. Bennett was the army but moved west after the war. Dewitt "Bird" with whom I used to coon hunt was not in army but moved west and was living with family a few years ago in Missouri. Sophia and Mary probably know.

My grandmother was Polly Sampson. The Sampsons all had tempers and she was no exception. She only quarrelled at times but grandfather paid little attention to her. She whipped me hard at times.

SUNDAY MAY 3, 1931

Visited Kelly's Mills, Ohio, today. We lived there about 1876 when I was a child. The old wooden bridge is still standing, and is used but I was informed, is condemned. It looks practically the same as it did when I was a child and must be at least 100 years old. I believe even some of the wide outside boards are still on it. The old board or shingle roof has been replaced by time. We lived on the right hand side of the road about 100-200 ft. going toward it- Bill Elswick's family on the other side. Both houses are gone. I found John Race 60 yrs. old R.#1 Hanging Rock and Otto Manning same address. Manning is about 70 yrs. old and remembered Pa. Said he taught there two or more years. School house burned (I think he said) 3 or four years ago. Foundation stones now piled in Monning's yard. He said Bill Ellswick once run the mill which stood just below the bridge.

Charles McCarthy, Editor the Ironton Tribune told me that Miss Jermie Merrill Columbus, Ohio, had 1870 files of the Ironton Register. Chas. Collet is editor of the Morning News. Copied following records

Old "Henry" Records of Cemetery at Ironton, Ohio.

James Henry died Nov. 10 1839 in the 50th year of his life.

Elizabeth , wife of James Henry Sr. Born June 14th, 1795 Died Oct. 17th, 1877.

James Henry Jr., Died May 30th, 1845 aged 23 yrs. 2mo. 24 days.

(I have heard the Henrys and Davidsons, both buried in the old Henry graveyard are related to the Lamberts. I would have to check this to be certain.)

Lambert's Bible which gives the dates of their births, etc. Mrs. and Mr. Willard Smith, now live in Jonathan Lambert's house. Their address is 1704 - 2nd ave., Ironton, Ohio. The old house of another Lambert just above is now used for a barn. Mrs. Smith told me one of her relatives Sanderson Gray, a Civil War vet 85 yrs old an inmate formerly of soldiers home at Quincy, Illinois knew Jonathan L. and used to steal apples from him when a boy. His son, Charles Gray, works for Horoko Manif Co. St. Louis, Missouri. She wants the old man's address. Try to find him through Treas. or Pension Dept. I found the graves of Rev. John Lee and Wife, also several Henrys.

Staid a year or so. Went to Guyandotte for a year or so and in March 1905 came back to home place. Staid about 13 mos. and moved to Jim Stevens farm on head of Seven Mile. Died of Cancer on wrist.

Abner Knight about June 1903. His wife died spring 1906. Both buried at Oak Hill. Sweetie Knight married Jim Mounts. Divorced. She is not married. I don't think Elizie Knight married Wm. Newman son of Pete Newman. Sweetie and Elizie Knight were running a kind of Hotel in Huntington in 1928.

Henry Jefferson died Jyly 1910. Buried at Oak Hill. Wash Jefferson died _____.

I arrived at Sioux City about 8 P.M. Sept. 22, 1940. No one home except Uncle Charley, 2617 28th St. They didn't expect me 'till Monday. I shall not interview him.

John Henry Lambert's old Bible is now owned by Mrs. Oliver Benjamin Ipsal (O.B.), of Carpenter, S.D.

He went to California via Sioux City, 1849, when only a single house, a log, was in Sioux City. It was called the Chicago House. He evidently forded the Mississippi River, as they had no bridge or ferry. They were driving an ox team. Quite a colony went. They arranged their camp at night, in a circle, to guard against Indians. He found considerable gold, and tried to send some of it back to his father in Ohio, but the man never delivered it. He had two or three thousand dollars worth. I had a nugget that he dug with a jack knife out of a rock, the first piece he ever dug, worth \$2.50. It got burned up when Minnie King's house burned at Macey, Neb. Old souvenirs, pictures of Thos. Lambert, Jr. &c. were burned.

John Henry Lambert went back from California and lived in Ohio until after the civil war. He moved from Ohio to Council Bluffs, Iowa about 71 years ago, when I was about a year old. I was born Oct. 22, 1868; so he must have come over here in 1869. He worked at Council Bluffs about two years, when he moved to Potawatamie County, (same county as Council Bluffs, and lived on a farm (40 acres) which he owned. He lived there about twelve years, and sold his forty acres and moved to Mornona County and bought 80 acres near Mappleton--six miles south.

Some time before the war he moved to Missouri, and tried to farm there, but had to fight against the Southerners. He slept out a night, with others, to keep from being killed. About six

horsemen of the bushwhackers got after him, and Charlie Reynolds, my Uncle. They were fording a creek. Three of the horsemen fell off their horses in the creek, while the horses were drinking, and two as they went up the bank.

He left Missouri, where he owned land which he traded to a man named Bill Black for a team of young mules and a team of young horses. I was ten to twelve years old before he sold the land; but in the meantime he moved back to Hio and settled near his father, between Jonathan and Thomas Lambert's place, up a hollow, to the left of the road. It was probable that he lived in the log house shown me (F.B.L.) below the road, between Thos. Lambert, Srs. and Jonathan's (Father's Uncle).

Uncle Bennett lived on the left Fork of Symmes Creek, above Thos. Lambert's going up.

My mother lived, during the civil war, at the log house above. One of my sisters, Janie, died while father was in the army. She was young, 3--4 ?

An older son was born dead after the war. Two boys and five girls lived. Janie died, and all the others are living, except the oldest, Frances Lambert.

Frances married William Farley, who lived in Potawatamie County when they were married. (William Farlet was a very good man, farmer. A shoemaker by trade). He sold out there the same time father did and moved to Monona County. He lived near father, about a half mile west of us, for about twenty years. He then moved to Warren County, Iowa, near Des Moines, where he lived 3--4 years, and then moved to Thurston County, where he died, and is buried, near Homer, West Winnebago, Nebraska, near Homer Cemetary.

Frances Lambert is buried there, also. They had seven children of whom the three oldest are dead, William, Henry and Charles (Sweedie). Stella, also is dead. She was married. The boys died young, of diptheria, within a week, and two, William and Henry, the oldest, are buried in one grave, in the Ash graveyard, in Monona County, south of Mapleton, a country graveyard. No stones, but they keep a record. Stella is buried at the Logan Cemetary, in Sioux City. She married George King, brother to Roland King, Minnie's husband. Jess, Velma, and Arlo are only children of Frances living.

Aunt Lizzie says her mother claimed her father came to Iowa when Chas.Lambert, our Uncle, was about six years old. If so, they came in the fall of 1868, to Council Bluffs. John Henry Lambert worked there in the brick yard. He weighed about 180 lbs. and was a good scrapper. He never drank much. He told Chas.Lambert, his son, that he never got drunk but once in his life. Got drunk, purposely, to have a fight, but didn't repeat, as it taught him better. He

belonged to Co.G. in 5th Va. (?). He never voted a Democratic ticket in his life. He was a life long Republican. A Methodist church member.

John Henry Lambert owned two acres of land at Wheeler's Grove, near 1-1/2 miles from where we bought land and built a four room, two-story house of ship-lap, with no plaster. Two beds in a room downstairs. Had a cook and room stove in other room, and cooked, ate, and lived there, and had two bed rooms upstairs. The nearest town was Macedonia. A railroad later went through the town. School was one-fourth of a mile south of us. Father owned forty acres there. He sold to Olliver Opsall and moved to Minnonsa County, near Morehead, then to six miles south of Mapleton. Bought 80 acres. Mother died there in February, 1894.

My mother was a Baptist, but as there was no Baptist church there she joined the Methodists. She was a real Christian.

No buffalo here when I was a boy. No deer, but stragglers. There are wolves here yet, but they are scattered. I had hounds catch and kill wolves after I was married. Two hounds killed a wolf. My father settled in Potawatamie County, about 35 miles east of Council Bluffs. They lived south-east of Macedonia. They lived there when John Henry Lambert came from Ohio. They all lived in Missouri before the war. Grandfather Reynolds was a Democrat.

We lived in Potawatamie County until I was 12 or 13 years old, when we moved to near Mapleton. We lived at Morehead, Ia. a year or so. This was in same County as Mapleton. We lived at Mapleton until about 1896. We never kept house after mother died, about February, 1894. Ed. Lucart moved to Nebraska in 1895.

THE RECOLLECTIONS OF THE PAYNE FAMILY.

BY L. L. PAYNE.

JOHN PAYNE, SR. CAME FROM HENRY COUNTY, VIRGINIA ABOUT 1790 AND SETTLED AT THE MOUTH OF BUCKEYE CREEK, AT THE WEST END OF OLD CAPTAIN PAYNE. THEN, ABOUT 1800 WILLIAM PAYNE, SON OF JOHN PAYNE, SR. CAME. HE SETTLED AT OR NEAR WHERE WILGUS NOW STANDS, RAISED A LARGE FAMILY AND DIED OF SMALL POX. ABOUT 1838 HE BUILT THE FIRST SCHOOL HOUSE THAT WAS BUILT IN MASON TOWNSHIP, JUST ACROSS THE PIKE IN FRONT OF OLD FAIRVIEW CHURCH AT WILGUS. THE WRITER OF THIS SKETCH SAW THE ENDS OF THE DECAYED, ROUND LOGS AT LEAST SEVENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO.

AFTER BUILDING THIS SCHOOL HOUSE WILLIAM PAYNE WENT TO VIRGINIA AND HIRED A TEACHER BY THE NAME OF BURWELL SPURLOCK TO TEACH THREE MONTHS AND GAVE HIM A GOOD, YOUNG HORSE FOR HIS SERVICES. MR. SPURLOCK RETURNED, AND TAUGHT THE SAME SCHOOL FOR THREE YEARS.

ELLIS PAYNE, SR. A BROTHER OF WILLIAM PAYNE, CAME FROM VIRGINIA ABOUT 1808 AND SETTLED ON LONG CREEK, ABOUT A MILE ABOVE WILGUS; HE RAISED A LARGE FAMILY.

GENERAL JUBAL EARLEY, C. S. A'S. MOTHER, WAS A PAYNE, RAISED IN HENRY COUNTY. A. P. HILL, ONE OF LEE'S GREAT CORPS COMMANDERS, WAS A SON OF A PAYNE. HE WAS KILLED AT THE BATTLE OF FIVE FORKS THE DAY BEFORE LEE SURRENDERED; MY BROTHER SAW HIM AFTER HE WAS KILLED.

GENERAL HENRY D. PAYNE, COMMANDER OF THE REBEL BLACK HORSE CAVALRY, WAS A VIOLENT REBEL JUDGE. JUDGE ISABEL, OF HUNTINGTON TOLD BILL HOLSHUH AND I THAT HIS MOTHER WAS A PAYNE; BUT HE FAVORED HIS FATHER, AND THAT I WAS A TYPICAL SOUTHERN MAN. HE TOLD US THAT THOSE OLD PAYNES WOULD KNOW US ON SIGHT, AS I AND THEY LOOKED LIKE BROTHERS. THEY BOAST OF THE LONG HEAD AND HIGH NOSE. THERE WAS NO APPEARANCE OF AFRICAN BLOOD ABOUT US.

I WAS AT AN ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE M.E. CHURCH. THERE WAS ONE OF THE "BIG GUNS" THERE FROM RICHMOND. THIS MEETING WAS IN KENTUCKY. THERE WERE AT LEAST ONE HUNDRED PREACHERS PRESENT.

THIS MAN'S NAME WAS HILL--A NEPHEW OF GENERAL A.P. HILL WHO WAS KILLED AT FIVE FORKS. HE PICKED ME OUT AND CAME TO ME SAYING THAT I ALONE HAD THE ONLY PLYMOUTH HEAD IN THE CROWD. HE ASKED HOW LONG IT HAD BEEN THAT WE HAD BEEN AWAY FROM VIRGINIA. HE TOLD ME THERE WAS ONE FAMILY THAT LEFT OR WENT AWAY FROM VIRGINIA, BUT THAT THEY HAD LOST TRACE OF THEM. HE THEN SAID THAT HE WAS FULLY CONVINCED THAT OUR FAMILY WAS THAT FAMILY.

MY GRANDMOTHER PAYNE WAS A WILSON. YOU CAN SEE THE TRUE TYPE IN BROTHER MOSE AND GROVER HULDAN'S ALLEN. GRANDMA WAS A FINE OLD LADY. HER FATHER WAS ONE OF THE BRAVE MEN THAT THRESHED OLD "JOHN BULL". HE WAS IN THAT STRUGGLE FOR SEVEN LONG YEARS. HE LIVED TO BE 87 YEARS OLD AND HE SLEEPS IN MARION CEMETARY. HE CARRIED AT LEAST A HALF DOZEN WOUNDS.

WILLIAM PAYNE'S FAMILY CONSISTED OF ELEVEN CHILDREN--SIX GIRLS AND FIVE BOYS, TO-WIT: JOEL, MOSES, MATHEW, URIAH, ULIN, THE

GIRLS WERE BETSY, SALLIE, CYNTHIA, NANCY, MELISSA AND MARINDA. MARINDA WAS THE GRANDMOTHER OF DR. LEWIS, OF HUNTINGTON, WEST VA.

ELLIS PAYNE, SR. CHILDREN WERE: JOHN, MILTON, ELLIOTT, BURWELL, RHODA AND JENNIE. I CAN GIVE THE HISTORY OF THE OFF-SPRING OF WILLIAM PAYNE AND ELLIS, PAYNE, SR.

I WILL GIVE YOU MY RECOLLECTION OF THE BACK PART OF LAWRENCE COUNTY WHEN THE FIRST TWO HORSE WAGON CAME ON LONG CREEK WHEN WITCHES HELD FULL SWAY. UNCLE JOE TOLD ME THEY WOULD WIRE HIM TO A HORSE, RIDE HIM TO A DRUNKEN DANCE, AND HITCH HIM UP. AN OLD WOMAN ALWAYS RODE HIM. THEN, THEY WOULD INDULGE IN A DRUNKEN DANCE AND LEAVE HIM HITCHED UP IN THE RAIN. THEY THEN WOULD RIDE HIM BACK AND TURN HIM BACK TO JOE; HIS BACK WOULD BE SORE AND HIS HANDS FULL OF BRIERS. THAT WAS ABOUT THE CRUDE IDEAS OF THOSE PEOPLE.

Dear Cousin:

I'm sorry I'm so late in answering your letter but I am so busy that the time I take to write is really a sacrifice.

I drive out nine miles every day to teach school. Besides this I do all my own housework, washing, ironing, etc. Then with church and certain civic duties I never have a moment to spare. But I like it that way--I'm not complaining.

I can tell you very little about my mother. She died at the age of 22 years with Tuberculosis. I was only four years old so all I know is what I have been told. I did gather a little information.

Her father - John Collins moved to Nebraska from Iowa.
John Collin's father - John Mason Collins came from Missouri to Ia. His mother - Becky Stevenson also from Missouri.

Virginia Argyle (wife of John Collins and my grandmother) born in Missouri.

Her mother - Jane Barnes

Her father - Haxley Argyle came from Scotland - direct descendants from Duke of Argyle.

That is all I know. An aunt started to trace the family tree but died before she finished it.

As to my full brothers and sisters I have none. One brother died shortly after my mother when he was four years old. He probably had Tuberculosis, too.

I have 2 half sisters who live in Seattle, Washington - one near Clark, South Dakota, and one in Madison, South Dakota. One half brother whom I haven't see for many years who lives in Missouri and one in Aberdeen, South Dakota. The one in Aberdeen is the youngest one in our family. He married a German girl while over there in the army. They have 2 children - a boy and a girl.

Phyllis a sister in Seattle has 2 little girls. The other one in Seattle has only one boy (an adopted child). My sister near Clark has 3 girls and 1 boy. Blanche, the half sister in Madison, has 1 girl and 2 boys.

I have one daughter who has her father's Degree and works in a school system as a Guidance Counselor. She has one daughter (a only grandchild) who is named after my grandmother, Virginia Argyle. My middle name is Virginia, you may know. I am sorry I do not have any pictures to send you now. I may later. All of mine are slides.

war, and so, were ruined by floods. Eventually, they were taken out by the Government. My father, W.C. Miller, built two of these locks by contract, one just above the mouth of Fult River, and one at Branchland. His foreman, Billingly Stafford, was drowned during this work and was buried in our old cemetery.

During his boyhood in Barboursville, Thomas E Miller saw many things remindful of earlier years. He heard, as a lad that his grandfather Miller had been the contractor for the Cabell County Court House and jail, which were built in 1857. The Court House, afterwards Morris-Harvey College and now a public school, had a bell fry and a bell which was supported by a platform of poplar boards. During the civil war, some of the Federal troops occupying Barboursville, were quartered in the Court House. Some of these young soldiers, doubtless homesick, whiled away their time by carving their names in the poplar planks of the bell platform. There were 18 names so carved, but Mr. Miller remembers only one, that of a Poffenbarger, initials unknown because his carving was so artistic. The old jail was built of hewn logs, with an outer and an inner layer, with a space between them which was filled with rocks and bruckbats. This was not the first Court House and Jail in Barboursville. J.W. Miller wrote that the original buildings were put up in 1814 and that there was a whipping post near by.

A man named Jack Murphy was dying, and an N.Y.W. railroad detective was so badly wounded that he only lived about a week. His name was Byron Slater. About ten men were killed around Williamson that year.

In addition to Federal homes for disabled soldiers, there were many State homes. It is possible that John H. Lambert was a resident of a State home for Civil War veterans. According to available information, a State soldier's home was located in Sandusky, Ohio; also at Quincy, Illinois, and Lafayette, Indiana.
