

Annual Brain Expo helps children explore brain function with fun activities



About 800 elementary school children will visit the Memorial Student Center Thursday, April 4, to learn about the brain and nervous system through activities and games.

This is the 11th annual Brain Expo to be held at Marshall. This year's event features 26 interactive stations where children explore various parts of their nervous system. They also learn how the brain controls their body and why

healthy lifestyle choices lead to better brain health. Activities at the stations include touching a real brain, playing a memory game, coloring their own "brain hat," examining drug effects and building brain cell-shaped key chains.

Overseeing activities will be nearly 200 Marshall students and faculty from the College of Science, departments of psychology and communications disorders, the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine and the School of Nursing. Community partners will participate as well, including St. Mary's Medical Center representatives, who will present a station about brain and spinal cord safety. Representatives from Cabell-Huntington neuroscience, neurophysiology and stroke departments will each host stations as well.

The event is part of Brain Awareness Week, an annual global effort founded in 1996 by the Dana Alliance for Brain Initiatives. Marshall's Brain Expo was founded by Dr. Nadja Spitzer and Dr. Brian Antonsen, both of whom are neuroscientists and faculty in the Department of Biological Sciences.

"Events like the Brain Expo are an excellent way of increasing public awareness of brain research at Marshall and in gaining the interest of students who may choose a career path in science, technology, engineering or mathematics," Spitzer said. "Through the many fun, hands-on activities, attendees get to better understand the brain. University student volunteers learn valuable skills in science communication. Our goal for the Brain Expo is to interest children in science and research at a young age though games and activities that demonstrate the relevance of neuroscience in everyday life."





Marshall to present lecture on Confederate economic ideology and its continued presence in American politics



Marshall University's Amicus Curiae Lecture Series will continue its Spring 2019 series with a presentation by Dr. Heather Cox Richardson at 7 p.m. Thursday, April 11, in Brad D. Smith Foundation Hall on Huntington's campus.

Richardson's lecture has the same title as her newest book, scheduled to be published by Oxford University Press in 2019: "How the South Won the Civil War: The Significance of the West in American History." According to Richardson, the American Civil War should have destroyed

forever the Confederacy's idea that society worked best when a few wealthy men controlled the economy and directed the lives of workers, but, due to an unusual quirk of history, Westward expansion nurtured and preserved its ideology.

Richardson holds that as more settlers moved across the Mississippi River, and the West developed its own identity, separate from that of the East or the South, the idea lived on that a few wealthy white men should oversee the economy and people of color. She contends that in the late 20th century, politicians embracing this ideology became ascendant and have shaped American politics ever since.

Richardson is a professor of history at Boston College. She earned her bachelor's and doctoral degrees in history at Harvard University. She is the award-winning author of several books, including *To Make Men Free: A History of the Republican Party; The Death of Reconstruction: Race, Labor and Politics in the Post-Civil War North, 1864-1901,* and *The Greatest Nation on Earth: Republican Economic Policies During the Civil War.* She is also a national commentator on American political history and the Republican Party.

"Dr. Richardson offers an interesting perspective on historical issues that continue to impact our current political discourse," said Patricia Proctor, director of the Simon Perry Center for Constitutional Democracy, which sponsors the lecture series with funding from the West Virginia Humanities Council.

"One of the great things about this lecture series is that it offers a diversity of views from notable scholars about the issues with which we grapple," said Proctor. "Dr. Richardson has spent her career studying and writing about 19th Century American history surrounding the Civil War and the American West, and is widely recognized for the excellence of her work. I think her lecture will offer an interesting perspective."

Later in April will be the final Amicus Curiae lecture of the semester. It is planned for 7 p.m. Thursday, April 25, at the Brad. D. Smith Foundation Hall and will feature Nancy Isenberg and Andrew Burstein. They will give a presentation entitled, "The Problem of Democracy," reflecting on President John Adams and President John Quincy Adams, their philosophies and how they are relevant today.

Marshall's Empty Bowls fundraiser set for April 12



The College of Arts and Media joins local nonprofits and volunteers to host its 16th Annual Empty Bowls fundraising event from 10:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Friday, April 12, at First Presbyterian Church, 1015 5th Ave.

Community members are invited to the church to purchase bowls created by Marshall University art students and other local volunteers. Bowls will be sold for \$15 each, with proceeds going to the Facing Hunger Food Bank. With their purchase of a bowl, guests also can enjoy a bowl of soup, donated by area volunteers and restaurants, and participate in a silent auction, also benefiting the food bank. Cash and cards will be accepted at the event.

"As Empty Bowls has been a partnership effort with the food bank for sixteen years, we see a variety of results from that partnership," said Cynthia Kirkhart, executive director of the Facing Hunger Food Bank. "First and foremost, the connection of the students' artwork and academic pursuits to provide the bowls is a wonderful symmetry of academics, art and service. I am always thrilled to provide the students with the total number of meals that their class production requirement provides.

"As an example, the first-year students make 20 bowls each, representing 2,250 meals. The advanced students make 40 bowls each, and that student is providing 4,500 meals with that number of bowls. Then you add the event itself, with the community coming out and purchasing the bowls and sitting together with a simple meal of soup, bread and a drink, understanding the same impact on hunger that their purchase is making to those needing hunger relief."

The class for which Marshall students create the bowls is about both art and community involvement.

"Empty Bowls is an opportunity for Marshall University art students to understand how their art can make a positive impact on their community," said Frederick Bartolovic, associate professor of ceramics and organizer of the event. "It is challenging sometimes for artists to get the opportunity to make such a direct impact on their communities. As students form the shape of each bowl, they know that single piece will help to feed over 100 people."

When they begin the semester, most of the students have never thrown a bowl before, he said.

"The learning curve is steep," Bartolovic said. "Yet with each bowl they throw, they hone their skills and the bowls get amazingly good. The Empty Bowls assignment comes about halfway through the semester, so by that point, my students are already making their best work."

This event also gives students the joy of seeing people buy their art, he said.

"Once the day comes, the bowls are set out and each student gets to see people interested in their bowls and the happiness that can come from a handmade object being introduced into someone's life," Bartolovic said. "In this way, the benefits are twofold. It's an amazing experience that takes a semester of hard work, but it results in students who become engaged with their community, literally in a hands-on way. That is inevitably a fulfilling and rewarding experience that allows young artists to be community activists, directly demonstrating how art can make a positive influence on our community."

Dr. Tammy Johnson, dean of admissions and executive director of enrollment services at Marshall, has been named to the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers (AACRAO) Leaders in Enrollment Advancing Diversity (LEAD) Curriculum Work Group.



Seasoned neurologist and neuropsychologist join Marshall Health





Neurologist J. Ivan Lopez, M.D., and neuropsychologist Steven P. Brown, Psy.D., ABPP, join the <u>Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine</u>, <u>Marshall Health</u> and Cabell Huntington Hospital, bringing more than 50 years of combined experience to the department of neurology.

Lopez, a board-certified neurologist, has been named professor in the department of neurology at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. He typically sees adult and pediatric patients for headaches, seizures and stroke. He also performs

procedures involving Botox® for various diagnoses such as migraines and spasticity.

He earned his medical degree from La Salle University in Mexico City, Mexico. He completed his neurology residency at the University of South Alabama in Mobile, Alabama. He is certified by the United Council for Neurologic Subspecialties in Headache Medicine and the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology with a special qualification in Child Neurology. He is a fellow of the American Academy of Neurology and the American Headache Society.

Brown, a board-certified neuropsychologist, has been named assistant professor in the department of neurology at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. He has combined experience in U.S. Air Force, VA and private hospital settings, with specialization in the evaluation of adults with traumatic brain injury, stroke, Parkinson's disease, multiple sclerosis, ALS, memory disorder, brain tumor and psychiatric disorder.

He earned his doctorate in clinical psychology from Biola University in La Mirada, California. He completed a pre-doctoral internship at Wright Patterson USAF Medical Center in Ohio and a postdoctoral fellowship in clinical neuropsychology at the Medical College of Wisconsin in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Student research showcased at Health Science Research Day



More than 100 students and postdoctoral, residents and fellows participated in the 31st Annual Marshall University Health Science Research Day Friday, March 22, at the Marshall University Medical Center.

Organized and sponsored by the <u>Joan C.</u> <u>Edwards School of Medicine</u>, the Health Science Research Day also partners with the School of Pharmacy and the College of Health Professions to highlight original research and educational innovations by undergraduate, medical, pharmacy,

nursing and other health professions students, as well as graduate students and postdoctoral trainees in medicine, biomedical sciences, and clinical and translational sciences.

"Over the last several years we have seen a dramatic change in the Research Day presentations," said Uma Sundaram, M.D., vice dean for research and graduate education at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. "More graduate and medical students are doing research, the quality of the research has greatly increased and the research that is being done is very relevant for the health issues West Virginians face."

This year's keynote address was delivered by Bishr Omary, M.D., Ph.D., of the University of Michigan, where he serves as research advisor to the dean, professor of molecular and integrative physiology, professor of internal medicine and the H. Marvin Pollard Professor of Gastroenterology. During his keynote, Omary, the incoming president of the American Gastroenterological Association, presented on the intermediate filament cytoskeleton in health and disease.

The daylong symposium also featured oral and poster presentations in the areas of clinical science, basic science, case studies, medical education and quality improvement. More than 25 faculty members from the Schools of Medicine and Pharmacy served as judges and selected the best abstracts in categories of basic science, clinical research, education and case study.
