Faculty members to offer perspectives on Russian-Ukrainian crisis

MARCH 2, 2022

Marshall University will present a virtual panel discussion at 2 p.m., Wednesday, March 2, with several faculty members, including Dr. Anara Tabyshalieva, an associate professor of history with expertise on war and peacebuilding in the Russian, Eurasian and Asian regions. She was born in the Soviet Union and has worked in Russia.

Joining Tabyshalieva for "Urgent Panel: War in Ukraine" will be longtime Marshall biology professor Dr. Victor Fet, a native of Ukraine who grew up in Russia, and Dr. Kateryna Rudnytzky Schray, a faculty administrator and professor of English, whose family is from Ukraine and who has taught at the university level in that country. Dr. Stefan Schoeberlein, an assistant professor of English and native of Germany, will also join the panel and provide perspectives on the European Union reaction.

The panel discussion will be moderated by Dr. Robert Bookwalter, dean of the College of Liberal Arts. It is sponsored by Marshall Libraries and was initiated by Fet, who still has many friends and relatives in both Ukraine and Russia.

The four-member panel will answer questions such as why the invasion is happening, how the people of Ukraine are responding, what can the West do to stop the war and does the war threaten Europe?

Also, at 5 p.m., Wednesday, on the Memorial Plaza, Student Government Association and the Office of Military and Veterans Affairs have planned a candlelight vigil for the conflict. It is expected that brief remarks by several members of the Marshall community will also occur. Organizers say mental health experts will be available, if needed.

Abbreviated bios of panel participants:

Victor Fet, Ph.D.- Professor, Department of Biological Sciences, Marshall University. Born in Ukraine in 1955; educated in Russia; in the USA in 1988, teaching biology at Marshall since 1995. Fet is an expert in zoology, genetics, evolutionary science, biogeography, biosystematics and the history of science. He has translated and edited books on zoology and history of science. Fet has written and published six books of poetry in Russian; translated Lewis Carroll into Russian; authored essays (in Russian and English) on Carroll and Vladimir Nabokov. Over 100 literary publications in periodicals of USA and Europe. Science fantasy books: Alice and the Time Machine; Dolly's Follies (in Russian and English). Advisory editor for Evertype (Scotland) in translating Lewis Carroll into rare languages. Editor, "Day of Russian Expat Poetry" (almanac, 2019-2022).

Stefan Schoeberlein, Ph.D. – Assistant professor of English and the director of digital humanities, Marshall University. Schoeberlein's research focuses on the intersections of science, literature and technology in the nineteenth century. He is currently concluding work on his first monograph, based on his award-winning dissertation on the mapping of the brain in the 1800s and its impact on literary production.

Originally from Germany, he has taught at Marshall since 2018. He spent a high school exchange in Donetsk, Ukraine and still has friends in Ukraine.

Kateryna Schray, Ph.D. – Professor of English and the director of the Center for Student Success. An award-winning teacher and a productive scholar, Dr. Kateryna (Rudnytzky) Schray is the founding director of Marshall's Center for Student Success. She joined Marshall's English department as a medievalist and language historian in the fall of 1996. Schray was born into a thriving Ukrainian community in Philadelphia, the daughter of a prominent Ukrainian family. Her father dedicated his life's work to advocating for human rights and religious freedom for Ukraine while it was under Soviet control, and his work became the family's mission. Schray served several terms as coordinator of the English Language Summer Program for the Lviv Theological Academy (Lviv, Ukraine) and works closely with Ukrainian colleagues on various projects throughout the world.

Anara Tabyshalieva, Ph.D. – Associate professor, Department of History, Marshall University. Areas of specialization are history of Soviet Union and Russia, history of Asia, women, war and peace, gender issues, conflict management, human security. Teaches history of Russia and the Soviet Union; history of Asia; world history; and women, war, and peace. Served as co-editor of the United Nations University volumes Escaping Victimhood: Children, Youth and Post-Conflict Peacebuilding, (Tokyo, New York, 2013) and Defying Victimhood: Women and Post-Conflict Peacebuilding (Tokyo, New York, 2012).

Tabyshalieva is the recipient of several awards and fellowships including Senior Fellowship at the US Institute of Peace, Fulbright Fellowship, Dorothy Cadbury Fellowship at University of Birmingham (U.K.), and UNESCO Silk Road Fellowship. She has received support from the

John D. and Catherine T. Mac Arthur Foundation, U.S. Institute of Peace, UNESCO (France), United Nation Development Programme (UNDP), United Nations University (Japan) and Wilson Center (Washington, D.C.) for research projects.

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Marshall, West Virginia State University reach athletic training agreement

Marshall University's athletic training program has partnered with West Virginia State University (WVSU) to establish an articulation agreement for a more efficient transfer of students from undergraduate studies at WVSU to Marshall's graduate athletic training program. Marshall's athletic training program is housed in the College of Health Professions.

The agreement establishes a plan of study for undergraduate students at West Virginia State University that will allow them to then enter the Professional Master of Science in Athletic Training

(PMSAT) program at Marshall University.

WVSU will advise and counsel students to enroll in the prerequisite athletic training courses at WVSU that have been accepted by the PMSAT program at Marshall University. Course substitutions may be available upon the approval of the appropriate Marshall department chair and academic dean.

Each year, the PMSAT program at Marshall will reserve two seats for prospective students attending WVSU. Dr. Zach Garrett serves as the program director for the Athletic Training Program at Marshall University. He says they're excited to establish an agreement with West Virginia State University to further provide Athletic Training education throughout the region.

"To be able to establish a relationship with one of our state's historically Black colleges is special," Garrett said. "We're looking forward to what this could mean for the proliferation of athletic training students in our region and we look forward to having our first set of students from West Virginia State University."

Jay Canterbury is an instructor of sports studies and general education in the Health and Human Performance Department at West Virginia State University.

"This is a great opportunity for WVSU students to seamlessly continue their education at Marshall University," Canterbury said. "This type of partnership not only benefits both institutions by providing a pipeline for continued education, but serves the entire state and region by providing a highly qualified workforce."

Students enrolled at WVSU who have a grade point average of 3.0 or greater may apply for admission to the PMSAT degree program. They must submit a transcript, resume and two letters of recommendation as outlined in Marshall's graduate catalog. WVSU applicants who meet all admissions criteria for Marshall's PMSAT program will be admitted to the two seats based on applicant ranking. Additional students from WVSU may be admitted depending on the demand for the program that application year.





Writers Series to welcome renowned writers for readings

The A.E. Stringer Visiting Writers Series will host bestselling essayist Melissa Febos and acclaimed poet Donika Kelly, Thursday, March 3, at 7:30 p.m. in the Joan C. Edwards Performing Arts Center.

Kelly is the author of two poetry collections: *Bestiary* (Graywolf 2016), winner of the Cave Canem Poetry Prize, a Hurston Wright Legacy award and the Kate Tufts Discovery Award; and *The*

Renunciations (Graywolf 2021), recently shortlisted for the National Book Critics Circle Award in poetry. Kelly's works have been published in *The New Yorker, The Atlantic, The Paris Review*, and *Foglifter*. She's a professor of creative writing at the University of Iowa.

Febos is the author of the memoir *Whip Smart* and three essay collections. Febos's *Girlhood*, is a national best-seller and National Book Critics Circle finalist. Febos is the recipient of the Jeanne Córdova Nonfiction Award from LAMBDA Literary. Her works have appeared in *The Paris Review*, *The Believer*, *The Sun*, *New York Review of Books* and *The New York Times Magazine*. Febos teaches at the University of Iowa in the nonfiction writing program.

Dr. Rachael Peckham, professor of English and coordinator of the Stringer Visiting Writers Series at Marshall, organized the reading event.

"Donika Kelly and Melissa Febos are some of the biggest, best-selling names in contemporary poetry and creative nonfiction," Peckham said. "I am overjoyed that our campus and Huntington will get to hear them read live, especially considering that Kelly and Febos were recently named finalists for the National Book Critics Circle Award. For them to both receive this prestigious honor simultaneously is remarkable."

Marshall to present two new art exhibitions

Marshall's 36th Annual Juried Student Exhibition will be on view March 8-31 in the Birke Art Gallery, located in Smith Hall on the Huntington campus. The exhibit features students' best artworks from throughout the past two years, as selected by an outside juror.

Meanwhile, *Indeterminacy and the Measurement Problem* by artist Gabe Michael Kenney will be on view through March 17 in the Charles W. and Norma C. Carroll Gallery, located in the Visual Arts Center on 3rd Avenue in downtown Huntington.

"For students in the School of Art and Design, (the Annual Juried Student Exhibition) is one of the most highly anticipated events of the year," Gallery Director Jamie Platt said. "This show is a unique opportunity for student artists. Testing their artwork in an arena of their peers outside of an assignment is something many of these students have not had a chance to do yet. It is exciting to watch them practicing the skill of public presentation that will be a big part of their professional lives."

Eight of the artworks will be awarded cash prizes totaling \$3,000. This year's juror is artist and educator Danielle Riede, who grew up in the United States and Iceland, received her Master of Fine Arts in Painting from Virginia Commonwealth University and studied with Daniel Buren at the Kunstakademie Duesseldorf.

Riede's international exhibition record includes galleries and museums in Mexico City, Athens, Berlin, New York, and many other cities. Riede is the recipient of numerous awards, including the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts Fellowship, the Virginia Commission for the Arts Fellowship in Sculpture and a New Frontiers Grant from Indiana University. She is currently the Randolph H. Deer Professor of Painting at Herron School of Art and Design at IUPUI (Indiana University–Purdue University Indianapolis).

The public is invited to a reception from 5-6:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 23. Awards will be announced at 5:30 p.m. The awards presentation will be simulcast to Instagram @marshalluartanddesign.

The *Indeterminacy and the Measurement Problem* exhibit in the Carroll Gallery features the works of Kenney of Columbus, Ohio, in a cerebral, mixed-media installation combining printmaking, sculpture and performance. Kenney is a conceptual artist interested in the role of

consciousness in day-to-day perception. His artworks are inspired by research into "the Observer Effect," the disturbance of an observed system by the act of observation.

The public is invited to a reception for *Indeterminacy and the Measurement Problem*, where visitors to the gallery will have an opportunity to engage with the artist. The reception will be from 4-5:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 9. Kenney will stage a performance during the reception, and immediately following the reception, he will give a talk about his work in Room 209 of the Visual Arts Center. For those who cannot attend in person but would like to watch the artist talk, there will be a virtual option at 5:30 p.m. via Zoom. Gerald G. "Jerry" Blackwell, M.D., has dedicated his career to treating cardiovascular disease in Appalachia, never forgetting his Fayette County, West Virginia, roots.

Blackwell, a 1983 graduate from the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine, and his wife Cynthia L. "Cindy" Blackwell recently established the *Blackwell Family Scholarship* to help future medical students from his home county. The award also grants second preference to students from the surrounding counties of

Greenbrier, Kanawha, Nicholas, Raleigh and Summers. The award is renewable for up to three years.

The Blackwells relocated to Kingsport, Tennessee, where he has been practicing cardiology since 1995. During his career, he served as chief executive officer of Wellmont CVA Heart Institute and chief clinical officer of Ballad Health. In 2020, he was named president and chief executive officer of MedAxiom, a company of the American College of Cardiology and the


cardiovascular community's premier source for organizational performance solutions. He was recognized as the School of Medicine's distinguished alumnus in 2018.






