Sheryl Sandberg visits Huntington and Marshall

She has one of the top business minds in the world, but Sheryl Sandberg's message of grit and resilience can resonate with everyone, regardless of their profession.

The former chief operating officer of Facebook (now Meta) spoke with Marshall University President **Brad D. Smith** yesterday in a fireside chat after a two-day tour of Huntington and visits with several community service organizations.

Sandberg's story of perseverance is chronicled in her book, *Option B*, written after the sudden death of husband, Dave Goldberg. As suggested by the title, the book discusses how to live life when it throws a curve.

"No one learns on the easy days, while on the couch watching TV," Sandberg said. "We learn on the hard days.... When people make jokes about getting older, it's not funny. You either live a long life, or you don't. Every birthday, I now celebrate."

While in Huntington, Sandberg and her family, including second husband Tom Bernthal, visited Golden Girl Group Home, Project Hope, Harmony House, and the Compass Center, among other organizations. The two-day trip concluded with the visit with Smith at Marshall.

"We all have a responsibility to each other," Sandberg said. "I don't want to live on one side of the country and have no idea what is happening on the other. I know that by leaving my little corner, I will learn."

When asked by Smith about the most important things in her life Sandberg said, in addition to her family, her foundation — Sheryl Sandberg and Dave Goldberg Family Foundation — with its priority to partner with others to work towards an equal and resilient world.

She also discussed gender equity in the workplace and at home, compassionate leadership and learning from every experience. Sandberg praised the Huntington community for developing programs to address substance abuse, homelessness and food insecurity.

MagMutual Foundation gifts support to School of Medicine outreach efforts

The MagMutual Foundation, established by MagMutual Insurance Company, recently announced a gift of \$40,000 to equally support two important outreach efforts at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine—Marshall Medical Outreach (MMO) and Project PREMED.

"At MagMutual, we're committed to strengthening the practice of medicine and making a positive impact by supporting meaningful change in the communities we serve," said William Kanich, M.D., J.D., chairperson-elect of the MagMutual Board of Directors. "The delivery of medical care to the underserved and promotion of diversity in the health care profession are causes that are close to our heart at the MagMutual Foundation. Our mission aligns with Marshall University's invaluable outreach to the community and among students, and we are excited to support their efforts with this gift."

MMO is a student-led initiative established in 2011 to provide medical care to Huntington's homeless community as well as those unemployed and at risk for homelessness. Under the guidance of faculty physicians from the School of Medicine, the monthly MMO clinic provides physical exams, wound care, immunizations, screenings, over-the-counter medications and more.

During the past decade, hundreds of medical, pharmacy and physician assistant students have cared for more than 4,000 patients through MMO. The team has also mobilized to serve flood-ravaged communities in southern West Virginia and eastern Kentucky. Support from MagMutual will be used to fund supplies, including more over-the-counter medication options for patients, for current outreach efforts. It will also allow MMO to expand specialized programs like those focused on vision, women's health and sun safety.

"We try to be very judicious in our spending and plan to use some of this gift toward our vision program which has become MMO's most popular service," said Katherine J. Steele, M.D., assistant professor of family and community health and supervising faculty for MMO. "Since vision care is not covered for the majority of our patients, those with deficits can have a very hard time in both the workforce and their day-to-day lives. We also plan to expand our access to over-the-counter medications to offer our patients as well as have resources to extend our services to other communities, should the need arise. We wouldn't be able to continue this program without the donations such as this and the many volunteer hours from our medical students."

Also established in 2011, Project PREMED, which stands for Providing Real-World Experiences for Marshall-Educated Doctors, offers the opportunity for undergraduate ethnic minority students to explore medical school as a career path. The program brings medical school to life through a five-day summer immersion experience on the Marshall University health sciences campus. Participants explore and experience the medical school journey through mock interview sessions, robotic surgery demonstrations and interaction with current medical students and residents.

Through the program, the School of Medicine continues to address barriers for students who are underrepresented in the health professions. More than 150 students have participated in Project PREMED since its inception in 2011; 20% of student participants have since completed medical school or residency; and 17% of past participants are currently completing physician assistant or nursing school. Support from MagMutual will be used to provide continued exposure to health careers for underrepresented minorities and support participants as they navigate the application process to medical school and other professional programs.

Internal medicine nurse practitioner fellowship now accepting applications for 2023

The <u>internal medicine nurse practitioner fellowship program</u> at Marshall Health and the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine is now accepting applications for its 2023-2024 cohort.

The fellowship provides one year of postgraduate training for nurse practitioners looking to transition into a new specialty or hone their skills in a specific area of practice. Fellows work closely with physicians, other nurse practitioners, pharmacists, resident physicians and internal medicine subspecialty fellows from the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine to grow professional expertise in clinical care, research, leadership, didactics and teamwork. Rotations in general internal medicine and cardiology are required. Elective rotations include endocrinology, gastroenterology, nephrology, infectious disease and pulmonology.

Eligible applicants must have graduated from an accredited Nurse Practitioner Master of Science in Nursing (M.S.N.) or Doctor of Nurse Practitioner (D.N.P.) program prior to the start of the fellowship on September 1, 2023. National board certification must be obtained by August 1, 2023. Applications must be submitted <u>online</u> no later than Monday, March 6, 2023. Applicants selected for interviews will be scheduled in March and April with the final selection of fellows in April.

The program will host a virtual a series of open houses at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 29, 2022, and Tuesday, Feb. 7, 2023; and 11 a.m. on Wednesday, Jan. 18, 2023. Hoops Children's Hospital at Cabell Huntington Hospital will present the Dave Koz and Friends 25th Anniversary Christmas Tour at the Keith-Albee Performing Arts Center on Sunday, Dec. 4, at 7:30 p.m. The longest running jazz-based Christmas tour features chart-topping, GRAMMY®-nominated saxophonist Dave Koz along with trumpeter Rick Braun and guitarist Peter White—artists that accompanied him on the road in the earliest years of the tour—as well as pianist Keiko Matsui and vocalist Rebecca Jade.


