# Marshall Health establishes postdoctoral fellowship program for adult neuropsychology

NOVEMBER 30, 2022

Marshall Health and the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine have established a new postdoctoral fellowship program that offers advanced training opportunities in adult clinical neuropsychology.

The two-year program focuses on a field of psychology dedicated to the advanced understanding of brain-behavior relationships. Fellows work closely with the experienced neuropsychologists at Marshall Health to acquire advanced skills in neuropsychological assessment, treatment and consultation for patients experiencing various neurodegenerative illnesses, cerebrovascular disorders, movement disorders, epilepsy, traumatic brain injuries and other chronic medical conditions.

"Postdoctoral training is an enriching experience that broadens your skills as a practitioner," said Michelle C. Hudson, Psy.D., ABPP, an associate professor at the School of Medicine who serves as director of the program. "The program we have built at Marshall Health offers diverse experiences through collaborations across neurology, geriatric medicine and neurosurgery that will better equip neuropsychologists to care for older adults."

Eligible applicants must have a graduated from a doctoral program accredited by the American Psychology Association prior to the start of the fellowship on July 1, 2023. Fellows must maintain an active psychology license in the State of West Virginia for the duration of their fellowship. Deadline to apply for a 2023-2024 fellowship is December 31, 2022.



## Faculty Achievement: Dr. Sasha Zill

Dr. Sasha Zill and medical student Sumaiya Chaudhry, in collaboration with colleagues from West Virginia University (Dr. Nicholas Szczecinski and graduate student Will Zyhowski) presented two posters at the Society for Neuroscience meeting in San Diego in November 2022. The posters were titled "What makes walking behavior 'naturalistic'? Feedback signaling the rate of change of force (dF/dt) in serially homologous legs of insects" and "Exploring the effects of tarsal segment morphology on insect strain sensing." This research, in Neurobiology/Neurorobotics, has been supported by an ongoing four-year grant from the National Science Foundation for collaborative work at Marshall and WVU.










# **Application period underway for Sarah Denman Faces of Appalachia Fellowship Award**

**NOVEMBER 30, 2022** 



Applications are now being accepted for the Sarah Denman Faces of Appalachia Fellowship Award\* for the 2023–2024 academic year. The deadline for submissions is **December 31, 2022**.

The purpose of this fellowship award, sponsored by the Center for the Study of Ethnicity and Gender in Appalachia (CSEGA), is to promote scholarship on gender, race, and/or ethnicity in Appalachia. The fellowship is awarded annually to a full-time Marshall University faculty member. The Sarah Denman Faces of Appalachia Fellow, who is selected by the CSEGA Advisory Board and announced at the annual spring faculty meeting, receives a \$3,000 cash award. Fellows present their scholarship to the Marshall community in the spring of their fellowship year (spring, 2024).

#### **Application Process**

Marshall faculty members interested in being considered for the fellowship award should submit a professional vita along with a 1-2 page abstract of the proposed project. Please include a statement that clearly defines the scope of your work and explains how the fellowship will assist you in your research. The research must emphasize gender, race, and/or ethnicity in Appalachia and may be a new project or a continuation of a project already underway.

Please send application materials by email to Mary Thomas at <a href="mailto:mthomas@marshall.edu">mthomas@marshall.edu</a> by **December 31, 2022.** The award winner, as well as other applicants, will be notified early in the Spring 2023 semester.

The Honors College provides faculty of programs from across the university the opportunity to design and teach Honors Seminars on subjects that inspire them, but that they may not have the opportunity to teach within their regular teaching duties. Faculty in our small sections of HON 480 work with outstanding, highly-motivated students to actively explore a subject together from an interdisciplinary approach. The college serves the entire university with majors in all programs. The Honors College provides a space where people from all over the

university come together to share ideas. We are an academic crossroads where collaboration is foundational.

The Honors College new seminar proposal and repeat seminar application deadline is Monday 23 January 2022. Proposals for **new** upper-level, interdisciplinary honors seminars to be taught as early as Fall 2023 can be submitted online through a form found on the Teaching Honors page of the Honors College website at <a href="https://www.marshall.edu/honors/teaching/">https://www.marshall.edu/honors/teaching/</a>. Full details and helpful information for preparing proposals are available there. Accepted proposals are scheduled as special topic sections of HON 480, which serves as a core upper-division course in the required Honors Curriculum for students in the college. Seminar proposals undergo review by the Honors College Curriculum and Policy Committee at least one semester prior to the semester in which an approved seminar will be offered. For faculty who have previously taught sections of HON 480, a shorter repeat (or updated) application is also due on that date. Please note that all Student Credit Hours (SCH) for faculty teaching HON courses will be credited to their home department.
