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## School of Medicine announces new clinical trial for new technology in meniscus repairs

### DECEMBER 12, 2022

The Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine is accepting applicants for a prospective randomized trial launching this fall that compares nanoscopic and standard arthroscopies for treatment of meniscus tears.

Nanoarthroscopy is performed through a needle scope, known as a nanoscope, instead of traditional portals and incisions. The goals of the randomized trial are to determine whether the more minimally invasive approach of the nanoscope improves patient outcomes for partial meniscectomies as well as fully evaluate return to play and return to work after surgery.

"We have developed several nanoscopic techniques at Marshall and have been pleased with the minimally invasive nature and positive impact on our patients. This trial is the next step in that research," said Chad D. Lavender, M.D., orthopaedic surgeon at Marshall Health and assistant professor in the department of orthopaedic surgery at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine.

Lavender has completed more than 100 procedures to date using the nanoscope.

Marshall is currently recruiting 100 patients for the study. All patients under the age of 60 with a meniscus tear are potentially eligible to participate at the surgeon's discretion. Participants will be randomly equally divided between two groups, one using nanoscopic technology for the surgery and the other using standard arthroscopy. Surgeries will be performed at Cabell Huntington Hospital.

Participants will attend regularly scheduled study visits with Marshall Health physicians for ongoing assessment. To schedule a consultation or for more information about the clinical trial, please call Marshall Orthopaedics at 304-691-6710.

Marshall is one of the first centers in the country to research nanoscopic technology and one of two sites chosen for this type of clinical trial. Arthrex, who distributes the nanoscope, provided partial funding of the study.

Study 1926751-2 has been approved by the Marshall University Institutional Review Board #1.

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## **Prevention Empowerment Partnership seeking donations for its 3rd annual Holiday Card Project**

The Prevention Empowerment Partnership (PEP) is seeking monetary donations from the local community in hopes of reaching their goal of raising \$2,100 to support the efforts and goals of their 3rd annual Holiday Card Project. The Holiday Card Project focuses on 75-100 Cabell County youth of middle school and high school age, who are often left out of typical community-giving events, and over 400 Cabell County seniors who are in nursing homes or homebound.

Over the past several weeks, PEP has distributed card-making supplies to local community partners who have identified youth to make cards for the seniors. Additionally, PEP staff and volunteers have held numerous card-making workshops at local community centers.

PEP is hoping to purchase 100 \$20 gift cards and four \$25 gift cards for youth. The goal is to provide a \$20 gift card to each youth who creates at least four cards. The holiday cards will all be entered into a competition for the top four cards in categories including most creative, best design, most sincere and best card overall. The four winners will receive a \$25 gift card.

"This project is important to our community and our youth because it allows youth to give back, while also allowing them to receive a gift of appreciation," Angela Saunders, director of PEP, said. "Our youth and their contributions are valued, and your gift can help us demonstrate that to them. This isn't a grant-funded project; this is a community project that will benefit two vulnerable populations, our seniors and youth."

PEP is a collaborative committee of community-based organizations and community leaders, under the financial umbrella of the Marshall University Research Corporation, that partner to increase access to prevention services for youth and families in Cabell County and throughout the state of West Virginia, where appropriate. Through its partnerships, subcommittees and workgroups, PEP provides technical assistance, capacity building, community outreach, evaluation and training for all types of prevention to empower youth to deal with the drug crisis and effect positive change in their communities.

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## Application period underway for Sarah Denman Faces of Appalachia Fellowship Award

Applications are now being accepted for the Sarah Denman Faces of Appalachia Fellowship Award\* for the 2023–2024 academic year. The deadline for submissions is **December 31**, **2022**.

The purpose of this fellowship award, sponsored by the Center for the Study of Ethnicity and Gender in Appalachia (CSEGA), is to promote scholarship on gender, race, and/or ethnicity in Appalachia. The fellowship is awarded annually to a full-time Marshall University faculty member. The Sarah Denman Faces of Appalachia Fellow, who is selected by the CSEGA Advisory Board and announced at the annual spring faculty meeting, receives a \$3,000 cash award. Fellows present their scholarship to the Marshall community in the spring of their fellowship year (spring, 2024).

### **Application Process**

Marshall faculty members interested in being considered for the fellowship award should submit a professional vita along with a 1-2 page abstract of the proposed project. Please include a statement that clearly defines the scope of your work and explains how the fellowship will assist you in your research. **The research must emphasize gender, race, and/or ethnicity in Appalachia** and may be a new project or a continuation of a project already underway.


