Work underway on Hal Greer renovation project between Third Avenue and Washington Boulevard

FEBRUARY 22, 2023

The median, as well as one northbound and one southbound lane of Hal Greer Boulevard in Huntington, will be closed between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. daily as work begins on the initial phases of the Hal Greer renovation project. There will be one lane open in either direction. Work includes digging out the median to build planter boxes between Third Avenue and Seventh Avenue, breaking up pavement for a new paving base from Seventh Avenue to Eighth Avenue, and digging out the median for planter boxes between Eighth Avenue and Washington Boulevard. Contractors will also install temporary traffic controls and temporary traffic signal.

Traffic traveling through the area should pay attention to posted signs and message boards for current traffic patterns.

Drivers should expect delays, adjust their commuting schedules and avoid the area if possible.

Please use caution when traveling through the area for flaggers, equipment and workers.

In November 2022, Triton Construction Inc. was awarded a contract for \$13,551,00 to renovate Hal Greer Boulevard all the way from Third Avenue to Washington Boulevard. The project will realign intersections at 10th Avenue and Charleston Avenue, widening sidewalks, adding bicycle lanes, installing new lighting, reconfiguring traffic lights and adding greenspace along the Hal Greer corridor, all to make the area more user-friendly for drivers, pedestrians and bicyclists and to make the corridor more attractive.

Center of Excellence awarded \$500,000 to provide mental health training to local communities

The Marshall University Center of Excellence for Recovery, housed in the Marshall University Research Corporation, was awarded \$1 million to examine the experiences of transitional-aged youth (TAY) from their own perspective, using both quantitative and qualitative methods to provide a comprehensive view of the diverse pathways that lead to independence.

A particular focus of this project will be to examine the resources, supports and infrastructure that are needed at critical transition points to reduce risky outcomes for youth who are transitioning out of foster care, juvenile detention or other placement facilities. The project will be developed to be inclusive of all youth, including those who have eloped from placements or left home prematurely, and youth with developmental and physical challenges.


The project was awarded through the Administration for Children and Families Congressional Funding. Kathy Paxton, M.S., was selected for the project director role of the Transitional Age Youth Project, working with Amy Saunders, managing director of the Center of Excellence for Recovery, and a highly qualified team of researchers and training specialists.

Paxton has experience in both private and nonprofit health care. She has held leadership positions at international health and human service organizations and as director of substance abuse services in West Virginia. Her experience as director of behavioral health and education at the Ohio State University Center of Excellence, as well as leadership as a national consultant on youth and families, perinatal substance abuse, and equity make her an ideal person to lead this project.

"I'm happy to be back in West Virginia to serve our most important assets-young people-and to work alongside a phenomenal team to discover what is important and what works to achieve positive outcomes," Paxton said.

New treatment available for patients with pulmonary hypertension

Pulmonologists at Marshall Health and Mountain Health Network are the first in West Virginia to treat patients with pulmonary hypertension using a subcutaneous treprostinil pump.

Much like an insulin pump, the treprostinil pump, under the brand name Remodulin®, delivers medication continuously under the skin, helping control the patient's symptoms and improve functional status and quality of life. Marshall Health Pulmonologist Amro Al-Astal, M.D., inserted the first treprostinil pump last month at Cabell Huntington Hospital (CHH), a member of Mountain Health Network. The first cases have shown excellent results and significantly improved patients' symptoms including shortness of breath, heart palpitations and dizziness.

Pulmonary hypertension is a serious condition caused by high pressure in the blood vessels leading from the heart to the lungs. While there is no cure for pulmonary hypertension, patients have access to advanced care close to home. In 2021, Marshall Health established a pulmonary hypertension clinic dedicated to evaluating and diagnosing pulmonary hypertension, as well as providing the specific level of care this condition requires.

"This disease places a significant burden on a patient's quality of life," said Al-Astal, an associate professor of medicine at the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. "Pump technology has made significant advances in the last few years. This pump is the most advanced on the market with an excellent safety profile. Through the collaboration of our team of physicians, pharmacists, and staff and the ICU nurses and staff at CHH, patients who have pulmonary hypertension now have access to state-of-art treatment without having to travel far from home."

Business students earn second place in international competition

Students from Marshall's Lewis College of Business, Brad D. Smith Schools of Business, earned second place in an international sustainability-themed case competition, hosted by Beta Gamma Sigma (BGS) with the Foundation for Environmental Stewardship (FES).

Marshall students Jamison Lewis and Erin Roberts were second-place winners in the Case Competition at the 2023 BGS x SDGs LAB Leadership Conference, which took place virtually Feb. 3-5. Marshall students Maddy Branham and Nick Smith participated as well in the conference, through which students learned about the United Nations' Sustainability Development Goals (SDGs), engaged with business professionals from across the globe and were empowered to become catalysts for change in their communities.

The Case Competition had 17 teams of two to five students, each submitting a written action plan strategy and B Impact Assessments for a fictional business, LAB Inc., to meet sustainability requirements and qualify for the B Corp Certification. An organization's B Impact Assessment is a measure of its social and environmental performance.

Lewis and Roberts were part of a team of five, including three students from another university.

"It was a great networking experience for me. Our five-person team worked very well together, and I'm extremely proud that we were able to earn this amazing win at the international level," Lewis said.

"I love seeing when our students make the most out of opportunities," said Dr. Ben Eng, faculty advisor of Marshall University's Beta Gamma Sigma chapter. "This particular opportunity is an especially important one because this conference is all about how the business leaders of tomorrow must be equipped with not only the ability to compete and succeed financially, but also to simultaneously make a real and positive difference in society. I'm proud that Marshall students are leading the way in high-impact leadership."

Beta Gamma Sigma is the official honor society of the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business–the premier business school accrediting body in the world. Membership is by invitation only and is based on class rank. Marshall University's chapter of Beta Gamma Sigma has been recognized as a "high honors" chapter for the past five years.

the level of understanding of basic Japanese mainly learned in class. N1 and N2 measure the level of understanding of Japanese used in a broad range of scenes in actual everyday life.

Faculty receive grants from West Virginia Department of Arts, Culture and History

Two faculty members from the School of Art and Design, Associate Professor Hanna Kozlowski and Professor Sandra Reed, received grants from the West Virginia Department of Arts, Culture and History to support creative work and promote lifelong learning and healthy aging.

Kozlowski received funds to support her research into wycinanki, a Polish cut-paper folk art. Through the "Living Traditions: Folk Art Project Support for Artists," Kozlowski's research builds upon work begun last fall while she was in residence at Sala752 in Rzeszow, Poland. Like Appalachian folk art, wycinanki depicts scenes and figures from nature, agriculture and the home. As a second-generation Polish American, she continues to incorporate wycinanki in her creative work and is particularly interested in its connection to the laboring class.


Reed received funding under the Creative Aging for Lifelong Learning (CALL) program and will use funds to employ Marshall art alumni to provide art instruction for adults ages 55 and older in four area senior centers. Alumni include Barb Lavalley Benton (Class of 2022), Shyanna Ashcraft (Class of 2021), Sophia Celdran (Class of 2021) and Karen Fry (Class of 2019). The Creative Aging for Lifelong Learning grant focuses on teaching new artistic skills over multiple sessions, social engagement, mental stimulation and self-expression. This grant funds activity during Spring 2023 and culminates in showcasing participants' work at each participating center.


At the Marie Redd Senior Enrichment Center in Huntington, a needle felting workshop has been offered, which continues through March 13, and other weekly workshops begin Wednesday at the Ceredo Senior Wellness Center and the Wayne Nursing and Rehabilitation Center and go on Feb. 22-March 29. A fourth workshop will be offered as well.

Two of the participating senior centers are in Wayne County, a county where there are more residents who are 65 and older than those younger than 18, Reed said.

"By 2034, it is estimated that more than 30% of the American population will be 65 and older," she said. "Motivated by its mission and statistics such as these, Marshall began a healthy-aging initiative in 2021, beginning with the formation of an interdisciplinary committee. What I've learned as a member of this committee inspired me to write a CALL program grant not for myself, but as a pilot training program for our art alumni. Many visual art majors are interested in giving back to their communities.

"I designed my CALL grant to build capacity for our art alumni to work as Teaching Artists in their hometown communities through the creation of relationships and familiarity with how arts workshops might be implemented," Reed continued. "Ideally, either the art alumni or the senior centers will independently apply for CALL program or other grant funding in the future to continue what they have begun. Working as a community Teaching Artist is just one of many forms of employment for a visual art major. This grant draws upon my experience as a teacher and practicing artist, my knowledge of community needs and values, what I have learned about facets of well-being in the older-adult community and ongoing relationships with our alumni who are engaged citizens."




With AppsAnywhere, Information Technology can offer a wider range of software across the university and even on personal devices. Software will no longer be constrained to specific labs or classrooms.






