

Thundering Word to compete in Tokyo event

he Marshall University speech and debate team, Thundering Word, will compete this month at the International Forensic Association Tournament in Tokyo, Japan.

The Thundering Word competes in the National Forensic Association throughout the country, competing in four basic areas:

- 1. Oral Interpretation of literature (prose, poetry, duo, programmed oral interpretation)
- 2. Prepared speeches (informative, persuasive, after dinner, rhetorical criticism)
- 3. Limited preparation speeches (impromptu, extemporaneous)
- 4. Debate

The team is led by the director of forensics for the Department of Communication Studies, Clara Adkins. Adkins says they're excited for the opportunity.

"When I received the invitation from the organization, I immediately went to Dr. Bookwalter, dean of the College of Liberal Arts; he looked at me and said let's see what we can do," Adkins said. "Sixty days later, I got an answer that through donations from supporters and the Maier Foundation, this once-in-a-lifetime-experience was going to happen."

The program is looking for additional help as they put together their plan to compete in Tokyo. They're accepting monetary donations through the Marshall University Foundation (COLA-Debate Program). Adkins says the team appreciates the support they've received thus far from the Marshall University community.

Toyota award to support RCBI engineering internship

During a two-semester internship at RCBI, one engineering student will receive a \$2,500 stipend each semester as the intern provides design,

engineering, prototyping and manufacturing assistance to industry clients and entrepreneurs.

Working alongside RCBI engineers and technicians, the intern will gain a better understanding of the inner workings of business startups, product development workflow, Design Thinking methodology, 3D printing techniques and computer-aided design technology.

RCBI hires interns each semester through the co-op program in the Marshall University College of Engineering and Computer Sciences, an immersive industry partnership that enables students to apply their knowledge in a professional setting while gaining practical experience.

"The broad-based engineering experience students gain at RCBI greatly enhances their skill sets and better prepares them for employment after graduation," said Derek Scarbro, RCBI deputy director. "They get their hands dirty at RCBI, directly assisting with multiple manufacturing projects for a variety of industrial sectors, from aerospace to automotive, medical technology to mining, and everything in between. Thanks to Toyota West Virginia, we can expand these opportunities."

"Workforce development is critical to the future of our region and all of West Virginia," said David Rosier, Toyota West Virginia president. James W. Endicott, M.D. (pictured), a longtime primary care physician in Mingo County, and his practice in Kermit, West Virginia, have joined <u>Marshall Health</u>. He will also serve as an assistant professor in the department of family and community health at the <u>Marshall University Joan C.</u> <u>Edwards School of Medicine</u>.

Endicott's practice has been renamed Marshall Family Medicine – Kermit, but retains its current office location at 108 Mingo Street in Kermit. The phone number, 304-393-4303, also remains the same.



"My patients will continue to receive their primary medical care from me, close to home," Endicott said. "As part of Marshall Health, they also now have easier access to the more than 75 areas of specialty care Marshall Health provides. I am passionate about caring for patients in rural communities, and I look forward to helping future physicians find a passion for rural health as well through the School of Medicine."

After earning his medical degree from the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine in 1983 and completing his family medicine residency at the Wake Forest University/North

Carolina Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, in 1987, Endicott returned to his hometown of Kermit to open a private family medicine practice. A board-certified family medicine physician, Endicott has maintained a solo practice for the past 35 years.

"As an alumnus, Dr. Endicott has always been a great friend of Marshall University," said Stephen M. Petrany, M.D., professor and chair of family and community health at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. "We look forward to working with him in his new role as a faculty member and building on the important care he's been providing in Mingo County for more than three decades."

Beyond medicine, Endicott has reinvested in his community in many ways, currently serving as member of the Kermit Town Council and past member of the Mingo County Redevelopment Authority. He has also coached the girls' basketball teams at Kermit Middle School and Tug Valley High School and served 12 years on the Mingo County Board of Education. 


