School of Medicine announces 2023 Match Day results

MARCH 22, 2023



Fourth-year medical students from the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine found out Friday during the annual Match Day event where they will train for the next three to seven years. A total of 78 students from the Class of 2023 matched to residency programs, representing a 99% match rate for the class.

Coordinated by the National Residency Matching Program (NRMP), the main residency match process uses a <u>computerized mathematical</u> <u>algorithm</u> that pairs the preferences of

applicants with the preferences of residency programs, resulting in a best result for graduating students. Marshall students, along with medical students from around the world, all opened their match letters at the same date and time.

"Matching into and completing a residency is the next step toward becoming a practicing physician," said Bobby Miller, M.D., interim dean at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. "Where they receive their residency training shapes the course of their medical careers. The future of health care looks promising with this accomplished class and the impact they will have on patients and the profession."

More than 50% matched into primary care residencies, which are identified in West Virginia as family medicine, internal medicine, internal medicine/pediatrics, pediatrics and obstetrics/gynecology. Other students were accepted into dermatology, emergency medicine, general surgery, neurology, orthopaedic surgery, otolaryngology, psychiatry and radiology programs. Four students matched in specialty matches for ophthalmology and military residency programs. 25 students will remain in West Virginia to complete their residency training.


"On Match Day, you experience the joy of moving to the next phase of your career," said Luke Hamm, president of the fourth-year class. "It's one of the largest milestones in a doctor's life."
Across the country, in the largest match in the NRMP 70-year history, 42,952 registered applicants submitted program choices for 40,375 available positions.



Dr. Allyson Bias named March Resident of the Month

Allyson Bias, M.D. (pictured at right), has been named the March Resident of the Month for the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine, announced Paulette S. Wehner, M.D., vice dean for graduate medical education.

Bias is finishing her third and final year of the pediatrics residency at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine, where she completed her Doctor of Medicine. Bias was selected Resident of the Month for her dedication to her pediatric patients during the recent surge of respiratory syncytial virus, or RSV, Wehner said.

"Dr. Bias has gone above and beyond during the pediatric RSV surge," said Susan L. Flesher, M.D., professor and chair of pediatrics, in her nomination letter. "She has done an amazing job balancing resident wellness and meeting the needs of the children of this region. She even


voluntarily changed her own schedule to serve as the 'swing senior'" to be help meet patient care needs and lessen the burden on her fellow residents."


According to Associate Professor and Pediatric Residency Director Audra Pritt, M.D., "Dr. Bias is a model resident—hardworking, kind and knowledgeable. She showed tremendous leadership during unprecedented times in the fall respiratory season as one of our co-chief residents. We are so proud to have Dr. Bias on our pediatric team at Marshall Health."

After graduation in June, the Ona, West Virginia, native will move to Augusta, Georgia, where she will complete a three-year Post Pediatric Portal Program (PPPP). The PPPP allows pediatricians to train in both psychiatry and child and adolescent medicine (CAP) in a three-year integrated program that leads to credentialing in both psychiatry and CAP.

As part of her Resident of the Month recognition, Bias received a plaque and designated parking spot.

'Rocketman' film with live orchestra to take place March 31

Mountain Health Network will present *Rocketman Live in Concert* Friday, March 31, at 7:30 p.m. at the Keith-Albee Performing Arts Center as the final event of the 86th season of the Marshall Artists Series.

About Rocketman

Rocketman is an epic musical fantasy about the incredible human story of Elton John's breakthrough years. The film follows the fantastical journey of transformation from shy piano prodigy Reginald Dwight into international superstar Elton John. This inspirational story – set to Elton John's most beloved songs and performed by star Taron Egerton – tells the universally relatable story of how a small-town boy became one of the most iconic figures in pop culture.

About Elton John

Elton's career achievements to date are unsurpassed in their breadth and longevity. Elton is one of the top-selling solo artists of all time, with 1 diamond, 40 platinum or multi-platinum, and 23 gold albums, over 50 Top 40 hits, and he has sold more than 300 million records worldwide.

He holds the record for the biggest-selling single of all time, "Candle in the Wind 1997," which sold over 33 million copies. "Diamonds," the Ultimate Greatest Hits album, reached the Top 5 of the UK album charts on its release in November 2017, becoming Elton's 40th UK Top 40 album in the process. This release celebrated 50 years of his songwriting partnership with Bernie Taupin. August 2018 saw Elton named as the most successful male solo artist in Billboard Hot 100 chart history, having logged 67 entries, including No. 1s and 27 Top 10s.

Among the many awards and honors bestowed upon him are six GRAMMYs, including a GRAMMY Legend award, a Tony and an Oscar; a Best British Male Artist BRIT Award; induction into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and the Songwriters Hall of Fame; the Kennedy Center Honor; Legend of Live Award; 13 Ivor Novello Awards between 1973 and 2001; and a knighthood from HM Queen Elizabeth II for "services to music and charitable services."

In 1992, Elton established the Elton John AIDS Foundation, which today is one of the leading nonprofit HIV/AIDS organizations and has raised over \$450 million to date in the global fight against HIV/AIDS. In June 2019, French President Emmanuel Macron presented Elton the Légion d'honneur, France's highest award, for his lifetime contribution to the arts and the fight against HIV/AIDS. Elton was awarded the Companion of Honour in the 2020 new year honours list. The highest acknowledgement in the list, Elton became one of only 64 people to hold the honor. September 2019 saw The Royal Mail issue a set of 12 stamps as a tribute to Elton being one of the most popular and enduring music artists of all time. Elton is one of only two individual music artists to be featured in a dedicated stamp issue.
