Marshall to host annual Student Research and Creativity Symposium, nationally acclaimed guest speakers

Marshall will host its annual Student Research and Creativity Symposium on April 7 and 8 on its Huntington campus. The event is aimed at showcasing undergraduate and graduate student work across the university, while hosting high caliber guest speakers from across the United States.

The goal of the symposium is to

showcase student work, contribute to the growth of Marshall as a research university, and show how student accomplishments can have an impact on the economy and quality of life of the surrounding intellectual and business community. A total of 118 oral presentations, poster sessions and artistic performances will be held.

The symposium's list of guest speakers includes the following presenters, who will speak in the Memorial Student Center in the Don Morris Room. All guest speaker presentations are free and open to the public.

"Our guest speaker lineup includes several world-renowned professionals and researchers," said Dr. Philippe Georgel, director of Marshall's Office of Undergraduate Research. "We are delighted that they accepted to present their work on our campus, exposing our students, faculty, staff and visitors to aspects of research that are not commonly discussed here. More specifically, we will have two experts in epigenetics who will discuss the importance of this aspect of regulation of gene expression in the context of cancer, as well as links between diet and health."

Georgel says he hopes community members take the opportunity to attend the symposium to learn more about the academic and research world.

"We often have invisible barriers between the local communities and universities or other educational institutions," said Georgel. "The symposium offers a unique opportunity to eliminate these boundaries and allows us to welcome the entire community to share our research and creative activities and demonstrate the enthusiasm and quality of our students and mentors."

Marshall University President Brad D. Smith will give a welcome address at start of the two-day event Friday at 8 a.m.

Peckham named outstanding faculty member with Hedrick Award

Dr. Rachael Peckham, professor of English at Marshall University, has been selected as the university's Dr. Charles E. Hedrick Outstanding Faculty Award winner for 2022-2023.

Peckham will receive \$5,000 through a grant from Charles B. and Mary Jo Locke Hedrick. The award is named in honor of Charles Hedrick's father, Charles E. Hedrick, a former history professor and later chair of the Graduate Council, and one of the founders of Marshall's graduate program.

Marshall's Center for Teaching and Learning today announced the Hedrick Award and three others honoring five faculty members. They are:

- Marshall & Shirley Reynolds Outstanding Teacher Award: Dr. Jill Treftz, an associate professor of English in the College of Liberal Arts.
- **Pickens-Queen Teacher Award**: Dr. Timothy Bryan, assistant professor of accounting and legal environment, Lewis College of Business; Dr. Mehdi Esmaeilpour, assistant professor of mechanical engineering, College of Engineering and Computer Sciences; Dr. Megan Marshall, assistant professor of English, College of Liberal Arts.
- The Council of Chairs Award for Excellence in Teaching: Dr. Laura Stapleton, instructor of mathematics, College of Science.

Here is a look at the awards and the winners:

Charles E. Hedrick Outstanding Faculty Award

This award recognizes a full-time tenured or tenure-track faculty member who has a minimum of seven years teaching experience at Marshall and has a record of outstanding classroom teaching, scholarship, research and creative activities.

Dr Rachael Peckham has been teaching at Marshall since 2009, when she joined the English department. She also served as a guest faculty member in 2017 for the West Virginia Wesleyan College's low-residency Master of Fine Arts program. She specializes in teaching writing courses such as creative nonfiction and literature courses such as Women Writers and American Literature since 1914.

"As a teacher, Dr. Peckham is both popular among students *and* known to maintain scholarly rigor and high standards in her classes," said Dr. Allison Carey, chair of the Department of English at Marshall. "Her students—undergraduate and graduate alike—consistently win awards and publish the writing which has been shaped by Dr. Peckham's mentoring. English majors and M.A. students seek out Dr. Peckham as a mentor, because they know she will inspire them to produce their best work. Students that Dr. Peckham has taught (or mentored) go on to publish in literary journals, are accepted to prestigious graduate programs (including, most recently, Yale Divinity School), and win national writing awards."

"Dr. Peckham's class was organized, productive and focused on the course objectives," said Dr. Kelli Prejean, associate professor of English and associate dean of the College of Liberal Arts, who observed one of Peckham's classes during the award application process. "... Dr. Peckham has an excellent rapport with students, and students obviously respect the creative and professional activities in which they are engaged."

"Dr. Peckham really goes above and beyond," said one of her students in a course evaluation. "Each of her lessons was interesting and actually made me excited to go to class each day. If anyone asked what I thought about taking one of her classes, I would tell them to do it immediately."

"Dr. Peckham is the best professor I've had at Marshall!" said another student.

Peckham earned her B.A. from Hope College in Holland, Michigan; her M.F.A. from Georgia College and State University in Milledgeville, Georgia; and her Ph.D. from Ohio University.

Marshall and Shirley Reynolds Outstanding Teacher Award

This award includes a \$3,000 stipend, and all tenured or tenure-track faculty members who have completed six or more years of service at Marshall are eligible.

Dr. Jill Treftz has been teaching at Marshall since 2009. She teaches both undergraduate and graduate literature courses, ranging from science fiction to British romantic poets to Sherlock Holmes.

"Jill Treftz comes alive in a classroom," said Dr. Laura Michele Diener, associate professor of history and one of Treftz's colleagues in the College of Liberal Arts. "I've been lucky to have witnessed her teaching on multiple occasions, both in her own classes and as a guest in mine, and each time, I come away dazzled and delighted. She possesses a flair for drama, a warm eloquence and an infectious charisma that energizes students."

"Dr. Treftz consistently uses her scholarship to reinvigorate her teaching and to benefit her students," Carey said. "[Her] scholarship on Victorian women poets was recognized by a John Marshall Scholar Award ... her scholarship [is still ongoing] to compile an edited collection of this poetry ... Meanwhile, Dr. Treftz brings such cutting-edge scholarship into her classes and guides her students (undergrads and grad students alike) as they do their own original research."

"Dr. Treftz is highly knowledgeable about the information that she teaches," said one of her students in a course evaluation. "She provides ample context that gives us additional information and makes it easier to connect with, and be interested in, the texts we read for class."

Treftz earned her B.A. from the College of Wooster in Ohio and her M.A. and Ph.D. from Penn State, all in English.

Pickens-Queen Teacher Award

Each of these three award winners receives a \$1,000 stipend. The award honors outstanding junior faculty. All faculty members teaching on a full-time, tenured or tenure track appointment who have completed one to five years of service at Marshall are eligible.

Dr. Timothy Bryan has been at Marshall since 2019, when he was hired as an assistant professor of accounting in the Lewis College of Business.

"Tim's background as a professional CPA enhances his teaching effectiveness," said Dr. Jean Price, department chair for accounting and legal environment. "In class, he shares examples from practice; students appreciate the sneak peek of what the 'real world' is like ...Students find him very approachable."

Bryan has B.A. and M.S. degrees in accounting from the University of Southern Indiana, and his D.B.A. from Jacksonville University in Florida.

Dr. Mehdi Esmaeilpour, assistant professor of mechanical engineering, has taught at Marshall since January 2018. He teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in heat transfer, thermodynamics, design of thermal systems, computational fluid dynamics and finite element method.

"Student success is of [the] utmost importance for the mechanical engineering department, and Dr. Esmaeilpour contributes to achieving this through his lectures/communication skills and personalized attention to students," said James McIntosh, chair of mechanical and industrial engineering. "... due to his positive attitude and reputation as a teacher, Dr. Esmaeilpour has been called upon to teach new courses that necessitated a fresh course preparation."

Esmaeilpour earned his B.S. and M.S. in mechanical engineering in Iran, at Mazandaran University and Ferdowski University, respectively, and his Ph.D. from the University of Iowa, also in mechanical engineering.

Dr. Megan Marshall has taught at Marshall as an assistant professor of English since 2017. She also has served as coordinator of composition since 2020.

"Dr. Marshall is an exemplary teacher and mentor," said Carey. "I've seen how frequently students seek her out for mentorship or to chair their M.A. capstones ... I know that under her guidance, students who take her how-to-teach English courses (at both the undergrad and graduate levels) go on to become successful professional educators."

Marshall received her B.A. in English from the University of Southern Maine, and her M.F.A. in creative writing and Ph.D. in literacy education from the University of Wyoming.

Council of Chairs Award for Excellence in Teaching

The Council of Chairs Award for Excellence in Teaching recognizes teaching excellence in Marshall's full-time term and temporary faculty. Each fall, members of the Council of Chairs (excepting the School of Medicine) are permitted to nominate up to two candidates from a given department. A \$1,000 cash award is presented each year. Full-time term or full-time temporary faculty with at least two years' full-time teaching at Marshall University are eligible.

Dr. Laura Stapleton has taught mathematics at Marshall since 1998.

"Laura is an excellent teacher and well-spoken [of] by her students and colleagues," said Dr. Alfred Akinsete, professor and chair of the department of mathematics. "She is a dedicated and hardworking teacher who is student-centered. I had worked with her on many occasions on curriculum matters and always valued her contributions and expertise. She had made tremendous contributions to the development of the programs in the department, particularly the general education courses."

Stapleton has an M.A. in mathematics from Marshall and her doctorate in instructional designs and technology from Old Dominion University.

Marshall University alumni and supporters will have an opportunity to make their mark on the university during the second-ever day of giving across two days April 26-27.

Hosted by the Marshall University Foundation, this event is an opportunity for the Marshall family to join together and make a lasting impact on the students of Marshall and to help shape the future of the institution. Beginning at noon on

Wednesday, April 26, Marshall's Day of Giving will feature 36 hours of giving thanks, with stories, updates and interactive elements throughout the event on the Foundation and Marshall University social media feeds and websites.

"Philanthropy is near and dear to my heart," said Marshall University President Brad D. Smith. "It is an opportunity to give back and support the things we love. On April 26-27, I encourage the entire Marshall family to come together and support our great university on Marshall's Day of Giving as we recognize those who support our students, our campus and our mission through giving."

While Marshall has participated in national giving days in the past, this will be the second time the university has set aside its own day dedicated to garnering financial support and highlighting those who give back to the university. The previous day of giving, which took place in October 2021, raised nearly \$80,000 for the university. This year's goal is \$100,000.

"Setting aside a day dedicated to recognizing those who make a profound impact on our institution through financial support is just one of the ways we can say thank you," said Dr. Ron Area, CEO of the Marshall University Foundation. "Marshall's Day of Giving is a great way for members of the Marshall family to make a difference and show their support for the university. Because all gifts, no matter the amount, add up to making a real difference for the students of Marshall."

Marshall's Day of Giving comes on the heels of the highly successful Marshall Rises campaign, the largest comprehensive campaign in the history of the university, which concluded last year. Marshall Rises raised more than \$176 million in support of the university, with more than 50,000 gifts recorded during the campaign.

One area most directly impacted in recent years is student support, with more than 500 additional students receiving scholarship aid annually than before the start of the campaign. In total, scholarship aid increased by 44% during Marshall Rises, with \$5 million in scholarship aid awarded annually over the past three years from more than 2,200 privately funded scholarships.

Marshall Rises also generated an unprecedented response from the alumni community and supporters of the university, with one-third of all gifts given during the campaign generated by first-time donors.

Additionally, money raised through this, and other initiatives, has helped shape new programs such as the Division of Aviation, which includes the Bill Noe Flight School and the Aviation Maintenance program, and is helping transform the Huntington campus through the building of a brand-new facility for the Lewis College of Business and Brad D. Smith Schools of Business, which is slated to open in 2024.

Through the financial support of a strong alumni community, Marshall has grown in stature and prestige over the past decade, reflected in the university's designation as a Doctoral University: High Research Activity, or "R2" status, in 2019, and a diverse offering of programs for students.

"In 2021 we broke away from traditional national giving days to create our own special day at Marshall," said Griffin Talbott, program director of the annual fund at the Marshall University Foundation. "We want to use this day to say thank you to all those who make an impact through giving each and every year. At the same time, we want to educate our alumni community and university supporters on how every gift made to Marshall equals real change in the classroom, on campus, in the community and around the world. We hope the Marshall community will join us on April 26 as we give thanks to our donors and encourage you to join that community with a gift of your own."

Machinist Tech program boasts 100 percent job placement rate

Every 2022 graduate of the Robert C. Byrd Institute's (RCBI) Machinist Technology/CNC Program found employment in the manufacturing sector and each student who is expected to complete the career skills program this spring already has a job.

"The exceptionally high placement rate of our graduates is a testament to their competence and the overwhelming demand for skilled machinists in our state and region,"

said Carol Howerton, RCBI senior strategic advisor for workforce development. "Year in and year out, nearly all – if not all – of our machinist grads find jobs in their chosen fields. We need more students to consider careers in machining. There are good-paying jobs waiting to be filled."

Merle Wooten, owner of Wooten Machine in Huntington, said the ability to find skilled machinist is an ongoing challenge for his company. "RCBI has always been and continues to be a great partner to the industry by producing quality workers," he said. "Most recently we hired three [RCBI] students as interns while they are completing their education. All have demonstrated great work ethic and a desire to learn and grow. We are excited to have brought them on board during their studies and look forward to them continuing employment with us beyond graduation."

In addition to Wooten Machine, RCBI's 2022 graduates and current students are working at manufacturing facilities across the state and region, including American Babbitt Bearing in Huntington; Engineered Profiles in Ironton, Ohio; FLSmidth in Winfield, Industrial Plating & Machine in Bluefield; HPS Co. in Charleston; Huntington Steel in Huntington; JM Precision in Normantown; Liberty Engineering and Machine in Craigsville; ML Dillion Co. in Milton; Micro Machine Works in Vincent, Ohio; Mouldagraph in Nitro; Northrop Grumman Innovation Systems at Rocket Center; Special Metals in Huntington; and U.S. Bearing and Power Transmission Corp. in Scott Depot.

Hayden Plum, a 2022 graduate, said he had multiple job offers but decided to accept a position at Northrop Grumman's facility in Mineral County, which he described as his "dream company," adding "I wanted to thank you guys (RCBI) for being a large contribution to my success."

RCBI's Machinist Technology/CNC Program enables students to earn industry recognized credentials from the National Institute for Metalworking Skills (NIMS) and a career-enhancing associate degree in partnership with Mountwest Community and Technical College. Because the RCBI program qualifies for West Virginia Invests, most in-state students graduate debt free.

TRIO staff attend COE policy seminar

Marshall University TRIO attended the Council for Opportunity in Education (COE) Policy Seminar from March 19 to 22. They joined over 800 TRIO professionals from across the country to meet with elected officials. TRIO is working to increase funding by \$107 million and increase the number of students served to one million. West Virginia TRIO programs met with Sen. Shelley Moore Capito (R-W.Va.), Sen. Federal TRIO Programs are outreach and student services programs designed to identify and provide services for individuals from disadvantaged backgrounds. TRIO projects serve and assist first-generation college students, income-eligible individuals and individuals with disabilities to progress through the academic pipeline from middle school to postbaccalaureate programs. TRIO programs started with the passing of the Higher Education Act of 1965.

Marshall University is unique because it hosts five TRIO projects. TRIO projects at Marshall University include Student Support Services, the Heart of Appalachia Talent Search (HATS) program, Empowering Appalachian Talent Search, Upward Bound and an Education Opportunity Center. Marshall University TRIO serves 2,419 participants and brings in \$1,651,365 annually in federal dollars. TRIO programs provide career exploration, college readiness, financial aid literacy, academic counseling, cultural enrichment and many other services. These services are free to students. Several TRIO alumni are working at Marshall University today, including Bonnie Bailey, Zachary Jenkins, Cody Call, Beretta Coleman, Katie Lyons, Caylin Bradshaw-France, Camille Collier and Alyssa Hager.
