Marshall opens first commercial composting facility in West Virginia

APRIL 19, 2023



Marshall officially opened the first commercial composting facility in the state of West Virginia with a ribbon cutting ceremony last Friday. The addition of the new facility also sets Marshall apart as the only university in the world with this level of technology.

The facility uses an XACT Systems BioReactor, which is a type of digester that offers an accelerated, automated and aerobic composting system. The composter boasts a rotating drum, with an advanced technological monitoring and control system that has the ability to overcome the challenge of

sustainable, responsible management of huge volumes of solid, organic waste. Aerobic digestion is a process that involves oxygen, allowing for digestion of the materials without the production of methane gas. Since the drum removes environmental factors that can slow the composting process, it can turn organic material into compost in as little as six days.

The composting facility is designed and operated by the university's sustainability department, led by Amy Parsons-White. She says the digester will have a large environmental impact.

"The digester will remove approximately 750 tons of waste from going to the landfill and 100 tons of methane production per year," said Parsons-White. "When accounting for the additional courses and workshops through the university, the workforce development and the potential for the model to be implemented across the state, the positive impacts are enormous."

The digester has the capacity to compost eight tons of organic waste per day. Organic waste consists of food waste, lawn waste, white office paper and cardboard. In addition, the

university's carbon footprint will be lowered by reducing waste haul to landfills and thousands of dollars will be saved each year in waste haul fees.

The entire composting facility project took four years from start to finish, with Parsons-White working extensively in the beginning of planning stages by collaborating with state legislators to draft bills that would change laws on postconsumer food waste.

"I am so excited to see the compost facility up and running and cannot wait to be able to share the facility with the community," said Parsons-White. "We hope the Marshall Compost Facility will be the first of many across West Virginia."

Parsons-White says compost can be a very lucrative way of handling waste, extending the life of landfills and developing a sustainable source of employment in the state.

"Compost is a highly desirable product," said Parsons-White. "I am thrilled that Marshall University and the state of West Virginia is a leader in bringing this technology to the eastern United States."

In addition to the digester, the compost facility also houses a worm bin, which contains more than 50,000 red wiggler worms that are capable of composting another three tons of waste each day.

Other offerings from the compost facility, including sought-after worm castings called "Herd Dirt" and compost tea, will soon be available for purchase at some area farmer's markets.

Parsons-White says the facility has garnered attention of others around the world who want to implement similar composting structures. A few of those who have reached out to her were in attendance at the ribbon cutting.

"We have people coming from all over the world," said Parsons-White before the event. "From Tanzania, from Canada and also from throughout the United States, because they want to model their compost facilities off of what we're doing here. We've also been contacted by Duke University, Virginia Tech, the University of Virginia, Arizona State University and McMaster University in Ontario because they want to model their sustainability departments off of us here at Marshall."

Speakers at the event included Marshall University President Brad D. Smith, West Virginia Del. Sean Hornbuckle, West Virginia State Sen. Bob Plymale and congressional representatives for U.S. Rep. Carol Miller, U.S. Sen. Joe Manchin and U.S. Sen. Shelley Moore Capito.

New Drinko Fellow named at Marshall University

Dr. Luke Eric Lassiter (pictured), a professor of humanities and anthropology and director of the graduate humanities program at Marshall University, has been named the 28th Distinguished John Deaver Drinko Academy Fellow.

The award is one of the university's highest recognitions for faculty and includes a stipend, re-assigned time from teaching, and other financial and clerical support for two academic years to undertake research, special projects, or other scholarly pursuits.

The announcement of Lassiter's appointment was made by the academy's executive director, Dr. Montserrat Miller, during the academy's annual dinner Saturday evening.

"It is truly an honor to welcome Dr. Luke Eric Lassiter to the ranks of Marshall University's Distinguished Drinko Fellows," Miller said. "In addition to being an exceptional faculty member, with incredible mastery of experiential learning and community engagement, Dr. Lassiter is a prolific scholar with a national and international consulting profile."

Lassiter has been with Marshall University since 2005. He received his doctorate in anthropology from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and taught at Ball State University in Indiana prior to joining Marshall.

Among his many awards and recognitions, Lassiter is a **2019 Weatherford Award** winner, along with colleagues Dr. Elizabeth Campbell and Dr. Brian Hoey, for "I'm Afraid of that Water: A Collaborative Ethnography on a West Virginia Water Crisis." He is a busy researcher, collaborator and lecturer.

Lassiter was recently named president of the Historic Glenwood Foundation and has served since 2014 as co-director of the Glenwood Center for Scholarship in the Humanities.

Saturday's dinner also featured a presentation by Sandra Reed, the 26th Drinko Fellow and a professor of art. Reed's award-winning paintings are held in numerous collections in the LaGrange Museum of Art, the Telfair Academy and the United States Navy Memorial.

Capener named new dean for the Lewis College of Business

Capener is an active volunteer leader for AACSB, having led peer-review teams in China, Taiwan, Malaysia, Japan and nine U.S.- based business schools. He successfully led UVU's Woodbury School of Business through AACSB re-accreditation in June 2022.

Capener earned his Ph.D. in International Business, an M.B.A. in marketing, and a bachelor's degree in political science and economics. In industry, Capener distinguished himself at international companies such as Leo Burnett. He also founded several companies including his own successful San Diego-based marketing agency and Above the Rim Hoopwear, and as a C-suite level executive with Necentives and Chang Industrial.



IT Update: Microsoft Authenticator App to add Number Matching

APRIL 11, 2023

Microsoft announced the default notification method for their multi-factor authentication (MFA) app, Microsoft Authenticator, will change from a push-to-approve model to a number-matching model. Designed to reduce bad actor MFA fatigue attacks on end users, the number matching system cannot be abused like its predecessor. On **Monday, May 1,** Marshall University Information Technology will push this update to university users.





When attempting log on to an Office 365 resource, users will be presented with a number on the screen (Figure I); the MFA notification is where the user will enter the number (Figure II). The notification will display the username, which application is being used, and the general location. With this information a user should easily be able to tell if the MFA prompt is legitimate or malicious. Keep in mind, the location can vary greatly if using a cellular device to log on to an MFA- protected resource.

With the addition of number matching, the Authenticator app will no longer work on Apple Watches. According to Microsoft, users who have used an Apple Watch with the Authenticator app in the past will need to authenticate on a different device.

If you do not currently use the Microsoft Authenticator App for MFA, this change does not apply and your current MFA method will continue to work.





Marshall to host 20th Annual Empty Bowls fundraiser April 21

APRIL 18, 2023



The Marshall University School of Art and Design will host its 20th Annual Empty Bowls pottery sale fundraiser from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Friday, April 21, in the gazebo at Pullman Square in downtown Huntington.

Bowls crafted by Marshall art students will be sold for \$20 each, with proceeds going to the Facing Hunger Foodbank. Each bowl helps provide 180 meals to

those in need in the food bank's 17-county region. The Facing Hunger Foodbank organizes, packs, and distributes about 11 million pounds of food annually.

In its 20 years, the Empty Bowls fundraiser has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for the food bank. The event was formerly held as a soup lunch-pottery sale fundraiser, but has been altered in the years since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"It is amazing to be in the 20th year for this event here in Huntington, West Virginia," said Ceramics Professor Frederick Bartolovic, the event organizer. "Empty Bowls allows students to very quickly understand how their art can make a difference to the local community.

"Our students work so hard to pull this event off, and they take so much pride in each and every creation they make. The community support behind this event is incredible and I am proud to showcase the works made by students in the School of Art & Design at Marshall University."

It continues to provide a direct link between the arts and the community, Bartolovic said. "Every year this event demonstrates the commitment of young artists and their desire to enrich the community in which they work," he said.

Facing Hunger Foodbank is honored to have this longstanding partnership with Marshall's School of Art & Design, said Samantha Adams, chief development officer at the Foodbank. "It aids us in our mission to serve the 130,000 souls at the center of our work, who live with food insecurity every day," she said.

Marshall student Hanna Davis participated in the event last year and is making bowls for the event again as part of the ART 446 Intermediate Pottery Class.







Prevention Empowerment Partnership to host Drug Take-Back Day Saturday

APRIL 19, 2023

The Prevention Empowerment Partnership (PEP), an initiative of the Center of Excellence for Recovery, housed within the Marshall University Research Corporation, will host the National Drug Take Back Day in partnership with the Huntington Police Department, Cabell County Sheriff's Department and Marshall University School of Pharmacy.

The National Drug Take-Back Day will take place on Saturday, April 22, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the following locations: Walgreen's, 111 4th Avenue, Huntington; Drug Emporium, 3 East Mall Rd., Barboursville; Huntington Police Department, 675 10th St., Huntington; QRT office, 1133 20th St., Huntington.

The National Drug Take-Back Day aids in the prevention of medication abuse and theft by ridding homes of potentially dangerous medications that are expired, unused and unwanted. Sites cannot accept personal care items, needles or sharps, liquid injectables, illegal drugs, thermometers and other mercury items, hydrogen peroxide or inhalers. The service is free and anonymous; no questions are asked.

Last fall, Americans turned in 324 tons of prescription drugs at more than 4,902 sites operated by the DEA with 4,340 state and local law enforcement partners. Overall, in its 22 previous Take Back events, the DEA and its partners have taken in over 16 million pounds of medication.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's National Survey on Drug Use and Health shows, year after year, that most misused and abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including someone else's medication being stolen from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash — pose potential safety and health hazards.





Marshall's annual SCORES (Scholastic Competition of Recognizing Educational Success) academic festival brought more than 1200 students from 27 high schools to Marshall's Huntington campus March 31.

"SCORES is a wonderful event that brings high-achieving students to campus to interact with our faculty and staff," said Michelle Biggs, director of Marshall's Herd Academy and event organizer. "It is a great opportunity for high school students to experience Marshall's campus and to hopefully be able to see themselves here as a Marshall student."

Students competed in 94 different academic events throughout the day in more than 40 different subjects. In addition, to the on-campus competitions, students had the opportunity to participate in 24 pre-submitted events.


