Marshall to establish new rural psychiatry residency program

A new grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Health Resources & Services Administration (HRSA) will support the planning and development of a four-year rural psychiatry residency program at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine.


The two-year, \$500,000 grant to the Marshall Community Health Consortium collaborative is one of 46 grants <u>announced</u> March 31 to plan and develop <u>Teaching Health Center</u> residency programs in community-based settings. The Marshall program will become the nation's fourth separately accredited rural track program designation in general psychiatry. The consortium, composed of the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine, Marshall Health, Cabell Huntington Hospital and Valley Health, is West Virginia's first recipient of the HRSA Teaching Health Center Graduate Medical Education Planning and Development Grant.


"Residency training programs proactively address the shortage of rural physicians across our state and nation," said Paulette S. Wehner, M.D., vice dean for graduate medical education at the **Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine** and principal investigator on the grant. "This grant enables us to develop a residency program that specifically trains psychiatrists to care for rural patients, with the goal that trainees stay in West Virginia to practice after they complete the program."

As part of separate rural accreditation designation requirements, the psychiatry residents must conduct at least 50% of their training at a rural site. The consortium will partner with Pleasant Valley Hospital, a member of Mountain Health Network, in Point Pleasant, West Virginia, located 42 miles north of Huntington. The consortium will work toward achieving initial accreditation in 2025 and welcoming its first residents in July 2026.

"Finding high quality mental health resources for patients in rural areas can be challenging," said Kevin Yingling, R.Ph., M.D., president and CEO of Mountain Health Network. "We are pleased to work with the consortium to develop a new rural psychiatry residency program at Pleasant Valley Hospital to improve access to mental health providers for Mason and Jackson counties in West Virginia, as well as Gallia and Meigs counties in Ohio."

"We look forward to building upon the work of our Marshall psychiatry residency program in Huntington to train quality psychiatrists for our state and region," said Suzanne Holroyd, M.D., professor and chair of psychiatry at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. "This new residency opportunity will combine rural clinical experiences with Huntington-based training to ensure a well-rounded curriculum." This is the second HRSA grant received by the School of Medicine's Office of Graduate Medical Education for rural residency planning. The school's rural surgery residency program will welcome its first residents in July 2023. To learn more about residency programs at the Joan C. Marshall student receives Young Forensic Scientists Forum (YFSF) Outstanding Poster Award

Kaylee N. Morton of Sheboygan, Wisconsin (pictured), was one of two young forensic scientists recognized for her research at the 75th Anniversary Conference of the American Academy of Forensic Sciences. The conference took place Feb. 12-18 in Orlando, Florida.

During the conference, posters are featured from students and professionals new to the field during the Young Forensic Scientists Forum (YFSF) poster session. Morton, a member of the Forensic Science Graduate Program (MUFSP) Class of 2023, graduating this week, was presented with an Outstanding Poster Award during the event. Her poster, titled "Visualization of Ignitable Liquid Residues

on Burned Substrates Using the Foster + Freeman Crime-lite® AUTO," was a collaborative effort among the Marshall University Forensic Science Graduate Program, the Huntington Fire Department, and the Huntington Fire Marshal to evaluate the potential of combining alternative light source detection with photography to aid in fire investigations. The poster was also authored by MUFSP faculty members Dr. Lauren L. Richards-Waugh and Dr. Kimberly S. Kunkler and Huntington Fire Marshal Captain Mathew Winters. The research investigated the use of the Crime-lite® AUTO to visualize and photograph ignitable liquid residues (ILRs) on burned materials commonly encountered at residential fire scenes.

It is often difficult for fire investigators to determine if a fire was intentionally set due to challenges such as destruction or rearrangement of the scene during extinguishing efforts. If the use of ignitable liquids is suspected, it may also be difficult for investigators to locate optimum areas for sample collection. Therefore, there is a need for accurate and efficient methods for the visualization of potential ignitable liquid residues at fire scenes. Morton's research demonstrated potential for the use of alternative light source detection with photography to aid in fire investigations, but further research and development are still needed.

Students in Health Communications course create campaigns to combat food insecurity, homelessness

Students in the Master of Public Health program (Health Communications course) and Dr. Georgiana Logan, who taught the class, worked with the Ronald McDonald House and the Huntington City Mission to design and create health communication campaigns that raise awareness of public health issues in West Virginia. Through these campaigns, students hosted a canned food/non-perishable food drive and a GoFundMe campaign during the week of April 10- April 14 for a class project

to collect donations to address food insecurity and homelessness in Cabell County. Students were able to collect over 200 non-perishable food items and raise \$400.00 dollars for The Huntington City Mission Cold Shelter.

School of Pharmacy, Rite Aid establish scholarship program to expand rural community pharmacy experience

Marshall's School of Pharmacy and Rite Aid are collaborating to provide a *Community Practice Rural Health Scholars* program for third-year pharmacy students interested in rural community pharmacy practice and future employment with Rite Aid. Eligible scholars will receive up to \$10,000 over the 15-week program.

"In many rural communities, a local pharmacist is the most accessible health

care provider," said Craig Kimble, Pharm.D., M.B.A., director of experiential learning and associate professor at the School of Pharmacy. "This program will advance patient-focused clinical skills, including medication reviews and counseling, medication insurance coverage assistance and vaccine administration."

Third-year pharmacy students in good standing with the School of Pharmacy must have a minimum 2.5 GPA, be eligible for hire at Rite Aid Corporation and licensure as an intern in

Ohio, and commit to working as a Rite Aid pharmacist in a mutually agreed upon rural area after graduation.

Completion of the program includes the development and presentation of a community-based rural health research project, participation in professional development opportunities such as customer service training and resume review with Rite Aid leadership.

Kim Richardson, Pharm.D., regional pharmacy leader at Rite Aid, welcomed the first two participants into the program during an event at the school April 7. Marshall students Asam Mesleh, from Dearborn, Michigan, and James Mills, from Corbin, Kentucky, will begin the *Community Practice Rural Health Scholars* program this summer as they start their Advanced Pharmacy Practice Experience (APPE) rotations.

"Community pharmacists are not only the most accessible, but sometimes the only health care professional that patients see in rural settings. It is critical that these pharmacists are highly educated on a broad range of topics and are prepared to practice at the top of their license," Richardson said. "Marshall graduates provide outstanding care to patients in community pharmacies. They make crucial health impact through immunization, medication therapy management and preventing emergency room visits. Rite Aid is ecstatic to partner with Marshall University and allow these pharmacists to be true practitioners and pillars of their community."

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Marshall establishes international dental preceptorship

The Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine has launched a short-term training program for internationally trained dentists who wish to increase their knowledge through didactics and observation of patient care.

The short-term program housed within the Department of Dentistry, Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery provides an opportunity for international dental graduates to increase their knowledge about postgraduate training in both clinical and didactic settings that teaches the basic principles, practice procedures and protocols of a general dental practice in the U.S.

"By observing and learning various methods and materials, participants can become more knowledgeable about expectations and clinical and didactic rigors of a general practice residency and thus become more competitive when applying for dental residency programs in the U.S.," said Raj K. Khanna, D.M.D., M.D., professor and chair of dentistry, oral and maxillofacial surgery and director of the preceptorship program. "Our faculty are familiar with international dental graduates and the rigors and challenges they face in order to practice in the U.S., especially since we accept international dental graduates into our residency program."

Program participants engage in didactic courses, observations and presentations in general dentistry, oral surgery, periodontics, endodontics and prosthodontics. The international preceptorship in general dentistry consists of two consecutive weeks, generally the third and fourth weeks of a given month.


Gue established the *Garee and Mary Ransbottom Scholarship* at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine in honor of his grandparents in 2019.

IT Update: Microsoft Authenticator App to add Number Matching

Microsoft announced the default notification method for their multi-factor authentication (MFA) app, Microsoft Authenticator, will change from a push-to-approve model to a number-matching model. Designed to reduce bad actor MFA fatigue attacks on end users, the number matching system cannot be abused like its predecessor. On **Monday**, **May 1**, Marshall University Information Technology will push this update to university users.



When attempting log on to an Office 365 resource, users will be presented with a number on the screen (Figure I); the MFA notification is where the user will enter the number (Figure II). The notification will display the username, which application is being used, and the general location. With this information a user should easily be able to tell if the MFA prompt is legitimate or malicious. Keep in mind, the location can vary greatly if using a cellular device to log on to an MFA- protected resource.

With the addition of number matching, the Authenticator app will no longer work on Apple Watches. According to Microsoft, users who have used an Apple Watch with the Authenticator app in the past will need to authenticate on a different device.

If you do not currently use the Microsoft Authenticator App for MFA, this change does not apply and your current MFA method will continue to work.

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Psy.D. program places all pre-doctoral students

The Doctor of Clinical Psychology (Psy.D.) program at Marshall University has placed 100% of its pre-doctoral students in nationwide internships.

The students are required to work full-time for a year providing mental health services at sites across the country.

"This is the final training experience for our students before they graduate and it is similar to a physician doing residency," said Dr. Keith Beard, director of the Psy.D. program at Marshall. "These students have already done practica in our campus clinic, in a community placement and in an integrated primary care setting. Now they will be representing Marshall across the country as they complete this internship."

Placement in pre-doctoral internship slots is a competitive process. There were almost 4,000 people all over the country applying for pre-doctoral internships this year.

"The fact that we had 100% of our students match to an internship site speaks to our training program and the quality of our students," Beard said. "It is an accomplishment that is impressive and one that Marshall can be proud of."

The Psy.D. program accepted its first class in 2002 and was granted accreditation by the American Psychological Association in 2006. The Psy.D. program is one of the few programs in the country that focuses on training psychologists to work with rural populations.
