Message from the President: Bystander Intervention training

As you may recall, one of the <u>recommendations of the student-led Title IX Task Force</u> last spring was yearly Bystander Intervention training for faculty, staff and student organizations.

Over the past few months, our Prevention & Response Program and the Women's and Gender Center, in conjunction with the Title IX Office, have been making this important training available to the university community.

The course is designed to provide members of our university community with tools we can use to help prevent sexual violence, including recognizing and stopping situations before they happen, stepping in during an incident, and speaking out against ideas and

behaviors that support sexual violence.

I encourage each of you to demonstrate your commitment to making Marshall University a safer place to learn, work and live by attending this training at your earliest convenience.

Marshall to increase Green & White Day open house opportunities

SEPTEMBER 13, 2023

The Office of Admissions and Recruitment will host an increased number of Green & White Days this fall, giving prospective students throughout the region even more opportunities to experience their moment at Marshall.

First FDA-approved RSV vaccine available for pregnant patients at Marshall Health

Pfizer's FDA-approved ABRYSVO™ vaccine for the prevention of respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) in infants through the immunization of pregnant patients at 32 to 36 weeks is available at Marshall OB/GYN.

ABRYSVO is the first and only U.S.-approved maternal vaccine to help protect infants at birth through six months of life from lower respiratory tract disease (LRTD) and severe LRTD due to RSV. Also approved by the European Commission, the vaccine is designed to protect against RSV A and B strains and was observed to be safe and effective. The FDA's decision is based on data from the pivotal phase 3 clinical trial involving more than 14,000 participants, including pregnant individuals and their infants. The <u>results</u> of the randomized, double-blinded, placebocontrolled phase 3 study were published in The New England Journal of Medicine in April 2023.

Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine and Marshall Health participated in phases 2 and 3 of the clinical trial from November 2020 through June 2023. Hisham Keblawi,

M.D., professor of OB/GYN; Morgan Ruley, OB/GYN research coordinator; and Hillary Salava, RN, research coordinator in the Department of Clinical and Translational Sciences (DCTS), led and coordinated the Marshall team's involvement in the trial among the Marshall Clinical Research Center (MCRC) and departments of OB/GYN, Pediatrics and DCTS. The multisite trial spanned across 18 countries.

"Clinical trials done at MCRC are essential to promote the well-being of West Virginians and the tri-state area we serve," said Uma Sundaram, M.D., vice dean of research and graduate education and chair of DCTS.

RSV is a contagious virus and common cause of respiratory illness. It can affect the lungs and make breathing difficult, potentially causing hospitalization or death. In 2022, children's hospitals locally and nationally saw an unusually high number of RSV cases and hospitalizations.

"RSV can be one of the most serious respiratory illnesses we see in young infants and, until now, we have had few tools to help in the prevention and treatment of RSV," said Jessie Shields, M.D., pediatrician at Marshall Health and associate professor at the School of Medicine. "The development of this vaccine is an exciting advancement in RSV prevention, and we are thrilled Marshall played an important role in its development."

For the first three months after birth, the vaccine was proven 82% effective at preventing severe RSV disease and 57% effective at keeping babies from visiting the doctor due to RSV infection. By six months after birth, the vaccine was 69% effective at preventing severe RSV disease and 51% effective at preventing a RSV-related doctor's visit. The vaccine did not prove to offer additional protection compared to the placebo in keeping six-month-old infants from seeing the doctor for RSV.

The most common maternal side effects were pain at the injection site, headache, muscle pain and nausea. While low birth weight and jaundice were slightly higher for infants in the vaccine group when compared to the placebo group, the FDA could not determine or exclude the vaccine as the cause. No safety concerns were evident in maternal participants or in infants and toddlers up to 24 months.

"Infants under six months are most vulnerable to RSV, and no other vaccine is available for this age," Keblawi said. "We are currently recommending all pregnant patients seen in our clinic receive the vaccine sometime between 32 and 36 weeks unless their medical history would suggest otherwise."

First house in Livable Housing Project to be unveiled Sept. 15

SEPTEMBER 13, 2023

The Minority Health Institute will hold a ceremony at 11 a.m. Friday, Sept. 15, to unveil a home at 1211 19th St. as part of the Livable Housing Project.

The Livable Housing Project was established through a groundbreaking collaboration between UniCare Health Plan of West Virginia and the Marshall University Minority Health Institute in October 2021. The \$1 million community grant provided by UniCare helped establish a program aimed at improving the livability and conditions of this home and four others chosen throughout the state of West Virginia. The visionary partnership seeks to counteract the prevalent issue of substandard housing, that often affects minority households, causing health issues.

Dr. Anthony Woart is professor and chair of the Department of Public Health at Marshall University and founder/director of the Marshall University Minority Health Institute.

"Addressing social determinants of health is essential to addressing health disparities and health equity among minority and vulnerable populations," Woart said. "I am therefore honored to have been a part of [the] Marshall University Minority Health Institute's efforts in providing opportunities for livable housing among the minority and vulnerable populations of West Virginia as part of the institute's mission and vision."

The project liberates families from issues like mold and other concerns that arise when housing hasn't been updated. With improved living conditions comes a feeling of hope and safety, according to Woart.

LaDawna Walker Dean is the minority health coordinator for the West Virginia Minority Health Initiative.

"Our work has just started by helping minority families throughout West Virginia be able to have access to safe, affordable, good-quality housing that can positively impact a person's health, well-being and overall community equity," Walker said.

The transformed home in Huntington belongs to Matthew and Angel Plante. They, along with distinguished members of the Huntington community, will be on hand for the unveiling of the first Livable Housing Project home that will stand for change in the minority community.



Marshall Heath supports hospital-based substance use disorder programs across southern West Virginia

Marshall Health is supporting substance use disorder (SUD) programs in hospitals across southern West Virginia thanks to funding from a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Overdose Data to Action grant.

The first program, called Reverse the Cycle (RTC), was developed by the Maryland-based consulting firm Mosaic. RTC integrates individuals in long-term recovery from SUD known as peer recovery support specialists into the hospital setting to work with medical providers. The support specialists help ensure all persons presenting for service, regardless of medical conditions, are screened for high-risk alcohol, illicit drug and prescription misuse. RTC incorporates evidence-based practices including the Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) model, the Overdose Survivors Outreach Program (OSOP); and Medication for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD) initiation in emergency departments.

"The Reverse the Cycle program is a collaborative effort between hospital emergency room providers, behavioral health agencies and those who have lived the recovery experience," said Beth Welsh, associate director of addiction sciences at Marshall Health's department of family and community health. "Working together, we meet persons with substance use disorder where they present, assess their readiness for change and assist them in finding a path to recovery."

The Reverse the Cycle program is now in these southern West Virginia hospitals: Beckley ARH Hospital, Bluefield Regional Medical Center, Boone Memorial Health, Cabell Huntington Hospital, Logan Regional Medical Center, Princeton Community Hospital, Raleigh General Hospital, St. Mary's Medical Center, Summers County ARH Hospital and Welch Community Hospital. Since the program was initiated, more than 200,000 persons presenting at the emergency room have been screened. More than 1,000 individuals have been linked to treatment.

In addition to RTC, Marshall Health has also collaborated with Vandalia Health's Charleston Area Medical Centers to support their hospital-based comprehensive substance use disorder initiatives that rely on the same evidence-based components as the RTC program.

Drinko Library hosting 'Indigenous Appalachia'

Marshall University's Drinko Library is hosting "Indigenous Appalachia," an exhibit that will be on display through Dec. 11, on the first floor Learning Commons area.

The traveling exhibit comes from West Virginia University, which resides on land that includes ancestral territories of the

Shawnee, Lenape (or Delaware), Cherokee, Haudenosaunee (or Iroquois–the Seneca, Cayuga, Onondaga, Oneida, Mohawk, Tuscarora) and other Indigenous peoples.

As part of the WVU Art in the Libraries program, the exhibit is designed to increase awareness of the contributions of Indigenous Appalachians to the region's shared history and present, while also recognizing continuing injustices faced by Indigenous people.

"We are excited to be a part of the WVU Art in Libraries Program this year by hosting their Indigenous Appalachia Exhibition. We hope that it will help to encourage discourse and

engagement with our students and community, as well as bringing visibility and awareness of this underrepresented portion of Appalachia," said Michelle Alford with Marshall University Libraries.

"Most Americans do not know about Indigenous culture, from history to today, but they are a large part of America's fabric. Invisibility is a modern form of bias," said Sally Brown, WVU Libraries exhibits coordinator. "With this exhibit, we hope to both acknowledge the contradictions in the Indigenous histories of our areas and in our collections, and highlight Indigenous stories, perspectives and successes, all curated in collaboration with Indigenous advice."

The exhibit explores indigenous people in Appalachia, both ancestral and contemporary perspectives, as well as themes such as portrayals of Indigenous cultures and histories, especially in consideration of European colonial history, U.S. policies, social forces and centuries of genocidal acts.

Artists include Nadema Agard (painting, Cherokee/Lakota/Powhatan), Connor Alexander (game design, Cherokee), Erin Lee Antonak (sculpture/drawing, Oneida), Kayln Barnoski (fabric/mixed media, Cherokee), April Branham (painting/photography, Monacan), Ethan Brown (gourd design/painting, Pamunkey), Annette Clapsaddle (writing, Cherokee), Robert D'Alimonte (woodworking/carving, Tuscarora), Brent Michael Davids (composing/music, Mohican/Munsee-Lenape), John Gritts (drawing/painting, Cherokee), Benjamin Harjo, Jr. (drawing/painting, Absentee Shawnee), Yonavea Hawkins (bead/fashion, Delaware), Antoinette (Toni) Scott (cornhusk dolls, Seneca), Rosy Simas (transdisciplinary art/dance, Seneca), Amelia Winger-Bearskin (NFT/digital, Seneca-Cayuga).

There are several resources available related to the exhibit as well, including a companion online exhibit, YouTube videos, discussion guides for tours, and lesson plans and worksheets for K-12 teachers.
