

Two to run for student body president

The largest number of candidates in Marshall's history has filed for the March 12 Student Government elections. This year's 78 candidates top last year's record of 50.

(See story page two)

Under the new registration system candidates have filed under specific constituencies rather than as "at-large" candidates as in the past.

There are two candidates each for president and vice president of the Student Body. Tom Hensley will run for president, with Beckley Fletcher as his running





mate. Both are Huntington juniors. Also running for president is Jim Wooten, Beckley senior, with Pam Slaughter, Dunbar junior as his running mate.

Two students have filed for president of the senior class and two for vice president of that class.

There are four candidates each for president and vice president of the junior class, seven candidates for president of the sophomore class and four for sophomore vice president.

Fifty-one students have filed for positions as student senators: 11 from the Greek (Interfraternity Council) constituency, 9 from the Greek (Panhellenic

constituency, 6 from the Interdorm (Men) constitutnecy, 6 from the Interdorm (Women) constitutnecy, 5 from the Unaffiliated constituency and 14 from the Transient (Town) constituency.

Approximately 2,400 students have registered to vote. The break-down of students registered in each constituency and the number of candidates to be elected from each constituency h as not yet been determined.

Last year's Student Government elections saw a record turnout of 1,504 voters. If as much as 65 per cent of those now registered vote in the coming election, the record will be topped.

Students will be voting on computer cards in four areas:

1. For a student body president and vice president.

2. For a class president and vice president.

3. For a given number of senators from the specified constituency.

 For seven constitutional amendments.

Students vote for class officers in the class to which they return in the fall.

The amendments, which have been listed previously in The Parthenon, concern student representation in Student Government.

Regents bill approved by House

Reorganization of higher education in West Virginia was virtually assured Monday with approval of the board of regents bill by the House of Delegates. The Senate passed it Saturday 20-13.

The bill which creates a supervising board for state colleges Governor Moore earlier told The Parthenon he would sign the bill. The House of Delegates approved the bill as passed by the Senate.

Senate defeated an amendment to the bill to establish a separate nine-member board of governors for Marshall, which was proposed by Sen. V. K. Knapp, R-Putman and a graduate of West Virginia University. The amendment would have retained the present WVU board of governors which will be "repealed by implication" under the board of regents bill. Sen. C. H. McKown, D-Wayne, was quoted as opposing Senator Knapp's amendment, saying he at one time favored such an idea but the "people at Marshall have made no request for a separate board. They adhere to the board of regents plan." Sen. Bernard Smith, D-Logan, said objections were only an attempt to try and kill the bill by "those who oppose it."

This follows the idea of the original House version which was amended to provide for terms orignially of one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, and nine years with one member being appointed each successive year for a term of nine years.

Before passing the bill, the Senate amended it to:

(1) Reduce the terms of the nine members of the board of regents appointed by the governor from nine years to six years and provide that three members shall be appointed each two years. The provisions of the bill as passed by the Senate would take effect July 1, 1969. It would place WVU, Marshall and the eight colleges all under the control of the regents, eliminating the WVU board of governors and limiting



Rules for student election outlined

Rules for the Student Government election March 12 have been released by Elections Coordinator Edward Robinson, Joppa, Md., senior.

Mandatory rules are:

1. All candidates must comply with provisions of eligibility as stated in the Student Government Constitution.

2. There shall be no defacing of state property, such as pasting, marking with chalk, tacking or nailing of materials on trees or buildings.

3. Any malicious destruction of properly posted materials is unlawful and any person found guilty of violating this act shall face Student Court action; guilty candidates shall be disqualified.

4. Each candidate shall be held responsible for complete disposal of all campaign materials bearing his name at a time to be fixed in the election rules.

5. It shall be the responsibility of the persons working at the polls to contest any vote at the time it is cast. This shall not preclude a later contestation of the ballot before Senate ratification of the election results.

6. All votes shall be counted by the dean of student affairs, the president and vice president of the student body, election commissioner and the respective coordinator.

The election committee's rules are:

 There shall be no posting or pasting of election materials by candidates within any building.
No signs, posters or billboards on or off campus may be put up before noon, March 9 (Sunday).

 No campaign materials, platforms, fliers, or cards may be passed out before noon, March 9.
The filing fees collected by the election committee shall be turned over to the business manager of Student Government.

6. Voting shall be done on computer cards with the order of candidates on the ballot to be determined by the drawing of lots.

* *

7. In the event that a candidate withdraws from the election, his spot on the ballot shall be left blank.

*

8. During the voting there shall be present at the polls the election commissioner and/or the student government election coordinator and/or a member of the Student Government committee.

9. Persons wishing to file for absentee ballots must do so by noon, March 10. The application must be approved by the election commissioner and the Student Government election coordinator. Absentee ballots must be held by the election commissioner until the next day.

10. Absentee ballots will be counted along with the regular ballots.

11. There shall be no campaigning or electioneering within 30 feet of the outer limits of the official polls on the day of the election. There shall be no posters within 30 feet of the outer limits of the official polls at anytime.

12. There shall be allowed no tape recorders, phonographs, radios or sound amplification devices of any sort on campus being used to campaign for an individual or individuals.

13. Official polling places will be the Shawkey Student Union basement, the first floor student lounge in Stewart H. Smith Hall and the lounge of South Hall.

14. In order to vote, one must present and surrender to the

election representative at the polls his voter's card and his activity card.

15. In order for a student to vote by write-in ballot, he must ask the poll worker for said ballot. These ballots shall be made available at the polls and shall be drafted by the Student Government election ocordinator and members of that committee.

16. Any irregularities during filing, campaigning, registration or voting should be reported to the election commissioner and the dean of student affairs at the time of occurrence for immediate action.

17. All campaign materials must be taken down by 6 p.m., March 12. Failure to comply will result in the candidate being fined the cost of having them removed.

18. Voting will end at 4 p.m., March 12.

19. When a student qualifies in more than one constituency, he should be allowed to choose the constituency in which he wishes to vote and/or run for office — provided that it is the same constituency. Classified Ads

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
