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

Marshall to celebrate 25th anniversary of John Deaver Drinko Library

Marshall will celebrate the 25th anniversary of the John Deaver Drinko Library Tuesday, Oct. 24, with an informal event at 2 p.m. in the library and a fundraising gala at 6 p.m. at Brad D. Smith Foundation Hall.

The library opened its doors in October 1998. Named for 1942 Marshall graduate and longtime university supporter John Deaver Drinko, it was designed by Perry Dean

Rogers & Partners with elements that tie to Old Main and a terra cotta archway salvaged from the building that previously stood there. The 180,000-square-foot building is home to University Libraries' general collections, Information Technology, multiple study and meeting rooms, the Online Learning Design Center, the Writing Center and a popular relaxation station.

University Libraries invites the Marshall community to celebrate the building's anniversary with free cake and refreshments at 2 p.m. Oct. 24 in the lobby, along with a performance by Marshall's own a capella group, 3rd Avenue, led by director Dr. Briana Nannen, and remarks from Marshall Provost Dr. Avinandan "Avi" Mukherjee and Dr. Monica Brooks, dean of University Libraries.

The evening of Oct. 24 will feature a private fundraising event for the planned Integrated Services Center (ISC). The ISC will be located on the first floor of Drinko Library and will integrate Circulation Services, Research Services, the Writing Center and the Drinko location of the MU Food Pantry with grab and go service.

The center will include a shared space for libraries, IT and the Writing Center, offer a podcasting/videocasting room (in collaboration with the Marshall University Foundation), and host the Communication Studies Presentation Room (in collaboration with Dr. Clinton Brown and Communication Studies).

Special guests for the dinner include Mukherjee, as well as Dr. Montserrat Miller, executive director of Marshall's John Deaver Drinko Academy, and Judge Robert C. Chambers of U.S. District Court's Southern District of West Virginia.

"I was so thrilled to have an opportunity to assist with the move to the Drinko Library in 1998 when we opened and have enjoyed seeing it evolve through the years," Brooks said. "The concept was extremely innovative for the time. You'd think we would have fallen back a bit since then, but I am happy to report this facility, the services and the talent within supporting our students and faculty with their research needs have stayed abreast of national trends. With our new and evolving efforts in open educational resources, integrated services, digital literacy, podcasting, and even wellness and pop culture, the Drinko Library is still relevant, inventive, and on point."

Thanks to the many offerings at Drinko and Marshall's leadership in developing a statewide consortium to help colleges and universities maximize their resources and buying power, Marshall has been recognized by EBSCO, a leading provider of library information resources. The organization recognized Marshall University Libraries as a "library they feel has contributed to the profession in a way that goes beyond their normal scope," and presented the university with a \$25,000 grant. This anniversary fundraising event aims to supplement that grant to provide services that will enhance the student experience, and expand opportunities for students and employees.

Marshall University, Marshall Health, Mountain Health Network announce new integrated academic health system

Marshall University, Marshall Health and Mountain Health Network have announced the official formation of Marshall Health Network Inc., an integrated academic health system with Marshall University's Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine.

Mountain Health Network has been renamed Marshall Health Network, which comprises four hospitals: Cabell Huntington Hospital, St. Mary's Medical Center, Hoops Family Children's

Hospital and Rivers Health; ambulatory facilities, medical offices and employed physician practices; along with the Marshall Health physician practice and its facilities.

The formation of the system drives the delivery of high-quality multidisciplinary care, provides a forum for training the next generation of health care providers and advances research opportunities aimed at improving the health and wellness of patients and communities across West Virginia and the bordering states of Kentucky and Ohio.

"From primary care and rural health to specialty services, the new system improves access to high quality care for patients of all ages," stated Kevin W. Yingling, R.Ph., M.D., F.A.C.P., CEO of Marshall Health Network. "Our highly trained physicians and staff are dedicated to addressing our region's pressing health issues of addiction, behavioral health, obesity and eldercare. Uniting as a system strengthens our shared commitment to expand research, develop clinical centers of excellence, and offer new medical specialties."

"This moment brings new meaning to the 'Power of We,' unifying our voice and amplifying our academic, clinical and research missions throughout West Virginia and beyond," said Beth L. Hammers, M.B.A., CEO of Marshall Health. "Under the Marshall Health Network banner, we look forward to optimizing resources and initiating a holistic shift in how we deliver health care, how we train future healthcare professionals and how we engage with our communities."

"Today marks a historic milestone in the journey of Marshall University as we officially recognize the new integrated academic health system, Marshall Health Network," said Marshall University President Brad D. Smith. "This transformative initiative represents our unwavering commitment to advancing health care, education, and research for the betterment of our community and beyond. Together, we will build a brighter, healthier future, where innovation and compassion converge to redefine health care excellence."

The organizations will host a joint community event celebrating the integration at 4 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 17, in the Marshall University Medical Center/Cabell Huntington Hospital Atrium, located at 1600 Medical Center Drive in Huntington.

Marshall Health Network Inc. is a West Virginia-based not-for-profit academic health system that includes Marshall Health physician practice; four hospitals: Cabell Huntington Hospital, a 303-bed teaching hospital, St. Mary's Medical Center, a 393-bed teaching hospital, Hoops Family Children's Hospital, a 72-bed pediatric specialty hospital within Cabell Huntington Hospital; and Rivers Health, a 101 acute-bed hospital, and the employed physician practices of the hospitals. 

'Us & Them' podcast host invites local community to discuss trust in science during live taping

Award-winning podcaster Trey Kay is bringing his program *Us & Them* to the Huntington campus for a deep discussion about diminished trust in science.

"Diminished Trust: How Do We Restore Faith in Science?" is scheduled for 4 p.m., Thursday, Oct. 19, in the Drinko Library Atrium. Kay will talk with Dr. Jonathan Zimmerman, University of Pennsylvania's education historian and author of "Whose America? Culture Wars in the Public Schools"; Dr. Habiba Chichir, Marshall's biological anthropologist; and Dr. Adam Franks, M.D., associate residency director for the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine.

The event is free and open to the public, but registration is recommended because space is limited. Registration is available at https://bit.ly/3RMEZun and includes an audience Q&A segment with preference given to students. The live event will be taped for use in a future episode of *Us & Them*. The event is co-sponsored by Marshall University's John Deaver Drinko Academy, the West Virginia Humanities Council and West Virginia Public Broadcasting, the broadcasting home of *Us & Them*.

Last month, Kay and his team hosted a "Diminished Trust" event at West Virginia University that focused on waning public trust in journalism and the news media.

"Trust is in short supply in America these days," Kay said. "Across the board and across the political spectrum people seem to lack trust in our government... in many of our agencies and organizations – even in each other. That's why our Us & Them team is staging these conversations to encourage citizens to consider how long our society can sustain this erosion of trust."

"The current diminishment of trust in science is one expression of anti-intellectualism, a longer trend in our culture, and one which waxes and wanes," says Dr. Monserrat Miller, executive director of Marshall's John Deaver Drinko Academy. "Diminishing trust in science, though, is something that we need to explore and discuss because it poses a range of dangers from public health to cynicism about the idea of truth itself."

Here is more about the speakers:

Zimmerman is a Professor of History of Education and the Berkowitz Professor in Education at the University of Pennsylvania. A former Peace Corps volunteer and high school teacher, Zimmerman is the author of "Whose America? Culture Wars in the Public Schools" (University of Chicago Press, 2nd ed.) and eight other books. Zimmerman is also a columnist at the Philadelphia Inquirer and a frequent contributor to the Washington Post, the New York Review of Books, and other popular publications. Zimmerman taught for 20 years at New York University, where he received its Distinguished Teaching Award in 2008.

Chirchir is a biological anthropologist and anatomist. Her research focuses on understanding the relationship between changes in skeletal anatomy and behavior by investigating trabecular and cortical bone. She conducts comparative analyses of anatomical features in fossil human ancestors, modern humans, other primates and non-primate animals including dogs and big cats using CT imaging. Chirchir earned a B.A. from the University of Nairobi, an M.A. from New York University, and a Ph.D. from George Washington University. Chirchir is a research associate at the National Museum of Natural History, Smithsonian Institution.

Franks is a family medicine physician at Marshall Health, and a professor and vice chair of the department of family and community health at the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. Franks' practice provides full-spectrum care for children and adults, including obstetric and gynecologic care. His research areas include COVID-19 protocols, opioid monitoring protocols, and blood borne pathogen exposure monitoring protocol adherence.

Kay is the creator and host of *Us & Them*, a podcast/radio program distributed by PRX that airs on West Virginia Public Broadcasting. Kay's passion for reporting on culture wars began in his hometown of Charleston, West Virginia, with "The Great Textbook War" (2009), a radio documentary. He followed that award-winning work with "The Long

Game: Texas' Ongoing Battle for the Direction of the Classroom" (2013), which he researched as a Spencer Fellow for Education Reporting at the Columbia Journalism School. He's produced for This American Life, The New Yorker Radio Hour, Marketplace, American RadioWorks, Morning Edition, Inside Appalachia and PBS Frontline. Kay also taught at the Columbia Journalism School, Marist College and the State University of New York at New Paltz. He splits his time between New York's Hudson Valley and West Virginia's Kanawha Valley.

The taping at Marshall is the second in a series of public *Us & Them* events focused on diminished trust in America. Kay's team is planning future "trust" related events with Marshall, WVU and other West Virginia institutions.

The national tour of "Come from Away," the Tony Award-winning Broadway musical about the true story of the small town that welcomed the world, will open the 87th season of the Marshall Artists Series at the Joan C. "Come from Away" tells the

remarkable true story of 7,000 stranded passengers and the small town in Newfoundland that welcomed them. Cultures clashed and nerves ran high, but uneasiness turned into trust, music soared into the night, and gratitude grew into enduring friendships.

On Sept. 11, 2001, the world stopped. On Sept. 12, their stories moved us all.


